Paramedicine Trial in Fort St. James

Director MacDougall mentioned that the Paramedicine trial is being implemented in Fort St. James. The Unit Chief for B.C. Ambulance is the lead and is currently working through the process. Optimism has been expressed that it will complement the health services in Fort St. James.

<u>Lakes District Hospital and</u> Health Centre Director Miller had an opportunity to utilize the Lakes District Hospital and Health Centre and noted the quality of the facility. He mentioned the importance for community members and staff to have input into the planning and developing of a new facility being built.

Child and Youth Mental Health Forum in Fraser Lake

Director Thiessen and Director Benedict attended a Child and Youth Mental Health Forum in Fraser Lake on August 18, 2015. Director Thiessen mentioned one of the key concerns brought forward was the inability for agencies to share information thus helping an individual can be a very slow process. Concerns were brought forward in regard to the red tape and the need for the province to make changes and allow agencies to share information in regard to patients dealing with mental health issues. Prince George has implemented a system wherein a mental health nurse accompanies RCMP when attending patients. This has allowed for streamlining and better care for the patient.

Representatives from the provincial government attended to receive input from stakeholders in regard to the needs of children and youth in regard to mental health in the region. There is funding being provided to develop collaborative working groups in the region to address children and youth mental health and a position is being formed in Prince George to oversee the work. It was a very positive discussion.

The Pine's existing Emergency Generator is 1970' vintage John Deer/Kohler 80KW generator. This Generator is obsolete and reliability is compromised. This project will install a surplus 230KW Volvo Generator removed from the old Burns Lake Hospital.

Scope of work will include the following:

- Design & construct new concrete generator pad
- Install new direct buried duct bank from generator to electrical room.
- Remove existing generator and associated fuel tank and hardware from the basement of the Pines
- Install new double door to the proposed new electrical room of the existing generator room
- Seal off existing single door opening to the existing electrical room and paint interior of new electrical room
- Move heating and sprinkler lines to accommodate the new installation of new electrical equipment.
- Fully commission and test new generator
