- Fees on Commercial Waste

Positive

- Simplest system to explain to the public
- All solid waste disposed could be charged

- May have more compelling grant applications to fund infrastructure

Negative

Proposed Implementation Plan

2018

- Collect data on facilities 1.
 - a. Install traffic counters at facilities to collect several months of data
 - b. Track all commercial, municipal, and First Nations loads and their time of arrival for 2-3 weeks (through attendant journals)

2018/2019

2. Develop a preliminary plan for implementation of user fees

2019

- 3. Consult with the public and key stakeholders (municipalities, waste haulers, etc.)
- 4. Develop policies and bylaw changes to support weight-based and volume-based user
- 5. Develop an illegal dumping mitigation program in partnership with First Nations and municipalities
- 6. Communicate the planned changes with the public

2019/2020

- 7. Procure and install equipment and infrastructure needed for fee collection
- 8. If applicable, develop a punch card for non-card transactions at the transfer station 2020
 - 9. Implement volume-based fees at relevant facilities, implement weight-based fees at Clearview and Knockholt Landfills

Director Beach spoke of the public response when the RDBN implemented cardboard bans at its transfer stations and landfills. He also noted the need to include First Nations populations in the Burns Lake statistics when planning for waste management needs. Rory Mckenzie, Director of Environmental Services noted that staff will amend the SWMP.

Director Greenaway questioned the use of tipping fees to offset illegal dumping cleanup and potential costs. Ms. McIver mentioned that other Regional Districts do use different options such as waiving tipping fees for community groups that clean up illegal dumping sites. Mr. Mckenzie commented that Nak'azdli First Nation is considering summer student positions as an option to assist in cleaning up illegal dumping sites in the Fort St. James area.

Discussion took place in regard to Eco Depots, which are transfer stations that provide a wide variety of recycling opportunities and the rebranding of transfer stations as Eco Depots. She also spoke of grant funding opportunities for Eco Depots.

The ability to charge for commercial loads at all transfer stations and landfill sites within the RDBN was discussed. Mr. Mckenzie mentioned that the larger solid waste management facilities would have scales and the smaller sites would use a smaller hand held device to weigh incoming loads.

Mr. Grilz spoke of an amendment to the agreement to utilize the BC Cattlemen's Association to rebuild range land fencing is before the Treasury Board and his confidence that it will be approved. Mr. Grilz noted that rehabilitation initiatives have begun to stop invasive plants in regard to fire guard disturbed areas. Seed is being delivered to the area to work with tenure holders to repair and rehabilitate the areas impacted by wildfire guards, etc. FLNRORD Range will be working with BC Wildfire Service in regard to extensive fire guards to mitigate water erosion and invasive plant concerns. Currently a meeting is taking place in Smithers in regard to reforestation and salvage priorities on the land base. Mr. Grilz noted that monies will be coming forward to the area from the Provincal and Federal Government and will provide significant funds to assist in rehabilitation efforts in the community. Rural Development will be working with the community in regard to the recovery process and social service aspects in regard to recovery. He spoke of support services being made available to the community after the event. Information will be provided in regard to compensation from BC Wildfire Service damages to private property due to fighting the fire such as guards and burn off operations. Funds will be provided to the private property owner for rehabilitation works to property.

Director Parker questioned whether programs will be available to repair and return ground levels to the pre-fire state as the firefighting impacts will impact the patterns of the movement of livestock. Mr. Grilz noted that under the fire guard rehab work there is the ability to do extra work. Tenure holders can contact their Range Officer for assistance.

Director Parker noted that the Emergency Hay Program mitigated the anxiety for farmers and provided the ability to take time to make decisions moving forward. He spoke of having the occasional load of hay weighed at a scale facility to determine actual weight. Mr. Barclay mentioned that the Regional District does have the ability to make changes as needed and required to make the program work for its region.

Chair Miller spoke of the importance of working together to ensure that there is help and assistance on the ground for farmers and ranchers in the area.

Chair Miller thanked Messrs. Barclay and Grilz for attending the meeting.

2018 Wildfire Event

Chair Miller spoke of the immensity of the 2018 Wildfire Event. BC Wildfire Service (BCWS) noted the impacts of the number of fires and the spread of the fires on the landscape within the region as being very challenging.

Chair Miller thanked Director Bachrach for his assistance in the EOC regarding media relations. He also noted that RDBN staff did a phenomenal job of managing the EOC due to the number of incidents taking place at one time.

Melany de Weerdt, CAO thanked Chair Miller and the entire Regional Board for their assistance during the event as many of them were within an Evacuation Alert or Order area and working to help their constituents.



VERBAL REPORTS (CONT'D)

Ms. de Weerdt provided an overview and maps of the number of fire incidents that occurred within the RDBN boundaries and where the RDBN is currently. She noted that incidents changed very rapidly and each was dynamic and unpredictable. BCWS mentioned during the height of the event that the relative humidity (RH) in the material on the ground was lower than kiln dried wood and with no precipitation this created very challenging circumstances.

Ms. de Weerdt commented that it is an honour to work with the dedicated hard working EOC staff during this very challenging time. She commented that due to the EOC staff workload timelines for projects may be impacted.

BCWS has indicated that it will be two to three weeks more of hard firefighting and some areas will continue to burn throughout the winter. BCWS will provide messaging in regard to smoke and fires during the coming months.

Ms. de Weerdt identified the huge impacts and devastation to residents in regard to lost homes, power outages, range lands, forestry,etc. for the immediate future and decades moving forward. She mentioned that there is a need for support and recovery as residents return to their homes.

Chair Miller spoke of bringing forward the issues that occurred during this event and continue to occur forward for discussion while attending the 2018 UBCM Convention in Whistler, B.C. September 10-14, 2018.

Chair Miller also thanked staff and noted that he had received a number of comments from the Provincial Government, Emergency Management B.C., BCWS Incident Commanders and Premier Horgan in regard to the highly functional RDBN EOC and the excellent staff.

Chair Miller spoke of working with BCWS in the capacity as industry liaison. He noted the importance of recovery planning in moving forward. Chair Miller recognized the phenomenal support and continued support from everyone involved in the 2018 Wildfire Event.

Chair Miller mentioned that along with Director Thiessen he met with Premier Horgan and outlined changes that need to be made moving forward.

The RDBN Board of Directors thanked Chair Miller and Ms. de Weerdt for their hard work and diligence during the event. Director Bachrach noted that in attending a Public Meeting in Burns Lake Chair Miller's caring and dedication for the region was very strong. Chair Miller's support for all Directors within in the region was recognized.

Director Benedict noted the need for additional support as the region moves forward in the recovery stage of the event and that the fires are still burning. She spoke of the power outages that continue to impact areas within Electoral Area "E" (Francois/Ootsa Lake Rural).

Discussion took place in regard to the current and future impacts to the region and the economy. Ms. de Weerdt commented that staff are working on recovery and resiliency planning.

Main goals are:

How to make some of these things work for "you", vs the other way around, sound decision making.
- 2) Leave participants with a better understanding of their individual farm finances and/or next steps for improvement. Each participant leaves with top 3 "action items" for their immediate/ short time frame implementation (and encourage uptake of the Farm Business Program)

The Smithers Curling Club has just successfully completed their Phase 1 WCB Compliance Upgrades project with Gas Tax funds. Further requirements determined during the first phase of the project require additional work to be done, and the Club has requested a second Gas Tax grant to complete these critical upgrades so that they can continue to provide a recreation facility for Smithers and area residents.

Extension to Transit Management Contract

Currently the transit management contract for the Bulkley-Nechako Regional Transit Service is with Pacific Western Transportation. With the introduction of new service, BC Transit had implemented a short term strategy through the direct award of the contract for service provision. However, this strategy has now been revised and BC Transit is seeking approval to move forward.

In line with BC Transit's Board approved contract strategy, their recommendation is to pursue a 3 year extension with the incumbent service provider. Approval would allow BC Transit to enter into negotiations with Pacific Western Transportation to extend their current agreement to March 31, 2022. In advance of the March 31, 2022 expiry date, an RFP would be developed and issued for the North Central competitive region, which also includes the Prince George and Quesnel transit systems.

A number of factors were taken into consideration with respect to the recommendation. This includes the quality of service that has been provided by the incumbent, and the strength of their management program in all aspects of service provision including operations, fleet and facility management. Their operations performance indicators are also taken into consideration, as well as the level to which they have worked collaboratively and constructively with BC Transit and the RDBN.

Affected by the 2018 Wildfires

The Environmental Services Department is prepared to accept Ozone Depleting Substance (ODS) appliance(s) from residents that were affected during the 2018 wildfires at a few of our transfer stations. The department is recommending that the Regional District Board of Directors waive the \$20.00/unit disposal fee for these residents for their ODS appliance(s).

The Environmental Services Department has been advised by the Major Appliance Recycling Roundtable (MARR) that they are willing to work with the RDBN in assisting them in the processing costs of the ODS appliance(s) that will be recovered from the 2018 wildfires. MARR is willing to cover the \$20.00 disposal fee that the RDBN charges per unit. They will reimburse the RDBN for the fridges, freezers and air-conditioners in wildfire impacted areas.

Also, staff would like to request that the Board of Directors waive the \$90/MT Construction and Demolition (C&D) disposal fee associated with the clean-up of any building or structure that was compromised by the 2018 wildfires. This waste will be directed to the Knockholt or Clearview Landfills. This includes burnt materials and debris. We have requested these costs to be reimbursed by EMBC and are awaiting a response.

The Southside Transfer Station can accept small loads of C&D under the permitted 2 cubic meters limit as well as additional general waste, separated scrap metal and a small amount of wood waste. The Environmental Services Department is prepared to organize additional waste hauling from the Southside Transfer Station as needed to be received at the sub-regional landfills.

TRUE Consulting has, throughout the project thus far, issued;

- Change Order No1. Watermain Insulation Where 2.5 m Cover is Not Available, which was approved;
- Contemplated Change Order No.2, Seal Coat Surfacing, which was not approved and abandoned;
- Contemplated Change Order No. 3 for a Tree Removal on Alexandria, which was not needed and abandoned;
- Change Order No. 4, Highway 16 Directional Drilling vs. open trench digging was issued and approved by staff and MOTI, to minimize risk to the integrity of Highway 16 during the installation of the new pipe works that ran parallel to the Highway. There was no significant cost identified with this construction change.
- Change Order No. 5:

On August 15, 2018, staff met in Fort Fraser with TRUE Consulting, Infracon Construction (formally LNB Contracting), MOTI and the paving sub-contractor to discuss options for road surface restoration for areas where the surface was disturbed during the installation of the new water distribution system. Initially, it was identified in the contract that the areas were to be repaved with 75mm of 16mm medium mix asphalt, later was found that the road surface was strictly seal coat over a gravel base. This discovery influenced a change in the restoration application technique. Budgeted costs were set at \$110,000 and not adequate for what was needed.

Infracon Construction had provided pricing on 2 options that were to be considered by issuing a Change Notice to the RDBN through True Consulting. Staff consulted with MOTI via TRUE who approved the design that was presented for both options. After discussion with the consultants, as well as with the Fort Fraser Local Commission, staff chose to go with option 1 - 75mm thick Asphalt Overlay. The estimated additional cost to the contract budget is an additional \$190,000 more than budgeted costs to move forward with this contract change. This cost could be covered in part by the contingency budget that was approved for this project. See attached Letter of Recommendation from TRUE Consulting, Change Order No.5 and summary budget with expected costs for remainder of the project.

Staff would like to recommend that the Board of Directors approve the additional costs of up to \$190,000 to cover the costs of road restoration for this project in Change Order No.5.

Fort Fraser's Change Order No. 5 September 13, 2018



Budget Summary

As the Budget Summary presents, the Fort Fraser Infrastructure Improvement Project is currently running a tight budget and has been using some of the contingency and optional work monies. Staff would like to point out that the current Outstanding Extra Work claim of \$125,000 reflected in the budget summary, is not a valid claim and is being disputed by Infracon. A smaller extra work claim of a lesser value is valid and will be presented to the consultant and staff in the next few weeks. The amount of this smaller claim is unknown at this time; therefore, staff has not adjusted the balance of the outstanding work claim in the summary sheet attached.

Staff has also added an expected cost of \$75,000 for a probable tie-in on 3rd Avenue and testing costs that will be included within this area. More detailed information will be presented once staff has received them.

One potential cost savings is to not replace the mainline, hydrant and service shut-offs on Dock Avenue which is recognized as a scope reduction area and involves more recent construction, from the 1980's. This will allow for these funds budgeted at \$80,000 to be used elsewhere. If Dock Ave. is taken off the plan, the RDBN will potentially address this portion of the existing construction plan as a septate project in the future.

There is the potential for further unknown costs which are not included in the Budget Summary to be identified during the remainder of the project. The budget is tight and the project costs will need to continue being closely monitored.

The project overage could be paid by 'borrowing' up to \$200,000 from Reserves, with an annual repayment of one fourth of the borrowed amount, over a period of four years.

Road Restoration Recommendation

The majority of the roads in Fort Fraser were found to be seal coat placed on existing gravel road and not seal coat placed on existing asphalt road as expected. This discovery has resulted in a road restoration design revision. The design revision is required because the interface between the proposed asphalt and existing seal coat is not adequate to protect from water migration into the sub-structure which would result in ongoing maintenance issues.

Two options for road restoration based on the know existing road surface have been analysed. The first option is to overlay the areas disturbed during construction with 75mm of asphalt and tapper or feather the asphalt to a thickness of zero approximately 20m back from the centre of road intersections. The second option is to patch the areas disturbed during construction with a single seal coat lift, and then provide a single seal coat lift over the entire road surface for all existing seal coat roads North of the railway.

The Contractor for the project provided the following cost for each option presented above:

- Option 1 - Asphalt Overlay \$290,500

Option 2 – Seal Coat \$340,500

The presented construction costs were compared to known 2018 construction values and it was determined that the cost for asphalt was lower than typical unit rate values, and the cost for seal coating was greater than typical unit rate values. The seal coat option was also contingent on the work being completed in 2019 and not 2018 as with the asphalt option.

TRUE completed an independent construction cost estimate for the seal coat option and it was estimated that the seal coat option could have a construction value of \$215,000. This estimate is based on Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure contracts completed in the region in 2018 and discussion with seal coat contractors.

The seal coat option introduces risk into the project because prices are subject to changing oil prices, the unknown operation and maintenance costs until seal coating is completed in 2019, and availability of the limited number of seal coat contractors in the Province.

Based on the preceding, it is TRUE Consulting's recommendation that road restoration proceed as per Option 1 – Asphalt Overlay. In addition to the reduce risk associated with this option, road structure will be build to allow for proper road crown and drainage. Proper drainage will extend road life and result in a more durable product when the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure place a new lift of seal coat over the road surface in the future.

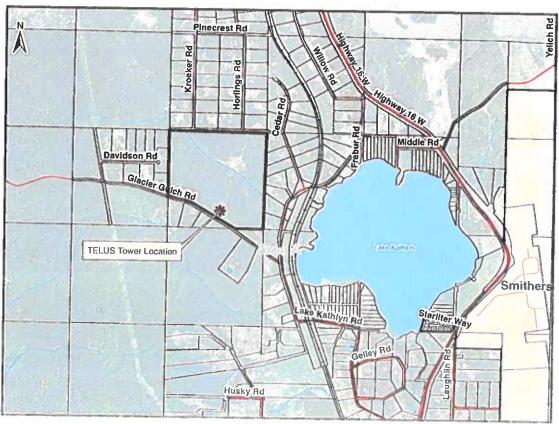

INTRODUCTION

The Regional District has received a referral from TELUS c/o Cypress Land Services regarding a proposed wireless communication tower to improve wireless communications services in the rural areas adjacent to the Town of Smithers.

The proposed tower is $45.0 \, \text{m}$ tall and is proposed to be located on a $20 \, \text{m}$ x $20 \, \text{m}$ lease area on private land at $6448 \, \text{Glacier}$ Gultch Road, approximately $1.8 \, \text{kilometres}$ from the Town of Smithers, BC.



The application area is zoned Community Development and Public Use Zone (P4) and is the property of the Rod and Gun Club. Unattended public service or utility buildings and structures having no exterior storage of any kind are permitted in all zones of the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Zoning Bylaw. However, it is noted that Zoning cannot regulate telecommunications towers, as this is under Federal jurisdiction.



INDUSTRY CANADA CONSULTATION REQUIREMENTS

Industry Canada has a public consultation policy that proponents must follow prior to the placement of communication towers. This policy requires that proponents consult with the local land use authority prior to construction. The RDBN relies on Industry Canada's default public consultation process which is outlined below.

The proponent is required to do the following.

- 1. Provide written notification to the public, the land use authority and Industry Canada of the proposed antenna system installation or modification.
- 2. Engage the public and the land-use authority to address relevant questions, comments and concerns regarding the proposal.
- 3. And, provide an opportunity to the public and the land use authority to formally respond in writing to the proponent regarding measures taken to address reasonable and relevant concerns.

The aim of the consultation with the local authority is to do the following

- Discuss site options;
- Ensure that local processes related to antenna systems are respected;
- Address reasonable and relevant concerns from both the land use authority and the community they represent; and,
- · Obtain land use authority concurrence in writing.

TELUS CONSULTATION WITH THE PUBLIC

Telus has informed the RDBN that they placed the attached public notice in the Interior News on, June 27, 2018.

