#### <u>CN – Lee Nelson, Senior Dangerous Goods Officer and Emily Hamer, Regional Manager,</u> <u>CN Public and Government Affairs</u>

Vice Chair Thiessen welcomed Lee Nelson, Senior Dangerous Goods Officer, Western Region and Emily Hamer, Regional Manager, CN Public and Government Affairs to the meeting.

Mr. Nelson and Ms. Hamer provided a PowerPoint Presentation.

Mr. Nelson provided an overview of the CN Network wherein CN transports a wide range of products across 23,000 miles. From Prince George to Prince Rupert there are a large number of intermodal containers. Some dangerous goods are also shipped along the corridor.

CN is run under a Safety Management System:

- CN Safety Policy: "Safety is of the utmost importance";
- · Customers rely on safe handling;
- Public expectations:
- CN's reputation:
- Partnership with its employees;

CN also has a "Responsible Care" commitment:

Dangerous Goods are an important and carefully managed part of the business.

Mr. Nelson advised that CN has invested heavily in technology that assists in foreseeing problems with trains and infrastructure ahead of having an incident. There are detectors that measure bearing temperatures on all cars. The automated detectors radio to the train to let the crew know if there are warm or hot bearings on the train to eliminate a potential train derailment. There are also WILD (Wheel Impact Load Detector) Sites that identify issues with wheels. In addition there are Driving Equipment Detectors that identify issues with the train.

CN has spent more than \$8 Billion over the past five years on technology and capital.

Mr. Nelson stated that CN is a Federally regulated railroad, however, CN goes above and beyond what the Federal Government requires for compliance. The following risk reduction initiatives have been implemented to further reduce risk during transportation:

- Implementation of the Association of American Railroads (AAR) "OT-55" Guideline in Canada: maximum speed of 50 mph for "key trains" transporting dangerous goods;
- Route Risk Assessment and Mitigation for Dangerous Goods: continuing review of mainline routes using a risk-based approach: assessment of multiple factors.

CN does not run 1-person train crews. All trains have at least 2 crew members including a conductor and a locomotive engineer.

CN has detailed and specific rules with respect to securing unattended equipment. When locomotives are attached:

- Application of air brakes on all locomotives in lead consist:
- Full application of air brakes on the entire train;
- Hand brake applied on the lead locomotive;
- All locomotive controls secured to prevent movement, and the reverser removed from the control stand:
- All doors and windows locked on the locomotives;
- Peer-to-peer verification among two crew members to ensure compliance verification;
- All CN locomotives are also equipped with a Reset Safety Control device, which prompts full-service train brake application if it detects locomotive movement and there is no control stand response.

When no locomotives are attached:

- Cars cannot be left unattended without handbrakes applied and specific operating instructions are met which mitigate risk;
- Peer-to-peer verification among two crew members to ensure compliance verification.

Specific handbrake guidelines applicable reflect specific grades on territory. All CN main line crews are composed of two members.

DOT-111 Tank Cars are non-pressure tank cars designed to carry a mixture of hazardous and non-hazardous materials, including crude oil. Railroads own very few DOT-111s. The majority are owned by leasing companies or rail customers. The U.S. Department of Transportation, Transport Canada, and the Association of American Railroads North American Tank Car Committee issue car regulations and standards.

Mr. Nelson noted that much of what CN transports are products that people use every day such as chlorine, propane, propylene, butadiene and styrene, and sodium hydroxide.


## <u>CN – Lee Nelson, Senior Dangerous Goods Officer and Emily Hamer, Regional Manager, CN Public and Government Affairs</u>

Mr. Nelson explained the System Protection Model for Dangerous Goods



CN's Emergency Response Plan covers how the plan is activated and how notifications are carried out both externally and internally. It covers how incidents are assessed and how CN intends to work in unified Incident Command. Where there are incidents within a municipality, CN is in custody and control of the materials and has a duty to respond. CN also works with the municipality in which the event occurred as the municipality has the legal authority to act.

Mr. Nelson described Unified Command.



Mr. Nelson discussed CN's notification system. If a CN employee discovers an incident, they contact the Rail Traffic Control Centre (RTC). At that time, the conductor will leave the engine with the paperwork and try to determine what has happened. RTC then contacts the Network Operations Centre who prepares the mandatory government reporting. The Senior Region Officers that run the railroad are notified and the CN Police Communication Center will notify the response team at the railroad. The eBusiness and Transaction Center will immediately take the information on what has been relayed regarding the cars known or believed to be involved and will notify the shippers. A safety data sheet for the product involved will be requested at that time. That information is distributed electronically to CNs distribution lists and emergency responders. The Dangerous Goods Officer, Risk Management and the Environmental Officer are notified, as well as Public Affairs, Human Resources, and the legal team.

The crew is responsible for a sequential train list of all the cars and what is being carried. That information is available in the event that emergency responders require the information. If the crew is incapacitated, the information is available digitally.

CN has a number of Outreach Programs:

- Railway Emergency Response Course;
- TransCAER/Training Car or Training Trailer;
- Joint Training Exercises;
- CN Sponsored Tank Car Specialist Week for Fire Departments in Pueblo, CO;
- CN Sponsored Advanced Tank Car Specialist for ER Contractors in Pueblo, CO.

Vice Chair Thiessen asked how many dangerous goods emergencies CN has had to respond to in the RDBN in the last 1-2 years.

Mr. Nelson indicated that there had not been any incidents.

Vice Chair Thiessen asked how CN engages the Regional District when an event occurs outside of a municipality.

Mr. Nelson indicated that that would be an ongoing process. Currently, municipal representatives are notified as per Federal regulations. New internal protocol has been developed to ensure Regional District representatives are notified for events outside of municipal boundaries.

Mr. Nelson stated that Transport Canada has put into place Protective Direction 32. Emergency Response Representatives, when registered through Canutec, will receive an annual report inclusive of the aggregate total of dangerous goods that move through the community, a breakdown of the type and quantity of dangerous goods that are being moved through the community, as well as a quarterly breakdown.

When an incident occurs, First Responders can immediately contact CN Police and request the document identifying what materials are being carried on the train.

Mr. Nelson advised that spill response equipment is located in Burns Lake and Smithers. Trained personnel are located in Terrace. Equipment and responders are flown in where required.

Vice Chair Thiessen questioned how CN wraps up an event ie. reporting and communicating.

Mr. Nelson responded that following an event, CN participates in a critique and debrief that is typically run by fire services. CN holds an internal critique and debrief. Depending on the severity of the incident, the Transportation Safety Board prepares a report.

Vice Chair Thiessen asked if CN obtains a list of local contractors.

Mr. Nelson replied that CN does maintain a list and uses the closest resources they can get during an incident.

Vice Chair Thiessen asked about training opportunities such as those offered in Colorado being offered in northern B.C.

Mr. Nelson stated that there is a specialized training facility in Colorado that cannot be decentralized. He added that there is a smaller scale version in Maple Ridge where training is offered. Transport Canada is currently discussing having a training facility in eastern and western Canada.

How does CN determine compensation for communities when damage has been done?

Ms. Hamer advised that during an incident, a Risk Manager would be on site. A community would work with the Risk Manager to determine damage and costs. Costs surrounding accommodations, meals etc. would be considered for any incident caused by CN.

April Flood Update

Director Thiessen brought forward concerns regarding the water release by Rio Tinto Alcan that is heightening the flood risk to Vanderhoof. Discussion took place regarding the ability for Vanderhoof to access the necessary sand bags and material in the high possibility of flooding.

Concerns and frustrations were expressed regarding the lack of community input in regard to water use in the Nechako River and Nechako Reservoir. Communication by Rio Tinto Alcan with the communities and the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako in regard to flood level changes was discussed.

Director Thiessen noted that during the winter of 2014/2015 the Nechako River was at extremely low levels. Director Parker also spoke to Fraser Lake experiencing low water levels in the summer of 2014 due to the impacts of Rio Tinto Alcan managing the Nechako Reservoir.

Discussion took place regarding the importance of inviting Rio Tinto Alcan to the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Board meeting.

The lack of a water use plan for the Nechako River is very concerning. There needs to be a balance throughout the Nechako Watershed to prevent un-necessary impacts to the region in its entirety. Discussion took place in regard to bringing the issues forward at the Union of B.C. Municipalities Convention in September.

Discussion took place regarding Rio Tinto Alcan's possible building of a second tunnel and the impacts to the region.

Hans Berndorff, Financial Administer provided an overview of the 2015 Budget Draft No. 3.

- Budget surplus from previous year;
  - In the past there was more project based work and currently it is more operational based;
  - Less surplus moving forward;
- Cost increases due to regulation changes;
  - A discussion paper completed by the RDBN titled "The Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako: Changing Service Delivery Requirements and Expectations"
    - Brings forward the impacts of regulation changes and funding impacts to the RDBN;
  - Possible development of a rising trend in cost analysis:
  - Ministry of Community, Sport and Cultural Development shows information on its website in regard to the RDBN tax rate being lower than other Regional Districts
  - Building Inspection:
    - 2014 Building Permit estimations were almost exactly what was received thus the surplus carried forward is less;
  - Emergency Preparedness:
    - o Two components:
      - Increase in cost:
        - 20% of staff cost previously allocated to rural government due to rural fire protection;
        - 2015 budget didn't belong in rural government moved to Emergency Preparedness;
        - ost to manage rural fire protection primarily to address the "British Columbia Fire Service Minimum Training Standards – Structure Firefighters Competency and Training Playbook" regulations;
      - Shift in cost:
        - Increase in cost in Emergency Preparedness;
  - Largest portion of the taxation increase is due to a decrease in revenues;
  - Decrease in revenues is due to less surplus to use towards the 2015 budget
    - o Past year larger operating budget;
  - Regional District vs. Municipal taxation ability;
    - o RDBN has 68 services paid for by a diverse tax base vs. approximately 5 services for a municipality paid for by the same tax payers;
    - Municipalities can tax more over a 5 year period for reserves, Regional Districts don't typically apply that funding model;
    - Municipalities move surpluses into reserves and use for special projects usually at the end of a budget year;
    - Difficult to move from the model of using prior years surpluses to a reserve model as the tax increase would be substantial;
      - Possible to take a long term view and transition over a longer period to attempt to minimize the impact to the tax base;
    - Local Government Act directs Regional Districts to apply any surplus to the exact service it is allocated to:
  - Reserves vs. Surplus
    - o Build reserves to tax now for future spending;
    - o Provides a buffer to offset a possible future tax increase;
  - Surplus
    - Conservative budgets provide less surplus;
    - Regional Districts can only use surpluses for services for that specific service;
  - Increasing taxes to develop a reserve vs. having surplus is similar model;
  - The time to move forward with a reserve model which is a substantial increase to the tax base is when there is a tax decrease as the Regional District has had in the past;



# REPORTS (CONT'D)

# 2015 Budget Draft No. 3 (CONT'D)

- Being extremely accurate and conservative in budget preparations in order to have less of a surplus coming forward in future years;
- Inflation rate for B.C. was 0.9%;
  - Increase in benefits in the past year—mitigated moving to a new benefit provider;
- Deferring expenditures:
  - o Due to regulation requirements some expenditures are required;
  - o Staff have deferred expenditures where possible:
    - E.g. computer, admin vehicle, etc.

Discussion took place regarding another budget scenario. For Regional Districts the budget must be approved under the *Local Government Act* by the end of March. The RDBN pre-budget planning session began in September, 2014 to formulate the budget for 2015 which included projects completed in 2014 and still needing completion, 2015 work plans and direction to staff to move forward. The 1<sup>st</sup> draft of the 2015 budget was brought forward in January 15, 2015, the 2<sup>nd</sup> draft of the budget in February 12, 2015. There are challenges due to the Local Government Elections in November, 2014 and the elections of new directors to the Regional Board. Discussion took place regarding the Regional Board's decisions and initiatives that have influenced the budget, for example, the recycling initiatives in Environmental Services.

The Regional Boards implementation of the initiatives being brought forward is to provide the ability to move away from having to rely on taxation and that is included in the 2015 Draft Budget for example the Legacy/Resource Revenue sharing initiative.

Discussion took place regarding the turnover and recruitment of employees. The success stories from employees that begin in entry level jobs but are able to succeed and progress their abilities and careers help to balance the turnover of employees.

Challenges in regard to obtaining sufficient fibre was discussed. Mr. Burkholder mentioned that Pacific Timber is willing to investigate any fibre source to determine viability. He also noted that the biggest portion of the fibre that Pacific Timber utilizes, approximately 75% is grade 4 or less and does not impact the Annual Allowable Cut (AAC) allotment.

Director Strimbold spoke of the RDBN Forestry Committee being an advocate for innovation and that support may be provided to assist in new innovative techniques/projects.

Chair MacDougall thanked Mr. Garrett and Mr. Burkholder for attending the meeting.

Chair MacDougall welcomed Heather Cullen, Director of Project Implementation, Pricing and Tenures, Omineca, Prince George, and Darrell Whelan, Resource Manager, Nadina, Ministry of Forests, Lands and Natural Resource Operations and Sean Hedges, Senior Manager for Sustainability and Tenure Operations, BC Timber Sales.

Ms. Cullen noted that she is currently on temporary assignment with BCTS (BC Timber Sales) to assist the BCTS to address the Role and Effectiveness Review and the recommendations brought forward. She noted that the BCTS program has been under scrutiny in the last couple years with industry raising concerns with high level government regarding the timber volume being administered through the BCTS program. The Premier requested that the Ministry of Forests, Lands and Natural Resource Operations (MFLNRO) conduct an effectiveness review of the BCTS program. An external consultant, John Allan, was hired to conduct a review of BCTS's roles and effectiveness and recommendations were brought forward. BCTS has a primary goal and six total objectives to constitute its revised role.

BCTS has implemented a number of recommendations but Ms. Cullen mentioned that as project manager she is assisting them to review the remaining recommendations for decisions to be made at appropriate levels of government.

Mr. Hedges noted that Bill 25, which will address changes to BCTS has been introduced in the legislature and has passed 1<sup>st</sup> reading. He noted that the BCTS elements of the Bill are to make continuous improvements and a number of the changes are for general housekeeping and overall improvements to business practices.

General themes and objectives

- 1. Improving business practices:
  - a. 1<sup>st</sup> amendment clarifying the financial reasons for which a Timber Sales Manager can refuse to approve an application for a Timber Sale License (TSL);
    - i. Section 81 of the Forest Act is being amended to establish clearly the discretion authority of the Timber Sales Manager in regard to outstanding stumpage and repayment plans;
  - b. Section 22 of the Forest Act being amended to clarify the current content provisions and authorities that describes what a Timber Sale Managers authority can include by way of obligations and requirements within a Timber Sale License.
- 2. Generating direct and indirect revenue:
  - a. Authorize Timber Sale Managers (TSM) to directly dispose of surplus assets that were acquired with funds from the BCTS accounts for example bridges and culverts. This amendment will allow BCTS to recover revenues directly back to the BCTS account, at present revenues from surplus assets is not credited back to BCTS.
  - **b.** Provide authority for TSM's and others in BCTS to enter into service agreements across government with third parties and customers.
    - i. Overarching agreement to promote effective working relationships
    - ii. Much more collaborative:
      - 1. Development planning;
      - 2. Reforestation activity;
      - BCTS could take care of the reforestation activities on a fee for service basis – through independent consultants and contractors.
- 3. Supporting accurate pricing of crown timber goal for program
  - a. Three legislative components:
    - i. Bonus offers on cruised based timber sale licenses (TSL)
      - 1. Two types of Timber Sales Licenses:
        - a. Cruise and Scale Based Licenses;
        - b. Cruise Based TSL's bidders pay an upset amount and lump sum bonus amount in installments over the term of the TSL:
        - If the TSL is surrendered or allowed to expire unharvested both the deposit and the bonus offer must be forfeited;
        - d. Scale Based TSL's bidder only pay an upset amount in installments over the term of the TSL;
        - e. If the Scale Based TSL is surrendered or allowed to expire un-harvested only the upset amount is forfeited;
        - f. The amendment will adjust the risk to a Cruise Based TSL to be the same as a Scale Based TSL;

- ii. Community Forest Volume Distribution Authority
  - Bill 25 provides discretionary authority that allows the Minister to issue a new Community Forest Agreement or First Nation Woodland License and in doing so can reserve a portion for BCTS:
  - This wouldn't apply to existing woodland licenses but could apply to new and/or renewed woodland licenses with the approval of the tenure holder;
  - Give the minister and government more options/additional tools to more effectively balance the competing objectives in an ever diminishing land base in terms of timber supply and operating areas:
  - 4. See as being rarely used.
- iii. Legislature which streamlines BCTS Disposition Agreement Authority:
  - Eg. Local Community Forest Agreement (CFA) had a need/interest to work with BCTS to auction the timber from that CFA, they can enter into a voluntary agreement with the Timber Sale Manager under the newly proposed section and release volume from the TSA to the Timber Sale Manager to auction. In return receive consideration as determined by the TSM and CFA.
    - a. This assists tenure holders around the province to partner with BCTS to auction timber to maximize return;
    - b. Allows for BCTS to realize incremental revenue and fibre opportunity and helps get fibre to market sooner.

Discussion took place in regard to the Community Forest Volume Distribution Authority and the ability for a Community Forest Agreement to utilize BCTS volume with a portion being reserved for BCTS. This would only apply to areas wherein a new CFA utilizes BCTS areas.

Director Miller questioned why the idea of the Volume Distribution Authority wasn't considered when major licenses did a license swap.

Mr. Hedges commented that the underlying motivation relates to CFA and First Nations Woodland licenses because of constant threats and challenges that BCTS was experiencing and the Minister was having to cope with. It specifically relates to demands from communities and First Nations to re-apportion BCTS AAC's (Annual Allowable Cuts) to support issues of tenures to CFA's and First Nations Woodland licensees. Part of the policy objective was to mitigate the impact to BCTS when the Minister feels no other option but to take from the BCTS and reallocate to First Nations or CFA. Major licensees already have quota and this does not apply.

Chair MacDougall thanked Mr. Hedges, Ms. Cullen and Mr. Whelan for attending the meeting.





Mr. Whelan mentioned that the modelling that was completed for the mid-term timber supply forecasts for the Lakes TSA (Timber Supply Area) were based on the current utilization of volume per hectare. Mr. Pressey noted that once new inventory numbers are available for the Lakes TSA they will re-evaluate the mid-term timber supply forecasts.

Discussion took place regarding the shelf life of the Mountain Pine Beetle (MPB) wood. Mr. Pressey explained that the prediction of shelf life for the MPB is 10-15 years. It has now been 15 years and the wood is starting to rot quite quickly now. The shelf life is also impacted by the growing site, if the trees are in a site where there is active growth the trees don't have as long of shelf life than sites that are dryer with a longer growth cycle.

Mr. Walsh stated that they are currently working with local licensees, BC Timber Sales and tenure holders to develop the Nadina Fire Management Planning Project.

Discussion took place regarding the impact of building lodges and infrastructure in remote regions when wildfire events occur. Mr. Pressey explained that the benefits of the new process that has been undertaken by MFLNRO is that all decision making regarding land tenures now sit at the same table.

Director Newell brought forward concerns regarding the cutting, salvaging and burning of wood after a wildfire event. Mr. Pressey noted that a contractor is granted a license to cut with conditions and consideration that include area reforestation needing to be completed. In areas that have been burnt the contractor cuts and salvages the most economical wood and the noneconomical wood is usually cut and burnt. Director Miller spoke of the importance of utilizing all possible fibre not just the easily accessible fibre and moving toward a zero waste policy that will assist the mid-term timber supply.

Chair MacDougall thanked Messrs Pressey, Walsh and Whelan for attending the meeting.

#### **New Broadband Standards**

The CRTC recognizes that a well-developed broadband infrastructure is essential to help Canadians participate in the digital economy. As a result, the CRTC has set a target speed for broadband Internet access across Canada (Telecom Regulatory Policy CRTC 2011-291). By the end of 2015, the CRTC expects all Canadians to have access to broadband speeds of at least

- 5 Mbps for downloads (data that consumers are receiving from the Internet, including files, web sites, pictures, music, and movies)
- 1 Mbps for uploads (data that consumers are sending to the Internet).

#### Telecom Regulatory Policy CRTC 2011-291

In Telecom Regulatory Policy 2011-291\* the Commission recognized that Internet access service is an increasingly important means of communication. The Commission was of the view that it would be in the public interest to establish universal target speeds for broadband Internet access in order to ensure that all Canadians, particularly those in rural and remote areas, could benefit from a greater level of broadband connectivity. In that decision, the Commission established target speeds of 5 Mbps downstream and 1 Mbps upstream. These speeds should be available to all Canadians, through a variety of technologies, by the end of 2015. Further, the Commission noted that it would gather information from Internet service providers (ISPs) in order to monitor progress towards reaching these target speeds. \* http://www.crtc.gc.ca/eng/publications/reports/broadband/bbreport1111.htm#a1

Mr. Kadenbach spoke of forming a BC Broadband Association sub-committee with other ISP's in order to collaborate in submitting conflict free applications to Industry Canada. Discussion took place regarding coverage in areas where an ISP is already in existence but does not fully cover the area.

