It was a pleasure to have met with the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako delegation at the Union of British Columbia Municipalities Annual Convention on September 28, 2016 in Victoria. I also want to thank Melany de Weerdt, Chief Administrative Officer, for engaging with Network BC staff since the Convention occurred. We understand how important connectivity is to citizens living in rural communities.

Network BC has reached out to Internet service providers and the federal government to draw attention to the need for improved high-speed Internet services in rural British Columbia. Increased access to reliable high-speed Internet services will provide British Columbians with new opportunities to take advantage of advances in health care, education and other services.

In addition to various provincial programs in place to assist rural communities to increase connectivity, a federal commitment for a new broadband connectivity program is expected to be announced in the near future. Federal Budget 2016 provided \$500 million over five years for a new program to extend and enhance high-speed Internet service to rural and remote communities. Network BC will be working with local Internet service providers (ISPs) to access as much of the new federal funding as possible to improve Internet access in our province.

To prepare for the federal opportunity, local governments have an important role in bringing together multiple regional stakeholders, including Internet service providers operating in your region. Network BC encourages the regional district to identify local government assets that may be leveraged by ISPs in a federal funding application. The Kootenay Regional Broadband Committee is one example illustrating the role of local government collaborating with service providers and other levels of government. You may wish to reach out to Aimee Ambrosone, Chief Operating Officer at the Columbia Basin Broadband Corporation, at 1-800-505-8998 or at ambrosone@cbt.org to discuss the development of the Kootenay regional strategy and approach

used to improve Internet service in their region. Another example is the Eastern Ontario Broadband Strategy located at this link http://www.eowc.org/en/futuredirectjons/Economic-Development-Strategy-2014.asp.

The Canadian Radio-television and Telecommunications Commission (CRTC) is holding consultations to explore the viability of telecommunications as an essential service under federal regulation. Please see http://www.crtc.gc.ca/eng/archive/2015/2015-134.htm. We encourage the Regional District to contact the CRTC to express the need for telecommunications as a basic service, and to convey your need for enhanced telecommunications services in your region. Please contact the CRTC at http://crtc.gc.ca/eng/info sht/g4.htm.

You should also be aware that the next British Columbia Broadband Association Conference is in Richmond on May 2-3, 2017. This is a forum to meet, to discuss connectivity solutions and approaches, industry trends and regulations. Please see https://www.bcba.ca/bcbc/ for more details.

With regard to cellular connectivity, TELUS has met its obligation to the Province under the Connecting BC Agreement to expand cellular coverage along 1,716km of provincial highways and the Cellular Highway Expansion program has concluded. Network BC has reached out to TELUS and Rogers to draw attention to the need for further cellular coverage in your regional district. There may be options for improved coverage if capital contributions from other sources are available. We encourage the Regional District to reach out to TELUS and Rogers to consider where cellular expansion opportunities may exist through cost sharing arrangements. CRTC establishes fund to attain new high-speed Internet targets

Wants Canadians to have access to an unlimited data plan option and speeds of at least 50 Mbps download and 10 Mbps upload

December 21, 2016 - Ottawa-Gatineau - Canadian Radio-television and Telecommunications Commission (CRTC)

The Canadian Radio-television and Telecommunications Commission (CRTC) today declared that broadband access Internet service is now considered a basic telecommunications service for all Canadians. The CRTC is also setting ambitious new speed targets and creating a new fund that will invest up to \$750 million over and above existing government programs.

Broadband and mobile services

Further to its legislative mandate, the CRTC has set the following targets for the basic telecommunications services that Canadians need to participate in the digital economy:

- speeds of 50 megabits per second (Mbps) download/10 Mbps upload for fixed broadband Internet access services.
- an unlimited data option for fixed broadband access services.
- the latest mobile wireless technology available not only in homes and businesses, but also along major Canadian roads.