They also indicated that they notified adjacent landowners found within 135 metres from the location of the proposed tower on June 22, 2018 by providing them with the attached public consultation information package. Telus states that they have received two comments of support, one neutral comment, and two comments of non-support, which are presented in the attached "Appendix 4: Comments and Responses Tracker." At the time of writing this report, Telus has not received the petition signed by concerned residents that was suggested in the comment tracker. If it is received, it will be provided on the supplemental agenda.

STAFF COMMENTS

The comments of non-support were brought up by neighbouring properties on Glacier Gultch Road and Davidson Road regarding health concerns from the tower's transmission signals. Telus has responded to these concerns explaining that the proposal meets Health Canada's Safety Code 6 requirements.

RDBN records indicate that there are two residences and 3 properties within 135 metres of the proposed tower. The closest residence is less than 100 metres from the tower. These residences have been provided with the public consultation package.

It appears that Telus has followed Industry Canada's public notification standards. Given that the applicant has followed Industry Canada's requirements and the towers meet Health Canada's Safety Code, staff have no concern with the location of the tower.

Recommendation

That the Regional District Board direct staff to send a letter stating that the RDBN has no objection to the proposed communication tower location.

Cypress Land Services Inc., in our capacity as agents to TELUS, is submitting this information package to formalize the consultation process related to the installation and operation of a telecommunications facility. TELUS has been in preliminary consultation with the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako (RDBN) to identify suitable tower site location for the operation of a new telecommunications facility.

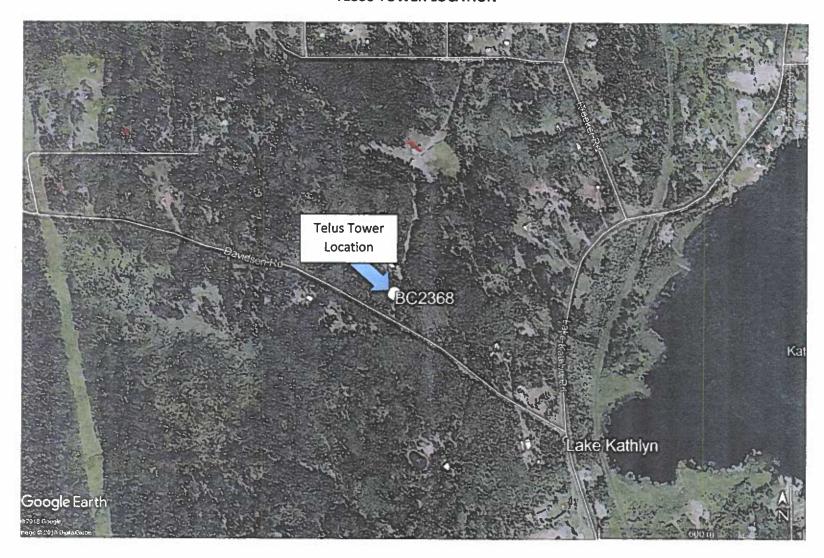

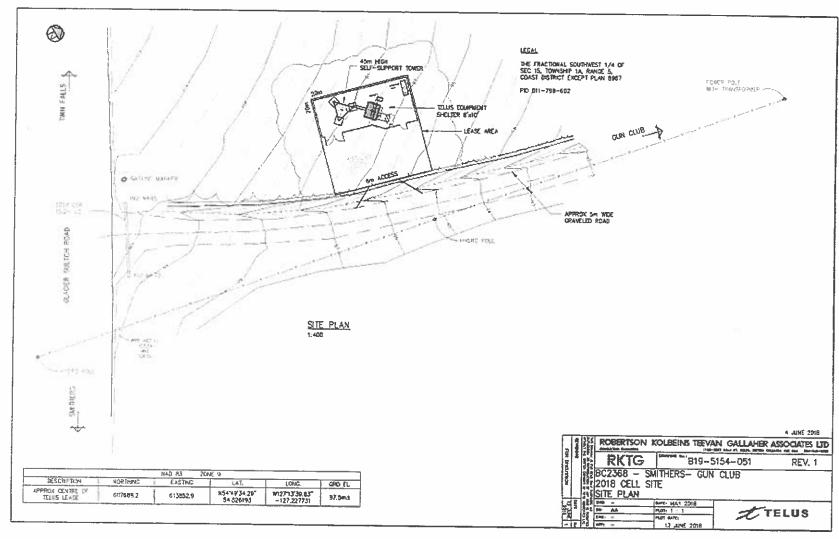
SCHEDULE A

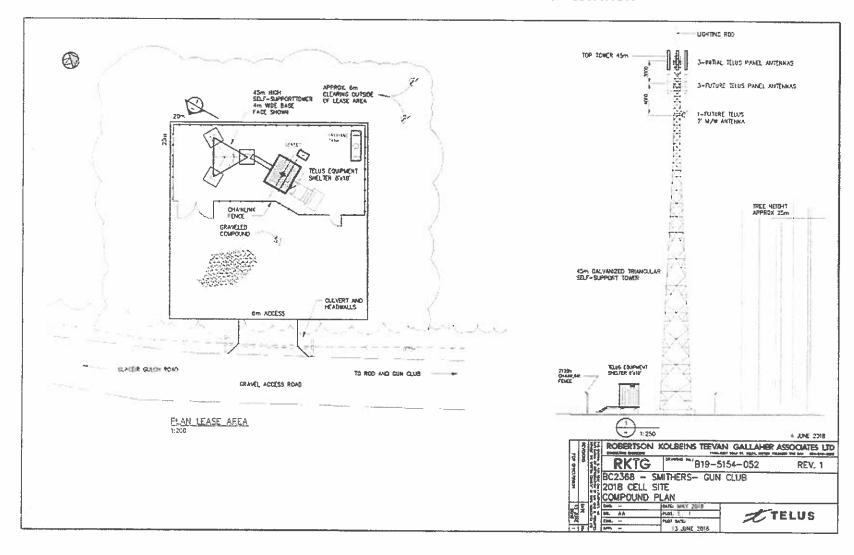

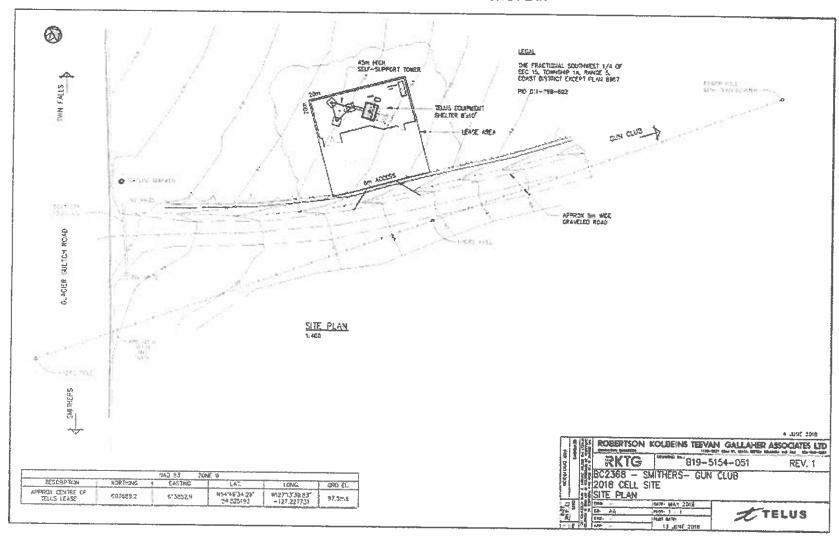

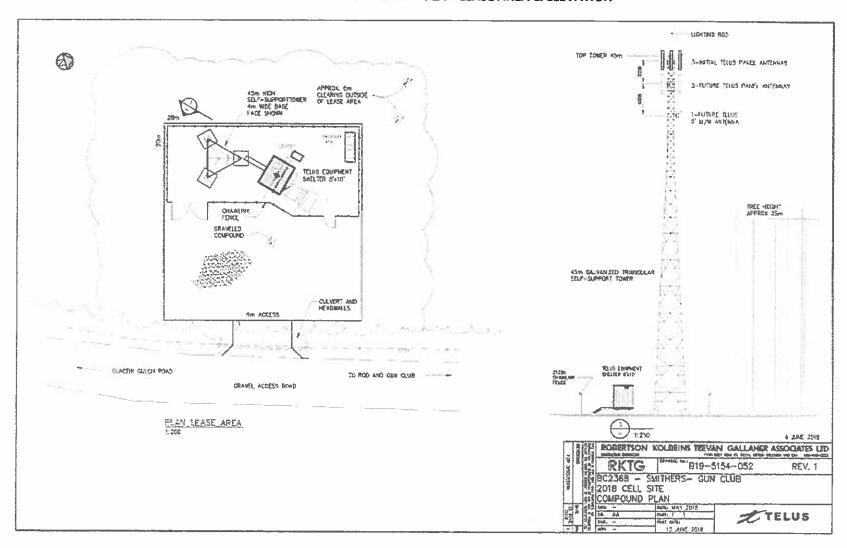
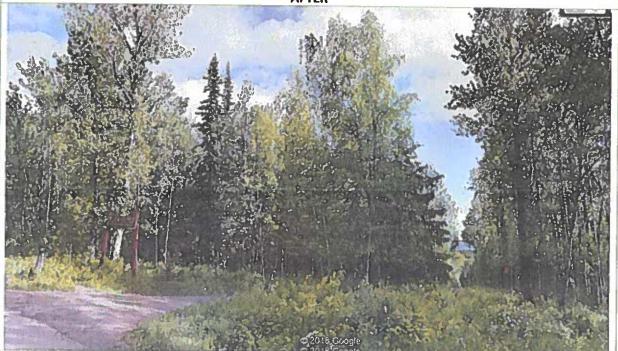

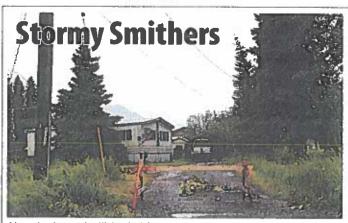

INTRODUCTION

The Regional District has received a referral from TELUS c/o Cypress Land Services regarding a proposed wireless communication tower to improve wireless communications services in the rural communities surrounding Francois Lake, BC.

The proposed tower is 30.0 m tall and is proposed to be located on private land at 344 Colleymount Road, approximately 20 kilometres from the Village of Burns Lake, BC.



The application area is not zoned under the RDBN Zoning Bylaw and is within the Agricultural Land Reserve. Unattended public service or utility buildings and structures having no exterior storage of any kind are permitted in all zones of the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Zoning Bylaw. It is noted that, Zoning cannot regulate telecommunications towers, as this is under Federal jurisdiction.

INDUSTRY CANADA CONSULTATION REQUIREMENTS

Industry Canada has a public consultation policy that proponents must follow prior to the placement of communication towers. This policy requires that proponents consult with the local land use authority prior to construction. The RDBN relies on Industry Canada's default

public consultation process which is outlined below.

The proponent is required to do the following.

- 1. Provide written notification to the public, the land use authority and Industry Canada of the proposed antenna system installation or modification.
- 2. Engage the public and the land-use authority to address relevant questions, comments and concerns regarding the proposal.
- 3. And, provide an opportunity to the public and the land use authority to formally respond in writing to the proponent regarding measures taken to address reasonable and relevant concerns.

The aim of the consultation with the local authority is to do the following

- · Discuss site options;
- Ensure that local processes related to antenna systems are respected;
- Address reasonable and relevant concerns from both the land use authority and the community they represent; and,
- Obtain land use authority concurrence in writing.

TELUS CONSULTATION WITH THE PUBLIC

Telus has informed the RDBN that they placed the attached public notice in the Lakes District News on, July 25, 2018.

They also indicated that they notified adjacent landowners found within 90 metres from the location of the proposed tower on July 16, 2018 by providing them with the attached public consultation information package. Telus states that they have received three comments of support, and four neutral comments, which are presented in the attached "Appendix 4: Comments and Responses Tracker." As mentioned in the comments, there was an error in the newspaper map, showing Noralee Resort being located just east of the Ferry Landing. Cypress Land Services clarified the location to concerned respondents and mentioned that they had used Bing Maps and this is an error in their mapping.

STAFF COMMENTS

RDBN records indicate that there are two residences and 3 properties within 90 metres of the proposed tower. The closest residence is less than 50 metres from the tower. These residences have been provided with the public consultation package which was mailed on July 16, 2018. From the consultation package provided, it appears that Telus has followed Industry Canada's public notification standards.

Recommendation

That the Regional District Board direct staff to send a letter stating that the RDBN has no objection to the proposed communication tower location.

Overview

Cypress Land Services Inc., in our capacity as agents to TELUS, is submitting this information package to formalize the consultation process related to the installation and operation of a telecommunications facility. TELUS has been in preliminary consultation with the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako (RDBN) to identify suitable tower site location for the operation of a new telecommunications facility.

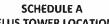

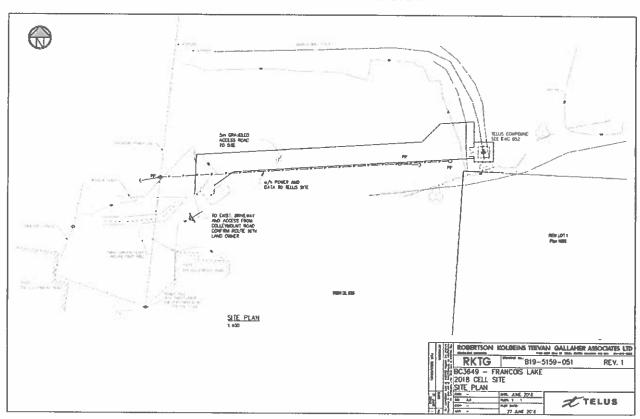

Overview

Cypress Land Services Inc., in our capacity as agents to TELUS, is submitting this information package to formalize the consultation process related to the installation and operation of a telecommunications facility. TELUS has been in preliminary consultation with the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako (RDBN) to identify suitable tower site location for the operation of a new telecommunications facility.

TELUS is proposing the installations in order to provide improved, dependable wireless data and voice communication services in the area. This information package is intended to formalize the consultation process to the RDBN.

Proposed Sites

TELUS proposes to install a 30.0 metre lattice tower within a 5.2 metre by 5.2 metre compound that includes TELUS telecommunications equipment.

The facility is located in the south eastern portion of the 131.5 acre property within a mature stand of trees and will be accessed off the land owners driveway, and will need to be extended with a 5.0 metre wide graveled access road to the site (Schedule A: Telus Tower Location).



Rationale for Site Selection

TELUS seeks to maintain and improve high quality, dependable network services. In order to improve network performance, TELUS is seeking to add the proposed communications installation to improve service in in the rural areas surrounding François Lake, BC.

The proposed site is a result of many considerations. TELUS reviewed co-location options on nearby structures and tower. There are no opportunities to use existing towers. As such, TELUS is proposing to construct a new tower. There are mature trees surrounding the facility that will help screen the lower portion of the tower. The location was chosen to maximize improved wireless services to the area.

Proposal Details

TELUS has completed preliminary design plans (Schedule B: Preliminary Design Plans) that include a 30.0 metre tower and ground equipment.

Consultation Process with the RDBN

It is our understanding that the RDBN does not have an adopted Telecommunications policy. Innovation, Science and Economic Development Canada (ISED), formerly Industry Canada, requires all proponents to consult with the local land use authority and public, notwithstanding that ISED has exclusive jurisdiction in the licensing of telecommunication sites, such as the proposed tower. Following ISED's requirements, TELUS would like to initiate Default Public Consultation Process (as described in the Industry Canada circular, CPC-2-0-03, issue 5, commonly referred to as the "CPC"). Information on the "CPC" consultation process may be found on-line at: http://www.ic.gc.ca/eic/site/smt-gst.nsf/eng/sf08777.html.

In order to obtain comments, concerns or questions in regard to the proposed tower site, the CPC requires TELUS to send out notification packages to all properties located within three times the height of the proposed tower (90.0 metres). A notice will also be placed in the local paper. This comment period is a minimum of 30 days. We expect the public consultation process to commence in July.

At the conclusion of the consultation process, TELUS will prepare a summary of comments received from the community as well as the replies provided by TELUS. TELUS is requesting that, subsequent to the completed consultation process a letter or resolution of concurrence will be issued by the RDBN.

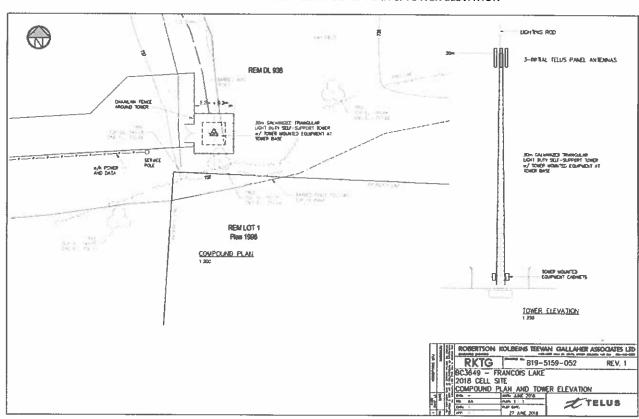

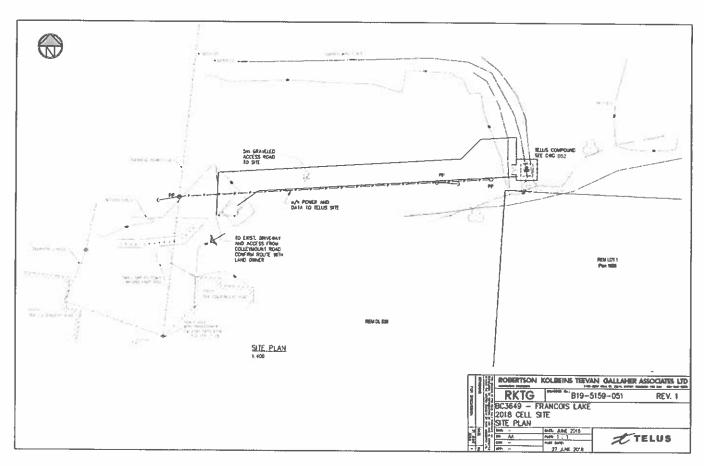

Designated access via an existing Right-of-Way has been cleared by the applicants, and Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure may comment on the driveway access. As of writing this report, MoTI has not responded to the referral and will appear on the Supplemental Agenda.

