Northern Development Local Government Management Internship

Staff have been investigating the opportunity to apply to Northern Development Initiative Trust's Local Government Internship Program, with a deadline of November 30, 2016.

The internship program would see a university graduate in a local government related field (economic development/planning/environment services/administration) be hired to complete projects at the RDBN from June, 2017 through April, 2018. Potential projects the intern could assist the RDBN with, include but are not limited to:

- Solid Waste Management Plan, Fort Fraser water system upgrade, Knockholt Landfill Phase Development Project (Environmental Services Department)
- Asset Management Plan (Finance Department)
- Bylaw and Policy updates (Administration Department)
- Rural Connectivity Study (Economic Development Department)
- Comprehensive review of planning and development charges (Planning Department)

Having a management level intern will greatly assist the RDBN in completing these projects at a very minimal cost to the RDBN. All the projects have budgets attached to them that could be accessed to cover the RDBN's portion of the intern's wages. The experience and mentorship that the intern will receive as they work on the above projects will meet the objectives of the internship program.

The internship program objectives are:

- To act as a pathway to accelerate operational learning and permanent placement into professional careers in local government management
- To provide results focused economic development professional training with Northern Development Initiative Trust and host communities
- To make local government management a career of choice by financially supporting internship opportunities for post-secondary graduates
- To allow for the flexibility of learning experiences where local governments or local governments and First Nations governments wish to jointly offer a placement for an intern

 To allow communities under 1,500 population with challenging recruiting locations to provide management internships at the same time that postsecondary courses in local government management are being completed

The grant funding available for an intern is \$35,000 and net costs to the RDBN to have an intern in house for 11 months will be approximately \$15,500, including wages and mandatory training. These costs will be included in the existing project budgets and may in fact reduce the project budgets as the intern can complete tasks that would have been outsourced to a consultant. Each Department will share in the costs using existing project and summer student budgets, resulting in no net increase to taxation for the intern.

With many projects planned for the coming year, hiring an intern provides excellent value, with ability to redistribute the workload of the management team to an additional person and reduce costs to the organization. Staff is seeking approval from the Board of Directors to submit an application to Northern Development Initiative Trust, with a funding commitment of \$15,000 to host an intern within currently planned expenditures, and with staff resources for hosting and mentoring the intern.

That the RDBN Board of Directors supports an application to Northern Development to host a Local Government Management Intern and receive a \$35,000 grant from the North West and/or Prince George Regional Advisory Committees, and;

That the RDBN Board of Directors is committed to the vision and goals of the Local Government Management Internship Program by committing \$15,500, providing staffing resources to host an intern, and providing training and exposure opportunities for an intern.

The purpose of this memorandum is to follow-up on the memorandum brought to the Committee of the Whole on November 3, 2016 and to obtain the resolution required from the Board of Directors to submit an application to the Canada-British Columbia Clean Water and Wastewater Fund for the un-incorporated community of Fort Fraser.

Project Title: Fort Fraser Infrastructure Improvement Project

Project Description:

The primary purpose of the project is associated with replacing approximately 80% of the unincorporated community of Fort Fraser's water distribution system which was originally constructed in the early 1960's using asbestos cement pipes and which is at or nearing its end of expected life.

The project will build off of studies previously completed, by moving forward with detailed design and construction of the entire water distribution replacement plan. The originally proposed asset management planning work for the water and wastewater systems and update of the Water Conservation Plan has been removed from the project details, following conversations with representatives from the Canada-BC Clean Water and Wastewater Fund.

The financials associated with the detailed design and construction project are presented below:

Fort Fraser Local Commission Resolutions:

At the November 7, 2016 Fort Fraser Local Commission Meeting, the following recommendations were carried unanimously:

- 1. That the Fort Fraser Local Commission fully support the RDBN submitting an application to the Canada-British Columbia Clean Water and Wastewater Fund for the Fort Fraser Infrastructure Improvement Project.
- 2. Further, that the Fort Fraser Local Commission approve the contribution of the entire capital reserve currently available for the water system (as of 2016) as well as the capital reserve contributions planned for the 2017 and 2018 fiscal periods (total amount of \$576,889) towards the Fort Fraser Infrastructure Improvement Project.
- 3. Further, that the Fort Fraser Local Commission support an increase to the taxation limit for water services (Budget 6201) by 25% as allowed by the *Local Government Act*. This would increase the taxation limit for the service from \$62,500 to \$78,125.
- 4. Further, that the Fort Fraser Local Commission approve borrowing up to \$56,000 over a 5 year payback period to contribute towards the Fort Fraser Infrastructure Improvement Project.
- 5. That the Fort Fraser Local Commission endorse the Fort Fraser Water Conservation Plan (March 2009).