Discussion took place regarding the options that ABC Communications can provide in comparison to TELUS. The upgrades that ABC Communications is planning to complete will provide 10 Mbps down. The average download speeds and the capabilities of those speeds were discussed. Charging for the usage of internet service similar to a utility such as BC Hydro was brought forward for discussion.

Hans Berndorff, Financial Administrator provided an overview of the Rural Fire Protection Services Taxation Capacity. Discussion took place regarding public sentiment for rural fire departments, fire protection and the costs associated. Director Petersen referenced the unsuccessful referendum that was held at Cluculz Lake regarding the increase to taxation for rural fire protection.

The RDBN in the past has strongly lobbied the province in regard to the direction in which the province was moving regarding rural fire departments. The province has developed the "British Columbia Fire Service Minimum Training Standards Structure Firefighters Competency and Training Playbook" but costs associated with implementation of the Playbook needs to be applied to the service areas wherein there is a rural fire department. Implementing the Playbook is to commence immediately with the expected timeline for full implementation being potentially one to two years. A resolution from the RDBN Board of Directors has been forwarded to the North Central Local Government Association Convention for May 6-8, 2015 in Prince George, B.C. regarding funding to implement the Playbook. The Playbook has been forwarded to the fire departments within the RDBN.

Discussion took place regarding the definition for Authority Having Jurisdiction (AHJ) and the roles and responsibilities outlined in the Playbook in regard to the AHJ. Downloading from the provincial government to local government in regard to fire departments was discussed.

At the November 20, 2014 RDBN Board Meeting the RDBN Board of Directors approved the Exterior Operations service level for the rural fire departments within the RDBN jurisdictional boundaries. Discussion took place regarding the scope of the Playbook and reasons for implementation. The Playbook provides a minimum training standard that will assist fire fighters in providing an effective and safe level of service.

Concerns were brought forward regarding the lack of volunteers for volunteer fire departments and the qualifications and requirements for volunteers.

The need to have further discussion with rural fire departments in the RDBN was discussed.

Mr. Berndorff, noted that the *Local Government Act* outlines that a service can only be funded through taxation by residents of that service area and not those residents living outside a service area. Discussion took place regarding the *Local Government Act* allowing for a 25% tax increase every five years if required to adjust for changing economies.

Discussion took place regarding the ability for fire departments to withdraw service and the process that may be involved.



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## **Executive Summary**

This application lays out how Chinook will move forward with forest management and governance for the Chinook CFA.

The initial offer for the CFA was made in September 2012 with the fruition of the CFA invitation in January of 2015. Over the past 2.5 years there have been many discussions on area selection and management objectives, which has lead to the current proposed area and offer to apply to the exhibit A area outlined in black below in figure 1.

Figure 1 - Exhibit A Proposed Chinook Gross Area



The general management intent for Chinook is timber objectives by utilizing the dead mountain pine beetle killed fiber efficiently. Chinook accepts FLNRO's timber supply analysis that states the annual allowable cut (AAC) of 150,000m<sup>3</sup> per year for the first three years and an AAC of 65,000m<sup>3</sup> per year for the consecutive 2 years. Chinook will commit to doing an analysis in the first


The management plan is a broad planning document which states resource management, objectives, goals and strategies for values on the land base. The plan will be the guiding and commitments document for forest management and values within the CFA. The management plan outlines guiding principles and goals of the CFA, information about the CFA area and addresses the requirements set out in the invitation letter as well as legal objectives required for any forest activities within the CFA. Chinook will be consistent with key legislation such as the Forest and Range Practices Act (FRPA) and the Forest Planning and Practices Regulation (FPPR).

Chinook has prepared a Business Plan which sets objectives, indentifying risk, determines revenues for the stakeholders and outlines the governance structure, conduct and policies.

At your option, your management plan can include a detailed analysis describing the inventory and growth and yield conditions found in your new community forest agreement, and propose an Annual Allowable Cut (AAC) for ten years. This process is in the industry termed a "Forest Analysis Data Package" and a "Forest Analysis Timber Supply Review". If you wish to defer this option for a period of five years, your Community Forest Management Plan must state that your AAC will be 150,000 cubic meters (m³) per year for a period of three years, followed by an AAC of 65 000 m³/year for a period of two years. Before the end of the five year period, you must have completed the data package and analysis report so as to provide information for a decision maker to set your new AAC.

In addition to the requirements set out in the provincial package (please also refer to the legislation and attached sample license document), because of the size and scope of the Chinook Community Forest, the following items must be included in your application package:

- A statement confirming that the tenure holder will be managing all the roads within the CFA area under road permit, and will continue to provide the public with safe and easy access to its tenure area.
- For all recreation sites within the CFA area, a plan and a commitment pertaining to how the tenure holder will develop and maintain these sites and encourage other recreational use with the CFA area.
- 3. For all areas within five km of private residences or public buildings and infrastructure, a plan that addresses and minimizes the wildfire risk to these assets.
- A commitment to monitor the growth and yield of trees and forests within the tenure area, and a plan on how the licensee plans to carry out this task.
- A commitment to collaborate with the appropriate provincial government ministry to



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

Post-public open house, Chinook collected all comments and feedback received and summarized it in the table 1 below.

Table 1 - Summary of Open House Verbal Comments

Open House Attendees	Comments
Dave Williams (Southside resident)	No comments; was only interested in seeing the area and an overview explanation of what Chinook was planning to do within the proposed area.
Harold Moroski (Logger)	Interested in logging a portion of the volume for Chinook on the Southside. Opportunities for small owner / operators to put in proposals for harvesting volume. Chinook representative explained on the ability for small operators to put in proposals to log the Chinook timber allocation.
Denys Bell (Trapper)	Provided a written letter of comments. Is concerned about timing of harvesting so that he can plan to trap or not trap an area.  Needs sufficient notice to be able to provide comments back to the planning foresters. Is concerned that there is now a potential of 5 planning areas within his trapline area (BCTS, Chinook, West Fraser and Burns Lake Band Woodland license). See figure 4 below.
Shawn & Cindy Andersen (Woodlot owners)	Wanted general information on the Chinook area and the plans within the area. Concerned about competition with woodlot owners with new volume coming from such a large community forest. Chinook representative explained that this is not new volume; it is actually a reallocation of BCTS volume within the Lakes TSA.
Garth Schienbein (Lakes Outdoors Recreation Society)	Wanted to know what Chinook's plans are for recreation sites within the area. Recommended working with LORS to continue to maintain the current established recreation sites. LORS is planning to provide a written letter as well.

# BEST PRACTICES FOR MANAGEMENT ACTIVITIES WITHIN THE PINKUT CREEK ORDER-IN-COUNCIL

Management activities should not result in a detrimental impact upon the fish habitat within the OIC. If any resource use activity is applied for within this OIC area, licensees are requested to comply as a matter of professional reliance in order to sapport the primary OIC value which is the fisheries resource, including water temperature, water quality, etc.

Send a copy of any proposed permit or development to DFO (now Fisheries and Oceans Canada) as the referral agency for review and comment. Licensees should make efforts to comply with DFO recommendations.

#### Forest Harvesting

Within the OIC area the overall goal will be to maintain an amount, type and distribution of forest cover that is sufficient to sustain natural hydrological and fluvial processes by implementing the following practices:

- For \$1-\$5 streams there should be no removal of vegetative cover permitted within 1.5 times the height of the dominant trees unless there is no practicable alternative.
- In areas where some or all of the forest has been previously altered or harvested, tree height will be estimated based on climax species in adjacent similar sites.
- In areas where some or all of the forest has been previously altered or harvested, recruit functional riparian forest in that reserve zone.
- Harvesting for the purposes of salvage should not be permitted in the reserve areas as
  these trees are still providing for attributes of fish habitat such as food and litter fall as
  well as future contribution of LWD.

#### Road Building and Maintenance

Within the OIC area the overall goal will be to maintain high quality aquatic habitat by managing direct sediment input to all water courses by implementing the following practices:

Under the Forest Act section 43.3(f), Community Forests must submit a Management Plan for review and evaluation. It must be consistent with the requirements of the application and to the satisfaction of the Community Forest organization and the Delegated Decision Maker (DDM).

Under the requirements set out in section 6 of the July 1, 2009 Community Forest Agreement (CFA) application, this management plan is consistent with the CFA offer from the Ministry of Forest, Lands and Natural Resource Operations (FLNRO) and the criteria set out in the CFA agreement application requirements. This document is approved by the Chinook Community Forest steering committee appointed by the Board of Directors.

This management plan sets out the intent of management and activities; however, does not give approval for operations within the Community Forest area. The approval of the Forest Stewardship Plan and issuance of cutting authority for road permits and cutting permits allows the proponent to initiate activities within the area with Site Plans for each cutting authority.

# 2.2 General Location and Area Description

The Chinook CFA is located within the Lakes Timber Supply Area (TSA) and its sub-units are discontinuous across the TSA. The area is composed of 5 separate blocks of land from South of Babine Lake to North of Ootsa Lake.

The CFA sub-units interface with private land, woodlots and public infrastructure such as highway 16, highway 37 and Forest Service Roads (FSRs). Areas like private land and woodlots will be netted out of the final THLB working forest area.

Much of the Lakes TSA is currently under a mix of replaceable and non-replaceable volume based and area based tenures. Within the CFA a few different volume based tenure holders have operated within it. Existing tenures may still have harvesting rights under active cutting

permits or silviculture obligations to achieve in plantations. Historically, the majority of the CFA units were primarily used for forestry activities (timber products). The overall intent for the area under the Chinook CFA is to focus on forest management and timber activities.

Blocks 1 and 5 do have some range and woodlot tenures that have historically used the area. All the blocks have traplines and guiding tenures that may use the area. Blocks 1 and 5 have the large majority of private land adjacent to the CFA.

The current state of the timber resource includes heavily impacted Mountain Pine Beetle stands. Much of the pine dominated landscapes have been impacted by the beetle so there are elevated levels of dead pine within the CFA.

# 3.0 Guiding Principles, Vision, Objectives and Goals

Chinook will manage the Provincial CFA Program Objectives by incorporating them into the guiding principles and goals for the CFA. Chinook will be consistent with the following provincial government objectives for Community Forests:

- 1. provide long-term opportunities for achieving a range of community objectives, values and priorities;
- 2. diversify the use of and benefits derived from the community forest agreement area;
- 3. provide social and economic benefits to British Columbia;
- 4. undertake community forestry consistent with sound principles of environmental stewardship that reflect a broad spectrum of values;
- 5. promote community involvement and participation;
- 6. promote communication and strengthen relationships between Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal communities and persons;
- 7. foster innovation; and
- 8. advocate forest worker safety.

#### 3.1 Vision

Chinook's vision is sustainable forest management that fosters and supports a healthy and vibrant local community and economy for current and future generations. Chinook's mission is

to effectively and efficiently manage the community forest to maximize the benefits to all residents in the Lakes District.

# 3.2 Guiding Principles

Chinook's guiding principles are as follows:

- 1. Maintain community involvement which is represented by a local Board of Directors derived of First Nations and local government representatives.
- 2. Ensure forest resources are managed in a manner that is environmentally sustainable for the long-term.
- 3. Maintain and enhance a high standard of environmental stewardship through innovative avenues of land base management.
- 4. Practice forest management that applies a balanced use of land base resources.
- 5. Encourage local job creation and sustainability with increased quality of life within the community.
- 6. Initiate and sustain partnerships between Chinook, First Nations, and the community at large.
- 7. Generate revenue that is sustainable over the long-term for the benefits of current and future generations.
- 8. Maintain and enhance current recreational sites and features in the Chinook area.
- 9. Be transparent in all activities.

#### 3.3 Goals

In addition to the provincial government objectives for community forests and Chinook's guiding principles, the following are Chinook's goals:

- Maintain a high standard of safety so that operations are conducted in a safe manner for the benefit of forest workers and forest users.
- Focus on the utilization of dead pine in the short term.
- Provide opportunities for meaningful public involvement.
- Support local businesses and build capacity locally for long term sustainability of the community.
- Generate revenues through a financially viable business model.

# 4.0 Resource Management Goals

The following section contains the broad social, economic and resource management goals for the CFA and are consistent with the guiding principles and goals.

#### 4.1 Social

- Sustain the current forestry sector in Burns Lake which provides the economic stability for the local community.
- Ensure the protection and safety of people and property through wildfire management.
- Practice open dialogue with the community on resource management.
- Collaborate with persons and other resource groups and stakeholders within the CFA.

#### 4.2 Economics

- Support local businesses with the expertise in resource management to the extent practicable.
- Utilize the timber resource allocated to Chinook CFA.
- Promote First Nations and local government relations through economic development opportunities.
- Encourage and initiate innovative forest practices which can help sustain and/or increase the AAC over the long-term.

#### 4.3 Environmental

- Achieve a high level of environmental standards through forest certification.
- Promote sustainable harvest practices which are consistent with legislation.
- Be consistent with forestry legislation and with higher level plans under FRPA.
- Collaborate with provincial government to ensure habitat to support key wildlife.

# 5.0 Timber Resource Management Objectives

The overall management intent for the Chinook CFA is to produce and harvest fiber for sale. The license provides the opportunity for the community of Burns Lake and local First Nations groups to have local input on how to manage the timber resource and provides direct and indirect social and economic support for the communities.

#### 5.1 Timber

Harvesting within the Chinook CFA will be in accordance with the legislated requirements under the Forest and Range Practices Act (FRPA) and Forest Planning and Practices Regulation (FPPR). Chinook will also be consistent with other relevant legislation and regulations, higher level plans, land use plans and objectives, protected areas, Land Act orders and government orders. Some of the strategic plans and Orders that will apply to Chinook's CFA are:

Lakes District Land and Resource Management Plan

- Lakes South Sustainable Resource Plan
- Lakes North Sustainable Resource Plan
- 2010 Lakes Scenic Areas Order

The Lakes TSA has been heavily impacted by the Mountain Pine Beetle (MPB) and there is an expected "fall-down" in available timber supply in the near future (3-5 years). Chinook's area is representative of the timber types within the Lakes TSA; approximately 65-70% pine and 30-35% non-pine species. The goal for harvesting priorities in the short-term is to target the salvage of beetle-killed lodgepole pine before it diminishes beyond utilization. Harvesting of non-pine volume will be minimized to preserve harvest opportunities for the mid-term and meet the current non-pine partition and apportionment requirements of the Lakes TSA.

Under FRPA, Chinook is required to prepare and have approved a Forest Stewardship Plan (FSP) prior to operations. Section 6 of FPPR identifies the objectives set by government for timber; therefore, the FSP will not prepare results or strategies for timber (FPPR, section 12(8)).

## 5.1.1 Operations and Harvesting

The primary means of harvesting will be with ground based harvesting systems which includes feller-bunchers, skidders and processors. There may be some opportunity to harvest some steeper ground through cable harvesting systems. Harvesting objectives will strive to:

- Have operations carried out in compliance with FRPA and its associated regulations;
- Focus on total chance planning in an area to maximize harvesting of dead pine stands and to not isolate timber;
- Selecting harvesting season(s) based on specific site factors details in Site Plans. Site
  factors considered during harvesting will include, but not limited to, potential soil
  features that may lead to soil degradation, potential impacts on wildlife, potential
  impact on regeneration capabilities and seasonal economics;
- Have operations not be carried out on wet soils during saturated conditions that may cause soil degradation;
- Have operations that will minimize soil disturbance and degradation; and
- Have operations that will maximize fiber utilization through minimizing stump heights (less than 30cm), minimizing top diameter, and use of feasible bioenergy product that is available during harvest.

#### 5.1.2 Basic Silviculture

Under FRPA section 29 and the FPPR section 16 and 44, Chinook will be required to establish a free growing stand. Chinook's objective is to create diversity with mixed-species planting where possible, planting suitable stocking types and sizes, site preparation where necessary to ensure survival on challenging sites and brush treatments as required to achieve free growing

targets. Chinook's goal is to reforest areas promptly following harvest completion consistent with the approved stocking standards under the FSP. The specific stocking standards will be documented in Chinook's FSP and they will generally follow the accepted standards currently used in the local area.

#### 5.1.3 Incremental Silviculture

Incremental silviculture projects such as fertilization, pruning or spacing may be proposed. Proposals will depend on the availability of Forest Investment Account (FIA) funding and the surveyed suitable areas for treatment within the CFA. Fertilization does occur in the Lakes TSA through the Land Based Investment Strategy (LBIS) as the stands start to meet the criteria for fertilization<sup>1</sup>. In 2012, within the proposed CFA block 5 in the Verdun area, approximately 2,000 hectares of predominantly Lodgepole Pine stands were fertilized. This will contribute to improvements in growth and yield in these younger stands.

Other opportunities to increase the productivity of the land base will also be explored site by site. For example, the use of class A seed stock or rehabilitation of in block roads to increase plantable areas within the harvested block. In turn, this will increase the productive land base and decrease permanent access structures.

#### 5.1.4 Growth and Yield

A requirement of the CFA is to commit to monitor the growth and yield of trees and forests within the tenure area. Chinook is committed to developing a growth and yield monitoring program over the first five years<sup>2</sup>. There are many avenues and methods that can be used to develop a meaningful growth and yield (G&Y) monitoring program. The objective of Chinook's G&Y monitoring program will be:

- Measurements over time that provide consistent and linear projections that can show trends in managed forest stands;
- The ability to use the measurements by incorporating them into timber supply analysis;
   and
- Consistency with provincial inventory measurement programs as a good practice to ensure evaluations with higher level timber objectives and good forest stewardship can also be determined<sup>3</sup>.

Chinook will develop a G&Y evaluation process consistent with the Provincial programs and other area based tenures so that the information collected is useful and comparable to others in the province. Some options may be Change Inventory Monitoring (CMI)<sup>4</sup> or Young Stand Monitoring (YSM)<sup>5</sup> as a permanent and ongoing data collection process. The G&Y program will consist of the following elements:

- The identification and use of existing plots such as permanent sample plots (PSPs) where practicable;
- The establishment of a sufficient number of new plots over the next five years, which will support a statistically sound sampling program; and
- Continual periodical monitoring for established plots over the life of the CFA.

# 6.0 Non-Timber Resource Values and Objectives

# 6.1 First Nations Cultural Heritage

Chinook's objective for heritage resources under FPPR Section 10 and not covered by the Heritage Conservation Act, is to ensure that First Nation cultural heritage resources are maintained and conserved. Any features or traditional use area(s) indentified and deemed as a significant value to a First Nations group will be protected within the CFA.

Chinook's CFA area overlaps with several First Nations groups. The following First Nations (including tribal councils and associations) have communities in the TSA<sup>6</sup>:

- Cheslatta Carrier Nation;
- Lake Babine Nation;
- Burns Lake Band;
- Wet'suwet'en First Nation;
- Skin Tyee Nation; and
- Nee Tahi Buhn Band.

First Nations (including tribal councils and associations) with interest but located outside of the TSA include:

- Office of the Wet'suwet'en;
- Stellat'en First Nation;

- Nadleh Whut'en Band;
- Ulkatcho Band; and
- Yekooche First Nation.

# 6.2 Non-timber Forest Products (Botanicals and Prescribed Products)

"NTFPs include all of the botanical (plant) forest products (BFP) and mycological (fungus) resources and associated services of the forest other than conventional timber products such as lumber, and pulp"<sup>7</sup>. There are seven recognized categories: wild edible mushrooms, floral greenery, medicinal products, fruits and berries, herbs and vegetables, landscaping products, and craft products<sup>8</sup>. Some products that may be harvested within the CFA area (but not limited to):

- Medicinal and Pharmaceuticals;
- Mushrooms:
- Floras;
- Berries;
- Beverages;
- Craft products (e.g. weaving or carving);
- Firewood and biofuel;
- · Christmas trees; and
- Cones and seeds.

It is known that there is personal and non-commercial harvesting for NTFPs within the CFA; however, the extent of the harvesting is unknown. Chinook understands and sees that the use of and free access to NTFPs by local residents as part of the local culture and does not intent to limit or regulate this use. The income opportunities and recreational and cultural pleasures afforded by harvesting NTFPs must not be unnecessarily infringed upon<sup>9</sup>. Unless such harvesting is unsustainable or is degrading to ecosystems and/or other resource values.

The objective for managing NTFPs if and when the opportunity arises, will be to focus on the balance of social and economic factors that provide diversification for resource uses. Factors such as community stability, different priorities of local and transient botanical forest product harvesters, costs and benefits for small businesses, employment opportunities and

employment losses associated with restricted harvest market development requirements may be evaluated when determining the viability of NTFPs.