Area 'D' Advisory Planning Commission

Resolution: That the APC inform the Regional District Board that they recommend approval for Rezoning Application D-01-18. The motion was carried unanimously.

Comments: A brief discussion was held regarding the inherent difficulty of developing the small lots in the Fort Fraser town-site, the progress of the replacement of the community water system, and that it is positive to see new residential development in the rural area.

PLANNING DEPARTMENT COMMENTS

Official Community Plan

The property is designated Community Centre (CC) in the Endako, Fraser Lake, Fort Fraser Rural Official Community Plan Bylaw No. 1487, 2008.

Section 3.5.1 Objectives states that,

- (1) To provide opportunities for new residential development with a complete mix of services and uses, provided that an acceptable sewage disposal and water supply are available.
- (2) To support opportunities for affordable housing, rental housing, and special needs housing.
- (3) To protect and enhance the quality of life associated with these existing centres and to encourage their responsible redevelopment, revitalization, and growth.

This application conforms to the OCP's objectives for the Community Centre designation and no OCP amendment is required.

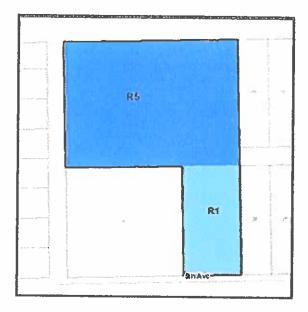


Zoning

The property is 3,000 m² (0.73 ac) in size, which is large compared to the average property size in that neighborhood of 3,700 m² (0.091 acres).

The property was consolidated in 2003, which resulted in the larger property size, and split zoning of Country Residential (R5) and Single Family Residential (R1).

The R5 zone's minimum parcel size requirement for subdivision is 4,006 m² (0.99 acres). Since the parcel is undersized there is no subdivision potential for this property.



Discussion

RDBN Environmental Services have confirmed

the location of both water and sewage connections located on 5th Ave and have stated that the additional dwelling may be connected to the municipal water and sewerage system.

In the Planning Department's opinion, the additional home should not negatively impact the neighborhood and is consistent with the area's OCP.

Recommendations:

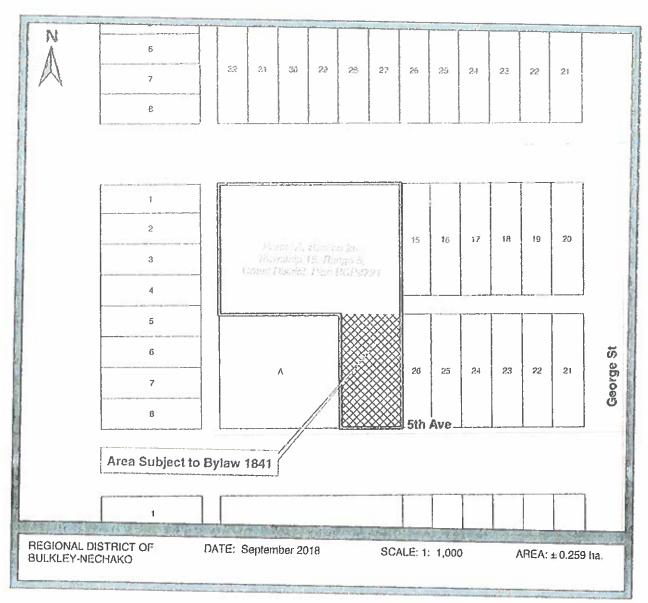

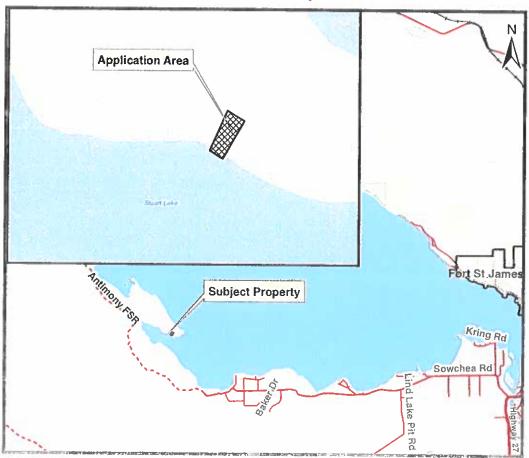

According to RDBN records the subject property consists of a recreational home and an accessory building. In situations such as this where the parcel is relatively small achieving appropriate on-site sewage disposal may be challenging. To ensure that the future development of the sensitive lakeshore lot is done with care and to protect the environment and the public's health, it is recommended that the Province identify the capacity of the lot to



accommodate on-site sewage disposal, and that purchasers be made aware of the limitations of the property. It is also recommended that the Province ensure that any existing on-site sewage disposal system is constructed in accordance with northern Health regulations.

The application area is within the building inspection area, and is not zoned. There is no building permit on file for the cabin and staff cannot confirm if the structures meet the setback or elevation requirements under the Floodplain Management Bylaw. Re: Planning Service to Municipalities

PURPOSE

This report proposes the use of a Planning Services Agreement to facilitate the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako providing planning services, by contract, to its member municipalities.

BACKGROUND

Official Community Plan Reviews

In 2015, the RDBN Planning Department consulted with municipalities to determine the level of interest in receiving planning services. There was a high level of interest regarding a number of planning related services; however, the greatest need related to the review of Municipal Official Community Plans (OCPs).

In 2016-2017 the RDBN Planning Department undertook the process to review the Village of Burns Lake OCP on a contract basis in a joint review process with the Electoral Area B and E OCP review. In 2017 the Planning Department began the process to review the Village of Fraser Lake's OCP in a joint process with the Electoral Area D OCP review. The Village of Fraser Lake's OCP / Electoral Area D OCP review process is anticipated to be completed prior to the end of this year. In 2019 the Planning Department will begin the process to review the OCP for Electoral Area F, and with Board approval, will offer to undertake a joint OCP review process with the District of Vanderhoof.

An Agreement to Provide General Land Use Planning Assistance

Over the last few years staff have seen an increase in the number of requests from municipalities for assistance with land use planning matters. The Planning Department provides assistance in most situations; however, the amount of work that can be done on an informal basis for municipalities is limited given the lack of a formal cost recovery structure, and staff resources. The majority of these requests are basic and relate to the processing of development related applications, and bylaw interpretation.

The Planning Department is proposing that the RDBN's provision of Planning Services to municipalities be formalized through the use of the attached Planning

Services Agreement. Given the large variance in the type of planning services that may be requested, it is proposed that the actual cost for the services be provided on a cost recovery basis, based on a detailed accounting of time and expenses. The agreement is designed to be used for a wide variety of small planning tasks and projects. Large projects such as OCP reviews would continue to be dealt with through separate agreements.

This process can be used to gauge municipal interest in receiving greater planning services and the long-term feasibility of increasing RDBN Planning Department staff capacity as necessary to support a greater level of service.

Workload Impacts

Planning Department staff do not anticipate any notable negative impacts associated with the proposed agreement, and the associated provision of Planning Services to municipalities. The agreement allows the Director of Planning to agree to undertake projects, or decline work, based on Department workload at any given time.

DISCUSSION

Should the Board approve the recommendation below staff will offer to enter into the attached agreement with RDBN member municipalities that wish to receive Planning Services from RDBN staff. Once an agreement is entered into, staff will provide Planning Services to that municipality as RDBN Planning Department workload permits.

It is noted that, unless directed otherwise by the Board, staff may enter into agreements with municipalities with minor amendments to individual agreements based on discussions with municipalities, and input from the RDBN's solicitor. However, no significant amendments, as determined by staff, will be made to the agreement attached to this report without first seeking the Board's approval.

Recommendation

That the Regional District Board approve the RDBN entering into agreements with municipalities for the provision of Planning Services as discussed in the staff report dated September 18th, 2018.

(hereinafter called the "RDBN")

OF THE FIRST PART

AND:

MUNICIPALITY

(hereinafter called the "Municipality")

OF THE SECOND PART

WHEREAS the RDBN and Municipality, under Section 263 (1)(b) and 334 of the *Local Government Act*, may enter into an agreement to provide the municipality a service that is a work or service within the powers of the Municipality;

AND WHEREAS the RDBN and Municipality are willing to enter into an agreement for the RDBN to provide Planning Services within the boundaries of the Municipality;

NOW THEREFORE the parties hereto in consideration of the performance of the covenants hereinafter contained and for other valuable consideration, the sufficiency and receipt of which is hereby acknowledged, covenant and agree as follows:

Term

1. This Agreement is for a term of 5 years commencing on and terminating on .

Intent:

- 2. The intent of this Agreement is to outline the manner and terms by which the RDBN shall provide Planning Services to the Municipality. The parties, as independent jurisdictions, agree that the RDBN shall provide Planning Services to the Municipality for the benefit of both the RDBN and Municipality.
- 3. Both parties agree that where a Municipality requests Planning Services, and the RDBN agrees to provide those services, the Planning Services shall be provided in accordance with this Agreement.
- 4. This Agreement forms a contract between the RDBN and the Municipality, with the RDBN being the contractor for the Municipality. The RDBN staff providing the Planning Services shall be representatives of the Municipality during the course of their duties under this Agreement, and all terms of the Local Government Act and the Community Charter respecting the Planning Services shall apply.

Termination

5. Either party may terminate this Agreement by delivering to the other party written notice, a minimum of six (6) months in advance of the termination date.

Waiver

6. This Agreement is binding upon the parties hereto and their successors and assignees. The waiver by a party of any failure on the part of the other party to perform in accordance with any of the terms or conditions of this Agreement is not to be construed as a waiver of any future or continuing failure, whether similar or dissimilar.

Planning Services Defined

- 7. "Planning Service" means any of the following.
 - a. Processing official community plan amendment applications.
 - b. Processing rezoning applications.
 - c. Processing development variance permit applications.
 - d. Processing development permit applications.
 - e. Processing temporary use permit applications.
 - Processing Agricultural Land Reserve (ALR) applications.
 - g. Processing land use contract amendment applications.
 - h. Processing applications for an exemption to a flood plain bylaw requirement.
 - i. Processing Board of Variance applications.



- j. Making recommendations regarding amendments to bylaws authorized under Part 14 of the *Local Government Act*.
- k. Making recommendations regarding land use and development related policy.
- 1. Interpreting bylaws authorized under Part 14 of the Local Government Act.
- m. Processing of liquor license referrals, and referrals regarding the retail sale of cannabis.
- n. Providing professional advice on land use planning issues.
- o. Overseeing the work of a Planning Consultant.
- 8. The Planning Services to be provided pursuant to this agreement do not include projects requiring over 100 hours of staff time. Large project, such as official community plan reviews, should be dealt with through separate agreements.

Requests for Planning Service

- 9. Planning Services under this agreement are to be provided on a request basis. When the Municipality requires Planning Service the Municipality shall complete Section 1 of the Planning Services Request Form attached to this agreement as Schedule A.
- 10. Upon receipt of a Planning Service Request Form the Director of Planning for the RDBN shall determine the current ability of the RDBN Planning Department to provide the Planning Service given existing workloads and expertise, and complete Section 2 of the Planning Service Request Form. The Director of Planning may decline to provide the Planning Service at his/her sole discretion.

The Provision of Planning Service:

- 11. When the Director of Planning agrees to provide a Planning Service the Planning Services Request Form shall be provided to the Municipality for completion.
- 12. Where there is agreement for the Provision of Planning Services the RDBN shall be responsible for the following.
 - a. Providing the Planning Services in accordance with Municipal bylaws, the Local Government Act and professional planning practice as determined by the Director of Planning in consultation with the Chief Administrative Officer for the Municipality (CAO).
 - b. Providing knowledgeable staff for attendance at Council meetings where a Planning Service is to be discussed, as requested by the Municipality.
 - c. Maintaining all documents relating to the Planning Service, making those documents available to the Municipality on request, and providing those documents to the Municipality at the completion of the work.
 - d. Providing the CAO with a regular report on the Planning Services being provided, with attention being given to politically sensitive issues or updates.

- e. Providing Planning Services in a diligent manner with all work being overseen by a Registered Professional Planner.
- 13. The Municipality shall be responsible for the following.
 - a. Designating the Municipal staff person that will be the contact with RDBN staff with respect to the provision of Planning Services.
 - b. Providing information to the RDBN as necessary to provide Planning Services including, but not limited to, all Municipal bylaws authorized under Part 14 of the *Local Government Act*, and all related Municipal policy.
 - c. Providing final interpretation and administration of Municipal bylaws and policy following appropriate consultation with RDBN staff.
 - d. Accepting all Municipal applications, collecting the required fees associated with the Planning Service, and ensuring adequate application information is provided.
 - e. Providing the staff reports provided by RDBN staff to the Municipal Council at regular meetings of Council as necessary.
 - f. Providing for the attendance of Municipal staff at public engagement events, and meetings as necessary.
 - g. Providing the administrative and clerical support associated with the Planning Service in a diligent manner. This work includes the organization of public meetings, advertising of events and public hearings, mailing of notices and letters, and similar tasks.
 - h. Authorizing the wording and format of amendment bylaws and advising Municipal Council on the bylaw adoption process.
 - i. Facilitating the legal review of any bylaws considered by the Council of the Municipality in association with a Planning Service.
- 14. The Municipal Mayor or Councillors shall not provide direction to RDBN staff regarding the provision of a Planning Service, or provide advice regarding an RDBN staff recommendation outside of the formal Council resolution process, unless a Councillor has been delegated authority by the Council to provide such direction or advice. If a Councillor is delegated such authority all direction shall be documented and reported to the Municipal Council.
- 15. All RDBN staff recommendations to the Municipality related to a Planning Service shall be based on the professional planning opinion of the planners making the recommendation.

Service Delivery Cost Recovery

 In consideration for providing Planning Service under this Agreement the RDBN shall receive fees for time spent providing a Planning Service based on the actual



cost per hour of time spent by RDBN employees. This includes salary, benefits, and expenses.

- 17. All costs associated with providing the Planning Service are the responsibility of the Municipality. The RDBN is authorized to incur the following costs on behalf of the Municipality when providing a Planning Service.
 - a. The fees outlined in Section 16 of this agreement.
 - b. The cost of advertising and notice provision required pursuant to the *Local Government Act*, Municipal bylaw, or municipal policy.
 - c. Legal Fees up to \$250 per Planning Service project.
 - d. Mileage at a rate of \$0.55 per kilometre.

All other costs associated with providing the Planning Service shall not be incurred without first obtaining the Municipality's written consent.

- 18. In the event that the services of a private sector consultant are utilized in conjunction with RDBN staff providing a Planning Service, the municipality is responsible for entering into a contract with the consultant. The Planning Services provided by the RDBN may be supervision and oversight of the consultant; however, the consultant shall not be working directly for the RDBN.
- 19. The RDBN shall bill monthly for the costs incurred in the previous month, and the Municipality shall pay the costs within one month of receiving an invoice.

Cost of Claims

- 20. The Municipality shall reimburse the RDBN for any deductible amount that the RDBN is obliged to pay in relation to a claim arising from a Planning Service.
- 21. The Municipality shall reimburse the RDBN for any damages award or portion thereof that actually results from a claim and that is not covered by the RDBN's errors and omissions insurance.
- 22. The Municipality shall reimburse the RDBN for any staff costs actually incurred by the RDBN in dealing with a claim arising from services provided within the Municipality.

Binding Effect

 This Agreement shall endure to the benefit of and be binding upon the parties hereto and their respective successors and assigns.

Planning Services Agreement

Dispute Resolution

- 24. In the event of any dispute or disagreement arising from the interpretation or application of this Agreement, or in the event of any breach or alleged breach by either party first written notice may be provided by either party to the other party describing the nature of the breach or alleged breach, or the disagreement or dispute. In the event that such notice is given, the parties shall:
 - a. immediately proceed to negotiate in good faith to resolve the matter to the mutual satisfaction of both parties; and
 - b. if a resolution satisfactory to both parties is not achieved within 60 (sixty) days of the first written notice being delivered to either party, then either party may serve a second written notice upon the other party that the matter is to be referred to binding arbitration; and
 - c. a single arbitrator shall be appointed by Agreement of the parties within 90 (ninety) days of the second written notice being delivered, and failing such Agreement, the arbitrator shall be appointed pursuant to the *Commercial Arbitration Act* to hear both parties to the dispute and the decision of that arbitrator shall be final, conclusive and binding on both parties, with costs payable in respect of the arbitration to be determined by the arbitrator.

Law Applicable

RE: Policy of a single standard of fire safety for public buildings

I am writing to advise you that government has directed the Office of the Fire Commissioner to implement a single standard of fire safety for public buildings, whether located in a municipality or in an unincorporated area. This means that buildings where people gather to meet, study, rest, engage in recreation, or receive care in a licensed daycare or group care home facility will be subject to fire inspection and risk-based compliance monitoring requirements.

