# DELEGATION

#### BRAD LAYTON – Liberal Candidate, Skeena Bulkley Valley

Chair Miller welcomed Brad Layton, Liberal Candidate, Skeena Bulkley Valley.

Mr. Layton provided a handout that included a bio and issues he feels are important along with the Liberal policy titled "A Historic Investment Plan to Strengthen the Middle Class, Create Jobs and Grow Our Economy." Mr. Layton explained that the document provides an outline on how the Liberal party plans to double the federal infrastructure investment from \$65 billion to \$125 billion over the next 10 years. If elected they plan to make an immediate down payment of \$5 billion for the first two years after the election for infrastructure. The plan has three distinct eligibility areas: public transit, social and green infrastructure.

Mr. Layton mentioned that a Liberal Government plans to add green infrastructure to the New Building Canada Fund and provide clearer project criteria, faster approval processes and quicker dispersal. It will be a similar model utilized for the Gas Tax Fund. Any uncommitted federal infrastructure funds near the end of any fiscal year will be transferred to municipalities through a temporary top-up of the Gas Tax Fund.

A Liberal government plans to establish the Canada Infrastructure Bank (CIB) to provide low-cost financing to build new infrastructure projects.

Mr. Layton spoke to the importance of skills and trades training and noted that a Liberal government will increase funding to skills and trades training by \$750 million. \$500 million will be invested in the labour market development agreements, \$200 million will be for workers not currently eligible, \$50 million to expand aboriginal skills training and \$25 million for training facilities, existing and new infrastructure.

# **DELEGATION (CONT'D)**

### BRAD LAYTON – Liberal Candidate, Skeena Bulkley Valley

The Liberal party is planning to work with employers to develop an appropriate apprenticeship worker ratio for all federal infrastructure projects. Changes are also planned for the Employment Insurance program through immediate engagement with the provinces. They intend to adjust the waiting period from two weeks to one week and reduce the waiting period to receive first payment to within two to three weeks.

Current relationships between the federal government and First Nations is also a top priority and the Liberal party plans to engage and communicate with First Nations to work together to address the issues faced by First Nations communities under past governments.

Chair Miller commented that immediately putting money into skills training is not the full answer to developing and growing skills training programs but the need to ensure that the federal, provincial, local governments, post-secondary institutions and industry form partnerships to work together to build a plan that will work for everyone. Mr. Layton noted that the funding will be available but the projects, models and planning still require development and implementation.

Director Thiessen spoke to the changes to the foreign workers program and what does the Liberal government plan to do to address the lack of workers. Mr. Layton mentioned that the Liberal government wants to create a program that provides work to displaced Canadian workers first, through such ideas of relocation of workers throughout Canada and then still provide opportunities for foreign/temporary workers along with their families to fill jobs.

Director MacDougall noted the challenges and issues regarding CN Rail in regard to getting products to market, safety of transporting products through communities and horn signals at crossings. Mr. Layton mentioned that the CN issue has not been recently brought forward but if he is elected he would like to see the regulations that CN follows in the United States be the same or similar in Canada.

Director Repen commented that a lot of the Liberal campaign has focused on a balanced budget, primary resource activities and how to foster growth in the long-term, what does the Liberal government plan to do to strengthen growth? Mr. Layton spoke to their plan to dedicate funding to green infrastructure such as better internet and cell service, once that is in place rural areas will have a better ability to attract business. Stable communications and internet are the backbone.

Chair Miller encouraged Mr. Layton and the Liberal party, if elected, to work together with all political parties and provinces to find solutions. It is important for politicians to work towards solutions for all of Canada.

# SHELDON CLARE - Independent Candidate - Cariboo-Prince George (via teleconference)

Chair Miller welcomed Sheldon Clare, Independent – Cariboo-Prince George.

Mr. Clare provided an outline of his background. He has lived the majority of his life in Prince George and currently teaches at the College of New Caledonia (CNC), sits on the CNC Board of Governors and is the Elected Facility Rep. He is currently the President of the Canadian National Finance Association and is past President of the Royal Canadian Legion, his local Rod and Gun Club and past Chair of the Alpine Club of Canada's Prince George Section. He also assisted with the profiles of the Caledonia Nordic Ski Club as a volunteer Biathlon Sports Information Officer for the 2015 Canada Winter Games in Prince George.

Mr. Clare mentioned that the reason he is running as an independent candidate is because he believes the party system is broken and in order to correct the system an elected official needs to be responsive and responsible to the voters rather than a political party. Mr. Clare intends to fight for local issues, diversify the economy and not just focus on resource extraction, but look for markets for renewable resources. He also noted that an emphasis needs to be put on the importance of the agriculture sector. There is a need to reduce student debt when students leave post-secondary education and he feels that an avenue to address this is through eliminating interest on student loans. He also believes in better support for seniors and more services for veterans along with more support for veterans and those dealing with post-traumatic stress disorder.

Mr. Clare commented that economic diversity is key for success and that we have been impacted by the boom or bust cycle numerous times and require diversification to cushion the effects of a boom or bust economy.

Mr. Clare spoke of his strong opposition to Bill C-51, Anti-Terrorism Act 2015. He strongly believes that intelligence agencies should not be law enforcement agencies as well. He noted concerns regarding the privacy and freedom aspects associated with the legislation of Bill C-51.

In terms of the environment, polluters need to pay for their damages and cleanup. Mr. Clare does not support mandatory minimum sentencing, he feels that limits the ability for the judge and courts to provide adequate sentencing. Mr. Clare has considered the idea of tying corporate tax rates with corporate performance in terms of providing jobs and employment opportunities and being good corporate citizens within communities. If companies have a high level corporate performance their tax rate would be reduced.

It is important to pay attention to the people that live in the region, why they live here, along with providing good quality work opportunities.

Mr. Clare commented that there needs to be a better voice for aboriginal people and also better support and education opportunities for aboriginal people.

Director Repen asked if Mr. Clare was elected would he consult with constituents regarding his various platforms to determine whether or not they were supportive and what the general consensus would be. Mr. Clare explained he felt that by being an independent he would have the opportunity to listen to his constituents and have the ability to be a critical thinker. He believes in a flexible coalition to better Cariboo-Prince George and Canada. Mr. Clare mentioned that it is important to get more people to vote and there needs to be a process to encourage people to vote for something not against something.

Chair Miller thanked Mr. Clare for attending the meeting via teleconference and the importance for all political parties to work together to find solutions for the betterment of all constituents.

The Village of Telkwa is in an agreement to maintain the road adjacent to the property and the Telkwa Industrial Park property owners and they are concerned that the increased impact on the road and degradation of the road would increase costs to the Village of Telkwa in its maintenance of the road. Concerns were also raised in regard to the elevation of the crusher and the impact to Regional District residents in the area. The Village of Telkwa passed a resolution in regard to its concerns.

The property owner's response was contrary to telephone conversations during the summer where he indicated at that time that he would complete the work, but avoided meeting with RDBN staff.	
	Unless staff receive different direction from the Regional Board the next steps will be to follow through with the court process to stop usage on the site. Staff will provide a report to the Regional Board in regard to remedial steps for the site and issues to access a right of way.	
	The Regional Board expressed frustration at the lack of support from provincial ministries in assisting in finding a suitable location for the SMXA track and mitigating the issue and finding a solution. Frustrations were voiced that the SMXA did not assist in moving forward to find a solution to relocating the motocross to a more suitable location.