RDBN Resolution Required:

The application deadline for the Clean Water and Wastewater Fund is November 23, 2016. For the RDBN to submit the application a resolution will be required from the Board of Directors to contribute its share of the eligible project costs and all of the ineligible costs. At this time, the recommendation is being made that the RDBN Board pass the following resolutions:

THAT staff submit an application for grant funding application for the Fort Fraser Infrastructure Improvement Project through the Clean Water and Wastewater Fund; and

THAT the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako supports the project and commits to its share (\$635,224) of the project and;

THAT this project could not proceed without program funding and;

THAT the full scope of this project would not otherwise have been undertaken in fiscal years 2016-17 or 2017-18.

FIGHT FOR THE FARM

The History:

My husband and I bought the farm on a wing and a prayer nearly 40 years ago. We were poor, skinny kids then, eyes wild with enthusiasm and promise. We were oblivious to what lay ahead of us.

When we purchased it, it was a tumbled down, ram-shackled, fence bare, thistle-rich piece of land. It was "barely" a farm. But, we saw potential.

The fences were nonexistent. The barns were falling back into the soil with tin from the roofs laying waste in the fields, blown off the rafters after a neighbor boy used them for target practice. The house had cold running water provided by a rusted old pisten pump perched precariously on a rotten rough 2 x 6 located in the "mud storage" area beneath the house called the "basement". This so called "basement" ranged in height from 4'-6' most of it filled with pools of stagnant water, perfect for toads, of which there were plenty. The septic field, located near the front door, had long since stopped its intended percolation process and had turned into a river of feces and urine every time the toilet was flushed. The four rooms in the house each had a 60 watt light bulb. The fifth room, the bathroom, you had to leave the door to the kitchen open or you'd have to do your business in the dark. We heated our water for dishes and bathing on a wood cook stove, which was also the only source of heat in the house. In those days, 37 years ago we had real winters. We arrived in the valley on Dec. 21, 1979 to minus 41 F. It did not get above minus 30 till mid February. But, we saw potential...

The first few years my job took me away to camps in all parts of the province leaving my husband and my mother on the farm. Not the best combination, as you can imagine, but we had no choice. My husband worked 8 hours at a "paying" job in town then came home to work another 8 hours in a "non-paying" job on the farm. When I made it home between jobs, we all worked together on the endless projects that needed to be done. My mother and my husband dug out the "basement" with a pick and shovel, not an easy job considering the wet glacial til clay they had to work with. My husband upgraded the water system and installed a hot water tank. We dug a proper lagoon. He rewired the electrical in the house. We fenced and cross-fenced the 140 acers. We built corals. We bought beef cattle. We bought Jersey Cows. We bought sheep. We refinanced



our mortgage several times and then several times more, because....we say potential...

When the kids started arriving I stayed on the farm and my husband went to camps for weeks at a time. The kids, my mother and I ran the farm for years while my husband spent time away from his growing family working in the bush alone. Progress on the farm was glacial, time went on, we became less skinny, eyes became less wild with enthusiasm, and we were still poor....but, we still saw potential....

The kids grew up, made lives for themselves but always seemed to gravitate back to the farm to touch base. Close to 5 years ago my husband passed away. I was determined to carry on but, realistically, I knew I would have to sell the farm eventually. Thinking of the blood, sweat, tears and sacrifice all of us went through to bring the farm to its present state broke my heart. This spring I was in line for a major operation and wanted to square things away with my children should I not come out of it. With a heavy heart I gathered them around our kitchen table and told them I was thinking of selling the farm and gave them the option of receiving money from the sale of the farm or giving one of them, two of them or preferably three of them the opportunity to buy it themselves. I was hopeful that at least one of them would want the farm. I did not predict the resounding agreement from all of them and their significant others, to purchase the farm together...They saw the potential....!