I recognize that this policy direction is a change from what was communicated to your members in September of 2016. Our view is that the most expeditious way of achieving our policy objective is to expand the capacity of regional districts to provide a comparable level of fire safety service to what municipalities currently offer. Our intention is to work collaboratively with the Fire Safety Act Working Group, UBCM's professional staff and the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing to understand how to mitigate the added administrative and operational costs of setting up a compliance program that serves unincorporated parts of BC. We expect that this engagement process will also inform the direction of amendments to Bill 4, 2016: Fire Safety Act, as well as the development of support tools and resources.

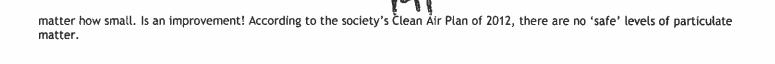
Hello:

What - we, the Bulkley Valley lakes District Airshed Management Society are requesting a LOS for our application to the Province of BC for a wood stove exchange program in 2019. This program covers an airshed which extends both sides of the hi-way from Endacko to Kitwanga so also the Kitimat Stikine District. We are currently running this program so next year there may be some simple changes but as it is now people in the Regional District who fall into this catchment area, which is most everyone - are eligible for either \$250 or \$400 from the province when they decommission uncertified wood burning appliances and go over to some other heat source - this could be certified EPA wood burning appliances, pellet stoves, gas or oil. Next years program may also allow for decommission of certified stoves greater than 5 years old. Some areas within the District like Smithers also has a top up scheme where they offer an additional amount of \$750 or \$1500 dollars depending on what options the resident takes as new heat and whether the heat source is their primary one for the residence. We will also swap out units in shops or businesses if they qualify. The objective is to have cleaner burning wood appliances and less particulate emissions. Our area is in the BC's Central Interior Air Zone and we have 2 communities who are not meeting provincially set air quality targets - Smithers and Houston. That's only because they have provincial air monitors! Many other communities are beginning to monitor their own air and they don't meet these targets either so we feel there are many rural densely populated villages and unincorporated neighbourhoods that have 'bad' air. This program is only one solution for a much larger problem which I would welcome to speak on at a council meeting if you would like it. The program also has some funding for educational initiatives around how to burn wood so you don't create unnecessary emissions. We encourage wood burning we just want people to know they can season wood or operate stoves much more efficiently not only saving them \$ in firewood costs but also reducing particulate.

This is a blip from me to the BCLUng Association: FYI

Does the public believe wood smoke is a problem?

Some see the impact their wood burning choices can make but lots don't, it remains an uphill battle. Locals feel their individual wood burning practice is negligible in comparison to what's emitted by other sources or what their neighbours are burning. They don't believe they can make a difference in the air when their personal contribution isn't as significant. They also don't understand that they can directly affect the air of their own home and their neighbours. Dr. Sarah Henderson has said that roughly 30% of the air outside your house is coming inside - thru cracks and vents and open windows or doors. If you or your neighbour are burning it doesn't just float up the chimney and away, it sneaks back in. Its odourless and invisible! Any improvement in air quality - no

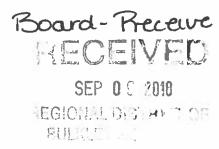

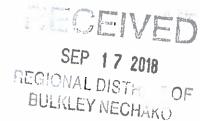

This letter is to advise you that **Onjo Lake** has been adopted as an official place name in British Columbia, replacing the former name "Witch Lake" as proposed by Nak'azdli Whut'en and Keyoh holder Edward Prince and shown on the attached map. This name change was endorsed by yourselves as well as Fort St James District, BC Parks, Fort St James Sled Dog Association, Fort St James Snowmobile/ATV Club, Apollo Forest Products, Conifex Inc, and Canfor Forest Management Group.

Onjo Lake is the Dak'elh language name for the lake, and has always been used by the Nak'azdli Whut'en to reference this lake. "Onjo" translates to 'caribou' in English (Advice from Nak'azdli Whut'en, 2017).

In accordance with the BC Geographical Naming Policy, local and First Nation governments as well as relevant organizations were invited to comment on the proposal, and bring forward local or heritage considerations and comments.

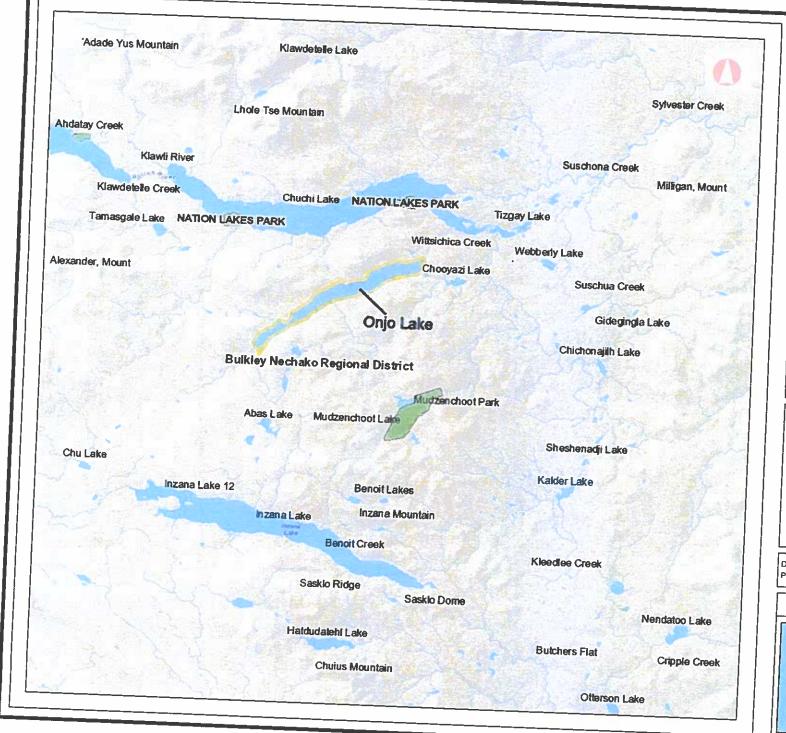

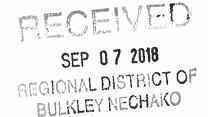

The Regional District of Kitimat-Stikine (RDKS) is developing a new Solid Waste Management Plan (SWMP) to provide direction for how waste materials will be reduced, reused, recycled and disposed of in our region for the next decade. The Regional District anticipates that the new SWMP will not include any major policy changes or plans for new facilities. The objectives of the new SWMP will be to:

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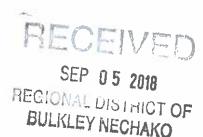

Review of the Auditor General for Local Government Act and Office

The legislation that created the Auditor General for Local Government (AGLG) in 2012 requires a five-year review of the Auditor General for Local Government Act (the "Act") and the functioning of the office of the Auditor General.

A Working Group has been established by the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing to provide oversight and input into the review. It is made up of representatives from Union of British Columbia Municipalities (UBCM) and Local Government Management Association as well as Ministry staff. The terms of reference are to conduct a review of how the Office and the Act have achieved their stated objectives to date and determine options for the future.

I have been retained by the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing to conduct the review. I have over 25 years of experience as the Chief Administrative Officer (CAO) of both municipal and regional governments in Alberta and British Columbia. I was the CAO for the Regional District of Nanaimo for 13 years and, most recently, retired as the CAO of the Capital Regional District where I worked for seven years.

During the week of September 17 to 21, 2018, the following surveys will be sent out electronically:

- For those local governments that have had a performance audit completed by the AGLG prior to the 2015 UBCM survey, you will be asked for information regarding your experience implementing the recommendations from the audit.
- For those local governments that have had a performance audit completed after 2015, you will be asked for information regarding your experience implementing the recommendations from the audit. You will also receive the 2015 UBCM survey from CivicInfo BC to complete.
- For those that have not had a performance audit, the survey will seek to understand the overall impact and value of the AGLG to your organization.

We are enclosing a few pictures so that you may see what it is all about.

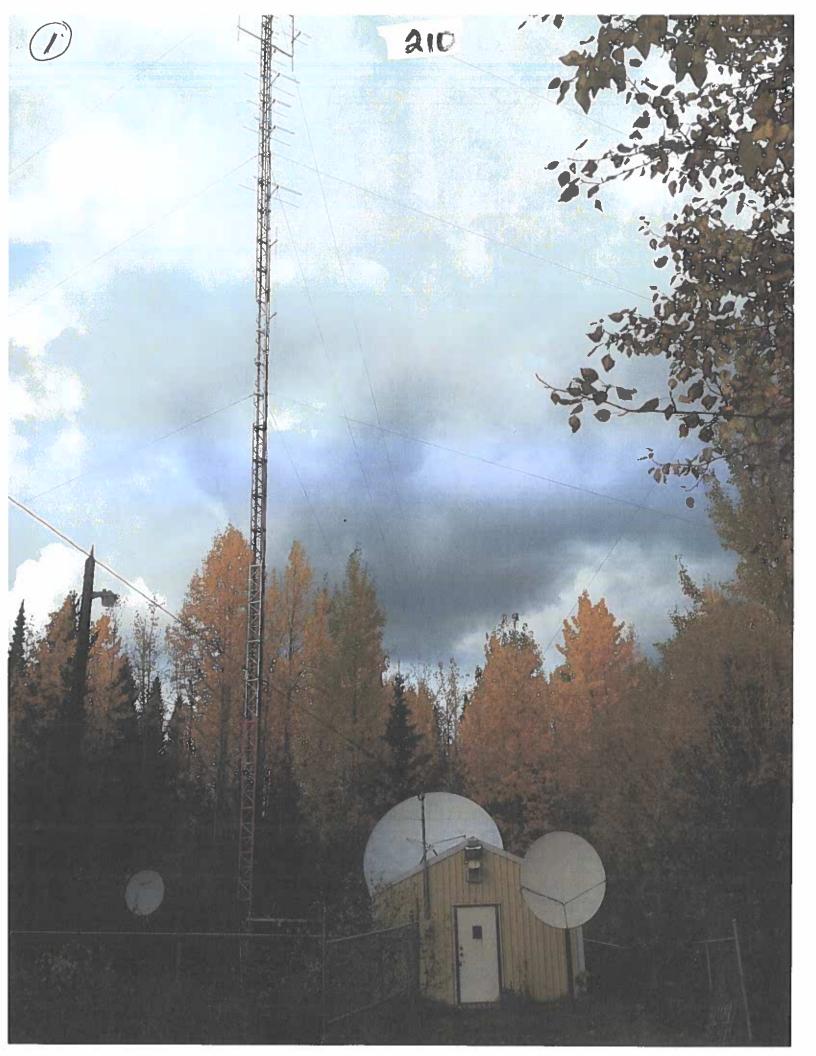
- 1. Our building which is fenced in. A tower and dishes which transmit signals for TV and radio.

General Manager's Report

On behalf of the Board of Directors, I am pleased to present this report regarding the activities and operations of Chinook Comfor Limited Partnership (Chinook) for the reporting period of April 1, 2017, to March 31, 2018.

Operations are proceeding well. As of March 31, 2018, Chinook delivered 82,000 m³ of its 150,000 m³ Allowable Annual Cut (AAC) and 214,000 m³ of its 580,000 m³ five-year cut control to date. The AAC is set at 150,000 m³ for the first three years and 65,000 m³ for the last two years of its first five-year cut control that expires in 2021.



2017 was a challenging year. Cutting permits were held up due to forest fires that resulted in a lack of local Ministry staff. There was also a shortage of local logging and trucking capacity to move fibre. Excessive amounts of snow presented challenges; however, two local contractors completed an extensive block layout of 300,000 m³ that brought Chinook's layout to 75,000 m³ beyond the five-year cut control. Chinook received \$25,000 in funding from the Forest for Tomorrow program to carry out surveys on potential fertilization areas.

The Light Detection and Ranging (LiDAR) project flight was completed in September 2017. The ground truthing plots for this project will wait for snow-free conditions in the late spring of 2018 and be completed by September 2018.

As per the Community Forest Agreement K4R, Chinook will complete and professionally publish three research papers by April 1, 2021. One research paper is already under way on the topic of Old Growth Management Areas (OGMAs) and a second study is planned to start September 2018 about mixed species stands and fire mitigation.

In January 2018, Chinook became SAFE certified.

Chinook had a booth at the Lakes District Fall Fair. Significant effort was made to engage with local community members and invite them to complete a survey on what a community forest means to them and how it should be managed. Fire risk and mitigation information were also provided.

Chinook sponsored the Regional District of Bulkley Nechako Business Forum. General Manager Ken Nielsen presented on Chinook's accomplishments and how Chinook will move beyond the beetle.

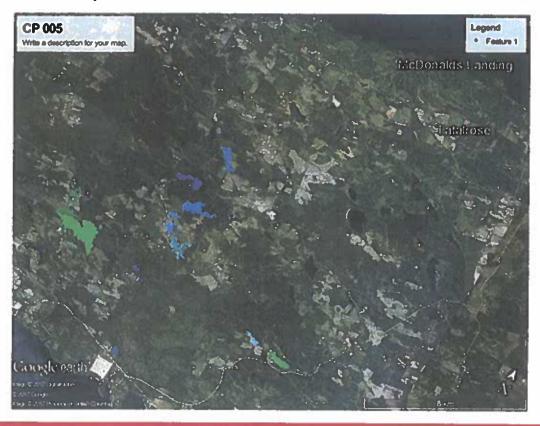

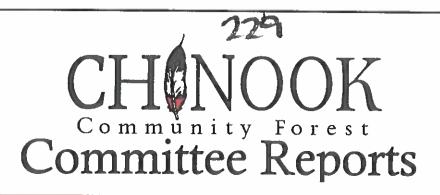

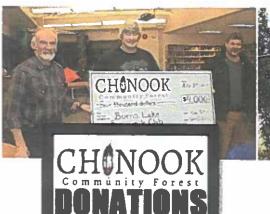


Guiding Principles

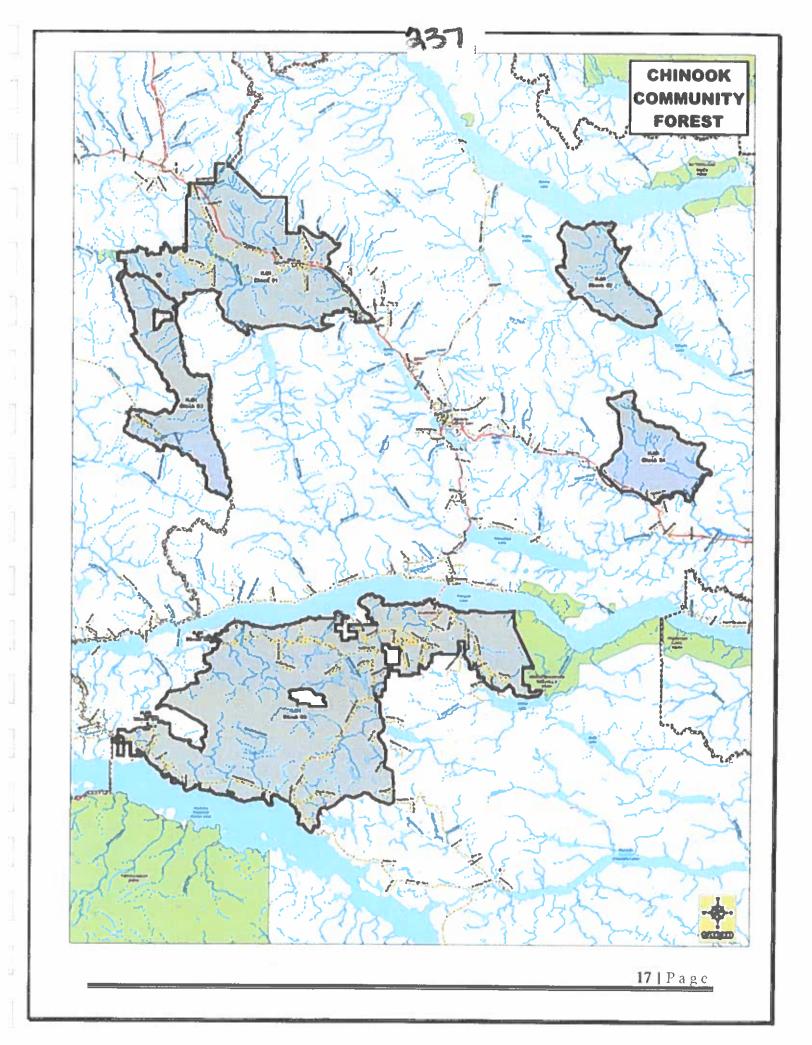

DESCRIPTION OF BUSINESS

Chinook Comfor Limited Partnership (the "Partnership") is registered provincially under the Partnership Act of British Columbia. The financial statements were prepared in accordance with Canadian Accounting Standards for Private Enterprises. The Partnership's principal business activities are managing a renewable resource area based forest license and to build community capacity in the Lakes District of British Columbia.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

These financial statements reflect the assets, liabilities, revenues and expenses of the partnership and do not include any other assets, liabilities, revenues or expenses of the owners/partners.

Basis of presentation

These financial statements reflect the assets, liabilities, revenues and expenses of the partnership and do not include any other assets, liabilities, revenues or expenses of the owners/partners.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash includes cash and cash equivalents. Cash equivalents are investments in treasury bills and are valued at cost plus accrued interest. The carrying amounts approximate fair value because they have maturities at the date of purchase of less than ninety days.