New funding for broadband projects

The CRTC is establishing a <u>fund</u> to support projects in areas that do not meet these targets. Applicants will be able to submit funding proposals in order to build or upgrade infrastructure for fixed and mobile broadband Internet access services. The fund will:

- make available up to \$750 million over the first five years;
- be complementary to existing and future private investment and public funding;
- · focus on underserved areas; and
- · be managed at arm's length by a third party.

Accessibility and tools for consumers

The CRTC wants Canadians to have access to the tools and services they need to empower themselves regarding fixed Internet access services. No later than six months from today, service providers should ensure that contracts are written in clear and plain language, and should make available online tools so consumers can easily manage their data usage.

Also, all wireless service providers will have to offer and publicize, no later than six months from today, mobile service packages that meet the needs of Canadians with disabilities.

The path forward for Canada's digital economy

During its consultations with Canadians, the CRTC also identified further gaps regarding the adoption of broadband Internet services in Canada that are outside its core mandate. Today, the CRTC is submitting a report to the Innovation Agenda, as encouraged by the Minister of Innovation, Science and Economic Development Canada, on the availability and adoption of broadband Internet services in Canada. This report includes information on access gaps resulting from infrastructure, affordability and digital literacy issues, as well as barriers to connectivity in Indigenous communities.

The decision issued today complements the Government of Canada's Innovation Agenda. Looking ahead, the CRTC will contribute in ways appropriate to its mandate. However, all stakeholders have a role to play to ensure that broadband Internet service is universally available and barriers to adoption are removed.

Quick Facts

 Broadband Internet access services are necessary to the quality of life for Canadians and empowers them as citizens, creators and consumers.

- While most are well-served, many Canadians, particularly those in rural and remote communities, do not have access to broadband Internet access services that are comparable to those offered to the vast majority of Canadians in terms of speed, capacity, quality and price.
- Broadband Internet services would allow more Canadian entrepreneurs to easily access crucial information relating to international markets and create more business opportunities across Canada.
- In 2015, 82% of Canadians had access to speeds of 50 Mbps download/10 Mbps upload for fixed broadband services.
- · The CRTC is shifting its regulatory focus from wireline voice to broadband services.
- Currently there is a subsidy for residential local voice services in rural and remote areas that amounted to approximately \$100 million in 2016.
- The current local voice subsidy will now be transitioned to the new funding mechanism announced today (for projects that meet the new targets).
- Further to a broad consultation, more than 50,000 Canadians provided their views on the telecommunications services they need to participate in the digital economy.

Quote

"Access to broadband Internet service is vital and a basic telecommunication service all Canadians are entitled to receive. Canadians who participated during our process told us that no matter where they live or work in our vast country — whether in a small town in northern Yukon, a rural area of eastern Quebec or in downtown Calgary — everyone needs access to high-quality fixed Internet and mobile services. We are doing our part to bring broadband services to rural and remote communities.

The availability of broadband Internet, however, is an issue that can't be solved by the CRTC alone. All players in the Canadian communications landscape will need to do their part to ensure Canadians have access to the services they need to participate in the digital economy.

All levels of government must address gaps in digital literacy. Affordability concerns are best addressed by the emergence of a dynamic market place where service providers compete on price for telecommunication services, in conjunction with social responsibility programs of telecommunications carriers and different levels of government.

High quality and reliable digital connectivity is essential for the quality of life of Canadians and Canada's economic prosperity."

CRTC broadband decision: Big win for rural and northern communities

December 22, 2016

FCM President Clark Somerville issued the following statement in response to today's (December 21) decision by the Canadian Radio-television and Telecommunications Commission (CRTC) in the Review of Basic Telecommunications Services.

Broadband is now fundamental to modern life and commerce. The CRTC recognized this today in its <u>Decision</u> adopting a "universal service objective" mandating universal access to reliable broadband - in communities of all sizes - through both fixed and mobile wireless networks.

The CRTC launched its sweeping review of basic telecommunications services in April 2015. FCM's final submission to that process raised the alarm over the "broadband gap" that constrains so many northern and rural communities. Some struggle with bandwidth and network capacity that cannot meet user demands. Others have no broadband coverage at all.