Within the first 5 year term of the management plan, Chinook does not anticipate any NTFPs commercial use or harvesting and will be consistent with the BFP regulation. This section will be reviewed if and when there are identified opportunities when users groups or persons approach Chinook for harvesting of a particular product. To reduce potential conflicts between the resource uses, the measures for BFPs or any prescribed product will be:

- To encourage commercial users to submit a proposal to Chinook to harvest NTFP(s) to determine the sustainability of the product. Chinook will require the proponent to submit a proposal which will outline the product, the harvesting area(s), the harvesting strategies for sustainability (harvest rates) and the economic viability of the NTFP.
- Continue to develop an inventory of NTFPs. This may prove challenging as persons or groups may not want to divulge information and location(s) of a high valued product.
- Coordinate forest resource use to minimize conflicts with timber harvesting activities 10.
- Continue research on the potential for NTFPs and products and its economic viability.
   NTFPs have the potential to add economic diversity and opportunity, which may reduce the pressures for timber products.

# 6.3 Energy and Minerals Rights and Other Tenures

Equity mine is located in block 4 (Maxan) area along the western border of the Morice / Lakes TSA boundaries. Chinook does not plan to work in close proximity to the mine unless both parties are understanding and in agreement of the work being conducted. Chinook will work with and come to an understanding with other tenures holders if and when Chinook's timber development overlaps with other tenures. Table 4 outlines the current total area where the CFA overlays with other tenures.

#### 6.4 Recreation

The forest management objective for recreation sites and uses will be to identify and maintain the value that is identified as a recreation feature, without unduly reducing the potential for Chinook to meet other objectives. Within the first five years of operations, Chinook will work towards developing a recreation plan and identify recreation sites in cooperation with the Nadina-Skeena District of Recreation Sites and Trails BC (RSTBC), FLNRO. RSTBC holds the legal authority for the management of public recreation on crown land including designated recreation sites and trails. Working with local groups that have legal Partnership Agreements (PA) under FRPA or creational interests within the CFA will be consulted with to develop the recreation management plan. Currently there are two PA administered by the RSTBC within the CFA. One is held by the Lakes Outdoor Recreation Society (LORS) to maintain the four recreation sites within the CFA and the other is with the Houston Snowmobile Club (HSC) to maintain a snowmobile trail network that is partially within the CFA area. Chinook will commit to develop and maintain the designated sites.

There are several sites within the CFA that are identified in the Resource Inventory section of the plan. There are opportunities to expand recreation and tourism through the maintenance and enhancement of current sites and access to these sites. Chinook will encourage other recreational use within the CFA area by not limiting or restricting access into areas, unless restriction is required for the enhancement of other objectives such as public safety (e.g. removal an unsafe bridge), wildlife habitat protection, wildfire, sensitive and rare ecosystems or susceptible waterbodies.

Within the first five years of the license Chinook will develop a recreation plan in conjunction with RSTBC which:

- Identifies recreation features within the CFA and the maintenance that is required for each site;
- Allocates funds, resources (e.g. in-kind time or equipment) and timelines for activities to be completed; and
- Ensures the safety of the public is encompassed in the maintenance activities.

#### 6.5 Visual Resources

The overall management objective for visuals will be to maintain the aesthetic quality and scenic values of the resource within the CFA. The Lakes TSA has a Visual Government Action Regulation (GAR) Order establishing scenic areas within the TSA<sup>11</sup>. These scenic areas have established visual quality objectives (VQOs). When planning operations within visual areas,

Chinook will employ the principles of good visual design (lines of force, slope, soft edges and decrease skyline notches) to minimize the impact to the visual resource. Table 5 is a breakdown of THLB area within the VQO classes.

Chinook may explore opportunities to harvest within scenic areas if it poses a threat and risk to public safety or infrastructure because of wildfire hazards and risks such as dead timber causing increased fuel loading (see Community Wildfire Protection section 6.11).

## 6.6 Biodiversity

Currently, the Lakes TSA Land and Resource Management Plan (LRMP)<sup>12</sup> sets the higher level objectives for biodiversity. Detailed biodiversity requirements for objectives such as Old Growth Management Areas (OGMAs), seral stage distribution, connectivity, patch size distribution, wildlife tree retention, retention of wild young forest and coniferous and deciduous tree species diversity are further developed through the Lakes South<sup>13</sup> and North<sup>14</sup> Sustainable Resource Management Plans (SRMPs). These plans provide more operational clarity and direction to implement the objectives. Tables 6 and 7 show the area of OGMAs and BEC for each of the CFA blocks.

# 6.7 Riparian

Section 8 of the FPPR sets the OSBG for water, fish, wildlife and biodiversity within riparian areas. Chinook's objective is to meet the requirements set out in the FPPR sections 47 to 51, 52(2) and 53 which outline riparian reserves, management zones and forest retention by riparian class. Chinook will strive to be consistent with local efforts for riparian management objectives and management strategies. Some strategies that will assist in achieving the riparian objective, but are not limited to:

- Minimizing crossing riparian features with forest road(s);
- Riparian reserve zones meeting the targets set in FPPR sections 47 to 49 but may be expanded dependent on a site by site assessment; and
- Retaining adequate stream side vegetation and trees for forest cover and stream side bank stability.

# 6.8 Fish and Wildlife

Chinook is committed to collaborating with provincial government to ensure habitat to support key wildlife without unduly effecting timber supply. Some strategies that may be used to determine and study fish and wildlife are:

- Dialogue with First Nation elders on what is important to their cultural heritage.
   Develop research and surveys around what they would like to see. For example, moose population is an important value to First Nations in the area; therefore a study may be developed with objectives to address any concerns;
- In collaboration with FLNRO, priority species will be indentified and risks will be determined for each species without unduly impacting timber supply;
- Access mitigation where species and/or their habitat has been indentified to reduce the risk to incremental mortality and maintain future habitat supply and connectivity as the primary objective; and
- Collaboration with FLNRO on population monitoring objectives and species specific assessments that identify trends to understand the effects of the proposed forest management activities.

In preliminary discussions with FLNRO some of the priority species that could have overlap with the Chinook's tenure are<sup>15</sup>:

- Grizzly Bear (Ursus arctos horriblis);
- Mountain Goat (Oreamnos americanus);
- Moose (Alces alces);
- Salmon (Oncorhynchus spp., Salmo salar)<sup>16</sup>;
- Char (Salvelinus); and
- Caribou (Rangifer tarandus).

#### 6.8.1 Fisheries

There are no fisheries sensitive watersheds (FSW) identified at this time within the CFA and thus no measures, results or strategies for the management of FSWs.

The Pinkut Creek Order in Council (OIC) area in block 2 is a required management area to conserve values necessary for the Department of Fisheries and Oceans (DFO) Pinkut Creek Fish Hatchery. The hatchery is an important part of the Babine Lake Sockeye Salmon runs and are valued in the local First Nations cultural heritage. The buffer around the OIC is approximately

400m and limits activities that remove shade and coverage for streams that flow directly into Pinkut Creek. Removal of dead pine stands has been permitted in the past as the dead pine pose a threat to falling over and introducing siltation into the streams. Chinook's strategy will be to work with DFO and the outlined best management practices (appendix D) when developing within the OIC area.

### 6.8.2 Ungluate Winter Range

Within the Lakes TSA under FPPR Section 7 objectives for wildlife, there is an approved ungulate winter range (UWR) notices for moose and deer<sup>17</sup>. The "Notice – Indicators of the amount, distribution and attributes of Wildlife Habitat required for the winter survival of ungulate species in the Lakes Timber Supply Area", outlines the requirements for UWR. Chinook will be consistent with this notice.

#### 6.9 Soils

The OSBG for soils are in FPPR Section 5, which is "without unduly reducing the supply of timber from British Columbia's forests, to conserve the productivity and hydrologic function of soils". Chinook will be consistent with the results and strategies listed in FPPR Section 35 and 36 for soil disturbance, permanent access structures and rehabilitation strategies. Where necessary specific measures on a site by site basis will be outlined in the Site Plan for each cutblock. Other strategies that may be employed, but not limited to:

- Operations on frozen soils to minimize impacts;
- Machine free zones around sensitive soils:
- Locating skid trails instead of roads to minimize construction; and
- Minimizing lengths of roads or skid trails over sensitive soils.

#### 6.10 Water

The overall water management objective will be to minimize the effects of forest activities that may have detrimental impacts on the quantity, quality and/or timing of flow of water supplies to water users. Currently, there are no community watersheds within the CFA. Strategies that Chinook may employ, but are not limited to:

- Classification of streams, lakes or wetlands applicable to the cutblock area during development stage;
- Using existing stream inventory and sampling data to determine classification;
- Riparian management areas around classified streams, lakes and wetlands will be managed as required under the FPPR; and

The use of further guidance from the Forest Practices Code Guidebook.

# 6.11 Community Wildfire Protection

Effective wildfire suppression in the area for the past several decades has created a build-up of fuels compounded by the MPB. Wildfire is natural and common within the Lakes TSA but can be a risk to balancing other resources as it holds no boundaries (e.g. TSAs, wildlife habitat, OGMAs). Chinook will prioritize fuel reduction strategies and harvest priorities across the CFA area by identifying fuel loaded sites (e.g. heavily attacked and dead forest health affected timber). Some of the strategies that Chinook will proactively use to manage the risk of wildfire are, but not limited to:

- Assisting land owners where practicable, to employ fire protection on their adjacent forested properties;
- Promote the usage of wildfire educational material already available such as Fire Smart<sup>18</sup> principles;
- Harvesting priorities focused on the removal of dead pine in and around communities;
   and
- Reducing ladder fuels and fuel loading where feasible to use partial cutting techniques.

It is important to note that these strategies may not prevent wildfires from occurring, but will help in the reduction and risk of ignition, the spread rate and severity of fires if and when they should occur and create access and critical evacuation routes for fire fighters.

Chinook will work towards collaborative strategies with the province's Wildfire Management Branch (WMB) and Lakes Fire Management Planning (LFMP) Coordination team when operating within a 5 kilometers of private residences or public buildings and infrastructure. This landscape management planning for wildfire risk through LFMP will provide Chinook the opportunity to work with WMB to identify higher risk fuel types across the CFA to be higher in harvest priorities for fuel removal. The LFMP team is currently identifying high risk areas through the Provincial Strategic Threat Analysis process within the Wildfire Urban Interface areas of the Lakes TSA<sup>19</sup> within the CFA. This collaboration with WMB will allow Chinook to be consistent with provincial objectives for managing wildfire risk around communities<sup>20</sup>.

# 6.12 Trappers, Guides and Range

To manage the trapper, guide and range resources within the CFA area, Chinook will share information with tenure holders during the planning stage and prior to harvesting to minimize the impact of operation on these tenures (i.e. road building and timber harvesting). Chinook will have an "open door" policy on working with the resource users during all stages of development.

#### 7.0 Resource Inventories

Many of the resource inventories are digital and are readily available on government websites or by request from FLNRO. The 2010 Lakes Timber Supply Analysis and Review packages uses inventories available through the Geo-Data BC website<sup>21</sup> and BC geographic warehouse and Data BC website<sup>22</sup>. Digital inventories and spatial information such as VRI, parks and protected areas, predictive ecosystem mapping (PEM), Old Growth Management Areas (OGMAs), ungulate winter range (UWR), landscape connectivity matrix and biological ecosystem networks (BENs), Biogeoclimatic Ecosystem Classification (BEC) riparian, roads and cutblocks. Chinook will collect an internal database of these inventories, which will be used in the future timber supply analysis for the CFA.

#### 7.1 Vegetation Resource Inventory

in 2012, the Lakes TSA was flown for an updated inventory of orthophotography (orthos) and are available for purchase through FLNRO. With the new orthos, the Lakes TSA is currently undergoing a re-inventory of the Vegetation Resource Inventory (VRI) for the entire TSA. When completed, Chinook will use this as the base for determining timber inventories within the area and the VRI will be used in the future internal timber supply analysis. How this VRI information was used for the CFA can be found in the Timber Harvesting Land Base Inventory section below.

#### 7.2 Timber Harvesting Land Base (THLB) Inventory

Using the THLB inventory provided by FLNRO, the following Table 8 is a description of the timber by age class and species. It is grouped by three different age class combinations to show what the potential is for harvesting in the short, mid and long term ranges over the consolidated CFA blocks. Table 9 shows the TLHB information that was derived from FLNRO's timber supply analysis for the CFA and was used to determine the annual allowable cut (see section on AAC for details).

- Fishing and Hunting.

# 7.5 Wildlife and Fish

Management tools that are currently used for Wildlife and Fish include protected areas and old-growth management, wildlife habitat areas and ungulate winter ranges, wildlife tree patches, Order in Council for fisheries sensitive streams (e.g. Pinkut Creek and Nadina River) and landscape seral-stage targets.

#### 7.6 Silviculture

There are many openings within the CFA that are already harvested and in various stages of silviculture and free growing status. The majority of the current silviculture activities from other tenures' obligation within the CFA should be found in the Reporting Silviculture Updates and Land status Tracking System (RESULTS) database. RESULTS is then used to update VRI on an annual bases.

Silviculture requirements for Chinook will be to reforest harvested area and conduct stand tending as required for young stands to assist them to a free growing status. For areas harvested by Chinook, silviculture surveys will be conducted to determine forest health, stand densities and species are reasonably meeting the reforestation obligations under the FSP and FRPA. Silviculture activities will be tracked in RESULTS and updated as required for activities completed within openings in the CFA area. It is important that Chinook continues to frequently update RESULTS to insure the database accurately reflects the new inventory updates.

## 7.8 Planned Resource Inventories

Within the first five years of operations after the issuance of the CFA, a landscape level review of other resources and inventories may be required to be collected and compiled.

- Quality and quantity of infrastructure;
- Important wildlife areas and/or habitat;
- High non-timber forest use values; and
- Operational challenges such as steep slopes, excessive moisture.

# 8.0 Access Management

The area under the CFA will remain accessible to the public. Chinook will manage the roads within the CFA area under road permit, and will continue to provide the public with safe and easy access within the tenure area.

# 8.1 Road Systems

The majority of the CFA is well roaded and various classes and standards of roads exist. Therefore there will most likely be limited requirements to build any new major road systems. Challenging ground such as steep terrain may require innovative road layout for safe access to timber.

# 8.2 Construction, Maintenance and Deactivation

New road development is considered an investment for future timber access. Roads will be maintained and/or deactivated as required. Chinook's objective for newly developed roads in the CFA are:

- to construct maintain and deactivate roads in a manner that is consistent with FRPA and the FPPR;
- to ensure structurally sound and safe construction and maintenance; and
- to minimize the impact on the land base and other resource values, such as water or timber productive areas.

The following strategies maybe implemented for roads on a site by site basis and where practicable (but not limited to these strategies):

- deactivate road sections and/or rehabilitate sections (decompress soils and plant) that do not access timber beyond the harvested area;
- deactivate road sections that are required for access management purposes;

- minimize road lengths during layout and harvesting phases;
- winter harvest which requires less road surfacing and minimizes soil compaction;
- construct roads with widths that are minimal but can be safely navigated (e.g. 4.5 to 6 meters wide); and/or
- follow the measures listed in FPPR section 82 and 83 when deactivating a road. This
  may include but is not limited to, removing bridges and culverts, cross-ditching for
  water management, barricading the road and posting signage for deactivations.

Chinook will develop an access management plan within the first five year term of the license once the road assets are transferred. This plan will include:

- identifying key road systems and main access routes which will be vital for the movement of fiber and scheduling maintenance activities;
- determining which roads and road permits are not necessary and deactivation and retirement of these roads; and
- · identifying infrastructure such as culverts and bridges.

# 9.0 Annual Reporting

Chinook CFA commits to producing an annual report in its 1<sup>st</sup> year of operations and every subsequent year of active operations thereafter. The annual report may be delivered in the form of a newsletter, advertisement, presentation at a meeting or electronically distributed as requested. The report will provide information to the public which will include the following:

- 1. Outlining how the Provincial CFA Program Objectives will be managed for;
- 2. Include the agreement holder's guiding principles;
- 3. Contain the social, economic and broad resource management goals proposed for the CFA:
- 4. Information on active forest management activities, and
- 5. Include a financial report for the term of the report.

The Chinook CFA commits to holding at least one annual general meeting or open house for the public each calendar year and will have an open door policy on any inquires relating to the CFA.

# 10.0 Annual Allowable Cut (AAC)

Chinook accepts the province's base AAC as described in the RED's letter with a commitment to redo the analysis within five years following the issuance of the CFA.



FLNRO's Forest Analysis and Inventory Branch (FAIB) completed the Timber Supply Analysis and determined an AAC of 150,000 m<sup>3</sup> per year for a period of three years, followed by an AAC of 65,000 m<sup>3</sup> per year for a period of two years. The AAC completed by FAIB used the Lakes TSR4 (2010) assumptions and considered:

- 1. Inventories within the proposed selected area;
- 2. Timber specifications proposed for the timber resources in the CFA area;
- 3. Reductions that are necessary to facilitate management and conservation of non-timber resource values (e.g. visual quality, biological diversity, soils, recreation resources, cultural heritage resources, range land, wildlife, water and fish habitats;
- 4. Silviculture practices and forest health factors that may impact on timber production;
- The anticipated impact of the reductions to the productive portion of the Community Forest Agreement area due to permanent roads, landings, pits and trails;
- 6. Any other factors that may impact on the allowable annual cut during each year; and
- 7. Any directions of the Regional Executive Director or District Manager.

# 11.0 Consultation and Information Sharing

Chinook's objective for the consultation process will strive to identify and consult with persons using the agreement area for purposes other than timber production and harvesting of prescribed products. Chinook will follow the requirements under FPPR Section 21 and any requirements communicated by the Nadina Forest District. Users and tenure holders such as range, guides, trappers, mineral and exploration rights will be identified prior to forestry activities and information sharing will be publicly available that may impact rights or other tenures. This management plan already identifies the majority of tenure holders; however, there may be unforeseen rights and tenures that may require consultation or information sharing in the future. Chinook will have an "open door" policy (measure) on receiving new information identifying and consulting with persons, other agreement holders or community members using the agreement area for purposes other than timber and harvesting of prescribed products.

## 11.1 First Nations

Chinook will follow the First Nations information sharing requirements and processes within the Nadina District. Chinook's entity is made up of six First Nations groups and two local government bodies that may sanction all activities within the CFA and help adjudicate the information sharing process. Currently within the district, consultation occurs, but not limited to, the following nations and bands:

- Cheslatta Carrier Nation;
- Lake Babine Nation;
- Burns Lake Band;
- Wet'suwet'en First Nation;
- Skin Tyee Nation;
- Nee Tahi Buhn Band;
- Office of the Wet'suwet'en;
- Stellat'en First Nation;
- Nadleh Whut'en Band;
- Ulkatcho Band; and
- Yekooche First Nation.

# 11.2 Range, Guides, Trappers, Other Agreement Holders

The Forest Stewardship Plan for the CFA will be referred to:

- licensed trappers,
- guide outfitters,
- commercial recreation licensees,
- other users that have shown past interest in specific development, and
- forest tenure holders sharing a common landscape unit.

# 12.0 Forest Certification

Chinook is committed to reach and maintain forest certification within five years after the effective date of the tenure agreement.

## 13.0 Provision for Revisions

If Chinook deems that this management plan requires revisions to address new objectives or enhance current ones, then the plan may be revised and submitted to FLNRO's DDM for approval.

Attached to this letter is a map entitled "Exhibit A CFA #K4D", which shows the legal boundaries of your future Community Forest Agreement. The coloured map entitled "Chinook Community Forest Tenure Area" is for reference and display purposes only, and has no legal bearing.

Your application package should be in the form described in the provincial document entitled "Community Forest Agreement (CFA) Application Requirements", which is also attached. Please pay careful attention to the management plan requirement listed in section 8.2.

For the purpose of section 8.2 (e) and (f):

At your option, your management plan can include a detailed analysis describing the inventory and growth and yield conditions found in your new community forest agreement, and propose an Annual Allowable Cut (AAC) for ten years. This process is in the industry termed a "Forest Analysis Data Package" and a "Forest Analysis Timber Supply Review". If you wish to defer this option for a period of five years, your Community Forest Management Plan must state that your AAC will be 150,000 cubic meters (m³) per year for a period of three years, followed by an AAC of 65 000 m³/year for a period of two years. Before the end of the five year period, you must have completed the data package and analysis report so as to provide information for a decision maker to set your new AAC.

In addition to the requirements set out in the provincial package (please also refer to the legislation and attached sample license document), because of the size and scope of the Chinook Community Forest, the following items must be included in your application package:

- A statement confirming that the tenure holder will be managing all the roads within the CFA area under road permit, and will continue to provide the public with safe and easy access to its tenure area.
- For all recreation sites within the CFA area, a plan and a commitment pertaining to how the tenure holder will develop and maintain these sites and encourage other recreational use with the CFA area.
- For all areas within five km of private residences or public buildings and infrastructure, a plan that addresses and minimizes the wildfire risk to these assets.
- A commitment to monitor the growth and yield of trees and forests within the tenure area, and a plan on how the licensee plans to carry out this task.
- A commitment to collaborate with the appropriate provincial government ministry to
  ensure that sufficient habitat is available to support key wildlife and that wildlife
  populations within the tenure area are appropriately monitored.