Property, plant and equipment

Property, plant and equipment is stated at cost or deemed cost less accumulated amortization. Property, plant and equipment is amortized over its estimated useful life on a declining balance basis at the following rates and methods:

Computer equipment

55% declining balance method

The Partnership regularly reviews its property, plant and equipment to eliminate obsolete items. Government grants are treated as a reduction of property, plant and equipment cost.

Property, plant and equipment acquired during the year but not placed into use are not amortized until they are placed into use.

Impairment of Long Lived Assets

The Partnership tests for impairment whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount of the assets may not be recoverable. Recoverability is assessed by comparing the carrying amount to the projected future net cash flows the long-lived assets are expected to generate through their direct use and eventual disposition. When a test for impairment indicates that the carrying amount of an asset is not recoverable, an impairment loss is recognized to the extent the carrying value exceeds its fair value.

Reforestation

The Partnership accounts for costs related to the reforestation of logged areas in the period such areas are logged. Costs represent estimated post logging expenditures to silviculture responsibilities pursuant to the Minister of Forests Lands and Natural Resource Forest Practice Code.

Revenue recognition

The Partnership recognizes revenues when they are earned, specifically when all the following conditions are met:

- · services are provided or products are delivered to customers
- · there is clear evidence that an arrangement exists
- · amounts are fixed or can be determined
- the ability to collect is reasonably assured.

Measurement uncertainty

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Canadian accounting standards for private enterprises requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amount of assets and liabilities, disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the period. Such estimates are periodically reviewed and any adjustments necessary are reported in earnings in the period in which they become known. Actual results could differ from these estimates.

Financial instruments policy

Financial instruments are recorded at fair value when acquired or issued. In subsequent periods, financial assets with actively traded markets are reported at fair value, with any unrealized gains and losses reported in income. All other financial instruments are reported at amortized cost, and tested for impairment at each reporting date. Transaction costs on the acquisition, sale, or issue of financial instruments are expensed when incurred.

10. CONSULTING CONTRACT

In connection with the high resolution inventory services contract signed on March 7, 2017, the Partnership entered into a consulting agreement with Tesera Systems Inc. As a part of the consulting contract, Teresa Systems Inc has agreed to complete the Partnership's LIDAR as outlined in Chinook's Community Forest Management Plan. The Partnership has agreed to remunerate Tesera Systems Inc. to develop a high resolution inventory based on a budget of 90,000 hectares at a cost of \$2.05 per hectare (\$184,500) from February 1, 2017 to March 31, 2019. However, the overall contract has a budget allocation of \$334,425 to allow for additional terrain, diameter distribution, growth yield, forest management services and cost overruns.

11. FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

The Partnership is exposed to various risks through its financial instruments and has a comprehensive risk management framework to monitor, evaluate and manage these risks. The following analysis provides information about the Partnership's risk exposure and concentration as of March 31, 2018.

(a) Credit risk

Credit risk arises from the potential that a counter party will fail to perform its obligations. The Partnership is exposed to credit risk from customers. In order to reduce its credit risk, the Partnership reviews a new customer's credit history before extending credit and conducts regular reviews of its existing customers' credit performance. An allowance for doubtful accounts is established based upon factors surrounding the credit risk of specific accounts, historical trends and other information. The Partnership has a significant number of customers which minimizes concentration of credit risk.

(b) Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that an entity will encounter difficulty in meeting obligations associated with financial liabilities. The Partnership is exposed to this risk mainly in respect of its receipt of funds from its customers and other related sources, long-term debt, obligations under capital leases, contributions to the pension plan, and accounts payable.

Unless otherwise noted, it is management's opinion that the Partnership is not exposed to significant other price risks arising from these financial instruments.

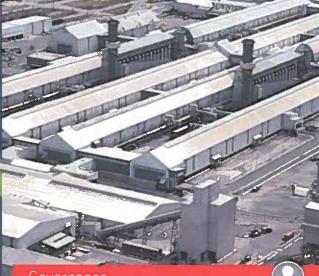

We held an extra ordinary Pool Society board meeting last night to discuss fall hour of operations and our staffing shortage.

The board had a good discussion and voted in favour of option 2; closing the facility on Sundays. This was a very hard decision and our hope is that this adjustment will be short lived. We have re-posted lifeguard job postings (constant since spring 2018) and are working with a couple local community members to get them trained as soon as possible. To return to opening on Sundays we will need to hire at least 2 – 4 more people to fill a minimum of 24-30 hours/week.

This announcement will be sent out the public and members tomorrow morning and will be effective we when open after shutdown for the week of September 17, first Sunday effected will be September 23rd.

I have attached the report to the board from staff, the press release and new pool schedule for your reference.

Fall Staffing Challenge. September 10, 2018

We are approximately 24 hours short staffed for lifeguards & instructors. Currently we have 4 supervising staff(3 full-time and 1 part-time), and 4 lifeguard/instructors, 1 fulltime guard/instructor (NEW starting work Sept 16) and 2 casual instructors. Total of 11 Aquatic Staff. We are in need of 1 part-time and at least 2 casuals to get back to a comfortable staffing level.

At the current moment we do not have enough Lifeguards to run the "normal" pool hours of operation. With the two options below we can operate the facility at reduced hours however, even with these reduced hours when staff are sick or need a day off management will be on deck covering.

We reviewed our user trends from last year and came up with these two options.

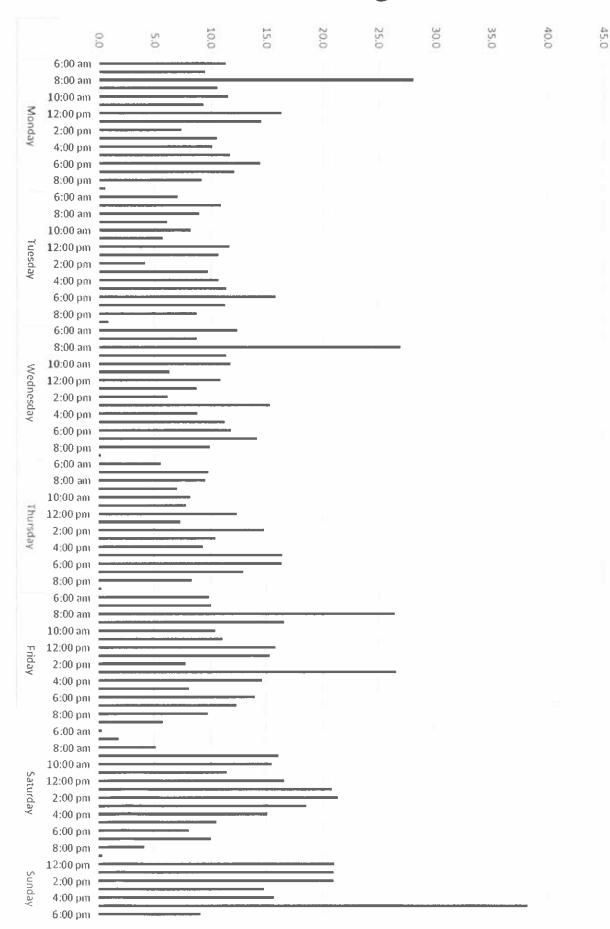

PURPOSE:

The purpose of this report is to seek Council's support in the District of Ucluelet advocating for the modernization of the 1% utility tax rate in the *Local Government Act* (LGA) to include internet and cellular services.

BACKGROUND:

Section 644 of the LGA provides for the taxation of utility companies (attached as Appendix A). Subsection 2 requires municipalities to tax utility companies at a rate of 1% on telephone or television services.

Staff have confirmed with a Telus representative that the 1% utility tax applies only to telephone land lines. Many households have replaced their land line telephone with a cellular phone, so while the utility company continues to offer a calling service it is not required to forward 1% of their revenue to municipalities.

Like the telephone, television subscriptions have also decreased due to the internet and online to streaming services. Internet services are delivered to households using cable and wire – both of which are included in the LGA's definition of a utility company's "specified improvements". However, the legislation is completely silent on the revenue from internet services which are still largely provided by "traditional" telephone and television service providers.



The updating of the LGA to reflect advancements in technology and changes to utility companies' revenue streams is overdue. I would like Council to support my motion to send a resolution for modernizing the 1% utility tax rate to the 2018 UBCM Convention as well as sending a letter to all BC municipalities. Local municipalities are always struggling to find new revenue streams and it appears this is one revenue stream that has been forgotten.

APPENDIX A - Local Government Act (Excerpt)

Taxation of utility company property

644 (1)In this section:

"specified improvement" means an improvement of a utility company that is

(a)a pole line, cable, tower, pole, wire, transformer, equipment, machinery, exchange equipment, main, pipe line or structure, other than a building,

(b)erected or placed in, on or affixed to

(i)land in a municipality, or

(ii)a building, fixture or other structure in or on land in a municipality, and

(c)used solely in the municipality or a group of adjoining municipalities by the company for local generation, transmission, distribution, manufacture or transportation of electricity, telephonic communication, water, gas or closed circuit television;

"utility company" means an electric light, electric power, telephone, water, gas or closed circuit television company.

(2)A utility company that is carrying on business in a municipality in which it has specified improvements must be taxed annually by the municipality at the rate of 1% as follows:

(a) for a telephone or closed circuit television company, on the gross rentals received in the 2nd preceding year from its subscribers for telephone or television service located in the municipality, including telephone interexchange tolls for calls between exchanges in the municipality;

(b) for any other utility company, on the amount received in the 2nd preceding year by the company for electric light, electric power, water or gas consumed in the municipality, other than amounts received for

(i)light, power or water supplied for resale,

(ii)gas supplied for the operation of motor vehicles fuelled by natural gas, or



(iii)gas supplied to any gas utility company, other than a government corporation as defined in the *Financial Administration*Act or a subsidiary of a government corporation.

(3) Tax under subsection (2) is subject to the same remedies and penalties as taxes under Part 7 [Municipal Revenue] of the Community Charter.

(4)A utility company liable to tax under subsection (2) must

(a) by October 31 in each year, for the purpose of determining the tax payable in the next year, file with the collector a return of the revenue referred to in that subsection that was received in the preceding year, and (b) pay the tax imposed under subsection (2) in accordance with Division 10 [Property Tax Due Dates and Tax Notices] of Part 7 of the Community Charter.

(5)As an exception to subsections (2) and (4), in the case of a company to which this section applies for the first time in the municipality,

(a) the company must pay the tax imposed under subsection (2) in the 2nd year of its operation on the basis of revenue earned in the first year, and (b) the report of revenue earned in the first year must be filed before May 8 of the 2nd year of operation.

(6) Tax imposed on a utility company under subsection (2) is in place of tax that might otherwise be imposed on the specified improvements under section 197 (1)

(a) [municipal property taxes] of the Community Charter, and taxes may not be imposed under that provision on the specified improvements although they may be imposed on those improvements under section 197 (1) (b) [property taxes for other bodies] of the Community Charter.

(7) For certainty, all land and improvements of a utility company in a municipality, other than specified improvements, are subject to tax under section 197 [annual property tax bylaw] of the Community Charter.

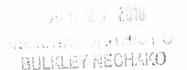

BC Local Governments Take the Lead on Energy Action

The Minister of Environment and Climate Change Strategy presents City of Victoria, District of Hudson's Hope and the Capital Regional District with Climate & Energy Action Awards. City of Nelson and City of Surrey receive Honourable Mentions.

[Whistler] The Honourable George Heyman, Minister of Environment and Climate Change Strategy presented awards recognizing the leadership of BC local governments and public sector organizations at the Union of BC Municipalities Convention. "These award-winning actions on waste reduction, active transportation, renewable energy, and more demonstrate creativity and innovation at the community level. Local government has consistently demonstrated true leadership year after year, and this will be crucial to help us reach our new climate targets," said Minister Heyman.

The City of Victoria won in the Community Planning and Development category for the All Ages & Abilities Bicycle Network. In accepting the award, Mayor Helps noted, "Victoria's Bicycle Network is helping residents and visitors cycle safely and comfortably through our community. In the first 14 months of operation, 530,000 trips were recorded on our downtown protected bike lanes." When complete, the 32km network is expected to reduce greenhouse gas emissions by over 10,000 tonnes per year.

The District of Hudson's Hope won in the Corporate Operations category for its Solar Initiative. The district installed 1,550 solar PV panels on nine municipal sites, for a total generating capacity of 500 kilowatts. Public workshops kept the community informed and high school students were involved in installation. "As a result of this project, Hudson's Hope will save about \$70,000 per year on its electricity bill. The project inspired several residences to install their own solar panels and many others are now considering it," said Mayor Johansson.

The Capital Regional District has won a 2018 Climate & Energy Action Award in the Public Sector Collaboration category for its Zero Emissions Fleet Initiative. Board Chair Steve Price would like to thank the University of Victoria's Institute for Integrated Energy Solutions (IESVic) for collaborating with the CRD on this ongoing pilot project. "IESVic's contribution is essential as we develop a suite of tools for zero emissions fleet optimization and in the testing and evaluation of these vehicles for CRD use. This project is expected to lower greenhouse gas emissions from our vehicle fleet by 132 tonnes Co2-e over the pilot period".

"B.C. communities are consistently moving forward with projects that are helping to reduce their corporate and community greenhouse gas emissions," said Patrick Johnstone, **Chair of the Community Energy Association** and Councillor with the City of New Westminster. "This local government action is essential to achieving B.C.'s long term GHG emission reduction targets."

Honourable Mentions were awarded to the City of Nelson for the Nelson Community Solar Garden (Community Development Category) and the City of Surrey for both the Surrey Biofuel Facility (Corporate Category) and Integrated Sustainability Education Program (Collaboration Category).

The Community Energy Association organizes the Climate and Energy Action Awards annually in partnership with the Province of BC, Union of BC Municipalities, BC Hydro, FortisBC, and Real Estate Foundation of BC. FCM statement following Board of Directors' meeting (14/09/2018)

Federation of Canadian Municipalities (FCM) President Vicki-May Hamm issued the following statement at the conclusion of the FCM's Board of Directors' meeting.

"This fall's Board Meeting took place against the backdrop of an important national discussion about the role of municipalities and their relationship with the provincial and federal orders of government. The FCM Board sent a unanimous message that municipalities will oppose any use of Section 33 (the notwithstanding clause) of the Charter of Rights and Freedoms that would have the effect of overriding local decision-making and democratic rights at the local level. The FCM Board also reaffirmed its support for the ability of municipalities to govern their own affairs and represent the interests of their residents.

"As federal political parties prepare for next year's election, it is time for a mature and modern conversation about how to strengthen municipal autonomy. We need political will from every order of government to have a conversation about how we work together within the Constitution. With engaged federal partners, we know it can be done.

"Over the course of our discussions, Board members were updated on developments in the federal infrastructure plan, rural broadband connectivity, and the legalization of cannabis. Each of these issues are compelling examples of how local governments can and must be supported with the tools for local decision-making.

"Particularly regarding cannabis, with legalization fast approaching, municipalities have been working hard to get ready for October 17th. Many provinces have yet to outline their plans for cannabis excise tax revenue sharing, and the uncertainty for local governments is a serious cause for concern. Success requires ongoing collaboration and cooperation across all orders of government.

"Local governments are building a more livable, competitive Canada. We are ready to have an important conversation about greater municipal autonomy, and the tools needed to support it.

"I was pleased to gather with my colleagues from across the country in the County of Annapolis, Nova Scotia, to discuss these ambitious goals and objectives of Canada's municipalities for the year ahead."

The Federation of Canadian Municipalities is the national voice of municipal governments, with nearly 2,000 members representing more than 90 per cent of the Canadian population.

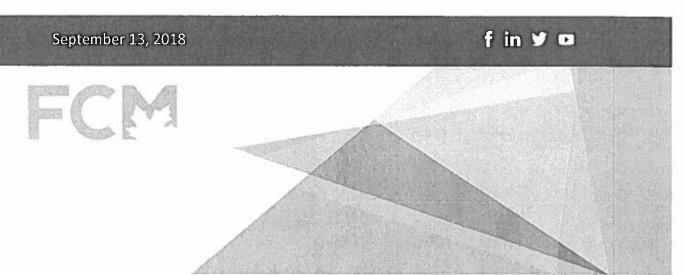

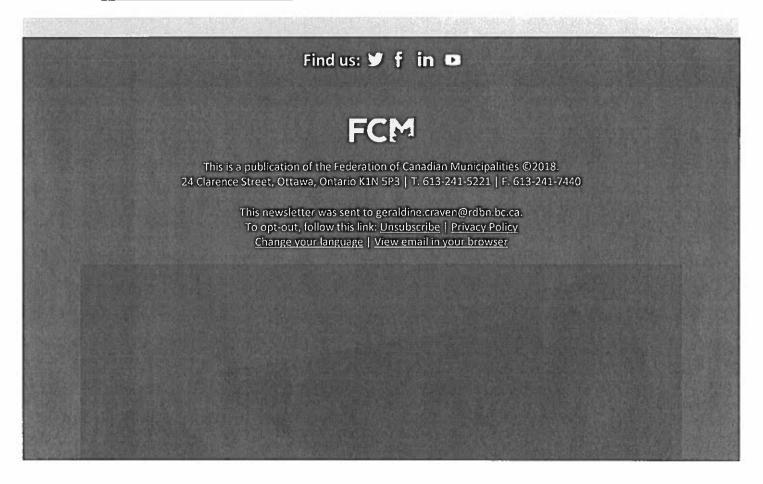

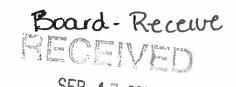

Caution in areas burned by wildfires

KELOWNA - The 2018 wildfire season has been one of the most challenging in British Columbia's history, and some areas of the province have sustained considerable damage.