For these communities, today's decision can be transformative. Expanding broadband access will improve local quality of life, help stem youth out-migration and support economic growth - by boosting productivity, supporting innovation and improving market access. The CRTC is responding to FCM's call by adopting a universal speed target of 50 mbps for downloads and 10 mbps for uploads, backed by a new long-term funding mechanism.

This decision comes less than a week after the federal government launched its Connect to Innovate program. First announced in Budget 2016, this five-year \$500-million commitment will accelerate broadband upgrades in high-cost rural areas. This plan responds to many of FCM's recommendations and we will keep working with our federal partners to confirm its details.

Even with this new federal support, however, market forces alone will not close the broadband gap for many remote and northern communities. FCM will be examining the CRTC's new funding mechanism to ensure it complements Connect to Innnovate funding to best support the communities that need it most. The next step will be to develop a comprehensive, long-term plan and timeline to make universal broadband access a reality for Canadians. FCM is eager to work with all orders of government to make that happen.



Re: Land Referral File No. 6406985 (Bear Enterprises Ltd)

This referral from the Province is for a Licence of Occupation to allow the applicant to develop and use the application areas for commercial recreation purposes. The company would like to use two areas within the RDBN and one area in the Kitimat-Stikine Regional District for a 20 year term.

Application Area 1, shown as the hatched area on the map below is partially located in the Regional District within Electoral Area G. This application area is 206,074 ha. in size.


Application Area 1



The proposed operations for Application Area 1 includes mountaineering activities such as mountain hiking, rock and ice climbing, and backcountry skiing. No structures will be built. Sites will be accessed via helicopter.

The application area is not zoned.

Significant ecosystems and wildlife values identified by the Ministry of Environment and mentioned in the Kispiox Land and Resource Management Plan are found in the Application Area. The LRMP designates most of the application area as a Scenic/ Recreation/ Wildlife Habitat where the objective is to maintain provincially significant scenic resources, and backcountry recreation opportunities.



Application Area 2 is located in Electoral Area 'A' on the Telkwa River FSR, 22 km southwest of Telkwa. This application area is 19 ha. in size.

The proposed operations for Application Area 2 includes a helicopter landing area. No infrastructure will be built, but the removal of timber is expected. No fuel will be stored on site; however, occasional refuelling of helicopters will occur.

The application area is not zoned.

Significant ecosystems and wildlife values identified by the Ministry of Environment and mentioned in Schedule C of the "Smithers Telkwa Official Community Plan, 1704, 2014" (OCP) are found within the application area. These include high valued moose habitat. The Regional District encourages the Province to evaluate the need for protection and enhancement of the associated values in the design of development within the Plan area (Policy 4.2.2(2)).

In addition, the application area is designated as a Landscape Corridor in the LRMP and the OCP. The purpose of the Landscape Corridor designation is to "maintain connectivity within the landscape, reduce habitat fragmentation, permit movement and dispersal of plant and

animal species, and maintain, within a managed forest"

The location is also adjacent to the Telkwa River which is identified as a critical fish habitat under the LRMP. It is recommended that the Province consider whether the helicopter use will disrupt wildlife habitat in the area.







This referral from the Province is for a Licence of Occupation, to expand Reddog Logging Ltd.'s sawmill operation.

The industrial site is proposed to be 0.69 ha. in size. The application area is located on the east side of Babine Lake, approximately 10 km east of Granisle and 3.5 km from Topley Landing. The closest residence is 3.6 km away.



The purpose of the project is to amend the unused licence of occupation for a gravel pit to allow a saw mill, shaper and planer. Additional area will be cleared to be used to store finished mill/ planer products and logging equipment. Other facilities will include an office, and an outhouse. The use of a diesel generator will power the facilities and is estimated to run 10 hours per week.

Use of the area is mainly for logging, hunting and trapping, and there is a guide outfitter within the area.

The application areas are not zoned, but are within the Agricultural Land Reserve. The applicant must apply for a Non-Farm Use Application or an Exclusion Application with the Agricultural Land Commission.