### **Chinook Community Forest Proponents**

 A commitment to reach and maintain forest certification within five years of the effective date of the tenure agreement.

For the purpose of Attachment B to the application requirements. I am satisfied that the area selected by the district manager is appropriate, and that the analysis completed by Forest Analysis and Inventory Branch illustrated that this area will support:

(a) An AAC that will mirror the Lakes Timber Supply Area AAC over time, and (b) the initial harvest level until 2017.

The analysis was conducted using the assumptions that were used in the last published AAC determination rationale for the Lakes Timber Supply Area.

Dear Mr. Zika:

The explosion and fire at Babine Forest Products sawmill was a tragedy that brought loss of human life and economic hardship on a scale that threatens the economic sustainability of the affected communities. We are gradually seeing fibre issues emerge that effect a much larger area as well as other communities.

The province convened a Special Committee on Timber Supply that has now submitted its report "Growing Fibre, Growing Value" which emphasizes the importance of a timely response to the situation in Burns Lake and the larger challenge in the interior.

It is my understanding that the owners of Babine Forest Products, Burns Lake Native Development Corp (BLNDC) and Hampton Affiliates (Hampton) are seeking an expression of government's intentions to manage timber supply in the Lakes TSA prior to finalizing a capital investment decision to rebuild the mill. I appreciate that Babine Forest Products and its owners are committed to rebuild and continue the mill in operation for a minimum of 15 years if it can secure an adequate timber supply.

Consistent with the report of the Special Committee, the Government of British Columbia will commit to taking the following actions to assist the owners of Babine Forest Products in their decision regarding potential rebuilding of the Babine Forest Products sawmill.

# Securing Timber Supply to support a facility in Burns Lake

I am prepared to adjust the existing apportionment in the Lakes TSA to create a significant new Community Forest Tenure that would:

Have a current AAC of approximately 150,000 m<sup>32</sup>;

- Be made available to a community partnership that includes one or more of the Six Nations and would support a manufacturing facility in Burns Lake.
   I am prepared to revise the bioenergy offer that has been made to the Six Nations and issue a new offer that would:
  - Have an AAC of up to 380,000 m<sup>3</sup> from low volume stands; this volume is sawlog grade located throughout the Lakes TSA<sup>4</sup>;
  - Include additional bioenergy volume (i.e. non sawlog grades) found in these stands which would further improve the economic viability of harvesting these stands; and
- Would be required to support a manufacturing facility in Burns Lake. I am also prepared to move forward immediately with volume offers to local First Nations under the First Nations Forestry Program. These offers will provide approximately 64,000 m³ of long term volume that would support the creation of First Nations Woodland Licenses or other long term tenures. This volume would be available for the First Nations and at their discretion may support negotiated fibre supply agreements to support a manufacturing facility in Burns Lake:

## Increasing fibre supply during the mid term

In addition, the government will take the following steps to manage and potentially increase the timber supply during the mid-term:

- Reconvene a Lakes TSA planning committee by the end of this calendar year to review the land use objectives in a manner consistent with the report "Growing Fibre, Growing Value":
- Take steps to secure financial resources required to sustain a program of fertilization in the Lakes TSA. Staff will undertake a review of stands that could provide a sound business case for return on investment and increased cut allowance;
- Complete a Type 4 Silviculture Strategy for the Lakes to ensure investments result in the maximum overall benefit:
- In order to reduce the harvest of the non-pine stands, implement a partition regulation in the Lakes TSA stands as soon as the amount of pine harvested falls significantly below the partition set by the Chief Forester:
- Complete a re-inventory of the Lakes TSA as soon as possible (the project was initiated this year).
- Direct the Chief Forester to review the AAC as soon as information from the
  inventory or monitoring indicates that a review will assist in safeguarding the midterm timber supply. Direct the Chief Forester through a letter expressing the social

and economic objectives of the Province and emphasizing the importance of timber in the economic recovery of the area.

- Based on the recommendations of the Timber Supply Committee regarding conversion of volume based licenses to area based licenses, we will bring legislation to the House at the next session. Conversion of Babine Forest Products licenses will be one of the first priorities for implementation under any resultant legislation. Babine has submitted a proposal for an area based tenure in historic Babine operating areas and we would expect a portion or portions of this area to be included in the area based licence that would be offered to Babine. The total area that would be offered will be commensurate with the proportion of cut held by Hampton.
- Remain open to the movement of existing licensees to other timber supply areas where mutually agreeable arrangements can be reached.

I believe that together, these steps will help us restore the health of the forest in the Lakes TSA and help us to optimize the timber supply. The specific timing of the various steps will be worked out as we move forward but our overall goal will be to provide an orderly and timely transition that is transparent, inclusive and maximizes business certainty so that you and others can make informed decisions. Clearly, we intend to work closely with your company, local First Nations and the community in moving forward. As soon as we have some indication from you of the workability of the above, we will need to enter into significant discussions with the aforementioned groups.

I look forward to a positive response from Hampton Affiliates on your decision to rebuild the Babine Forest Products mill.





# Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Board of Directors Memorandum April 30, 2015

Regarding: Concerns expressed at the CN Rail Meeting and Tabletop Exercise

On March 25, 2015, the Regional District of Bulkley Nechako hosted the CN Rail Meeting and Tabletop Exercise.

Twenty representatives including CN Rail's Dangerous Goods Officer and Public and Government Affairs Spokesperson, Fire Chiefs, RCMP, Public Health, Emergency Program Coordinators, Public Works Manger, and a Chief Administrative Officer joined Regional District staff to review the CN Rail Emergency Response Plan and participate in a Tabletop Exercise.

CN emphasized that the train crews had a manifest that outlined the cargo of each train car and in the event the crew is incapacitated CN Police and the Dangerous Goods Officer would be able to provide that information via email.

During the discussions CN advised that they now had HazMat resources in Prince George and would be able to mount a response within five hours, with the Dangerous Good Officer, Public and Government Affairs Spokesperson, and crews from Vancouver being on a charter flight within two hours of notification. The five hour response time as indicated by CN does not factor in weather conditions for travelling, and where the incident is located and how accessible the site is. The Dangerous Goods Officer stated that there are now four Dangerous Goods Officers spread out over the CN Rail's routes and that someone will always be on call.

CN Rail also offered to provide Tactical Training for fire departments at no cost. Smithers Fire Department has offered to host the training.

During the meeting and tabletop exercise participants were given the opportunity to ask questions and give opinions regarding the CN Emergency Response Plan and CN's reliance on local resources. The following concerns were raised:

- > There is a risk that fire departments responding to a train derailment will not get a task number from Emergency Management BC if the incident does not involve a vehicular accident, how will CN reimburse these departments for their costs for response?
- > A majority of first responders are only trained to HazMat Awareness level. CN advised they do not expect its crew members or first responders to put themselves at risk to evaluate the danger of or the extent of the derailment.
- ➤ Emergency Support Services would not be supported by Emergency Management BC during an evacuation of residents due to a train derailment or hazardous spill, how will CN ensure that residents evacuated are provided accommodations, food, and other necessities?
- > How will CN compensate for the damage and loss to the:
  - environment;
  - residents;
  - local government; and

CN advised that they will compensate all affected by the impact of train derailments and hazardous material spills caused by a derailment. How will CN track these costs and the people who require services during these events?

- > In the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako, like the majority of northern regional districts, the better part of the rail track is not covered by fire departments, CN needs to engage Regional Districts in events involving hazardous material spills or events that cause residents to be evacuated.
- > CN advised that the company will be reviewing and revising the CN Emergency Response Plan this year. Participants recommended that emergency response agencies and local governments should be represented if the plan states a reliance on local resources.
- > There was discussion around the type of response a fire department should provide depending on the type of hazardous material spilled. Preplanning for train derailments and hazardous material spills and CN's expectations of local government and first responder agencies needs to be discussed.
- Standard Operating Guideline (SOG) development is required to ensure the safety of responding agencies for training and response to derailment events and hazardous material spills.
- > CN Rail advised that they would take over dealing with the media, however, they do not run advertising, they primarily rely on social media, given the lack of internet access in northern British Columbia this is a concern.
- > An Emergency Operation Centre train derailment and hazardous spill specific emergency response plan should be developed by local government in collaboration with CN Rail.
- Once an Emergency Operation Centre train derailment and hazardous spill specific emergency response plan is developed Emergency Operation Centre staff should be trained in the different response requirements and tabletop and functional exercises should be hosted by CN Rail.



#### 1. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The Regional District uses Canadian generally accepted accounting principles for governments, as recommended by the Public Sector Accounting Board of the Canadian Institute of Chartered Accountants.

#### **Basis of Presentation**

The consolidated financial statements include all the funds of the Regional District. Inter-fund transactions and balances have been eliminated.

Budget figures disclosed throughout the financial statements have been extracted from the 2014 final budget, adopted in March 20, 2014.

# **Basis of Accounting**

A full accrual basis of accounting is used.

#### **Tangible Capital Assets**

Tangible Capital Assets are recorded at cost less accumulated amortization.

#### Amortization

The Regional District amortizes tangible capital assets on a straight line basis over the estimated useful life of the asset.

#### Reserves

Reserves consist of funds set aside for future use from current and prior year's operations.

#### Revenue Recognition

The Regional District recognizes revenue as follows:

Revenue generated by property taxes and utility user fees is recognized in the period to which it relates.

Unrestricted revenue from government and other grants is recognized in the year in which it is approved by the funders.

## 1. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES, continued

#### Revenue Recognition, continued

Grants received for specific projects or purposes are recognized as the related expenditures are incurred.

Grants received from the Federal Gas Tax Agreement are contributed to a federal gas tax reserve and recorded as revenue in the year amounts are expended on qualifying projects.

Revenue from sales and services is recognized at the point of sale or when service is provided

#### Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in accordance with Canadian public sector accounting standards requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and the disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements, as well as the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Significant areas requiring management estimates are the determination of capital assets, their useful life, and closure and post closure costs of the regional districts landfills. Actual results may vary from the estimates and adjustments will be reported and reflected in operations as additional information becomes available.

#### 2. MFA DEBT RESERVE FUND

The Regional District issues debt instruments through the Municipal Finance Authority of B.C., and as a condition of borrowing, one percent of the debenture proceeds is withheld as a debt reserve fund. The Regional District also executes demand notes in connection with each debenture whereby the Regional District could be required to pay certain amounts to the Municipal Finance Authority in excess of the debt borrowed. The demand notes are contingent in nature and are not reported in the Financial Statements (see note 6).

The Regional District reports the Debt Reserve Fund Balances for both debts issued on its behalf, and on behalf of member Municipalities, as a Financial Asset. Because all Debt Reserve Fund refunds received on behalf of Municipal borrowing are repayable to those Municipalities, the Municipal portion of the Debt Reserve Fund balances are also reported as a Financial Liability.

#### 3. MUNICIPAL DEBENTURE DEBT

When a member Municipality within the Regional District wishes to issue debenture debt through the Municipal Finance Authority of B.C., the borrowing is done through the Regional District. The Regional District is therefore responsible for repayment of the debt to the Authority. When payments (interest and sinking fund or principal) are made on this debt, the Regional District pays the Authority and is in turn reimbursed by the Municipality.

The Regional District therefore reports the net outstanding debt borrowed on behalf of Municipalities as both a financial liability and a financial asset. Municipal debt payments are shown as revenue and an offsetting expenditure.

#### 4. SINKING FUND ACTUARIAL EARNINGS

The majority of issues of debt instruments through the Municipal Finance Authority of B.C. are sinking fund debentures. The Authority uses a 4-5% internal rate of return when it sets the annual sinking fund payments required. The actuarial earnings on Debt Sinking Funds reported on the Consolidated Statement of Financial Position are computed at this 4-5% rate of return.

#### 5. DEBENTURES ISSUED FOR THE REGIONAL DISTRICT

The Regional District's long term debt is in the form of Debentures issued by the Municipal Finance Authority of BC. These are all sinking fund debentures, stated and repayable in Canadian funds as shown below:

#### 6. CONTINGENCIES

#### MFA Issues

The Regional District is contingently liable to the Municipal Finance Authority of B.C. in excess of the amounts borrowed under the terms of demand notes issued to the Authority. Member Municipalities have signed offsetting demand notes to the Regional District for borrowing made on their behalf:

#### **Employee Sick Leave**

The Regional District is contingently liable to pay its employees sick leave. The total value of the accumulated sick time is \$492,330 at December 31, 2014 (2013 - \$405,636). As at year-end an amount of \$245,940 (2013 - \$225,584) has been accrued as an estimate of the liability.

#### Employee Retiring Allowance

The Regional District is contingently liable to pay employees one week salary for every year of employment to a maximum of 13 weeks upon normal retirement from the Regional District. The total value of this retiring allowance is \$209,942 at December 31, 2014 (2013 - \$172,213). As at year-end an amount of \$177,903 (2013 - \$145,985) has been accrued as an estimate of the liability.

#### 7. MUNICIPAL PENSION PLAN

The municipality and its employees contribute to the Municipal Pension Plan (the Plan), a jointly trusteed pension plan. The board of trustees, representing plan members and employers, is responsible for overseeing management of the Plan, including investment of the assets and administration of benefits. The Plan is a multi-employer contributory pension plan. Basic pension benefits provided are based on a formula. The Plan has about 182,000 active members and approximately 75,000 retired members. Active members include approximately 36 contributors from The Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako.

#### 7. MUNICIPAL PENSION PLAN, continued

The most recent actuarial valuation as at December 31, 2012 indicated a \$1,370 million funding deficit for basic pension benefits. The next valuation will be as at December 31, 2015 with results available in 2016. Employers participating in the Plan record their pension expense as the amount of employer contributions made during the fiscal year (defined contribution pension plan accounting). This is because the Plan records accrued liabilities and accrues assets for the Plan in aggregate with the result that there is no consistent and reliable basis for allocation the obligation, assets and cost to the individual employers participating in the Plan.

The Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako paid \$220,770 (2013 - \$200,113) for employer contributions to the Plan in fiscal 2014.

#### 8. ACCOUNTS PAYABLE AND ACCRUALS

As at year-end, accounts payable and accruals include \$279,192 (2013 - \$254,957) of unused employee vacation entitlement.

#### 9. UNFUNDED LIABILITY FOR LANDFILL CLOSURE COSTS

Accounts payable and accruals include \$ 2.11 million of liabilities at December 31, 2014 (\$1.97 million at December 31, 2013) which the Public Sector Accounting and Auditing Board stipulates be recognized in the financial statements but which are not included in the Regional District's budgets but are recorded as accounting adjustments at the end of the year. These amounts represent management's best estimate of the future closure and post-closure costs of both active and inactive landfill sites in the Regional District. Additional costs will be recognized in future years during the life of active landfill sites in proportion to the waste capacity used up in each year. A reserve created to fund closure and post-closure monitoring costs held a balance of \$626,779 as at December 31, 2014 (2013 - \$571,698).

#### 10. FEDERAL GAS TAX AGREEMENTS

Gas Tax funding is provided by the Government of Canada. The use of the funding is established by funding agreement between the Regional District and the Union of British Columbia Municipalities. Gas Tax funding may be used towards qualifying expenditures as specified in the funding agreement. The Regional District maintains the amounts in a statutory reserve.

#### 12. FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

The Regional District's financial instruments are comprised of cash, temporary investments, grants receivable, accounts receivable, due from Municipalities, accounts payable, accrued liabilities, debentures issued for the Regional District and debentures issued for Municipalities.

#### Credit Risk

The Regional District provides credit to its clients in the normal course of business and carries out specific procedures to minimize the risk. Credit risk is minimal.

#### Interest Rate Risk

The Regional District is exposed to interest rate risk arising from fluctuating interest rate on borrowing and investments.

#### Fair Value

The carrying value for primary instruments approximates fair value, due to their short-term maturities. The carrying value of non-current instruments approximates fair value because it is based upon interest rates currently available to entities in similar circumstances.

#### 13. INVESTMENTS

The Regional District holds investments in Guaranteed Investment Certificates at varying interest rates throughout the year. The average interest rate for the year was 1.3% (2013 – 1.1%).

During Budget development there was significant discussions held regarding expansion of recycling programs across the RDBN in those areas where MMBC is not currently providing services.

Following the discussions, direction was provided to staff to allocate sufficient funding in the 2015 recycling portion of the Environmental Services Budget to allow for the initiation of the expanded programs.

Preliminary discussions have been initiated with the local recycling groups that will be impacted by the expanded programs, however important details still have to be worked out. The contracts in these areas expire at the end of April, 2015. So, at this time it is being recommended to extend the current contracts with the recycling groups in Houston, Fraser Lake and Vanderhoof until June 30, 2015 to allow for the necessary discussions and details to be completely understood by all parties involved.

Two amendments are being proposed for the Chinook Community Forest Service Establishment Bylaw No. 1714.

- 1. As discussed during the April 16<sup>th</sup> Board meeting, the Village of Burns Lake Council has decided that it wants to own its Chinook shares directly instead of through the RDBN. As a result, it wants to withdraw from the Chinook Community Forest Service that was established to fund the RDBN's legal and other setup costs for Chinook. In addition to the Village of Burns Lake, the Directors representing Area B and Area E have indicated support for this change.
- 2. The original service establishment bylaw specifies that costs be apportioned among the participants on improvements only. Consistent with other shared services in the Lakes District, it was also intended that properties be taxed on improvements only. However, this latter point is not clear in the bylaw. Therefore an amendment bylaw no. 1728 was previously given three readings by the RDBN Board. However, subsequent to this, the Village of Burns Lake Council declined to consent to this change because it wanted to withdraw from the service completely. As a result, this clarification is also included in the proposed amendment bylaw no. 1736 further in the agenda.

The Board is being requested to rescind 1<sup>st</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> reading of Bylaw No. 1728 and give three readings to Bylaw No. 1736 further in the agenda.

Attached for your review is the Snow Survey and Water Supply Bulletin - April, 2015.

The snow pack report is as follows:

- → Nechako Basin is 106% of normal.
- → Skeena-Nass is 92% of normal.

Near-normal snow packs Skeena-Nass indicate normal seasonal flood risk."

"At a basin-wide scale, higher than normal snow packs in the Upper Fraser West basin indicate increased seasonal flood risk in the unregulated regions of the Nechako basin this year."

The April 1st snow survey is now complete. Data from 154 snow courses and 49 snow pillows around the province and climate data from Environment Canada have been used to form the basis for the following report.

#### Weather

Temperatures across British Columbia continued to be well above normal through the month of March. Temperatures were typically 1-3°C above normal along coastal areas of BC, and 3-5°C above normal across the interior. March sea surface temperature anomalies in the Pacific Ocean off the shores of British Columbia have continued to be 1-3°C degrees above normal, and NOAA's National Climatic Data Centre is reporting that temperature anomalies off the BC coast have been at record high levels through the winter of 2014-15.

March precipitation trends have been varied across the province, but in general have been well above normal (120-200%). Areas of the central interior (e.g. Merritt, Salmon Arm) and Okanagan experienced below normal (40-60%) precipitation. With increased temperatures, rainfall was the dominant form of precipitation through mid-elevation terrain.

### Snowpack





Figure 1: basin Snow Water Index Map

Snow pack accumulation trends from early in the season have persisted throughout March. Snow accumulation through the month has been modest, and in some cases some locations experienced a net loss of snow. Declines in snow basin indices were observed in almost all basins between the March and April surveys. With the exception of the Upper Fraser West, all regions of the province have near normal or below normal April 1st snow basin indices (Figure 1). Snow basin indices range from a low of 13% on the South Coast to a high of 120% in Upper Fraser West (Table 1 and Figure 1). The average of all provincial snow water equivalent measurements for April 1st is 73% of normal. This is the second lowest provincial average snow water equivalent in the past 31 years of record.

Near-normal (90-110%) to slightly below normal (80-90%) snow packs are present through the Upper Fraser East, Nechako North Thompson, South Thompson, Upper Columbia, Peace, Liard, Skeena-Nass, and Central Coast. Moderately low snow packs (70-80%) are present in the Middle Fraser, West Kootenay, East Kootenay, Similkameen and Okanagan. Very low snow pack (60-70%) is present in the Boundary, and extremely low snow packs (<40%) are present throughout southwest BC, including the Lower Fraser, South Coast, Vancouver Island and Skagit basins.

Field observations around the province indicate that snow packs at valley bottom to mid-elevation (e.g. 800-1100m) is limited. As most snow basin indices are based on observations at higher elevations (e.g. 1100m-2000m), indices reported here may not fully reflect the snow pack situation at low to mid-elevation.

The extremely low snow packs in southwest BC and low snow packs in the low to mid-elevation terrain, are the result of both warmer temperatures and drier conditions through the winter. A high proportion of precipitation has been delivered as rain rather than snow. Snow basin indices are at historic minimum values (30 years of record) in the Lower Fraser, South Coast, and Vancouver Island.

Variability in snow packs are present within snow basins. Above normal (>120%) snow measurements were observed in areas surrounding the Cariboo Mountains, Bowron and headwaters of the Quesnel River, West Central BC including areas around Burns Lake, Francois Lake and around Houston, and through the Chilcotin.