Hunters, recreationalists and anyone else heading into the backcountry should use caution when travelling in areas affected by wildfires, since there may be safety hazards present. These hazards could include:

- danger trees (fire-damaged trees that have become unstable and could fall over without warning)
- ash pits, which may be hard to detect and can remain hot long after the flames have died down
- unstable soils and terrain
- increased potential for landslides or rock falls
- damaged trails or irregular trail surfaces
- increased water runoff, which could lead to flooding or debris flows
- damaged fencing, which could allow livestock to enter roadways

In areas that have been severely burned, post-wildfire risks may last for two years or more. However, the increased risk of floods or debris flows in severely burned areas may persist much longer.

Every year, post-wildfire hazard assessments are completed on significant wildfires to identify potential threats to public safety, buildings or infrastructure. Risk mitigation and rehabilitation planning are already underway in some areas.

The BC Wildfire Service reminds members of the public that they also need to use extreme caution in regions where fires are still burning. Wildfires are active worksites where fire suppression efforts may be ongoing.

People can expect to see smouldering ground fires and smoke within the perimeters of existing wildfires over the coming weeks. This is common with large wildfires and may continue for some time. If smoke is rising from well within a fire's perimeter and the area is surrounded by black, burned material, this is typically not a concern. However, smoke rising from green, unburned fuel or from outside a fire's perimeter should be reported immediately.

- Even if an area restriction order has been rescinded, officials engaged in fire control (including firefighters) have the authority under the Wildfire Act and its regulations to order anyone to leave the area.

Cannabis Retail Information for Local Governments

Aug. 8, 2018

On October 17, 2018, non-medical cannabis will be legal in Canada. In anticipation of federal legalization, the Province has passed legislation to provide for legal, controlled access to non-medical cannabis in British Columbia. Information is also available regarding local governments' role in licensing non-medical cannabis retail stores.

Under provincial legislation, local governments have the ability to make decisions based on the needs of their communities, whether that be setting a minimum distance between cannabis stores, limiting the number of licences that may be issued in their jurisdiction, or prohibiting cannabis retail stores altogether.

B.C.'s Liquor Distribution Branch (LDB) will be the wholesale distributor of non-medical cannabis and will operate public retail stores and online sales. The LDB will work with local governments to ensure their support for any proposed public retail store sites. Local representatives can reach the LDB at cannabis@bcldb.com to discuss potential public retail in their communities.

The Liquor and Cannabis Regulation Branch (LCRB) will be responsible for licensing private stores and monitoring the retail sector. When an application is received, the LCRB will notify the local government of the area where the proposed store will be located. The LCRB must receive a positive recommendation from the local government in order for an applicant to be approved for a retail license. More details on the local government role in private cannabis retail licensing can be found in the LCRB's guide for local governments. While the provincial legislation provides a sound foundation for the regulation and safe implementation of legalized cannabis, the Province has committed to assessing and refining cannabis policy and regulation over the months and years ahead. The Joint Provincial-Local Government Committee on Cannabis Regulation will continue as the provincial regulatory framework is implemented and monitored. UBCM members are encouraged to bring forward any interests or concerns to contribute to these discussions.

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Course in Community Energy Management

Aug. 8, 2018

The Community Energy Association (CEA) and BC Institute of Technology (BCIT) are offering a six-week online course in community energy management in the fall of 2018. Registration is now open for Introduction to Community Energy & Emissions Planning, which will run from Sept. 19 – Oct. 26, 2018.

Learn about the main objectives and components of community energy and emissions plans, understand how to develop and implement actionable CEEPs that achieve results, and discover the energy savings opportunities specific to your community.

This course is one of six courses offered through the Certificate in Community Energy Management program.

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New Invasive Species White Paper

Aug. 8, 2018

The Invasive Species Council of British Columbia's (ISCBC) Local Government Network provides coordination, dialogue, resources, and other opportunities for local governments working on invasive species management. Supported by the ISCBC's Local Government Network, local government staff from across the province have collaborated to produce an *Invasive Species White Paper – Call to Action*.

The White Paper is aimed at garnering elected official support for the appropriate commitment of resources to reduce the risks and impacts posed by invasive species. The impacts of invasive species are far reaching as they affect infrastructure, human health & safety, and biodiversity. Key examples of invasive species that cause significant impacts to infrastructure, human health & safety, and biodiversity are: Japanese Knotweed, Giant hogweed, European fire ants, and wild parsnip.

The White Paper asks local government elected officials and staff a series of questions designed to help assess their readiness to take action against invasive species. Please contact the ISCBC local government representatives, below, for more information on local government species management.

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Funding & Resources Update

Aug. 8, 2018

Each month we provide an update on UBCM funding programs and information on other programs or resources that may be of interest to local governments and First Nations.

Local Government Program Services

Asset Management Planning Program: Matching grants of up to \$15,000 are available to support activities that advance local government's asset management planning or practices and that facilitate better integration of asset management planning with long term financial planning. The next application deadline is September 28, 2018.

Asset Management Training Subsidies are also available and will cover up to 50% of the registration fee for up to three staff per local government for eligible Asset Management BC NAMS training events.

Regional Community to Community Forum Program: Matching funds of up to \$5,000 are available to support elected officials and/or senior staff of neighbouring First Nations and local governments to meet to address issues of common concern. The 2018/19 C2C program has been enhanced to increase focus on reconciliation, support coordinated approaches to emergency prevention, response and recovery, and to allow elected officials or senior staff to be eligible participants. The final application deadline for this year's program is October 19, 2018.

Community Emergency Preparedness Fund: This suite of funding streams is intended to enhance the resiliency of local governments and their residents in responding to emergencies. Four streams are now open for applications with staggered deadlines between October 5, 2018, and February 22, 2019. The Structural Flood Mitigation stream will receive applications in the fall of 2019, the deadline date will be posted soon.

Other Funding

Connecting British Columbia: This program helps pay for infrastructure required to deliver high-speed internet connectivity to rural and remote areas of the province, under two funding streams. Applications will be reviewed and assessed on a first come, first serve basis until available funds are committed.

Green Infrastructure - Environmental Quality Program: The program provides access to funding for important drinking water, wastewater, and solid waste projects to improve community infrastructure. Applications will be accepted until August 29, 2018.

Real Estate Foundation of BC: REFBC General Grants support projects that advance the sustainable use of land, and that build knowledge and professionalism in the real estate industry. The next deadline for applications is September 6, 2018.

CBT Arts & Culture Venue Grants: If your Columbia Basin organization is looking to make capital improvements to an arts and culture venue, this grant program may be for you. Deadline: September 13, 2018.

Promoting a Healthy Drinking Culture in BC: Community Action Initiative is offering convening grants of up to \$15,000 to fund community dialogues around moderate-risk alcohol consumption. Grantees and their communities will be supported



with alcohol-related resources and capacity-building tools, along with knowledge exchange opportunities. Applications will be accepted until November 15, 2018.

Green Municipal Fund: This FCM program finances capital projects that improve air, water, and soil and reduce greenhouse gas emissions. The deadline for energy, waste, water and transportation capital projects is March 1, 2019.

First Nations Adapt Program: This federal program supports First Nations communities to assess and respond to climate change impacts on community infrastructure and emergency management. It prioritizes communities most impacted by sea level rise, flooding, forest fires, and winter road failures. Applications are reviewed on an ongoing basis.

Resources

Municipal Natural Assets Watershed-level Pilot: August 17, 2018, is the due date for letters of interest in the MNAI's Watershed-level pilot implementation in BC. The program offers a methodology and support for local governments to integrate natural assets into core asset management and financial processes using the same systems as for engineered assets.

Environmental Flow Needs - Science, Policy & Practice: The Okanagan Basin Water Board and the Canadian Water Resources Association will host this conference on October 17 & 18, 2018, in Kelowna, BC. The conference will bring together representatives from national and international organizations engaged in water management or research, including fisheries and water managers, First Nations, regulators, policy-makers, academia, and NGOs.

NAMS Asset Management Training: This 3-day training session (October 31-November 2, 2018, in Courtenay, BC) provides staff with a broad understanding of asset management practices and will equip them to develop and implement an asset management program in their local government. The \$1,650 registration is eligible for a 50% UBCM training subsidy for up to three registrants per local government.

Making the Links 2018 Symposium: Climate change, Community Health & Resilience are the themes for this first of its kind event, in November 5 & 6, 2018, in Kelowna, BC. Through inspiring speakers, engaging workshops and cross-sector dialogue, we will explore practical strategies and deepen knowledge, skills and tools for collaborative action.

Introduction to Reconciliation Webinar: This Reconciliation Canada webinar creates a safe place for participants to explore our shared Canadian history, examine the meaning of reconciliation, and their respective roles to play. Join Charlene Seward in this recorded hour-long webinar and explore your values and beliefs as they relate to reconciliation.

A Community Guide to Flood Risk Communication: Available on the Fraser Basin Council's Retooling for Climate Change website, this guide provides an overview of best practices for effective flood risk communication. It will assist in the development of a communications strategy for a targeted community. Intended for emergency managers, risk communicators, and others working to develop messaging that empowers communities to pursue personal preparedness.

Solutions to Municipal Sustainability Challenges: Watch FCM's Sustainable Communities Award winners' TED-style presentations to hear about the strategies they used to develop their projects.

Climate Atlas of Canada: This interactive online tool is for citizens, researchers, businesses, and community and political leaders to learn about climate change in Canada. It combines climate science, mapping, and storytelling to inspire local, regional, and national action that will help us move from risk to resilience.

Building sustainable communities with asset management: This guidebook is designed for staff or elected officials in medium and large municipalities who are responsible for green projects or who are interested in municipal sustainable development.



CivicInfo BC: British Columbia's local government information hub offers comprehensive organizational and grant directories, events listings, tools for training, research and career development, bids & tenders, and other resources.

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Wildfire Impacts on Police Resources

Aug. 15, 2018

UBCM has received correspondence from the provincial government regarding potential impacts from the current wildfire situation on local governments that utilize RCMP policing services. Local RCMP detachments across BC may be required to redeploy some of their Members to assist.

There are currently multiple large wildfires threatening several areas in British Columbia. Under the Provincial Police Service Agreement (PPSA) and Municipal Police Service Agreement (MPSA), this situation constitutes a policing "Emergency," meaning:

- This is an "urgent and critical situation of a temporary nature that requires additional police resources to maintain law and order, keep the peace or ensure safety of persons, property or communities;" and,
- Local jurisdictional police do not have sufficient resources to manage the situation within their geographical boundaries.

As per policing agreements involving the federal government, the Province of BC, and BC local governments, resources may be redeployed from one of the following Units:

- A BC Provincial Police Service Unit;
- A municipal or federal Unit within British Columbia; and/or,
- RCMP resources from a different province or territory.

Although a number of resources from the Provincial Police Service have already been deployed to affected areas, local RCMP detachments may be required to redeploy some of their Members to assist. In assessing their local needs and operational ability to assist, detachment commanders should be consulting with local mayors and councils. The Province is required to pay costs associated with redeployment (e.g. Member salary, transportation, maintenance) at the appropriate cost-share.

The Province's Policing & Security Branch and RCMP "E" Division endeavour to provide consultation and communication as the wildfire situation evolves. 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Nominations for 2018-19 Executive Announced

Aug. 15, 2018

In response to a Call for Nominations by UBCM's Nominating Committee, the Nominating Committee Report has been prepared and is now available online. The report includes a summary of candidates running for Executive positions and their bios. Members will receive hard copies of the report by mail before the end of August.

Based on the advance nominations received, there will be an election for Third Vice-President and Small Community Representative.

For those who missed the July 31 deadline, there will be an opportunity to be nominated from the floor at Convention at designated times noted in the program. Please contact the Chair of the Nominating Committee, Councillor Murry Krause, for further information about the process.

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Model Code of Conduct

Aug. 15, 2018

The Working Group on Responsible Conduct has developed a model Code of Conduct for use by councils and boards. The purpose of the resource is to provide a set of principles and general standards that support the development or updating of a Code of Conduct. A companion guide has also been prepared to provide additional guidance and resources.

The model Code of Conduct will be one of the resources highlighted in a clinic September 12 at UBCM's Convention. This session will explore steps some BC local governments are taking to develop and implement Codes of Conduct and provide an update on the activities of the Working Group on Responsible Conduct.

The Working Group on Responsible Conduct is a joint initiative of the Union of BC Municipalities, the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing, and the Local Government Management Association. The staff-level Working Group was formed to undertake policy work in response to a 2016 resolution to UBCM that addressed the issue of responsible conduct by local government elected officials (specifically about local government Integrity Commissioners).

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Report on Child Care Needs

Aug. 29, 2018

Over the summer, UBCM and the Coalition of Child Care Advocates of BC (CCCABC) teamed up to better understand child care needs in small, rural and remote communities. A summary of the research is available on UBCM's Health and Social Development webpage.

In February 2018, the provincial government made a significant commitment to quality, accessible and affordable child care in British Columbia by investing one billion dollars over the next three years to start building a universal system for BC's children, families and economy.

The Province also released the document, *Child Care BC Caring for Kids, Lifting Up Families: The Path to Universal Child Care.* The document details the government's values, vision and steps on how they will create universal child care in BC. Child Care BC includes: reducing child care fees for parents, creating new licensed spaces, investing in the Early Childhood Educator (ECE) work-force, and investments in child care for Indigenous communities.

To build on this work and add to the discussion on child care, UBCM and CCCABC are working together to better understand child care needs in small, rural and remote communities. While some of the same challenges may exist for both urban and rural communities, UBCM and CCCABC believe there are specific issues that arise for the small, rural and remote areas of the Province.

In May 2018, with input from CCCABC, UBCM launched a survey to local governments asking about their child care needs. The two groups also conducted six in-person interviews with local governments and others in the Peace River/Northeast region of BC in July 2018.

The final report, Child Care Needs in Small, Rural and Remote Communities in BC provides a summary of the survey and the in-person meeting results. A number of recommendations were suggested by the local governments and are also presented in the report.

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RCMP Contract Management Committee Update

Aug. 29, 2018

On May 3, 2018, the Local Government Contract Management Committee (LGCMC) met with provincial and RCMP representatives to discuss issues related to the RCMP contract and policing in British Columbia. The key issues discussed at the meeting are summarized in this article.

1) Working Group Discussion Items RCMP Outstanding Issues

Provincial representatives provided an update on the status of three long-standing issues (Severance, Green Timbers, IHIT). Thus far, Public Safety Canada has rejected all offers from the Province to settle these issues.

RCMP Labour Relations Update

Members considered implications of unionization, including the difficulty in maintaining service levels in rural areas.

Five Year Review

This review has now concluded. Most of the recommendations have been fully implemented, many of which involved amendments to the Companion Document. Recommendations include the need for improved consultation, clarifying roles and responsibilities, and improved implementation of the agreements.

Breaching Equipment

The Five Year Review partly addressed the need for early warning information regarding the use and purchase of new equipment (e.g. breaching equipment). Policy direction from Ottawa dictates that this new equipment must be made available to police officers. No finalized policy yet on how many will be required per detachment, or per police vehicle.

Less Lethal 40 MM Projectiles

"E" Division has asked the provincial government to approve a one-year pilot project, which would see less lethal 40 MM projectiles used in several BC communities. These less lethal projectiles are already being used by other police agencies in Canada.

Auxiliary Program

Discussions are ongoing between the RCMP and BC regarding the Province's position (as expressed by the former Minister of Public Safety and Solicitor General):

- . That current Auxiliary Members be grandfathered into Tier 3 of the new Auxiliary Program; and,
- That the proposed uniform (a ball cap and yellow jacket that both clearly display the word "volunteer") be amended.



Resource Planning

With regards to the upcoming G7 Summit, the RCMP has done a good job of providing early notice and implementing measures (e.g. restricting leave) to manage the force during this time.

Joint Provincial-Local Government Committee on Cannabis Regulation

Members discussed recently tabled provincial legislation that will provide for a provincial regulatory framework for non-medical cannabis. In particular, the Province is working towards creating a community safety unit that includes dedicated enforcement officers throughout BC who will work with local bylaw enforcement to shutdown illegal storefronts.

RCMP Consultation & LGCMC Meeting with Okanagan Representatives

LGCMC Co-Chairs recently met with representatives from the Okanagan to discuss communication issues with the RCMP.

RCMP Occupancy Agreements

Members went through the Local Government Management Association (LGMA) working group's principled approach to dealing with building leases. Provincial representatives were supportive of the examination of this issue.

2) RCMP Update

Cannabis Legalization

The RCMP is in the process of exploring options for roadside screening devices. If these are not procured before legalization, the RCMP is still equipped with tools to detect cannabis. The RCMP are also working to increase the capacity of Drug Recognition Experts (DREs); "E" Division will be looking for 33% of frontline members to be trained in Standard Field Sobriety Testing (SFST) within 3 years of legalization, and 50% within 5 years.

Vacancy Management

RCMP 'E' Division has established a Vacancy Management Committee co-chaired by the Human Resources Officer (HRO) and the Officer in Charge of the Operations Strategy Branch to ensure a consistent approach in deploying resources in a strategic manner.

Shared Services Canada (SSC)

RCMP representatives provided an update on the new SSC Service Model sourced from the National Contract Management Committee meetings.

RCMP Consultation

Keeping in mind the local government budget cycle, the discussion focussed on in-year cost items and the need to consult and provide ample notice to local governments when making these types of requests.