Farming runs thick as mud through my veins. My grandparents on my father's side emigrated from the former Yugoslavia and established a homestead on Yelich Rd. My grandparents on my mother's side arrived from Poland and Ukraine in the same immigration wave in the early 20th century and settled in Alberta. My Father and Mother met in Smithers and homesteaded a farm on Snake Rd. My Uncle took over my grandparent's farm. My brother and his family farmed next to my farm. My neice and her husband took over his farm when he passed away and are now farming cattle that graze on my land. My husband and I made farming our lives, spurning all other occupations to make something of a forgotten, untended piece of land. Now all of our children and their spouses want to carry on the historic family tradition of taking and giving back to the land. They understand instinctively the value of land and the even higher value of "farm land".



The Plan:

I sat back and listened to the explosion of ideas expressed around that kitchen table. "A pasture full of "Ewok" sheep (whatever they are)... Orchards of cold weather apples and plums. A cider press. A cottage industry. A mushroom farm. A Christmas tree farm. What about hydroponics? Soil sampling to determine what crops might be grown with the coming Global warming. Ginseng...could it be grown this far north...?

Then suddenly the conversation turned to more practical matters. Where would they all live? The farm house is big enough for two families to live in and never see each other. Mom could make a little apartment above the barn and she could move there. The apartment would eventually pass to Logan when the time came. Kyler and Tara would want their own place as they're private people and would like to have their assets separate from the fray. This only makes sense.

The Principles:

Please allow me to introduce the principles:

Kyler: My oldest son, is an entrepreneur. He sees the world through a global lens. His work takes him to The States, Europe, The Middle East, South America, Africa, Australia. He sees a lot of different land being used for a lot of different things. He's an "ideas" man. And do you know where he comes to rest his head? The Bulkley Valley.

Tara: Wife and leveler of Kyler. Among her many talents, she is the numbers lady of the group. She also has excellent knowledge in risk assessment. Kyler and Tara have run successful businesses in the valley.

Logan: My middle child. Methodical, analytical, hardworking, is cultivating a "killer green thumb" his Ukrainian Grandmother would be proud of.

Jess: My daughter. An absolute dynamo, a problem solver, has organizational skills that would make your head spin.

Jr.: Jess's partner. Would follow her to hell and back with a smile on his face. He's unable to be here this evening as he's in camp earning money so he can buy a farm.

And the cherry on top of the sundae? They all work well together!

You people have such an important job. We farmers and potential farmers, successful and not so successful, acknowledge your collective experience and



commend you for being the stalwart barrier to land exploitation in this valley. But that is not what this is. This is our family attempting to carry forward a tradition that has been in our blood for centuries with the hope it continues for centuries into the future. You have the power to give these young folks, the next generation of land tenders, the opportunity to maybe, together, do something wonderful for themselves and their community... to contribute to the local economy. If Kyler and Tara are not allowed to build their little dream home, they and their talents may leave the valley. We as a family may lose our thrust.... We may never reach our full potential.

And what if all their grand ideas fall to the ground and are never realized? What if the "potential" is just as simple as living a "quiet country life"? The hayfields will still be hayed. The pastures will still be grazed. The veggies will still be harvested and eaten. The livestock will still be grown and slaughtered and sold locally. Because that's who we are. Please! I ask you to allow the "farming way of life' to move forward through these young people as fast or as slow, as creative or as benign, as they deem. They are our collective potential...

Thank you for the opportunity to provide comments on the OCP and Zoning Amendment Application (A-03-16) for the properties legally described at Lot B, Section 14, Township 1A, Range 5, Coast District Plan EPP25548, Except Plan EPP42101 (referred to as Lot B) and Lots 2, 3 & 4, Section 14, Township 1A, Range 5, Coast District, Plan EPP 42101 (referred to as Lots 2, 3, and 4).

The current application is to swap the applicable zones and to transfer the residential subdivision potential between the two areas of the property, while <u>not increasing</u> the total number of potential residential lots to what currently exists. This density transfer is the preferred option by the Town provided that the applicant is willing to discuss the registration of a Section 219 covenant on the residential properties to ensure that there remains a setback buffer between the airport and non-airport uses.

As per previous referral responses regarding the above properties, the Town of Smithers does not support further residential intensification in close proximity to the Smithers Regional Airport. Any new residential lots have the potential to create land use conflicts with both the present and future operations of the Airport, due to noise, access, lower landing limits and servicing issues as well as the future light industrial development of the area.