#### **Streamflow Runoff**

As a result of warmer temperatures, increased proportion of precipitation falling as rain rather than snow, and mid-season melt of snow packs (particularly at low- to mid-elevation), rivers across the province have seen well above normal flows through the winter. Warm temperatures in mid- to late-March led to increased melt at mid-elevation, leading to dramatic rises in many interior rivers. For example, the Fraser River at Hope (Water Survey of Canada gauge 08MF005) reached approximately 5200 m3/s towards the end of March. This was an historic high for this time of year and occurred approximately 6 weeks earlier than is typically observed. Similar high flows have been observed in most of the major rivers of the province. In the interior plateau, early snow melt runoff is leading very high flows in some medium sized rivers around Prince George, Quesnel, Williams Lake, and surrounding areas.

#### **Outlook**

Extremely warm Pacific Ocean temperatures persist off the BC coast. El Nino conditions are present in the equatorial Pacific, and there is a moderate likelihood of those conditions persisting into the summer. However, NOAA is suggesting that the influence of El Niño through the spring is likely to be small given the weak nature of the El Niño conditions. Environment Canada is forecasting a very high likelihood of above normal temperatures over the April to June period across British Columbia, particularly for the coastal areas.

By early April, nearly all of the annual BC snow pack has accumulated, with a typical peak accumulation occurring in mid-April. Additional accumulation through April is possible, but given the existing conditions, it is expected that the province will generally commence into melt at mid to high elevations this month.



At a basin-wide scale, higher than normal snow packs in the Upper Fraser West basin indicate increased seasonal flood risk in the unregulated regions of the Nechako basin this year.

Near-normal snow packs (90-110%) in the Upper Fraser East, Nechako, North Thompson, South Thompson, Peace, Liard and Skeena-Nass indicate normal seasonal flood risk. Below normal snow packs (60-90%) in the Middle Fraser, Upper Columbia, West Kootenay, East Kootenay, Okanagan, Boundary, Similkameen, Central Coast, Stikine, and Northwest indicate below normal seasonal flood risk for these regions. Similarly, seasonal flood risk for the entire Fraser River is below normal, with the observed 79% of normal snow basin index being the 58th lowest year out of the past 63 years of snow observations, and the forecast peak flow for the Fraser River at Hope, given normal seasonal weather, is estimated to be 7000-8000 m3/s, or slightly below mean annual flood level.

Flooding is always possible during the snow melt freshet season, even in years with normal or lower than normal snow packs. Given the snow conditions this year for most of the province, extreme weather, such as extreme precipitation or combined hot and wet weather, would be required to produce flooding or higher than expected flows.


With extremely low snow packs in the Lower Fraser, South Coast, Skagit and Vancouver Island, runoff from snow melt will be limited. Seasonal low flows are expected to occur earlier than normal this year; very low flows can be expected in the summer unless significant rainfall occurs through the spring and summer. Lower snow packs in the West Kootenay, East Kootenay, Boundary, Similkameen, Okanagan, Stikine-Nass and Northwest indicate an increased likelihood of summer low flows in these regions as well. A summary of seasonal volume runoff forecasts for select rivers in the province is below. Normal, or slightly below normal, seasonal runoff is forecast for most basins, with below normal runoff forecast for the Nicola (48-81% of normal), Kalamalka-Wood (50-64% of normal) and Cowichan (57-65% of normal).

The River Forecast Centre will continue to monitor snow pack conditions and streamflow across the province. Snow melt "Freshet" information, including stream flow mapping, is available at: http://bcrfc.env.gov.bc.ca/freshet/index.htm. Hydrologic modelling forecasts will be available and posted towards the end of April. The next Snow Survey and Water Supply Bulletin is scheduled for release on Thursday, May 7th.

### Proposal:

The applicants own a lot with a residence, and wish to build a 45 by 30 ft. double garage and carport on the subject property. The proposed location of the new construction including a 0.6 metre overhang, will not meet the rear parcel line setback requirement of the zoning bylaw.

The subject property is zoned "Country Residential (R5)" under Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Zoning Bylaw No. 700, 1993. Section 10.05 (1) of the zoning bylaw states that in the Country Residential Zone no building or structure or part thereof,



except a fence, shall be located within 7.5 metres (24.61 ft.) from the front and rear parcel lines.

The applicants have applied for a development variance permit to vary Section 10.05 (1) (a) to reduce the rear parcel setback from 7.5 metres to 1.5 metres. The applicants feel that the reduction in setback will allow for a better use of their relatively small parcel.

### PLANNING DEPARTMENT COMMENTS

According to the survey plan, there is a lane running along the rear property boundary. Staff confirmed with the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure (MoTI) that no setback permit is required from the Ministry for the proposed building as the 4.5 metre setback required by the MoTI does not apply to a lane.

The Building Inspection Department has no Building Code related objections to the reduced setback. There is a building permit on file from 1985 for the residence.

The Planning Department believes that the proposed building site location in the setback area is reasonable. The reduction in setback should have a limited visual impact, as the proposed building will be adjacent to an undeveloped lane.

The opinions of adjacent property owners are not known at this time. The neigbours and the public will have an opportunity to comment on this application at the Planning Committee meeting on April 30<sup>th</sup>, 2015 when the Board considers this application.

It is noted that Development Variance Permit A-02-15 requires that the construction be substantially completed within 2 years of the issuance of the permit.

### **Recommendation**

That the Board approve Development Variance Permit A-02-15 for the property located at 4225 Regina Street to vary Section 10.05 (1) (a) to reduce the rear parcel setback from 7.5 metres (24.61 ft.) to 1.5 metres (5 ft.) for an accessory building developed in compliance with Schedule A of the permit.





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### **PROPOSAL**

The applicant has requested the issuance of a 2<sup>nd</sup> Temporary Use Permit (TUP) to legalize the operation of the motocross track on Donaldson Road for the 2015 season. The motocross track was constructed, and began operation contrary to "Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Zoning Bylaw No.700", in 2012. A permit was previously issued in 2013 for the 2013 season, and that permit was extended for the 2014 season.

Staff's understanding is that the SMXA are currently working with the Province to find a new home; however, it appears that a new location has not been secured.

#### LAND USE ISSUES

### Official Community Plan

Pursuant to Section 921 of the *Local Government Act*, a Regional District Board may allow temporary uses for a period of three years or less.

The permit should only be issued in accordance with the policy identified in the applicable OCP. The Smithers Telkwa Rural Official Community Plan allows for the issuance of a Temporary Use Permit on the following basis.

- (1) Temporary commercial or industrial permits may be issued, pursuant to Section 921 of the Local Government Act, throughout the plan area, where:
  - (a) The proposed temporary use will not create an amount of traffic that will adversely affect the natural environment, or rural character of the area;
  - (b) The environment would not be negatively affected by the proposed temporary use;
  - (c) The proposed temporary use will not have adverse affects on neighbouring land uses or property owners;
  - (d) The proposed temporary use does not require a significant amount of capital investment in a particular location; and,
  - (e) The proposed temporary use has the support of the Agricultural Land Commission if the land is within the Agricultural Land Reserve (ALR).

## **Agricultural Land Commission (ALC)**

The ALC has allowed the motocross track use subject to the following conditions:

- 1. Confirmation that reclamation of the scrap and salvage yard has been completed;
- 2. The approval is for operation of the motocross track between April and October;
- 3. Any further expansion of the motocross track or construction of accessory buildings or infrastructure will be subject to a non-farm use application;
- 4. Approval for non-farm use granted for the sole benefit of the Smithers Motocross Association and is non-transferrable; and



5. The approval is for 5 years. Renewal of the non-farm use will be considered subject to compliance with the other conditions contained in this decision.

#### **Landfill Related Environmental Issues**

The motocross track is located on a landfill that was closed in 2001. The RDBN continues to have certain responsibilities associated with the landfill closure permit issued to the RDBN by the Ministry of Environment. The development of the motocross track was not contemplated in the RDBN's landfill closure plan, which requires the following:

- The landfill must remain capped with a minimum 900 mm of clay / gravel soils.
- The landfill should be graded with a domed shape.
- The landfill should have a cover of vegetation.
- The landfill should have a functioning perimeter drainage system.

These requirements, designed to minimize water infiltration through the landfilled materials, have not been met since the SMXA track was illegally constructed on the property in 2012. The function of the perimeter drainage system has been compromised; the vegetation has been removed from the landfill, and the contours of the track act to trap water on top of the landfill.

The risk to the RDBN taxpayer is that increased water infiltration, reduced drainage, and increased ground saturation is leading to subsurface leaching of contaminants from the landfill into surrounding lands. The impacts of the continued existence of the track on the landfill are not known.











If the motocross track remains in 2015 the risk of potential landfill related contamination of adjacent lands will be further increased. Staff can not recommend that the RDBN Board allow the SMXA track to remain on the property for another year given the unknown impact of the track on the landfill.

Staff are currently working with the property owner to facilitate the work necessary to bring the landfill into compliance with the landfill closure plan this summer.

#### **PROCESS**

The staff recommendation is that the application be denied. Therefore, staff have not drafted a permit for the Board's approval, and have not undertaken the public notification necessary for the Board's approval of a permit. This allows the SMXA to be refunded 50% of their application fee should the application be denied.

Should the Regional District Board wish to consider approving this application staff should be directed to draft a temporary use permit, undertake the necessary public notifications, and present the permit to the Board for consideration at a subsequent Board meeting.

#### Recommendation

That Temporary Use Permit application A-03-15 be denied.



This designation is intended to provide opportunities for people to live in a rural setting in a sustainable and responsible manner, while protecting and reserving the rural character of the area. The proposed rezoning is consistent with the direction provided in the OCP.

The subject property's current P1 zoning permits a number of public institutional uses that could potentially have some impact on the area.


The permitted uses in the proposed R6 zone are as follows:

- (a) single family dwelling;
- (b) two family dwelling;







To amend Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Zoning Bylaw No. 700, 1993 by changing the zoning from **Tourist Commercial (C3)** to **Rural Residential (R6)**.

The subject property is zoned C3. There is a residence located on the property and the property owner is not planning to pursue any tourist commercial uses. A residence is not a permitted principal use in the C3 zone; therefore, an application has been submitted to rezone the property to legalize its residential use.

"No objections.

- Only one (1) driveway is permitted per lot. A permit is not required for residential access off of side roads.
- If an industrial, commercial or farm access is proposed a permit will be required from the Ministry."

### PLANNING DEPARTMENT COMMENTS

The subject property was rezoned to the C3 zone in 1999 with the intention of developing a tourist retail store, a primitive campground, an artist retreat and a bed and breakfast. The permitted principal uses in the C3 zone are:

- (a) resort lodge;
- (b) restaurant;
- (c) campground;
- (d) marina;
- (e) golf course;
- (f) guest ranch.


The permitted uses in the proposed R6 zone are as follows:

- (a) single family dwelling:
- (b) two family dwelling;

### **Zoning Map**



The property is located in a rural residential area which contains residential parcels created many years ago. As can be seen on the zoning map, there is a mix of zoning in the area, which allows residential, commercial, and community uses. The residential use of the property is not expected to conflict with the C3 and P1 zoning in the area, and the proposed residential use fits within the character of the area.

The minimum parcel area that may be created by subdivision in the R6 is 1 hectare (2.47 acres). The subject property is 1.04 ha in size; therefore, the proposed rezoning would not allow future subdivision of the property.

It is noted that the property is located outside the RDBN building inspection area.

### **Proposed Rezoning:**

To amend Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Zoning Bylaw No. 700, 1993 from **Small Holdings (H1)** to **Small Holdings (Additional Dwelling) (H1 A)** to legalize a second dwelling on the subject property.

There are currently three residential dwellings located on the property. In addition to the main house, there is a garage with a dwelling above it, and a large shop containing a third dwelling. In the H1 zone only one single family dwelling is permitted on a property that is smaller than 4 hectares (9.88 acres) in size. The applicant has submitted this application to rezone the subject property to the H1A zone in order to allow for one additional dwelling. The property owner has indicated that they will discontinue the illegal residential use of the dwelling above the garage if the zoning to allow the residential use in the workshop moves forward.

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### REFERRAL COMMENTS

### **Ministry of Transportation**

"No objections. The Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure has no objections to this rezoning application. The only thing noted would be potential concerns with a shared easement if more than the allotted parties were using this easement."

### Northern Health

Approval recommended subject to conditions below:

- 1. The **sewerage system** servicing the new dwelling must meet the requirements of the Public Health Act Sewerage System Regulation;
  - Assessment of the current system to handle capacity The current system providing sewage disposal for the current property has been assessed for its ability to handle the increased demand on the system but unfortunately this information is contrary to that filed for the property. The sewage filing accepted on September 18, 2007. The Letter of Certification was submitted on May 08, 2008 and did not have any adjusted amendments to capacity. See below for specific information addressed in the filing:
    - i. Estimated daily sewerage flow (Litres/day) of 1602L and is based on a 3 bedroom house and/or 5 people.
    - ii. The treatment capacity is listed as the same amount (1602L/day)
    - iii. A comment in the septic maintenance plan and maintenance schedule report is as follows:
      - a. "This system is capable of treatment domestic residential sewage in the amount of <u>N/A</u> imp gallons or <u>1602</u> litres that represents <u>5</u> people and has a capacity for intermittent short term extra loading of <u>100</u>% per day for up to <u>5</u> days. Do not exceed these loading rates".

The information provided in the letter and filing is conflicting. More information would be required in regards to the inspection and how this decision was made prior to recommending approval. The letter provided from the inspection is not currently sufficient to explain how the determination was made and how the current system can now handle the increase in resident capacities proposed. If this information is available then please forward to Northern Health and have the filing amended as appropriate.

Systems are normally designed for their current intended use, at the time of install, unless additional facilities /dwellings are planned at that time. There is a filing stored with Northern Health in regards to your system install (Folio#754.03773.46012) as per the Sewage System Regulations under the Public Health Act. If you do not still have access to the original



filing information then a file search for sewage can be conducted at the local Public Health office. A \$50.00 would apply.

- 2. The 'water supply system' on-site must meet the requirements of the Drinking Water Protection Act and the Drinking Water Protection Regulation. A 'water supply system' is defined as a domestic water system; other than one that services only one single-family residence, and/or equipment, works or facilities prescribed by the regulation as being excluded. If there is to be a rental unit on the property or there will be any use that extends outside the definition of a single family dwelling then:
  - Construction/Operation permitting will be required for the residence prior to construction and delivery of water used for domestic purposes. As this proposal places the proponent outside the realm of a single family dwelling then it is required that they contact Northern Health for more specifics on how to complete the permitting process for a water system and meet requirements of the Drinking Water Protection Act and Regulations. The Act and Regulations provides information on best practices and requirements for the system in relation to the provision of potable waters but some guidance and applications would be required from Northern Health to complete the process."

**Advisory Planning Commission** (It is noted that a quorum was not present at this meeting.)

"Resolution: The APC recommends approval of rezoning application A-09-14 provided that the illegal dwelling above the garage is decommissioned as discussed in the staff report.

Comments: if the third illegal dwelling is not decommissioned it will be too easily converted back into residential use."

### PLANNING DEPARTMENT COMMENTS

### Official Community Plan

The subject property is designated Rural Residential (RR) in the Smithers Telkwa Rural Official Community Plan Bylaw No. 1704, 2014 which is intended to provide opportunities for people to live in a rural setting while protecting and preserving the rural character of the area.

With regards to an additional dwelling in the RR designation, Section 3.4.2 (7) of the OCP states that rezoning applications to allow a 2<sup>nd</sup> single family dwelling on a parcel may only be considered under the following circumstances:

- (a) The subject property is a minimum of 2 hectares (5 acres) in size or larger or a 2<sup>nd</sup> single family dwelling exists and is legal but non-conforming to zoning.
- (b) It has been demonstrated that the parcel can accommodate an on-site sewage disposal system for two dwellings.

- (c) The development is compatible with adjacent land uses and maintains the rural character of the area.
- (d) The parcel is not located within a floodplain or on other hazard lands.
- (e) The development addresses wildlife and ecological values.
- (f) And, the future subdivision of the land into a parcel smaller than 2 hectares (5 acres) is prohibited.

### **Zoning**

In the proposed Small Holdings (Additional Dwelling) Zone only one single family dwelling per parcel is permitted a gross floor area which exceeds 100 square metres (1,076 ft<sup>2</sup>. The second dwelling proposed to be legalized is 71 square meters in area.

Further subdivision of the property cannot occur under the proposed zoning given the minimum parcel size at subdivision of 4.94 ha. Given the information received to date, the OCP allows the Regional District Board to consider the proposed rezoning.

### Land use Issues

A key consideration in rural land use planning is the desire to keep rural densities at a reasonable level to maintain a rural character, avoid the environmental issues that can be associated with on-site sewage disposal and water supply, and control the need for land use regulations associated with higher density. There are also considerations related to the appropriate balance between rural and urban growth.

One of the key ways in which rural density is controlled is through the regulation of the number of dwellings allowed on a parcel. Unfortunately, it is becoming increasingly common in Electoral Area A for property owners to apply for a building permit for an accessory building with a "studio" or "office" use and then convert that area into an illegal dwelling once the building permit process is complete. This is what occurred twice on the subject property. It is noted that the property owner is an experienced residential builder in the area.

This growing non-compliance with the RDBN's zoning regulations, Northern Health regulations, and the BC Building Code is problematic and can be expected to lead to increased rural density, land use conflict and negative long term issues. It is also unfair in that it places the property owners that voluntarily follow the regulations at a disadvantage. This growing trend needs to be addressed through changes to the building permit approval process, increased enforcement, or new regulation.

### **Sewage Disposal**

The applicant has submitted a letter from a Registered Onsite Wastewater Practitioner (ROWP) that says that the lagoon system has been inspected and has room for an increase of 2 additional dwellings. However, Northern Health's records for the on-site sewage disposal system that was constructed conflicts with the ROWP report and do not support the opinion that the system can accommodate additional dwellings. Northern Health is therefore requesting further information.



This issue should be resolved prior to the rezoning of the property.

### Water Supply

It appears that the water supply system serving the dwellings may be in contravention of the *Drinking Water Protection Act* and the *Drinking Water Protection Regulation*.

This issue should be resolved prior to the rezoning of the property.

### **Building Permits**

The property is located in the Regional District Building Inspection area. There are building permits on file for the main dwelling and two accessory buildings.

In 2008 the current property owner made application for a building permit for the garage. The plans identify the 2nd floor as a studio with a sink and tub and no kitchen or bedroom.

In 2010 the current property owner made application for the building permit for the workshop. The plans identify the second floor as storage and office area. It was noted at the time of building that the area was not to be used as a residential suite.

The building permits and inspection process did not anticipate the use of the accessory buildings as dwellings; therefore, illegal dwellings may not comply with the *BC Building Code* or the *BC Fire Code*. Therefore, if this application proceeds, it is expected that staff will not recommend adoption of the amendment bylaw until it is confirmed that the dwelling is in compliance with the BC Building Code. The applicant will be expected to work directly with the Building Inspectors to meet this requirement.

### **Future Bylaw Compliance**

It appears that both dwellings were established with the knowledge that they are not in compliance to zoning, the Building Code, the RDBN's Building Bylaw, and Northern Health regulations. Given the history of non-compliance Planning Department staff are concerned that the illegal dwelling in the garage will continue to operate contrary to zoning and Northern Health regulations if the rezoning is approved to legalize the dwelling in the workshop.

To help address this concerns staff asked the applicant to consider decommissioning the suite above the garage by removing the kitchen facilities, disconnecting the electrical wiring for the appliances, and removing the shower and toilet facilities from the illegal suite. Staff also asked if the applicant would register a covenant on title restricting the placement of the above noted facilities in the area above the garage. These actions would not ensure the building is not used as an illegal dwelling; however, it will make such action more difficult, and may aid any future enforcement process.



The applicant was not open to decommissioning the illegal dwelling above the garage, and only offered to ask the tenant to leave and remove the stove if the rezoning were approved.

Staff are also concerned that there is the perception in the development community that there is little risk in developing an illegal second or 3<sup>rd</sup> dwelling on a property. It may be presumed that if an illegal dwelling is discovered the rezoning process will be successful, and enforcement is highly unlikely. Support of this application (which involves two illegal dwellings, problematic sewer and water systems, and little attempt to address concerns relating to future non-compliance) would help support that public perception.

### **Staff Recommendations**

Given the outstanding issues relating to the two illegal dwellings, their non-compliance to the RDBN's Building Bylaw and Northern Health Regulations, and the concerns regarding bylaw compliance, staff are not able to recommend that the Regional District Board support this application.

It is noted that staff shall be recommending to the Regional District Board, in a subsequent staff report, that the Board direct staff to file a notice on title of the property to inform any interested persons that structures on the property are non-compliant with the BC Building Code and the RDBN's Building Bylaw.

It is also recommended that the Regional District Board provide staff with direction on whether to undertake the process to obtain a B.C. Supreme Court injunction to seek compliance with zoning, which may include an order to decommission the dwellings.