Occupancy Agreements

RCMP representatives spoke to LGCMC members regarding requests from municipalities that would prefer to buy buildings from the RCMP. It was explained that under the PPSA only the provincial government is stipulated as a party that could purchase a building from the RCMP.

Supplemental Policing Agreements & G7 Summit



"E" Division is re-assessing the number of resources committed towards the G7 Summit on a weekly basis. The initial request was for 1071 Members; however, it has now been reduced significantly.

With regards to supplemental policing, the RCMP committed to providing policy or an assessment tool/matrix, which they use to assess resource needs at the detachment level for local events.

RCMP Labour Relations Update

RCMP representatives noted that communities should be planning for unionization, as it is very likely to occur. With regards to concerns over pending labour negotiations, impacts on the RCMP or municipal partners were not known at this time.

RCMP Integrated Detachment Staffing Levels

In collaboration with the Province, the RCMP has developed a template for Resource Reviews. The Resource Reviews look at current resources and historical workloads to determine whether jurisdictions in a given detachment have adequate resources to meet their respective workloads.

RCMP Policy on Limited Duration Postings

The RCMP uses a scoring system to determine where a Limited Duration Posting is necessary. This point system takes into consideration location, distance to a larger community of more than 5,000 in population, travel time to a major centre, population, housing, educational facilities/options, medical services, entertainment, community cohesiveness, developmental opportunities, caseload, etc.

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UBCM Group Benefits Renewal Negotiations

Aug. 29, 2018

UBCM Group Benefits Plan renewal negotiations are nearing completion. The service offer to UBCM members includes an actuarial review of the carrier's proposed new rates for the coming year. The renewal letter will be sent out by the beginning of September with the rates effective October 1, 2018.

George and Bell Consulting have reviewed Pacific Blue Cross's (PBC) proposal and have been negotiating the renewal on behalf of UBCM. George and Bell work with UBCM to ensure the aggregate adjustments for the renewal are fair and appropriate. Individual local government reviews will be finalized before the end of the August.

Information provided by PBC includes historical premiums and claims experience, required reserves, and expenses. George and Bell's objective in analyzing this information and the proposed renewal action is to determine whether the proposed premium rate adjustments are appropriate and competitive at the aggregate level and to ensure that the premium rates for each local government are determined in accordance with the pre-determined methodologies and reflect applicable claims experience.

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Community Emergency Preparedness Fund

In order to help B.C. municipalities better prepare for disasters, the Province signed an agreement with the Union of BC Municipalities (UBCM) to establish a \$32 million fund for specific programs to increase local government resilience in the face of disasters. The Community Emergency Preparedness Fund is administered by UBCM with some assistance from the Province where UBCM requests technical expertise (e.g. assessing flood projects). The funding is divided into five streams:

- Flood Risk Assessment, Flood Mapping & Flood Mitigation Planning The intent of this
 funding stream is to support eligible applicants to ensure they have accurate knowledge
 of the flood hazards they face and to develop effective strategies to mitigate and
 prepare for those risks.
 - o Grants of up to \$150,000. Intake 1 (October 27, 2017) funded 20 projects totaling \$2.5 million. Intake 2 application deadline is February 22, 2019.
- <u>Emergency Social Services</u> The intent of this funding stream is to support eligible applicants to build local capacity to provide emergency-social services through training, volunteer recruitment and retention, and the purchase of equipment.
 - o Grants of up to \$25,000. Intake 1 (November 17, 2017) funded 84 projects totaling just under \$2 million. Intake 2 application deadline is October 5, 2018.
- Emergency Operations Centres and Training: The intent of this funding stream is to support the purchase of equipment and supplies required to maintain or improve Emergency Operations Centres (EOC) and to enhance EOC capacity through training and exercises.
 - o Grants of up to \$25,000. Intake 1 (February 2, 2018) funded 100 projects totaling \$2.3 million. Intake 2 application deadline is February 1, 2019.
- <u>Structural Flood Mitigation</u> The intent of this funding stream is to support eligible applicants to prevent, eliminate or reduce the impacts of hazards through construction of structural flood mitigation projects. Ongoing operational costs are not eligible.
 - o Grants of up to \$750,000. Intake 1 (April 13, 2018) funded 17 projects totaling \$9.5 million. Intake 2 application deadline is October 25, 2019.
- <u>Evacuation Route Planning</u> The intent of this funding stream is to support applicants to develop evacuation route plans for communities that would be challenged to remove people to safety in the event of an emergency.
 - o Grants of up to \$25,000. Applications are being accepted for a single intake of this funding stream through November 30, 2018.

Progress on Housing

Sept. 5, 2018

Over the past year, the provincial and federal governments have begun to implement policy agendas that address housing needs. Recent months in particular have seen aggressive action by the province on housing, coupled with the introduction of a National Housing Strategy. This article presents an overview of how recent initiatives align with UBCM policy.

Housing continues to be a crisis in communities across British Columbia. As noted in the provincial report *What We Heard About Poverty in B.C.*, "Affordable housing was overwhelmingly the top issue that came up during the consultation. It was named the most pressing issue for people living in poverty by people and organizations throughout British Columbia. Businesses, local governments, Indigenous leaders, and people living in cities big and small all spoke up about how the housing crisis has contributed to poverty." Impacts of the crisis vary from community to community, but include difficulties for employers finding and retaining employees, local government challenges in addressing tent cities, and hardship for renters, seniors and youth.

Recognizing the importance of this issue for our members, UBCM continues to be an active advocate on housing. Recent advocacy efforts have been focused on the agenda for action set out in our 2018 housing strategy. Since the release of the strategy, UBCM has continued to provide local government perspectives on a variety of issues, through regular communication with the province on the implementation of their 30-point plan, *Homes for B.C.*

The province's plan aligns closely with key elements of UBCM's housing strategy, with recent actions that include:

- a commitment to the construction of 30,000 new affordable units over the next three years.
- · new rental-zoning powers that received royal assent this spring,
- several measures brought into effect by the 2018 budget aimed at the management of speculative demand including
 a higher foreign buyer's tax with an expanded scope of application,
- · construction of temporary modular homes in communities across the province to house the homeless,
- · the development of a poverty reduction strategy, and
- the introduction of a HousingHub to foster engagement amongst all orders of government, non-profits and the private sector on creative housing solutions.

Differences between the provincial plan and UBCM recommendations include:

- The provincial plan does not provide for a taxation measure that would penalize rapid speculative re-sales, opting
 instead for the speculation tax. The province has however moved aggressively on several other measures to address
 speculation consistent with UBCM policy, including new reporting requirements for developers to limit tax evasion by
 those who resell condos before they have been built.
- On short-term rentals, the plan while providing for taxation of Airbnb units, does not provide additional supports for regulation to address local government challenges with enforcement.

UBCM will continue to advocate on behalf of members on this important issue, recognizing that the current housing crisis has built over several decades, and may take a comparably long time frame to meaningfully address. This year's Convention will



feature several sessions on housing, including a clinic on HousingHub, a forum on homelessness, a workshop on short-term rentals, and a Monday morning policy session.

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Structural Flood Mitigation Funding

Sept. 5, 2018

UBCM has launched the second intake of the Structural Flood Mitigation funding stream within the Community Emergency Preparedness Fund (CEPF). Program materials are now available.

All five CEPF funding streams are open, and program materials for all five streams are available on the CEPF webpage.

The Community Emergency Preparedness Fund (CEPF) is a suite of funding programs intended to enhance the resiliency of local governments and their residents in responding to emergencies. Funding is provided by the Province of BC and is administered by UBCM.

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Passenger Transportation Board Reviews Taxi Modernization Actions

Sept. 5, 2018

In response to the report on *Modernizing Taxi Regulation* by Hara Associates, the Passenger Transportation Board (PT), an independent tribunal, is reviewing three short-term actions referred to as the "Hara recommendations".

These include:

- Allowing existing licencees a one-time opportunity to increase their number of taxi vehicles (plates) by up to 15% in the near term;
- 2. Giving the industry the flexibility to lower fares below metered rates in off-peak hours for app-hailed taxi trips; and
- 3. Increasing efficiencies at shift change through separate day and night vehicles.

The Board will also be working on provincial standards for smartphone apps and data issues.

The PT Board is undertaking a three-stage process to review the three modernization actions.

- Consultations & online surveys with industry associations (licencees and drivers).
- Findings and Policy Setting these will set out Board findings on the three recommendations and set policies to guide implementation.
- · Implement policies through a streamlined process that is consistent with Board decision-making requirements.

The PT Board is currently concluding its consultations and will implement the one-time opportunity to increase supply in mid-September. As part of its consultation process, the Board has reviewed submissions from local governments to the Select Standing Companies on Crown Corporations inquiry into ridesharing in January 2018.

The Board's consultations are independent of any consultations that Government may undertake regarding legislative initiatives related to taxis and ridesharing.

Local governments and First Nations will have an opportunity to comment on individual applications in their area. The PT Board will publish all applications in their weekly bulletin every Wednesday.

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Funding & Resources Update

Sept. 5, 2018

Each month we provide an update on UBCM funding programs and information on other programs, events and resources that may be of interest to local governments and First Nations.

Local Government Program Services

Asset Management Planning Program: Matching grants of up to \$15,000.00 are available to support activities that advance local government's asset management planning or practices and that facilitate better integration of asset management planning with long term financial planning. The next application deadline is September 28, 2018.

Asset Management Training Subsidies are also available and will cover up to 50% of the registration fee for up to three staff per local government for eligible Asset Management BC NAMS training events.

Regional Community to Community Forum Program: Matching grants of up to \$5,000 are available to support elected officials and/or senior staff of neighbouring First Nations and local governments to meet to address issues of common concern. The 2018/19 C2C program has been enhanced to support coordinated approaches to emergency prevention, response and recovery, increase focus on reconciliation efforts, and to allow elected officials or senior staff to be eligible participants. The final application deadline for this year's program is October 19, 2018.

Community Emergency Preparedness Fund: This suite of funding programs is intended to enhance the resiliency of local governments and their residents in responding to emergencies. Application deadlines are as follows:

Emergency Social Services - October 5, 2018

Evacuation Route Planning - November 30, 2018

Emergency Operations Centres & Training - February 1, 2019

Flood Risk Assessment, Flood Mapping & Flood Mitigation Planning - February 22, 2019.

Structural Flood Mitigation - October 25, 2019

Other Funding

Connecting British Columbia: This program helps pay for infrastructure required to deliver high-speed Internet connectivity to rural and remote areas of the province, under two funding streams. Applications will be reviewed and assessed on a first come, first serve basis until available funds are committed.

CBT Arts & Culture Venue Grants: If your Columbia Basin organization is looking to make capital improvements to an arts and culture venue, this grant program may be for you. Deadline: September 13, 2018.



Municipal Asset Management Program: FCM's MAMP provides project funding to help local governments enhance their asset management practices for infrastructure assets such as roads, buildings, water supply and sanitation systems. Applications will be accepted until October 23, 2018.

Promoting a Healthy Drinking Culture in BC: Community Action Initiative is offering convening grants of up to \$15,000 to fund community dialogues around moderate-risk alcohol consumption. Grantees and their communities will be supported with alcohol-related resources and capacity-building tools, along with knowledge exchange opportunities. Applications are due by November 15, 2018.

Green Municipal Fund: This FCM program finances capital projects that improve air, water, and soil and reduce greenhouse gas emissions. Deadline for energy, waste, water and transportation capital projects is March 1, 2019.

First Nations Adapt Program: This federal program supports First Nation communities to assess and respond to climate change impacts on community infrastructure and emergency management. It prioritizes communities most impacted by sea level rise, flooding, forest fires, and winter road failures. Applications are reviewed on an ongoing basis.

Government Finance Officers Association of BC Asset Management Workshop

Date and Time: Monday, September 24th, 2018 – Tuesday, September 25, 2018 Location: Radisson Hotel Vancouver Airport, 8181 Cambie Rd, Richmond, BC

According to UBCM's results from the 2016 Gas Tax Fund Asset Management Baseline Survey, Status of Asset Management in B.C., 32% of local governments have not integrated asset management processes into long term financial planning. Of the 68% of BC local governments who have integrated asset management processes into their long term financial plans, more than half of the integrations were reported as being underdeveloped. This interactive 2-day comprehensive workshop will focus on the finance officer's role in the asset management process from the asset management framework to the capital plan and long term financial plan integration. Topics will include asset inventory, levels of service, full lifecycle cost model, prioritization, the infrastructure deficit, and funding the asset management plan. Participants will be provided with a workshop workbook and ample opportunity for group discussions.

Renewable Energy Transition Strategies: Practical Innovations for Urban Areas: This interactive course, designed for local government staff, elected officials, researchers, and individuals concerned about their energy future, runs from September 14 to December 8, 2018.

NAMS Asset Management Training: This 3-day training session (October 31-November 2, 2018, in Courtenay, BC) provides staff with a broad understanding of asset management practices and will equip them to develop and implement an asset management program in their local government. The \$1,650 registration is eligible for a 50% UBCM training subsidy for up to three registrants per local government.

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Special Resolution Seeks Cannabis Tax Sharing Agreement

Sept. 6, 2018

Among the resolutions admitted for debate at this year's Convention is a Special Resolution (SR1) that seeks to advance a short- and long-term cannabis excise tax revenue sharing strategy. This strategy is intended to guide the negotiation of a provincial-local government cannabis excise tax revenue sharing agreement.

UBCM has analyzed cannabis taxation schemes in number of jurisdictions where non-medical cannabis is currently legal or will soon become legal, including several U.S. states and Canadian provinces. Based on the findings of this research, and combined with UBCM's approach to cannabis excise tax revenue sharing, UBCM is proposing two strategies to guide the negotiation of a cannabis excise tax revenue sharing agreement with the Province.

The short-term strategy proposed as part of SR1 intends to adopt a revenue sharing framework that would entail the provincial government providing local governments with 40% (\$50 million) of the projected provincial cannabis excise tax revenue (\$125 million) over the first two years of legalization. Any revenue in excess of the \$125 million provincial projection would be shared 50-50 between the Province and BC local governments. Excise tax revenue would be distributed to BC local governments on a per capita basis, with all municipalities and regional districts receiving a minimum of \$10,000 regardless of population.

The proposed long-term strategy seeks to develop an agreement that explores the following options:

- Continue with the framework used in the first two years, particularly if projected costs and revenues are within a
 reasonable variance from the original projection; or,
- Determine the potential to increase the provincial sales tax on cannabis from 7% to not more than 10% with a commitment of this portion to local governments in place of excise sales tax revenue sharing.

SR1 and cannabis excise tax revenue sharing will form part of the discussion during the *Cannabis Legalization: A Joint Venture* session on Tuesday, September 11.

Background

In advance of the October 17, 2018, legalization of non-medical cannabis, the Province of British Columbia has signed on to the Federal-Provincial-Territorial Agreement on Cannabis Taxation. The two-year agreement will see the federal government retain 25% of excise tax revenue (up to a maximum of \$100 million per year), with the remaining 75% (or more) going to provinces and territories. The federal government increased the share of cannabis excise tax revenue to be transferred to provinces and territories from 50% to 75% in recognition of legalization's impacts on local governments.

The federal government has refrained from directly providing local governments a share of cannabis excise tax revenue, leaving that responsibility to provinces/territories. As of September 1, only Ontario and Quebec have completed cannabis taxation revenue sharing agreements with local governments.

In Ontario, local governments have agreed to \$40 million in cannabis excise tax revenue over 2 years, representing 40% of the projected provincial cannabis excise tax revenue (\$100 million). The Province of Quebec will be providing \$20 million of



its projected \$73 million in cannabis excise tax revenue to local governments over 2 years. The Province will also commit \$42 million towards public safety.

Based on the Federal-Provincial-Territorial Agreement on Cannabis Taxation, as well as their own projections, the Province of British Columbia expects to receive \$125 million in cannabis excise tax revenue over the first 2 years of legalization. The Liquor Distribution Branch has announced that a 15% mark-up will be applied to the price of cannabis, in addition to the federal excise tax. Non-medical cannabis will also be subject to the provincial sales tax and federal goods and services tax.

Through endorsed resolutions 2017-SR1, 2016-A3, and 2016-A2, UBCM's members have placed a high priority on cost recovery and equitable sharing of cannabis taxation revenue.

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New Program to Reduce Wildfire Risk, Impact

Sept. 10, 2018

The new Community Resiliency Investment (CRI) program will expand opportunities for local governments and First Nations to reduce the risk and impact of wildfires by applying FireSmart principles, Forests Minister Doug Donaldson announced at UBCM's Convention today.

"The CRI will replace the Strategic Wildfire Prevention Initiative with a significant acceleration in the pace of funding," announced Minister Donaldson, confirming \$50 million will be made available over the next three years, with \$10 million committed for this year.

For 2019, the CRI will have a scaled structure with up to \$25,000 or \$100,000 available per applicant, depending on demonstrated wildfire risk. Applicants may choose from a suite of eligible activities that best suit their communities' needs and priorities.

Projects funded under the FireSmart Community Funding & Support category of CRI will be for activities primarily within the applicant's jurisdiction. "Funds for activities on Crown lands in and around communities will be in addition to these amounts," said Minister Donaldson.

"The funding gap that made it difficult for some communities to take advantage of the previous program has been closed," he confirmed. Successful projects will receive 100% funding with no cost-sharing requirement.

In addition to wildfire prevention planning and fuel management projects, which have always been important to wildfire prevention, the scope has been expanded to include demonstration projects, training, public education and community engagement, interagency cooperation and development considerations.