### **Alternative Approach**

Should the Regional District Board wish to support the application the following Board motion is identified.

- 1. That a bylaw for the application A-09-14 be drafted and presented to the Regional District Board for consideration of 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> reading.
- 2. And that should the bylaw be supported, final reading not be considered until:
  - b. the dwelling above the garage is no longer used as a dwelling;
  - c. the Building Code issues for the dwelling in the workshop are resolved to the satisfaction of the Building Inspector; and;
  - d. Northern Health confirms that the two dwellings are services by a sewage disposal system and water system that are in accordance with Northern Health regulations.



### **Recommendations**

- 1. That rezoning application A-09-14 be denied.
- 2. That the Regional District Board provide staff with direction on whether to undertake the process to obtain a B.C. Supreme Court injunction to seek compliance with the Zoning Bylaw

According to the RDBN Zoning Bylaw No.700, 1993, page 3, it states:

"DWELLING UNIT means any building or portion thereof operated as a housekeeping unit, used or intended to be used as a residence for one or more persons and containing cooking, sleeping and sanitary facilities"

The use of the word "and" means that as soon as one of the elements is not present, it would no longer be considered a dwelling. Therefore, if the ability to cook in the unit is removed, it would no longer be classified as dwelling unit.

We have a building permit and a final inspection that states we are permitted to have studio on this property. The use of this unit would be as a studio, which meets the intended use of this building. We plan to use this area as a rec room area.

We are prepared to remove the stove from the unit, and ask our tenants to leave. Thus making it no longer a residence or dwelling unit. This also complies with the state of the building as it was at final inspection.

It is our desire to keep this unit in a state that is practical for use. Thus we are willing to bring the building back to the state that it was at, at the point of the final inspection.

We appreciate your concern in your attempts to keep this area a "rural area".

We should not be required to sign a legal document stating that we will not make the studio into a dwelling unit, as that is not required by the bylaws. Therefore we are open, upon request for you to make sure our use of the building stays within your zoning bylaws.



MOTOR VEHICLE RENTALS means the use of land and Structures for the rental or lease of new or used vehicles, and may include one or more of the following incidental and subordinate uses: administrative support, the storage, service and repair of vehicles.

WAREHOUSING means the use of lands or Structures for the storage and distribution of goods, wares, merchandise, substances, articles, or other things, including the storage of goods in separately occupied, secured storage areas and lockers. This use does not include storage of goods for retail sales, Wrecking and Salvage or a Waste Disposal Site.

The applicant has also submitted the attached site plan showing the proposed phase one development of the site.

### PLANNING DEPARTMENT COMMENTS

### Official Community Plan (OCP)

The proposed uses appear to be a combination of commercial retail, commercial service, and light industrial uses designed to service the entire region. The direction provided in the OCP is that the Village of Telkwa and the Town of Smithers should be the commercial centres of the area. The policies in the OCP are designed to limit commercial development in the rural area to commercial services catering to local neighbourhoods, tourists, and outdoor recreation. Therefore, the OCP does not support the commercial activity proposed in this rezoning.

The proposed extent of the light industrial (fabricating and assembly) component of the Contracting Service use (40% of gross floor area) may not fit the intent of the Commercial OCP designation.

### Zoning

As can be seen on the map below, there is a mix of zoning adjacent to the subject property. The lands zoned Light Industrial (M1) and Highway Commercial (C2) are owner by the Province and will likely not be made available for development. The land zoned Agricultural Industry (M3) contains a greenhouse and garden supplies sales business. The majority of developed lands surrounding the subject property are residential. The property north of the subject property is zoned H1B which allows its residential use, as well as use for a commercial workshop.


The Willow Trailer Court was established on the property for many years. The property was rezoned in 1984 from Mobile Home Park (MHP) to Commercial I, for a service station. It appears that the property continued to be used for a mobile home park until 2009, when it was closed to comply with an Order under the *Public Health Act* to stop a Health Hazard. When the existing zoning bylaw was adopted in 1993 the General Commercial (C1) Zone was applied to the property.



The permitted uses in the C1 zoning are:

- (a) retail store;
- (b) business and professional offices;
- (c) hotel and motel;
- (d) restaurant and licensed establishment pursuant to the Liquor Control and Licensing Act;
- (e) personal service establishment;
- (f) fraternal lodge, community hall and theatre;
- (g) service station.

### Zoning Map



The proposed Contracting Service, Motor Vehicle Rentals, and Warehousing uses are not allowed in the C1 zone. Therefore, the applicant has applied to amend the zoning bylaw to allow the uses. The initial application was to amend the C1 zone by adding the Motor Vehicle rentals use to the C1 zone. This application was subsequently amended to accommodate the proposed Contracting Service, Motor Vehicle Rentals, and Warehousing uses.



It is noted that Northwest Truck Rentals has recently began using the property contrary to the C1 zoning.



### **Commercial Strip Development**

The Planning Department does not recommend that small tenancy commercial or light industrial activity be allowed to spread along the highway in rural residential areas. This type of strip development is attractive for business as the land has good exposure, can be inexpensive compared to other lands in commercial areas, and is less expensive to develop because of reduced development standards and regulations in the rural area. Accommodating strip commercial / industrial development along the highway is inefficient and there are notable aesthetic, function, and land use conflict related issues that will inevitably result.

In staff's opinion this type of commercial development in the rural area will result in the need for increased RDBN regulation to control site design and development standards to mitigate the associated negative impacts. This type of regulation typically requires the Board to approve detailed development plans to ensure that issues such as on-site parking, lighting and glare, landscaping and building design, drainage control, noise abatement, and screening are dealt with appropriately. This type of regulation is very costly in terms of staff time.

The limited regulation in the rural area is possible because rural densities are kept low and commercial and service related light industrial development is focused in municipalities where the necessary regulation and development standards are in place.

### **Site Specific Considerations**

As noted the Official Community Plan discourages support of the type of development proposed in this application in the rural area; however, the situation is complicated by the fact that the property is currently zoned C1. The property owner is making the argument that the proposed uses represent an improvement over the uses permitted in the C1 zone, and that the proposed uses are suitable for the property.

The Planning Department has concerns with the proposed uses. The primary concern relates to the proposed Contracting Service use, which allows up to 80% of the gross floor area of buildings to be used for retail or industrial manufacturing. The proposed



mix of uses are not appropriate for the property, may have a notable negative impact on the surrounding area, and do not represent an improvement over the existing C1 zone.




### The Site Plan

The applicant has submitted the site plan shown below. This plan includes the first phase of their proposed retail and light industrial development. Staff have the following comments on the site plan:

- The site plan only covers a portion of the property.
- The parking identified is less than half of that required pursuant to the Zoning Bylaw.
- The site plan does not contain any detail relating to landscaping, screening, paving, or lighting.

In staff's opinion the site plan does not address any of the land use impact concerns associated with the proposed uses.





### Site Design and Development Standards

The applicant has not offered to commit to develop the property in accordance with a specific site plan. Therefore, there is no certainty regarding the manner in which the property may be developed. As noted, even if the applicant had agreed to register such a covenant the above site plan would not be adequate for that purpose, in staff's opinion.

In staff's opinion, given the high visibility of this location, in the middle of a residential neighbourhood, it is important that the RDBN Board, and area residents, understand the minimum standard to which the property is proposed to be developed.

### RECOMMENDATIONS

In staff's opinion the development proposal associated with this rezoning application is not acceptable. The uses can be expected to cause land use conflict with the surrounding residential area, and the manner in which the site is to proposed to be developed is unknown. Therefore, staff cannot support the application.

The following options are presented to the Regional District Board for consideration.

### Option 1

That rezoning application A-06-14 be received.



That staff be directed to work with the applicant in an attempt to identify a land use proposal and detailed site plan that better reflects Official Community Plan objective and policies.

That staff be directed to report back to the Board regarding the application at a subsequent Board meeting.

### Option 2

That rezoning application A-06-14 be denied.

This option means that 50% of the application fee will be returned to the property owner. It is noted that an application for the same or similar land use cannot be made within a 1 year period according to the "Development Approval and Notification Procedures Bylaw."

### Option 3

That the Board direct staff to prepare the necessary bylaws for first and second reading, and present those bylaws to the Board at a subsequent Board meeting.

To approve the above noted bylaws the Board must be satisfied that the level of industrial development allowed is not contrary to the direction provided in the Official Community Plan.

### Recommendations (option 1)

- 1. That rezoning application A-06-14 be received.
- 2. That staff work with the applicant in an attempt to identify a land use proposal and site plan that better reflects Official Community Plan objective and policies, and minimizes potential negative impacts on the community.
- 3. That staff report back to the Board regarding the application at a subsequent Board meeting.



To amend "Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Zoning Bylaw No. 700, 1993" from **Small Holdings (H1)** to **Country Residential (R5)** for part of the subject property to allow the subdivision into two parcels, as shown on the subdivision plan below. The applicant wishes to subdivide the subject property along Kathlyn Creek as the portion of the subject property that is cut off by the creek is not being used by the property owner.

Lot A is proposed to be 0.86 ha in size and is vacant. The remainder is proposed to be 3.28 ha in size and contains a hobby farm with the applicant's residence, a garage and a barn.

### **Proposed Subdivision**

Proposed Lot A is too small to meet the 2 ha minimum parcel area requirement of the H1 Zone and is required to be rezoned prior to subdivision. The remainder will retain the current H1 zoning.

### REFERRAL COMMENTS

### **Ministry of Environment:**

"Thank you for the opportunity to help determine compliance with condition (d) of OCP Section 3.4.2. (9) for this proposed rezoning.



The OCP rezoning requirement for parcels smaller than 3 acres may be considered, "where a natural water feature exists and where criteria for Section 3.4.2 (9) are addressed."

The proposed 0.86 ha Lot A (Third Avenue and Edmonton St) is not in compliance with condition (d) "The development addresses wildlife and ecological values."

The high fisheries values of Chicken Creek (actually upper Kathlyn Cr) were confirmed September 22 as part of a joint field inspection by Department of Fisheries (DFO) and Ministry of Forests, Lands and Natural Resource Operations, Ecosystem Section (ES). With the exception of a very small area at the top of slope, by Third Avenue, the proposed lot is located on a steep ravine slope and floodplain terrace which is an integral part of a documented very high-value and sensitive fisheries stream. A mitigative set-back requirement from top-of-slope is not possible because the lot is too small.

The stream is identified as critical fish habitat on the Regional District Environmental Values map. It is ground-water fed which prevents de-watering and over-heating of important steelhead and coho juvenile rearing habitat during hot, dry summers such as this one. There is a build salmon-spawning bed immediately upstream and the stream is known rearing habitat."

In follow up conversation with the Ministry of Environment it was confirmed that the Ministry does not support the application as the additional dwelling in this location, in their opinion, will require tree cutting, vegetation disturbance, and the establishment of a sewage system in to close a proximity to the watercourse. Also, there is not enough developable area to allow for a conservation covenant that would adequately protect the environmental values in the area.

### **Ministry of Transportation:**

"The Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure has no objection to this proposal. There is adequate road frontage. However, should access be requested southeast of Edmonton Street, this would be within the Town of Smithers boundary."

**Northern Health:** No response received to date.

**Town of Smithers**No response received to date.

### **Advisory Planning Commission:**

"The APC recommends approval of rezoning application A-04-14.

- Proposed lot clearly separated from remainder parcel, by topography and creek.
- Good access.
- Size of parcel fits with area."



### PLANNING DEPARTMENT COMMENT

The Public Hearing for Bylaw No. 1710 occurred on March 25, 2015. The Report of the Public Hearing is attached to this report.

### Official Community Plan (OCP)

The current OCP designation for the property is Rural Residential. This designation is intended to provide opportunities for people to live in a rural setting while protecting and preserving the rural character of the area. Under Section 3.4.2 (9), the OCP states that rezoning applications to permit parcels smaller than 1.6 ha (4 acres) to a minimum parcel size of 0.4 ha (1 acre) may be considered where:

- (a) An area of an existing parcel proposed as a smaller parcel is truncated by an existing road or natural water feature.
- (b) The average size of all parcels created is not smaller than 1.6 ha. (4 acres).
- (c) The criteria outlined in Section 3.4.2 (8) are addressed.

The proposed rezoning and subdivision of the application area complies with Section 3.4.2 (9) (a) and (b) given the size of the parent parcel and that the proposed parcel is separated from the remainder of the subject property by the natural water feature of Kathlyn Creek.

The criteria outlined in Section 3.4.2 (8) state that:

- (a) There is no known barrier to the development of an on-site water supply and sewage disposal system;
- (b) The development is compatible with adjacent land uses and maintains the rural character of the area;
- (c) Parcels are not located within a floodplain or on other hazard lands; and,
- (d) The development addresses wildlife and ecological values.
- (e) And, the development will not create an unacceptable conflict between farm and non-farm use.

In respect to criteria (a) the applicants state that they have reassurance from MoFLNRO that there is currently sufficient supply to warrant the issuance of a domestic water licence for Kathlyn Creek. A Registered Onsite Wastewater Practitioner has done a preliminary investigation of the site and says that it might be appropriate for a raised mound, although a soil study has not been done. The applicant will be required to demonstrate that the proposed new parcel will have an acceptable water supply and can accommodate a sewage disposal system to the satisfaction of Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure as part of the subdivision approval process.

The proposed rezoning and subdivision of the application area complies with conditions (b), (c) and (e) of Section 3.4.2 (8) in the OCP. A portion of the property is low lying and may potentially be subject to flooding; however, there is an elevated building area. The Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure will assess the details and suitability of the building area as part of the subdivision approval process.



In order to help determine compliance with condition (d), this application was referred to the Ministry of Environment, and the applicant has retained the services of a biologist to assess the impact on the watercourse.

### Zoning

The proposed rezoning will not increase residential density in the area. The subject property is currently 4.138 ha in size and can be subdivided into two parcels under the current H1 zoning provided that the minimum parcel size of 2 ha. is maintained.

Also, in the H1 zone, parcels that are 4 ha in size or larger, are allowed two single family dwellings. A second dwelling can currently be accommodated on the parcel without rezoning and/or subdivision.

#### **Restriction on Further Subdivision**

According to the site plan provided with the application the proposed parcel is 0.86 ha in size. The applicant states that the application area has not yet been surveyed but may be slightly smaller than the estimated 0.86 ha. The applicant wants to delay the survey of the application area and associated costs until further on in the rezoning process when there is more certainty that no major obstacles to rezoning and subsequent subdivision will be encountered.

However, as the minimum parcel size in the proposed R5 zone is 0.4 ha (0.99 acre), there is a potential for future subdivision if the proposed parcel is 0.8 ha in size or larger. The applicant is offering to register a covenant on title restricting the subdivision of the property to the subdivision plan submitted with the application, if the proposed parcel is 0.8 ha or larger in size. The exact size of the proposed parcel will need to be determined before adoption of this rezoning bylaw. The restrictive covenant alleviates any concerns regarding potential further lot development.

#### **Environmental Concerns**

To address the Ministry of Environment's concerns the property owner has offered to register a conservation covenant on title of the proposed new parcel, and the remainder, restricting the disturbance of vegetation adjacent to Kathlyn Creek in accordance with the recommendations of a professional biologist (15 and 17 metres from the watercourse as identified in the biologist's report). The offered covenant would protect the riparian area on both sides of the watercourse, and would extend the length of the proposed new parcel.

In the Planning Department's opinion allowing the subdivision and development of the proposed new lot, with an appropriate conservation covenant protecting the riparian area, is acceptable. The primary reason for this position is that the area can be subdivided and developed under the current zoning, and the ability to obtain a conservation covenant represents a net improvement to the situation.



The Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure has agreed to require the conservation covenant as part of the subdivision approval process.

# **On-Site Sewage Disposal**

The biologist's report provided by the applicant noted the following:

"...special precautions should be taken to ensure that the sewage system used for this new development does not impact Kathlyn Creek due to its close proximity to the stream. I recommend that of Lot A is approved that efforts be made to acquire permission for the sewage from this location to be pumped to the town sewage system that appears to be located nearby on 3<sup>rd</sup> Avenue."

The potential purchaser of the property also requested that the RDBN ask the Town of Smithers to allow the property to be connected to their municipal system, for environmental reasons.

Planning Department staff are evaluating this application based on the assumption that the proposed new parcel will be serviced by an on-site sewage disposal system. Therefore, given the concerns raised by the biologist, it is recommended that the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure be asked to ensure, as part of the subdivision approval process, that any on-site sewage disposal system be designed by a qualified engineer to ensure that its function will not have any negative impact on the watercourse.

# **Building Area and Slope Stability**

The proposed new parcel consists of a lower level adjacent to the watercourse, and an elevated area adjacent to the road. It appears that there is a suitable building area adjacent to the road, and there are no signed of soil or slope instability in the area. The Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure will evaluate the suitability of a building site as part of the subdivision approval process.



## Recommendations

- 1. That the Regional District Board receive the Report of the Public Hearing for "Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Rezoning Bylaw No. 1710."
- 2. That "Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Rezoning Bylaw No. 1710, 2014" be given third reading.
- 3. That prior to consideration of adoption:
  - a. the proposed parcel is surveyed to determine the size of the proposed parcel;
     and
  - b. a covenant restricting subdivision is registered on title to the satisfaction of the Director of Planning if the proposed parcel is 0.8 ha in size or larger.
- 4. That the Ministry of Transportation be requested to ensure, at the time of subdivision, that:
  - a. any on-site sewage disposal system for the proposed parcel be designed by a qualified engineer to ensure that its function will not have any negative impact on the watercourse,
  - a conservation covenant is registered on title of the proposed new and remainder parcel as offered by the property owner during the rezoning process, and
  - c. the proposed parcel contains a suitable building site.



CALL TO ORDER: The meeting was called to order at 7:01 p.m.

**BUSINESS**:

Chairperson Fisher Welcomed the persons present and read a

statement regarding Bylaws No. 1710, noting the location of information packages, and explaining the Public Hearing process. The page missing from the Sept 21, 2014 letter from the Ministry of

Environment was provided.

Chairperson Fisher Called for comments on Bylaw 1710.

Mike Moore Asked if this subdivision would set a precedence for

future subdivision in the area, as this would be a

concern.

Jason Llewellyn Discussed the role of the Official Community Plan

in directing how future development should occur.

Marjorie Emmelot Noted that they are offering to register a covenant

on title that protects the disturbance of vegetation surrounding the watercourse on the property.

Dave Mayer Said that he did the assessment of the

watercourse, according to the Provincial Riparian Areas Regulation, to determine what vegetation protection area that is necessary to protect the watercourse. He said that the assessment

recommended a protection area that is 3 times the width of the watercourse in one area, and 2 times its width in other areas. The setback offered was



increased slightly from that required to 17 and 15 metres as shown on the plan submitted.

Kathy Williamson Asked if Mr. Mayer had a conflict of interest and

should not have done the assessment.

Dave Mayer Noted that his work was reviewed by an

independent biologist and that a report was provided by that biologist confirming the proposed

setback.

Dave Mayer Said that the Regional District's regulations call for

only a 15 metre setback and the proposed

covenant offers additional protection.

Jason Llewellyn Confirmed that the Regional District's regulations

required a building setback and do not control

vegetation disturbance.

Jason Llewellyn Asked the property owner to confirm the proposed

setback being offered. He also confirmed that the Ministry of Transportation has agreed to require the

covenant at the time of subdivision.

Marjorie Emmelot Confirmed she was offering a covenant on both

sides of the watercourse, of 15 and 17 metres as shown on the plan provided, along the width of the

proposed Lot A.

Dave Mayer Said that the biologist's report noted that a sewage

system could be provided on the proposed lot, but concluded that the proposed lot should be serviced by the Town of Smithers sewage system, which is a close distance away. The rationale for this is provided in the Official Community Plan. Servicing the proposed new lot with municipal sewer would

be more efficient and would be more

environmentally sound. The connection to the municipal system could be achieved without crossing private property. Sewage can be provided

on the subject property in accordance with

regulations; however, this connection should occur to help protect the environment. He asked for a commitment that the Regional District will request that the Town of Smithers allow this connection. He said he has spoken to a municipal councillor and staff and the request from the Regional District

is an important first step.

Jason Llewellyn Asked if Dave Mayer was saying that there may be

negative environmental impacts from sewage being

disposed of on the subject property.

Dave Mayer Said that a sewage disposal system can be

installed that meets regulations. He is not an expert in this area and the system would have to be



designed by an engineer. Servicing from the Town of Smithers would be the best option. The municipal system has the capacity.

Kathy Williamson Asked if she would lose her access if the

connection were made to the municipal system.

Dave Mayer Said that she may lose access temporarily while

the line was being built.

Mike Moore Said that rural residents should not be able to

access municipal services that have been paid for

by Town residents.

Kathy Williamson Said that she remains concerned that the study

should not have been done by Mr. Mayer because

he has a conflict of interest as the potential

purchaser of the property.

Dave Mayer Said that all he did was measure the width of the

watercourse, and the biologist did his own report. He asked for an overview of the approval process.

Jason Llewellyn Explained that the Report of the Public Hearing

would likely be presented to the Regional District Board for consideration along with 3<sup>rd</sup> reading of the bylaw in April. If 3<sup>rd</sup> reading is approved, final consideration would occur in May if all of the required actions have been completed, such as a covenant and Ministry of Transportation approval.





# **Proposed Rezoning:**

To amend the **Civic/Institutional (P1) Zone** in the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Zoning Bylaw No. 700, 1993.

The purpose of this application is to allow the property to be used for a multiple-family dwelling with six dwelling units. The Southside Seniors Housing Society is proposing this development to house seniors. A multi-family dwelling is not permitted in the P1 Zone.

"The above noted rezoning application has been reviewed by this office with a primary focus on sewage disposal concerns. Detail and soil information was received from the application as prepared by McElhanney Consulting Services Ltd.

Based on the review of the soil information, I have no objections with this rezoning application. The information presented by the consulting firm reasonably confirms that the property can support the addition of a multi room living accommodation through a raised bed infiltration pressure distribution system. It is important to note that the assessment was conducted in 2010 using the Sewerage System Standard Practices Manual Version 2 and that the sewage design will not necessarily be limited to an infiltration pressure distribution system. Construction will be carried out using the Sewerage System Standard Practices Manual Version 3, which should in fact provide more options for sewage system design.

Also, the domestic water supply system for this property will fall within the jurisdiction of the Drinking Water Protection Act. Prior to construction of this system, a waterworks construction permit will need to be obtained."

# PLANNING DEPARTMENT COMMENTS

The Public Hearing for Bylaw No. 1730 occurred on April 14, 2015. The Report of the Public Hearing is attached to this report.

The current permitted uses in the P1 zone are as follows:

- (a) public institutional uses including schools, hospitals, fire halls, police stations, and correctional centres;
- (b) churches and cemeteries;
- (c) community halls and associated recreation facilities including baseball diamonds, tennis courts, riding rings and skating rinks;
- (d) fraternal lodges and clubs;
- (e) community care facilities;
- (f) fire suppression crew camps;
- (g) public utility uses;



(h) government offices, storage structures and compounds.

The proposed development is not a community care facility, which must be designated as such under the *Community Care Facility Act*. The proposed development is a multiple family dwelling, which is defined as follows:

DWELLING, MULTIPLE FAMILY means a detached building used exclusively for residential purposes, consisting of three or more dwelling units, either with private individual access or common access and hallways. Dwelling, Multiple Family shall include apartments, row houses and townhouses.

Staff propose that the multiple family dwelling use be added as a permitted use to the existing P1 zone in such a manner that the amendment would apply only to the subject property, as proposed and with a maximum total of 12 units. The application is for a six unit facility, so the proposed 12-unit limit would allow for a doubling of capacity in the future. This limit appears reasonable based on the size of the property, and the already existing presence of the community hall.

#### **Land Use**

A multiple-family dwelling is not typical in a rural residential area, and can have a negative impact on community character. However, given the intended use of the development and its location on a large parcel in Southbank, staff do not have any notable concerns with the proposed rezoning. The ability for elderly Southside residents to remain in the community in such a development is a notable community benefit.

While there is a potential for a small increase in traffic to the neighbourhood the Planning Department does not expect that the proposed use will result in an unacceptable negative impact. The Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure (MoTI) did not raise any concerns regarding traffic and access issues in their referral response.

The subject property is located outside the Regional District Building Inspection area. It is noted that the applicants have provided a geotechnical assessment providing recommendations for the construction.

The subject property has a beach, picnic tables and a boat launch on the eastern shore of the property. This area is used frequently by the public in the summer. The applicants state that the proposed development should not affect the public use of the beach area.

#### Covenant

The applicants are open to the registration of a covenant on title limiting the use of the multi-unit dwelling to seniors housing operated by a society. Staff agree that the restrictive covenant is a good idea, but are supportive of the application regardless of whether the covenant is registered on title. Staff are currently working with the property owner to sort out the cost issues associated with preparing and registering the covenant on title.



# Recommendations

- 1. That the Regional District Board receive the Report of the Public Hearing for "Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Rezoning Bylaw No. 1730, 2015".
- 2. That "Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Rezoning Bylaw No. 1730, 2015" be given third reading.







# **Current zoning and rezoning proposal**




The applicants own three parcels and wish to do a boundary adjustment and a subdivision which would create four parcels. The majority of the area proposed for subdivision is zoned R5, with a minimum parcel area of 0.4 ha at subdivision. The application areas are zoned H1, which requires a minimum parcel area of 2 ha. To subdivide the parcels as proposed, the application areas must be rezoned to the R5 zone.

Mr. Kempenaar owns Lot 6 of Plan 7754, which spans Kathlyn Creek. A house and a mobile home are located north of the creek and he wishes to have each dwelling on its own legal parcel. He plans to sell the portion of the property south of the creek to Mr. De Jong.



Mr. De Jong owns two parcels, Lot 5 and Lot 6 of Plan 5291. He wishes to move the boundaries between those two lots and amalgamate Mr Kempenaar's portion south of Kathlyn Creek into proposed lot 3. Currently there is a house located on the boundary between Lot 5 and 6 and the boundary adjustment would solve that encroachment issue and make both proposed lots larger.





- Proposed Lot 1 is to be ±0.468 ha in size and would be accessed by easement from Henry Road, and would contain the mobile home.
- Proposed Lot 2 is to be ±0.86 ha in size and would become a panhandle parcel with access to Powell Frontage Rd, and would contain a house.
- Proposed Lot 3 is to be +0.76 ha in size and would be accessed directly from Powell Frontage Rd, and is a consolidation of a portion of Lot 6, Plan 7754 and a portion of Lot 6, Plan 5291, and is vacant.
- Proposed Lot 4 is to be ±0.576 ha in size and is a consolidation of the remainder of Lot 6, Plan 5291 with Lot 5, and would contain a house.



# Property History (Lot 6, Plan 7754)

Bylaw 401 (1983) - The part of Lot 6, Plan 7754 lying north and east of Kathlyn Creek was rezoned by Mr. Kempenaar, from Rural II to Rural I to facilitate a subdivision of the property along Kathlyn Creek, as the parcel remaining after the proposed subdivision was less than the minimum site area in the Rural II zone. It appears that this subdivision was never completed.

Bylaw 879 (1995) – Mr Kempenaar applied to rezone the part of Lot 6, plan 7754 lying south of Kathlyn Creek from Small Holdings to Country Residential to facilitate a subdivision of the property into two parcels from north to south. The Ministry of Health expressed concerns regarding the suitability of the lot for on-site sewage disposal. The rezoning was rejected at second reading.

Bylaw 1182 (2000) – Mr. Kempenaar applied to rezone the portion of the property south of Kathlyn Creek from H1 to R5 to facilitate a three lot subdivision. The Town of Smithers and Northern Health expressed concerns. The applicant requested that the application be deferred in order to provide an opportunity to address the objections. While giving the Bylaw third reading in 2005, the Board also directed that final adoption be withheld until the owner has filed an application for subdivision together with the proposed restrictive covenants required by the Northern Health Authority and the Town of Smithers. This would give the RD and its referral agencies an opportunity to review the restrictive covenants prior to subdivision approval and ensure that they are registered with the new plan. The subdivision was never completed.

# PLANNING DEPARTMENT COMMENTS

At the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako January 29<sup>th</sup>, 2015 Board meeting third reading was given to "Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Rezoning Bylaw No. 1709, 2014".

The Regional District Board also directed that final reading not be considered until a restrictive covenant is registered on the title of Lot 6, Section 2, Township 1A, Range 5, Coast District, Plan 7754, Except Plan 10135 by the applicant to the satisfaction of the Regional District to restrict the subdivision of the subject property to the subdivision plan submitted with the application.

The applicant has registered the covenant on title to the satisfaction of staff. Bylaw No. 1709 has been signed by the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure. Therefore, Bylaw No. 1709 is forwarded to the Board for consideration of adoption.

## Kathlyn Creek - conservation covenant

This application was referred to the Ministry of Environment (MoE). The MoE's referral response recommends a riparian preservation covenant, or equivalent legal protection, be registered on the new titles and maintained. MoE's referral response was discussed with the property owners, and they have offered to register a15 metre conservation covenant on the title of their properties along Kathlyn Creek. MoTl has offered to ensure



that the conservation covenant is registered at the time of subdivision. This approach is acceptable to staff.

# Recommendation



Dear Chair Miller and Board Members:

2014 marked the end of the Strategic Community Investment Fund (SCIF) program. This was a multi-year program that accelerated Small Community, Regional District, and Traffic Fine Revenue Sharing grants in the early years of the program and reduced them in the later years.

Beginning in 2015, the Province of British Columbia will return to regular annual grant funding (similar to funding calculations prior to SCIF). However, there will be a one-time advance from the 2016 budget to the 2015 budget. Thus, this year's Regional District grants will be marginally higher (7% to 10%) than next year's grants.

The total value of 2015 grants for all regional districts will be \$4.7 million and will be paid in two installments (March and June), as follows:





Dear Chair Miller and Board,



On behalf of the BC Water & Waste Association (BCWWA), I enclose a summary of *Are Our Water Systems at Risk?*, a report that assesses the financial capacity of BC's municipalities to maintain, renew, and replace BC's existing water and wastewater infrastructure. The BCWWA is a not-for-profit association that represents over 4,700 water professionals who are responsible for ensuring safe, sustainable, and secure water, sewer, and storm water systems in British Columbia and the Yukon.

The report, which is based on analysis of 2013 audited financial statements from BC's municipalities, outlines 4 concerns about the financial sustainability of BC's water and wastewater systems:

- 1. Water and sewer fees are not covering the full cost of service delivery in many communities; in the worst cases, rates would need to nearly double in order to reach financial sustainability.
- 2. Many communities are **vulnerable**, as they have not set aside sufficient reserves to buffer against unexpected changes in operating costs or revenues.
- Smaller communities have greater financial gaps than larger communities, as costs are shared across a small base of users.
- There is an unfunded liability of over \$13 Billion to renew and replace water and wastewater
  infrastructure when it comes to the end of its useful life. Additional investment will be required.

This is the first of a series of assessments that will be used to evaluate trends in the financial position of BC's water and wastewater systems over time. It is intended to inform dialog among elected officials, utility managers, and the public about policies and priorities for infrastructure renewal and investment, and provides recommendations that are aimed at enhancing the fiscal sustainability of our water, sewer, and storm water systems, to ensure that our systems continue to protect public health and the environment for generations to come.

I invite you to review the report, and encourage you to work with staff from your municipality to assess the financial sustainability of your community's water and wastewater assets, compare your community's results with those of similar size across the province as presented in the report, and prioritize water and wastewater renewal and replacement projects for capital investment. Assessing the Financial Sustainability of BC's Municipal Water and Sewer Systems

- Are BC municipalities financially well positioned?
- Are water and wastewater rates recovering the full cost of service, including infrastructure renewal and replacement?
- How much investment is needed to sustain our water and wastewater infrastructure?
- Are municipalities financially ready for unexpected costs or failures?

Reliable water, sewer, and storm water systems are essential to public health, a clean environment, and a strong economy. But these essential systems may be at risk – aging infrastructure, growth, strengthened regulations, seismic risk, and climate change are driving the need for significant upgrades and re-investment in the pipes, pumps, and equipment that are used to treat, deliver, and remove water safely for our homes and businesses. At the same time, fiscal restraint and public complacency impede the ability of local governments and water utilities to secure the financial resources required to sustain our water infrastructure assets.

The BC Water & Waste Association (BCWWA), together with Urban Systems, has recently assessed the financial capacity of British Columbia's local governments to maintain, renew and replace our existing water and wastewater infrastructure.

Financial sustainability is a key principle for safeguarding water, sewer, and storm water systems so that they continue to protect public health and the environment, and contribute to economic development. It means having adequate funds to pay for the current cost of operating and maintaining our water and wastewater systems, and proactively planning to ensure there will be funds to eventually renew and replace systems as they come to the end of their useful life.





We have reviewed 4 financial indicators, based on data from the 2013 audited financial statements for municipal governments in BC. The indicators were selected based on a review of best practices in other jurisdictions, available information, and advice from knowledgeable professionals in the asset management field.

The results point to 4 challenges about the financial sustainability of BC's water and wastewater systems:

- 1. Water and sewer **fees are not covering the full cost** of service delivery in many communities; in the worst cases, rates would need to nearly double in order to reach financial sustainability.
- 2. Many communities are **vulnerable**, as they have not set aside sufficient reserve savings to buffer against unexpected changes in operating costs or revenues.
- 3. Smaller communities have greater **financial gaps** than larger communities, as costs are shared across a small base of users.
- 4. At least \$13 Billion of additional investment will be required in BC to renew and replace water and wastewater infrastructure when it comes to the end of its useful life. This does not include the investment required to meet new regulations, growth, or upgrades to address resilience for seismic or storm events.

### Do Current Rates Cover the Full Cost of BC's Water Systems?

The operating surplus ratio indicates whether water and wastewater **rates cover the full cost** to operate and sustain the system, including renewal and replacement of existing infrastructure.

# Operating (Revenue - Operating Expenses) Surplus = Ratio Revenue

### Where:

- Revenue includes funds generated from the sale of services, user fees, and charges. Revenue excludes development cost charges (DCCs).
- Operating expenses include all operating and maintenance costs, replacement value depreciation, and interest on debt.

The charts below show the ratio results for BC municipalities, by size.


An operating surplus ratio of **zero or greater** indicates that rates charged for water and wastewater services are sufficient to fully recover the annual cost to operate and maintain existing water and wastewater infrastructure, including an annual allocation for the eventual renewal and replacement of infrastructure.

An operating surplus ratio of **less than zero** indicates that the annual costs of providing water and wastewater service are not being covered through water or wastewater rates charged to customers; the ratio value identifies the percentage value that rates would need to increase. For example, a ratio value of -25% indicates that rates would need to increase by 25% in order for revenues to cover expenses, including replacement costs.


### What do the ratio results tell us?

- The majority of BC municipalities are charging annual water and wastewater rates below the full cost required to operate, maintain, and replace the systems.
- The greatest gap between revenue and operating expenses is seen in smaller municipalities (<10,000) for both water and wastewater systems. In small communities, with a few exceptions even the upper quartile or "best" municipalities are not covering full operating expenses.
- If replacement value depreciation costs of existing infrastructure are excluded from operating expenses, 27% of water systems and 38% of wastewater systems are still not covering their annual operating costs through their current water and wastewater rates.
- These results indicate that water and wastewater operations are likely being subsidized by other revenue sources such as property tax, and/or annual allocations for replacement costs are being deferred.
- The percentage increase in rates required to reach full cost recovery is significant for the majority of municipalities, requiring rate increases that are nearly double the current rates in the worst cases.

### Are BC municipalities financially ready for unexpected costs or failures?

The reserves to operating expense ratio provides an indication of short-term resilience to unexpected changes in revenues or costs, such as those that might occur due to unpredictable events like storms or equipment failure.

Reserves to
Operating = Reserves

Cash Operating Expenses

#### Where:

- Reserves include both restricted and unrestricted reserves for water and wastewater, but exclude development cost charge reserves (DCCs).
- Cash operating expenses include all cash-based costs to operate and maintain the system, including interest on debt. Operating expenses do not include depreciation, as this is considered to be a "non-cash" expense.

A reserves to operating expenses ratio of 12.5% or greater means that the reserve savings are considered to be adequate to buffer against unexpected changes in revenues or operating costs from year to year. This is based on the American Water Works Association (AWWA) recommendation for water system reserves.


A reserves to operating expense ratio below 12.5% indicates that a community may be vulnerable to unexpected revenue shortfalls or unanticipated expenses, and as a result may have difficulty delivering the expected level of service or recovering from change when an unexpected event occurs.

The appropriate reserve size will vary by municipality and is dependent on specific local conditions, such as condition of infrastructure, financial policies regarding borrowing, borrowing capacity, and asset management plans.


### What do the ratio results tell us?

- Across all community size groups, there are water and wastewater systems with no reserves in place, indicating that many communities are vulnerable to unexpected costs or changes in revenue.
- Municipalities with no reserves or low reserves may be vulnerable when there are abrupt changes in expenses (for example, from asset failure, an emergency situation, etc.); however, the appropriate size of the reserve depends on local context.
- There is little connection between size of municipality and the reserves as a percentage of expenses.
- Most municipalities do not hold sufficient reserves to fund substantial infrastructure renewal and replacement.

### Do Municipalities Have Enough Reserve Savings to Replace Existing Systems?

### Where:

- Replacement cost accumulated depreciation is the inflation adjusted accumulated depreciation.
- Reserves are funds specifically set aside by the municipality to fund water and wastewater system costs. Reserves include both statutory and general reserves held by the municipality for water and wastewater systems, but exclude development cost charges (DCCs).
- Population is based on the 2013 population estimate for the municipality.

There is an **infrastructure surplus** if current reserves exceed the expected cost to replace the asset.

here is an **infrastructure deficit** if the expected ost to replace the asset is greater than the current eserves.

an infrastructure deficit due to a shortfall in reserves is not necessarily an indicator of poor fiscal management. Aunicipalities have several options to finance of necessarily an indicator of poor fiscal management. Aunicipalities have several options to finance of necessarily an indicator of poor finance options is reserves that have been set aside for that purpose), or it can be paid for using debt to finance all or a portion of the construction cost when the asset is replaced.

Both strategies have merit and are equally valid means of accomplishing asset renewal. It is important, though, for a municipality to have a clear policy about which strategy it wishes to use for asset renewal, so that there is no sudden surprise when an asset reaches the end of its useful life.


### What do the ratio results tell us?

- Smaller municipalities have the largest infrastructure deficit per capita.
- Deficit per capita is greater for water assets than wastewater assets.
- BC communities have not set aside sufficient reserve funds to fully fund the eventual replacement of water and wastewater systems assets.
- The overall water and sewer infrastructure deficit in BC is estimated to be approximately \$13.2 billion. This is a conservative estimate of the unfunded infrastructure investment to renew and replace aging water and wastewater assets in BC. It does not include the cost to enhance existing systems to meet new regulations, population growth, or resilience upgrades.

### Do Municipalities Have the Ability to Finance Water System Replacements?

The interest cover ratio provides an indication of our capacity to finance system renewal using debt.

Interest Expense
Cover Ratio
Revenues

#### Where:

- Interest expenses are the sum of all interest payments for debt servicing.
- Revenues include all annual revenue from sale of water or sewer services, user fees, and charges (excluding DCCs).

The interest cover ratio indicates the proportion of revenues required to pay interest on debt.

Municipalities have varying financial policies with respect to borrowing, and varying tolerance for risk. There is no single recommended interest cover ratio, but it is important that municipalities make informed decisions about borrowing that also consider future costs for infrastructure renewal and replacement, and how these costs will be covered.


A **higher interest cover ratio** indicates that the municipality is using more debt to finance the cost of their water or sewer assets. Depending on the overall financial commitments of a community, a higher interest cover ratio may limit the municipality's ability to take on additional debt to finance asset renewal or replacement, and may indicate a greater vulnerability to increases in interest rates.

A **low interest cover ratio** indicates that a municipality is using less debt to finance the cost of their water or sewer assets. Depending on the overall financial commitments of a community, a lower interest cover ratio indicates that the municipality may have the financial capacity to use debt to finance asset renewal or replacement.


### What do the ratio results tell us?

- Larger municipalities (>50,000) have a lower interest expense as a percentage of their revenues.
- Municipalities have greater debt servicing costs for wastewater systems than water systems.

The cumulative effect of decisions, policies, and actions over a long period of time have influenced the financial status of BC's water and wastewater systems. Some of these factors include reliance on government grant funding for capital projects, lack of asset management planning, deferral of maintenance and investment, urban sprawl, and a lack of public support for full cost pricing.

Building financial sustainability will take time. While the financial risks to our water and wastewater systems are not immediate for all communities, it is important to make sound choices today about priorities for existing tax dollars, and set rates so that they cover the full cost of operating, maintaining, and replacing systems.

Financial sustainability is a key principle for safeguarding water, sewer, and stormwater systems so that they continue to protect

public health and the environment,

and contribute to economic

development.

Communities can take the following steps to strengthen their financial capacity to meet current and future water and wastewater infrastructure needs:

- Adjust water and wastewater rates to cover the full cost of service, including the cost to renew and replace systems.
- Develop and implement integrated asset management processes that assess the state of infrastructure, evaluate risks, and set priorities for investment in water and wastewater assets.
- Rank water and wastewater renewal and replacement projects as top **priorities** for capital investment.
- 4. Adopt "smart growth" principles.
- Foster collaboration among all levels of government to support communities to become fiscally self-reliant.

Re: Biosolids Resolution

At the March 27, 2015 meeting of the Thompson-Nicola Regional District (TNRD) Board of Directors, the following resolution was passed:

That the following resolution, which was approved by the Board on February 26, 2015, be sent out to all other Regional Districts for information:

"WHEREAS the Ministry of Environment and the Ministry of Health are responsible for reviewing and approving biosolid composting facility permits and land application notifications under the Organic Matter Recycling Regulation and the Ministry of Agriculture is responsible for administration of the Agricultural Land Commission Act;

AND WHEREAS, due to these activities being carried out within the Agricultural Land Reserve, the interjurisdictional importation of biosolid waste materials is being authorized and land application and composting facilities are being permitted without a public consultation process in locations where residents and the environment may be adversely affected by potential health risks, noise and odour nuisances, property value reductions and loss of community well-being:

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Province form a committee including local government representatives to examine and make recommendations for changes to the Provincial biosolid review process and changes to the content in the Organic Matter Recycling Regulation and Agricultural Land Commission Act that govern the biosolid regulatory process in the Province of British Columbia."

CARRIED

In the last few months, an issue has arisen in the Nicola Valley regarding a biosolids composting facility. The application of biosolids for regular farming practices has lawfully occurred in the TNRD for many years. The issue that is of concern now is the commercial composting of biosolids on properties that are relatively small and close in proximity to other residents. The TNRD is currently reviewing and amending its bylaws to determine which can potentially be done to deal with the siting issues that are leading to these facilities being established in too close of proximity to other residential properties. The changing of TNRD bylaws would not necessarily impact the Province. The TNRD passed the resolution (above) and the resolution has been forwarded on to the Southern Interior Local Government Association (SILGA). If SILGA delegates debate and endorse the resolution, it will be forwarded on to the Union of BC Municipalities (UBCM) for consideration.

At the present time, the TNRD Board strongly feels that the issues occurring in the Nicola Valley may occur in other areas in the near future and that the Province should review current regulations and standards in anticipation of continued issues. The TNRD's recommended way to address future situations of this nature is for the Province form a committee including local government representative to examine and make recommendations for changes to the Provincial biosolid review process and changes to the contents in the Organic Matter Recylcing Regulations and Agricultural Land Commission Act that govern the biosolid regulatory process in British Columbia.

Thank you for taking the time review this letter. Should the opportunity arise in the future to support TNRD's recommendation that the Province form a committee to address the issues mentioned above, we would respectfully request that your Board do so.

Please consider this letter notification that Burns Lake Community Forest (BLCF) is providing opportunity for Review and Comment regarding Management Plan #3 for Long-Term Community Forest License K1A. The management plan proposes management objectives for each resource value and management activity, and includes a proposed Annual Allowable Cut for K1A. This notice was advertised in the Lakes District News on April 22, 2015. The review period is 60 days, ending June 22, 2015 at 3:30 P.M

The community of Burns Lake was awarded a pilot Community Forest Agreement (CFA) in July, 2000. A 25 year Long-Term Community Forest Agreement was signed April 21, 2005. Since 2005, the community forest was granted uplifts to accommodate the salvage of mountain pine beetle-killed and infested areas, and to salvage a large area of blowdown. The Regional Manager or designate will consider Management Plan #3 along with public and First Nations input when he determines a new AAC for K1A. BLCF will present the findings of Management Plan #3 Review to the government after the 60-day review period.

Since inception, the community forest has completed numerous inventories on the CFA and has recently completed a formal timber supply review process with the objective of determining a new AAC that reasonably reflects current management as well as the productive capacity of the land base.

The Province highlighted as successes its leveraging of additional funding from federal and local governments; as well as the development of partnership agreements with local organizations to maintain recreation sites and trails. Ultimately, however, the provincial government indicated that "funding for managing recreation sites and trails is limited in the current fiscal environment."

**April 13, 2015** – At the March 18<sup>th</sup>, 2015 meeting of the Nechako-Kitamaat Development Fund Society Board in Vanderhoof, the Board of Directors approved funding for six new projects, bringing the total year-to-date total amount approved across the NKDF investment area to \$531,005.00.

"The grants that have been approved will be put to good use by organizations in the Nechako and Kitimat regions," Minister of Jobs, Tourism and Skills Training and Minister Responsible for Labour Shirley Bond said. "From the purchase of LED lights, to parking and building upgrades, these projects will make a difference."

Rio Tinto Alcan's Kevin Dobbin, Manager of External Relations, Communities and Media said, "Rio Tinto Alcan is very glad that the Nechako-Kitamaat Development Fund continues to provide support to community initiatives that work toward sustainability, but also address community needs in many positive ways. Thank you for your interest and ongoing participation in Northern Gateway's Engagement Road Map. The purpose of my letter is provide you with an update.



The Engagement Road Map was created to outline how and when Northern Gateway intends to meet many of the 209 conditions required by the National Energy Board (NEB). Since we began this process last year, we have received invaluable input from First Nation and Métis communities, stakeholders and government agencies.

After listening to this feedback, we have made the decision to slow the pace on the Engagement Road Map schedule to focus on building partnerships with First Nation and Métis communities. To meet our regulatory requirements, we will continue to engage on Phase 1 of the Road Map this year.

As part of our regulatory approval, work is continuing on two engagement activities:

- The research program on the behaviour and cleanup of heavy oils; and
- Northern Gateway's upcoming workshop sessions on the Pipeline Environmental Effects Monitoring Program (Pipeline EEMP) and the Marine Environmental Effects Monitoring Program (Marine EEMP). These workshops will provide stakeholders with an opportunity to have a detailed discussion on the programs, prior to our required submission June 2015 to the NEB.

As we move forward Northern Gateway's top priority remains building First Nation and Métis partnerships. The project proponents are open to change and remain committed to building this critical Canadian infrastructure.

Your continued feedback and input is a critical component of moving the project forward and we look forward to your participation.

### Research program on the behaviour and cleanup of heavy oils (Condition 169)

Together with the Canadian Energy Pipeline Association (CEPA) and the Canadian Association of Petroleum Producers (CAPP), Northern Gateway is jointly sponsoring a research program on the behavior, cleanup and recovery of heavy oils spilled in freshwater and marine aquatic environments.

The Royal Society of Canada (RSC) has been engaged to carry out this research project, entitled "The Behaviour and Environmental Impacts of Crude Oil Released into Aqueous Environments". To be completed in the fall of 2015, the RSC's independent, science-based study will be used to inform spill preparedness and response capabilities and contribute to the plan for meeting Condition 169.

The first meeting of the RSC Expert Panel and the start of their consultation with government and stakeholder participants commenced in early 2015. The Expert Panel is scheduled to continue their scientific stakeholder consultations until June 2015, which will be open and available to the public on the internet in real time as well as being made available later on the RSC's website. Formal oral presentations to the Expert Panel will be by invitation only, but it will accept all written contributions of scientific evidence and its interpretation.

### Pipeline EEMP (Conditions 27-32) and Marine EEMP (Conditions 36-37) Update

We have received valuable feedback from First Nation and Métis communities, stakeholders and government agencies on the Pipeline EEMP and Marine EEMP plans and we continue to revise these two draft plans as we receive additional input. We heard interest expressed in an opportunity for a more detailed discussion prior to our submission of the plans to the NEB. As such, we are inviting all stakeholders and government agencies to participate in a one day detailed workshop on either the Pipeline EEMP or Marine EEMP before we file in June 2015 as required by the NEB. We have and will continue to hold separate engagement for participating First Nation and Metis

communities, however these communities are also welcome to participate in the workshop if they choose. There will be six sessions across British Columbia and Alberta (lunch and coffee will be provided).

Improving ophthalmology services in northern B.C.

Northern Health places a high importance on providing high quality services to residents of northern B.C., and that includes ophthalmology services. Recognizing that there is an aging population, and that the demand for ophthalmology services continues to increase, we're working on solutions to improve services across the region. There have been a number of recent media reports about ophthalmology services and I'd like to provide further explanation.

We currently have ophthalmology services available in Terrace, Fort St. John, and Prince George. Ophthalmologists can diagnose all disorders that affect the eye, including cataracts and refractive errors such as nearsightedness. An ophthalmologist can carry out any medical or surgical treatment as necessary for these conditions. In Northern Health, we do not have any current ophthalmologist vacancies. Further recruitment of ophthalmologists could occur in the future depending on demand and capacity. The number of cataract surgeries in northern B.C. continue to increase year over year.

There is always work to be considered in terms of prioritizing operating room time. This includes ensuring the allocations of operating rooms. Extensive work has been completed in Terrace over the past two years to improve operating room procedures. This has



resulted in improved access to care for patients such as reduced wait times. In Prince George, there is currently a challenge with the sharing of operating room time with our surgeons. This is a process we've been working to resolve for approximately one year, and we're hopeful we will come to a conclusion this summer. Northern Health has completed a request for qualifications to increase ophthalmology surgical capacity, and we are in the process of finalizing a contract. It is expected the increased surgical capacity will be in place for the summer of 2015, and will improve access to service for residents of Prince George and the surrounding area.

As many Northern Health communities have one specialist position, we routinely plan for holiday or sick leave. Leaves of absence occur occasionally with staff and physicians for a number of reasons, including unexpected circumstances. Currently, the ophthalmologist in Terrace is away on personal leave that is expected to last approximately three months. During the ophthalmologist's leave of absence, there are locums providing ophthalmology services in Terrace to ensure residents have timely access to care. There may be urgent cases that need to be seen in Prince George, which would include potential travel time for patients. Northern Health Connections bus is available as an affordable transportation option for people with out-of-town health care appointments, if necessary.

People have a strong vested interest in their health, and we have an extremely vested interest in providing care in a timely manner. If you feel that your condition has changed dramatically while waiting for a referral or surgery, we encourage you to speak with your health care provider for a reassessment. We will continue working with the ophthalmologists in the region to improve access to care.

### **Federal Budget Highlights**

Apr 22, 2015

The Honourable Joe Oliver, Minister of Finance, introduced the federal budget on Tuesday. The budget, *Economic Action Plan 2015*, introduces a balanced budget with a \$1.4 billion surplus this year. The budget makes a significant investment in new public transit projects, while also focusing on tax cuts for families and seniors, as well as national security measures.

The federal budget referenced several initiatives of interest to local governments, including:

- Investing \$750 million over two years starting in 2017–18, and \$1 billion per year thereafter, for a new Public Transit Fund aimed at building new public transit infrastructure;
- Creating a new dedicated infrastructure fund to support the renovation, expansion and improvement of existing community infrastructure in all regions of the country as part of the Canada 150 celebrations (details forthcoming);
- Maintaining annual investments of \$1.7 billion for social housing for the next four years;
- Providing \$150 million over four years, starting in 2016–17, to support social housing in Canada by allowing social housing providers to prepay their long-term, non-renewable mortgages without penalty;
- Provides \$80 million over five years, starting in 2015–16, to the National Energy Board for safety and environmental
  protection and greater engagement with Canadians (funding to be cost recovered from industry);
- Provides \$34 million over five years, starting in 2015–16, to the Canadian Environmental Assessment Agency to
  continue to support consultations related to projects assessed under the Canadian Environmental Assessment Act,
  2012;
- Continuing to support, with \$75 million over five years, starting in 2015–16, the implementation of the Species at Risk Act;
- Provides \$30.8 million over five years, starting in 2015-16, for measures to strengthen marine incident prevention, preparedness and response in waters south of the 60<sup>th</sup> parallel;
- Investing \$27 million over five years, starting in 2015–16, to enhance security measures at Canada's federal courts and registry offices;
- Providing \$3 million over two years, starting in 2016–17, to take initial steps to establish a Public Safety Broadband
   Network, a high-speed mobile network dedicated to emergency management; and
- Reducing the small business tax rate to 9 percent from 11 percent by 2019.

Absent from the budget were any commitments on partnering to meet the new federal wastewater regulations that will cost upwards of \$18 billion over the next 25 years.

The Federation of Canadian Municipalities has been advocating for a partnership with the federal government on this infrastructure project.

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### **Wildfire Prevention Program Relaunched**

Apr 22, 2015

Funding for forest fuel reduction plans and projects is again available under the 2015 Strategic Wildfire Prevention Initiative, which is being relaunched today with recently announced additional provincial funding.

The initiative supports communities to mitigate risk from wildfire in the wildland urban interface. The primary objective of the program is to maximize the number of hectares treated in areas that pose the greatest risk of wildfire to communities.

2015 Program & Application Guides are now available for the initiative's Fuel Management Prescription and Operational Treatment streams. A revised program guide has also been issued for the 2015 Community Wildfire Protection Plan (CWPP) stream.

Funding permitting, local governments and First Nations may submit applications at any time, and these will be reviewed following the intake deadlines of May 29 and October 2, 2015.

Community Wildfire Protection Plan grants cover up to 50 per cent of eligible project costs for local governments (and up to 100 per cent of First Nations' CWPP costs), while prescription grants cover up to 75 per cent, and operational treatment grants pay for up to 90 per cent, of eligible project costs.

The Strategic Wildfire Prevention Initiative (SWPI) is administered by the Provincial Fuel Management Working Group, comprised of staff from UBCM, First Nations' Emergency Services Society and Wildfire Management Branch of the Ministry of Forests, Lands and Natural Resource Operations.

The 2015 SWPI program guides, application forms and resource materials are now available on UBCM's website.

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# **Province Seeks Input on Emergency Communication**

Apr 21, 2015

The Ministry of Justice is seeking input from key stakeholders, including local governments, in order to inform the future of emergency communications across the province involving 911 and police communication centres.

By modernizing the current approach to a more streamlined, equitable and resilient emergency communications system, services and public safety will be enhanced province-wide. Local governments have worked to manage and improve service since the 911 system was implemented in the late 1980s, when the technology was predominantly landline telephone services. Times have changed – households are moving from landline to cell phones, the majority of calls to 911 are from cell phones, and the implementation of Next Generation 911 (text and images) is expected to be complex and costly. Given these challenges, the Province is looking to revisit the overall approach to 911 service delivery in British Columbia.

The delivery and funding of 911 emergency services has been an ongoing issue for local government. UBCM in 2013 established a working group and hired a consultant to prepare a report "911 Services in British Columbia: Background Review in Relation to a Province-Wide Call Answer Levy". The report was considered at the 2013 Convention and endorsed. Following the 2013 Convention UBCM tested support for a province-wide levy on wireless devices and determined at the time that the membership was divided on the issue and there was no opportunity to move forward.

As a way to re-engage with stakeholders, a Discussion Paper – Emergency Communications Service Delivery in British Columbia - has been prepared by the Ministry of Justice that outlines the background, challenges, and strategic vision for emergency communications service delivery involving 911 PSAPs. Specifically, the vision includes a consolidated 911 PSAP and police dispatch service delivery model, with enhanced support from a call answer levy on wireless devices.

Written feedback on the questions in the Discussion Paper is requested via email by May 15, 2015. The Ministry will consider the results of the stakeholder engagement as part of the analysis of the strategic vision. 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# **Gas Tax and Asset Management Workshops Conclude**

Apr 14, 2015

UBCM staff completed a series of workshops in March and April across the province on the renewed Gas Tax Fund and Asset Management in BC.

The workshops – held in Abbotsford, Nanaimo, Kelowna, Prince George, Cranbrook and Fort St. John – provided local government staff with information on changes to the Gas Tax program in BC; details on Asset Management requirements under the Gas Tax Agreement; and information on tools, resources and training opportunities for asset management – including an overview of the work of Asset Management BC.

The workshop also included a number of case studies provided by Local Governments on their experience with Asset Management practices in their communities. Case studies included the District of North Vancouver, Fraser Valley Regional District, Regional District of Nanaimo, City of Powell River, District of Lake Country, City of Grand Forks, Northern Rockies Regional Municipality, City of Fort St. John. The workshops also included a presentation from Christina Benty, formerly Mayor of Golden, on the critical importance of communication and public engagement throughout the Asset Management process.

Presentations from the workshop, including the various case studies, will be available on the UBCM website later this month.

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# \$1.24 Million Available for Community Energy Leadership

Apr 14, 2015

The Ministry of Energy and Mines, on behalf of its provincial partners, has posted a Request for Expressions of Interest (RFEI) to B.C. local governments and First Nations to determine the level of interest in, and eligibility for, a potential Call for Applications under the newly created Community Energy Leadership Program (CELP).

This \$1.24M program is a component of the Ministry's Innovative Clean Energy Fund, designed to support government's energy, economic, environmental and greenhouse gas reduction priorities and advance British Columbia's clean energy sector.

The objective of the Ministry's CELP is to provide local governments and First Nations with funding ranging from \$20,000 to \$80,000 per application. The Program is scheduled to run for the next three fiscal years (2015/16 through to 2017/18, inclusive). Separate calls for applications will be made for each year. Communities will be eligible for funding if they undertake:

- One of a range of renewable energy capital projects that the local government or First Nation has part (e.g., IPP equity stake) or full ownership of; or
- A major energy efficiency initiative applied specifically to the local government's or First Nation's own infrastructure.

Communities are invited to provide a completed RFEI no later than Monday, May 4th 2015 by email to Leah Davies, Ministry of Energy and Mines. Please refer to RFEI number "CELP2015" in your message.

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# **Funding Available for Improving Accessibility**

Apr 1, 2015

The federal Enabling Accessibility Fund is currently receiving applications from local governments for projects that improve accessibility in communities across Canada.

Eligible projects under this program include renovation, retrofit or construction activities, as well as the provision of information and communication technologies that increase accessibility to facilities where programs and services are offered to people with disabilities.

Proposals can involve a wide variety of projects, however priority will be given to projects that enhance access for children with disabilities (e.g. outdoor playgrounds), veterans with disabilities or seniors with disabilities. Projects must have support from their community and secure a minimum of 35 per cent of the total eligible proposed project costs from non-federal government sources. Organizations can receive a grant of up to \$50,000.

This year's call for proposals is open to all local governments regardless of size, but only for projects under the children with disabilities priority.

# **Renewed Gas Tax Agreement**

Strategic Priorities Fund: Applications will be accepted until April 15, 2015.

# **Local Government Program Services**

2014/15 Regional Community to Community (C2C) Forums: Final reporting for C2C forum events held under the 2014/15 program are due no later than April 30, 2015.

Strategic Wildfire Prevention Initiative: The province has announced an additional \$5 million to support the Strategic Wildfire Prevention Initiative. A call for applications for fuel management prescriptions and treatment projects will be made in the next few weeks with an expected deadline of May 29, 2015. The previously announced deadline for Community Wildfire Protection Plans and Updates will be extended to this new deadline.

# **Other Funding**

Asia-Pacific Gateway and Corridor Transportation Infrastructure Fund: April 30, 2015, is the deadline for BC local governments, not-for-profit and for-profit private sector organizations to apply for project funding aimed at making Canada's multimodal transportation network more efficient for international trade with Asia-Pacific.

#### **Excerpt from the Minutes of the 2011 UBCM Convention**

Opening the Convention policy session on Thursday, September 29, 2011, Mayor Greg Moore assumed the Chair at 8:55 a.m. and introduced the Municipal Auditor General Policy Paper. A motion, duly moved and seconded, that the recommendation from the Municipal Auditor General Policy Paper be amended to express disagreement with the need for an office of the Municipal Auditor General, was endorsed.

The recommendation, as amended, then read:

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that UBCM, while disagreeing on the necessity to create an office of the Municipal Auditor General, due to the fact that requirements of such an office are already met under existing local government legislation and regulations, endorse in principle the policy paper and instruct the UBCM Executive to continue negotiations with the provincial government.

ON MOTION the recommendation, as amended, was ENDORSED.

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# **Additional Wildfire Prevention Funding Announced**

Mar 25, 2015

The B.C. government will provide an additional \$5 million to the Strategic Wildfire Prevention Initiative (SWPI), Forests Minister Steve Thomson announced last week. The funding will support First Nations and local governments undertake forest fuel management prescriptions and treatment projects. Reducing fuel loads in interface areas, where urban developments border forests and grasslands, is a proven method of lowering the threat of damaging wildfires.

Applications under the initiative were curtailed last year for three of four program streams. Applications for Community Wildfire Protection Planning continue to be accepted.

The additional funding will allow communities to apply for site specific planning (prescriptions) and operational treatment projects that will better protect their citizens, their homes and businesses, and critical infrastructure from the risk of wildfire.

2015 SWPI Program & Application Guides and a revised application intake deadline will be announced in the near future.

The SWPI is a suite of funding programs managed through the Provincial Fuel Management Working Group, which Includes the Union of B.C. Municipalities, the First Nations' Emergency Services Society, and the Wildfire Management Branch of the Ministry of Forests, Lands and Natural Resource Operations.

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# **New Infrastructure Program Launched**

Mar 25, 2015

Federal transport minister Lisa Raitt announced a call for proposals for BC infrastructure projects under the Asia-Pacific Gateway and Corridor Transportation Infrastructure Fund (APGCTIF). Local governments, as well as provincial, not-for-profit and for-profit private sector organizations are encouraged to make application by the April 30, 2015 deadline.

Approximately \$16.5 million in contribution funds will be made available to support projects aimed at making Canada's multimodal transportation network more efficient for international trade with Asia-Pacific.

The council will also advise on rural community capacity building, including the Rural Dividend. Former Terrace Mayor David Pernarowski was also appointed to the group of fourteen.