For the first time, provincial funding will be available to First Nations for on-reserve fuel management projects. Also new, funding may be used to provide incentives to private land owners to conduct FireSmart activities on their properties.

UBCM will administer the program in collaboration with the BC Wildfire Service, First Nations' Emergency Services Society and the Forest Enhancement Society of BC, assisted by the BC FireSmart Committee.

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Advancing Local Government Relations with Indigenous Peoples

Sept. 10, 2018

A morning policy session at UBCM Convention Monday received an update on legislative advancements in Indigenous governance and how these changes will affect relationships between First Nations and local governments.

The first presentations of the morning saw Chris Lewis, Council Member for the Squamish Nation and Mike Furey, Chief Administrative Officer of Whistler, discussing their work together establishing and strengthening local government-togovernment relationships. Speaking about similar experiences, L Maynard Harry, founder & Principal Indigenous Analyst of Indigenous Insight, presenting along with Stewart Alsgard, Mayor of Powell River from 1999-2011, discussed the development of the historic Community Accord between the Tla'amin [sly-ah-mon] Nation and the City of Powell River.

Furey, Lewis, Alsgard and Harry all cited the importance of developing protocol agreements between municipal and First Nations governments, and emphasized the need for collaboration between neighbouring governments to increase the scope of services offered while decreasing the costs of service delivery for all governments.

In the second half of the session, delegates heard from panellists including Manny Jules, Chief Commissioner of the First Nations Tax Commission, Robert Louie, Chairman of the Lands Advisory Board, and Harold Calla, Executive Chair of the First Nations Financial Management Board. The trio spoke about how legislative mechanisms, established by the *First Nations Land Management Act* and the *First Nations Fiscal Management Act*, have empowered First Nations to profitably utilize the resources of their lands. In turn, this economic activity has created a proactive investment climate and has opened doors for increased collaboration and partnership with municipalities.

As speaker Harold Calla said, First Nations and local governments must continue to learn to work together to confront the wrongs of the past. He also warned that failure to do so imperils economic development for all communities.

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UBCM Supports Registry Identifying Land Owners

Sept. 10, 2018

As the provincial government continues to accept input on its draft *Land Owner Transparency Act* (LOTA) to curb anonymous and speculative investing in real estate, the Union of British Columbia Municipalities (UBCM) is indicating support for the proposed legislation and urges the province to use the data to support tax law enforcement.

As outlined by the government in June, LOTA would create a publicly accessible registry to clearly identify the true, beneficial owners of real estate in the province and prevent investors from hiding behind numbered companies, offshore and domestic trusts, and corporations.

UBCM's submission regarding the *Land Owner Transparency Act* was released this morning at a special session on affordable housing during UBCM's annual convention in Whistler.

UBCM's own Special Committee on Housing released a report of its own on BC's housing crisis earlier this year and recommended four key policy shifts:

- · a rental housing strategy to address low rental inventories
- a demand management strategy to reduce speculation and tax evasion
- · a comprehensive homeless strategy
- · a collaborative approach by all levels of government towards housing affordability.

While the proposed collection of data under LOTA on beneficial ownership is viewed as an important first step, and is in line with the committee's second recommendation, UBCM is further recommending the provincial and federal governments work together additionally on:

- · The publication of aggregate data on pre-sales
- Identifying additional data needs and actions to address tax avoidance in real estate.
- Ensuring better co-ordination of agencies responsible for monitoring and regulating the relations between property transactions and capital flows, including Canada Revenue Agency, FINTRAC, Canada's banks, and the Real Estate Council of BC.

"We commend the provincial government for beginning to take action to bring greater transparency to home ownership," says Chilliwack Mayor and UBCM Third Vice President Sharon Gaetz. "Knowing exactly who is purchasing home will help ensure that all real estate owners in the province pay their fair share of taxes. Closing loopholes and better transparency will lead to the kind of enforcement needed to slow speculative real estate purchases that are driving up prices in B.C. beyond what people can afford."

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Working Together to Advance Reconciliation

Sept. 10, 2018

The Province and UBCM have reaffirmed their commitment to working together toward reconciliation with Indigenous peoples in British Columbia. A renewed memorandum of understanding (MOU) between the Province and UBCM underscores the importance of the provincial government's relationship with local governments in fulfilling the commitment to reconciliation.

The renewed MOU supports working in partnership towards implementing the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples and the Truth and Reconciliation Commission's Calls to Action.

"A fundamental truth of reconciliation is the need to work together to right past wrongs and move forward in a direction that will benefit everyone," said Scott Fraser, Minister of

Indigenous Relations and Reconciliation. "This agreement strengthens the partnership between our government, municipalities and Indigenous communities so we can take that journey together."

In addition to reflecting governments' commitments to reconciliation, the MOU reaffirms both parties' commitment to regular discussions on matters that affect local government jurisdictions, including treaty negotiations and non-treaty agreements, as well as other initiatives with Indigenous communities.

"The level of consultation that has gone into the renewal of this MOU gives us confidence that its intent will be fulfilled," said Wendy Booth, UBCM president. "We welcome a stronger collaborative relationship in the vital undertaking of reconciliation with Indigenous peoples, and are ready to fulfill our role in this partnership."

The agreement highlights the need for local governments to continue developing relationships at a grassroots level with Indigenous governments and communities to create conversations and partnerships that will benefit everyone at the community level.

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Age-friendly Funding Program to Continue

Sept. 10, 2018

The Ministry of Health confirmed that additional funding is available to continue the Age-friendly Communities program. The next phase will also include a pilot program for Indigenous communities.

UBCM will continue to administer the program and the application deadline is November 2, 2018.

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New Child Care Funding Announced

Sept. 11, 2018

Today, the Honourable Katrine Conroy, Minister of Children and Family Development, announced two new funding programs to support local governments to better understand local child care needs and to develop new child care spaces in their communities.

The announcement highlighted the importance of partnerships in delivering child care in communities across BC, as well as the value of working with UBCM to administer funding directly to local governments.

The Community Child Care Planning program will provide funding for local governments to engage in child care planning activities in order to develop a community child care space creation action plan.

Through partnerships and engagement, funded projects will collect information regarding the child care needs of the community; create an inventory of existing child care spaces; identify space creation targets over the next 10 years; and identify actions that can be taken to meet those space creation targets. This funding is provided through the BC Ministry of Children and Family Development.

The Community Child Care Space Creation Program will award up to \$1 million to successful local governments to create new licensed child care spaces within their own facilities for children aged 0-5, with a focus on spaces for infants and toddlers. An estimated 1,370 spaces are to be created under the program.

This funding is provided through the Ministry of Children and Family Development under the Canada-British Columbia Early Learning and Child Care Agreement, which will provide a total of \$153 million over three years to improve the delivery of child care services in BC.

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RCMP Policing Structure Under Review

Sept. 11, 2018

Increasing policing complexity and impending RCMP unionization could make the current provincial policing structure unsustainable. Delegates at a UBCM convention session heard that the provincial government and RCMP are examining the viability of the current model, and in particular British Columbia's smallest RCMP detachments.

RCMP and provincial presenters indicated that the solution might involve creating larger regional RCMP detachments by centralizing and reducing the number of smaller detachments. RCMP Assistant Commissioner Eric Stubbs noted that the RCMP is actively examining the idea of creating policing hubs in British Columbia. While no decisions have been made, the RCMP will update local governments should there be any developments. There are currently 144 RCMP detachments in British Columbia.

UBCM expects that an update will be provided at the next RCMP Local Government Contract Management Committee (LGCMC) meeting. The LGCMC is a forum for consultation, analysis and communication regarding the management of the Agreement under which the RCMP provide local police services in BC.

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Moving Ahead on Cannabis Legalization

Sept. 11, 2018

Delegates received an update on the status of cannabis legalization in a policy session Tuesday afternoon at UBCM's Convention. The presentation outlined the policy work undertaken by the Joint Provincial – Local Government Committee on Regulation that was introduced at the 2017 UBCM Convention, along with the gaps in the legalization framework for BC.

Vancouver Councillor Kerry Jang and Mary Shaw, Executive Director of the provincial Cannabis Legalization and Regulation Secretariat reviewed corresponding federal, provincial and local government responsibilities with regard to legalized cannabis. The presentations by Jang and Shaw are available on this website.

Councillor Jang highlighted the cost impacts for local government that will result from legalized cannabis, including increased policing and bylaw enforcement; administration for licensing; land use management; and transition to the new legalized regime.

Key issues that are still in development include the completion of an excise tax revenue sharing agreement; regulating edibles; developing a full rural retail framework; and evaluating the provincial framework once implemented.

UBCM President Wendy Booth presented the background to UBCM's Special Resolution (SR1) on cannabis taxation that will be brought before delegates for consideration during the resolutions session on Thursday.

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Financing Reconciliation

Sept. 11, 2018

Addressing longstanding, problematic fiscal and governance gaps in public service delivery for Canada's local governments and First Nations was the focus of this Tuesday morning clinic. A distinguished panel of indigenous rights lawyers and First Nations and regional government leaders explained the origins and possible solutions to the current challenges communities face in service delivery.

The gap is a structural creation of the country's constitutional framework, which only recognizes the two senior levels of government and does not specifically mention municipalities. Solutions proposed at the clinic included embracing Constitutional values and changing the federal transfer payment system to more equitably benefit all communities, including First Nations.

Section 36 of the *Constitution Act* (1982) is meant to address equalization and regional disparities, promising all Canadians comparable levels of public services at reasonably comparable levels of taxation.

"First Nations have a difficult time resourcing on-reserve capital projects and the basic public services that the rest of Canada takes for granted," said Tony Bennett, Alberni-Clayoquot Regional District (ACRD) Director. They often lack access to safe water or fire protection, as two examples, and no mechanism for receiving the kinds of transfer payments that address these disparities in other parts of the country.

"The federal transfer payment system is intended to ensure quality public service delivery to all Canadians regardless of where they live," said Courtney Kirk, CAO of the Central Coast Regional District (CCRD), who described the \$75 billion in federal transfer payments made to provinces and territories and the \$6 billion specific to British Columbia.

Ad hoc service agreements with local governments have tried to bridge the gap, but are not a long-term answer.

"Treaty is the only mechanism for First Nations to join into regional governance and finance," said Bennett.

However, "many First Nations will not consider treaty, because there is no trust that the process will create an outcome that is acceptable to our people," said Travis Hall, Heiltsuk councillor and CCRD director, adding that "Local Government Act amendments are necessary to end the blatant exclusion of non-treaty nations and change the flawed system of representation."

"The current fiscal imbalance represents a meagre vision of the Canadian Constitution," said University of Saskatchewan professor and Canada Research Chair in Indigenous Rights, Dr. Dwight Newman. Arguing for the proactive, common sense embrace of Canada's constitutional values, he warned that a legal challenge will take too long for the urgency of the issue.

"We need a Section 36 solution," said Don Lidstone of Lidstone & Company Barristers & Solicitors.

Divisive and ignorant comments from the Canadian public are a frequent and disappointing reality when these conversations arise.



"The distinction between taxpayers and First Nations is a false one," said John Jack, ACRD Chair and Huu-ay-aht First Nation Councillor. "The road to reconciliation has to change these discussions."

"First Nations are not a threat," said Jack. "First Nations are an ally and will always be a neighbour."

The effort for fair fiscal compensation is the subject of Resolution B-150 and will be debated at this week's policy plenary.

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Housing Hub

Sept. 11, 2018

Earlier today Convention delegates heard about HousingHub, an initiative of BC Housing to increase the supply of affordable housing for middle-income earners. The goal of this recently developed office is to identify and advance innovative approaches to create affordable homes—both for rent and for purchase—in BC communities.

The HousingHub office works with non-profits and private developers, faith groups, property owners, federal and local governments, and Indigenous partners to locate, use, or repurpose, land in communities where affordability is an issue. The office provides a centre for community partners and private industry to collaborate on developing new construction or redeveloping existing sites for affordable housing purposes.

One of the goals of the office is to leverage low cost financing available to BC Housing to help build new affordable housing that does not require capital funding or ongoing operational funding.

HousingHub's Affordable Home Ownership Program has been developed to help low to middle income renters move out of rental units into homes available at below market costs. HousingHub is able to offer discounted home ownership opportunities by providing financing support for developers; building local partnerships (including expedited development approval processes with local governments and leveraging land from project partners); and providing a second interest free mortgage on title support to prospective home owners to make first mortgages more accessible and sustainable.

Anticipated benefits of the program include reducing or eliminating loan insurance costs attendant to high ratio mortgages. The program also provides a buffer against interest rate and market fluctuations.

One of the recently announced projects through the HousingHub will deliver affordable rental homes for seniors, adults with disabilities, and families in Saanich.

Working in partnership with the Capital Region Housing Corporation and the Independent Living Housing Society, HousingHub is helping to make five fully accessible ground-floor units available for people who need them, as well as office and gathering space for the society's programming. The society will select tenants for the five designated accessible units.

The project will also provide 73 affordable rental homes for people in the Capital Regional District. The four-storey building will contain 11 studio apartments, 38 one-bedroom apartments, 20 two-bedroom apartments and four three-bedroom apartments.

The Capital Regional District provided the land, and the Capital Region Housing Corporation will operate the building. The site is fully excavated, and the foundation will be poured in the coming weeks. Construction is anticipated to be complete early in 2020.

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Implementing Codes of Conduct

Sept. 12, 2018

Convention delegates considered ways councils and boards might effectively implement codes of conduct in a clinic Wednesday. Prince George Mayor Lyn Hall and Fraser Valley Regional District CAO Paul Gipps emphasized that the very process of developing codes of conduct helps to build cohesion and a common understanding among councils and boards.

"If you are looking at a cookie cutter approach, it will fail," said Hall, saying that the process to develop a code should take 8 months to a year. Prince George Council signs on to their code of conduct following each election in a public ceremony, and revisits the document throughout the term as new issues arise. Hall spoke to the importance of involving senior management in the process of development.

Gipps described the process the Regional District is following in order to complete a code of conduct in advance of the 2018 local government general election. Gipps noted that the transition period provided by the election cycle provides an ideal window for the introduction of code of conduct.

Fraser Valley Regional District developed its code of conduct through the work of an Internal Affairs committee of elected board members and staff. The committee drew upon resources developed by the Working Group on Responsible Conduct (WGRC), a joint effort of the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing, UBCM and the Local Government Management Association.

Gipps encouraged delegates not to be daunted by the process of developing a code of conduct. "In some ways, this is simple stuff. It is about how we want to have a conversation together. We don't want to stifle debate, but we want to manage it." He also said the committee made sure that each measure introduced in the draft code was backstopped with references to similar standards introduced in other communities.

The panel also included Lesley Scowcroft, Manager of Policy and Legislation with the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing. Scowcroft led delegates through resources that have been developed by the WGRC over the past year. Scowcroft described these resources as "foundational" for codes of conduct. These resources include a set of principles describing responsible conduct; a model code of conduct and a resource guide. All resources are available on LGMA's website.

Scowcroft also outlined the work ahead for the WGRC. Questions the working group will be exploring include how prescriptive a responsible conduct framework should be; how to keep ensure it remains meaningful; and how it fits within existing legislation.

A key aspect of the work ahead is the development of an enforcement model. The Working Group will consider how complaints handled, including who decides if a complaint is worthy of investigation; and who would undertake such an investigation.

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Land-use for Housing People Can Afford

Sept. 12, 2018

Representatives from the Province and BC Housing led delegates in a session exploring land-use tools available to local governments to support the development of affordable housing and rental housing in their communities in a session today.

One of the newest such tools available is the Residential Rental Tenure Zoning legislation enacted by the Province in April. The legislation provides local governments with the authority to zone for residential rental tenure. The legislation also empowers local governments to enact zoning bylaws that require new housing in residential areas to be developed as rental units and ensure that existing areas of rental housing are preserved. The new rental zoning authority can only be used where multi-family residential use is permitted and may be applied at scales that range from an entire city block to a percentage of a building. The zoning tenure is designed to be combined with pre-existing land-use tools such as density bonuses and housing agreements.

Also included in the session was the announcement of a Land-use Best Practices Guide that will be released in October by the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing. The document will offer practical policy direction, regulatory frameworks, and financial tools to help local governments of all sizes to deliver affordable housing.

The presentation was followed by small-group discussions focused around local approaches. Delegates shared experiences of trying to lower the cost of rental housing and concerns regarding the impact of increasing density in neighbourhoods and reflected on potential opportunities, such as the use of DCC's, for reducing the cost of housing.

The Community Excellence Awards recognize and celebrate UBCM members that have implemented projects and programs that demonstrate excellence in meeting the purposes of local government in BC. The awards are designed to profile promising practices and to create successful pathways and incentives for others to follow.

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Partnerships Responding to the Opioid Crisis

Sept. 12, 2018

Delegates explored new partnerships that have been developed to respond to the challenges posed by the opioid crisis. These approaches focus on the need to eliminate the stigma associated with illicit drug use and addiction and the development of deeper understanding of addiction as primarily a health issue.

Panelists also emphasized the importance of supporting those with addictions from treatment to the establishment of strong supports to prevent relapse.

Speakers from the Ministry of Mental Health and Addictions, the new Overdose Emergency Response Centre in Vancouver and the Vancouver Centre for Disease Control, Mental Health and Addictions described how a provincial, cross-ministry, collaborative approach evolved a new understanding of mental health and addiction, and crafted a new community-based model for addressing the mental health and substance use crisis.

Two media campaigns by the Ministry of Health illustrate this new understanding and approach. An early campaign used a fear-based approach to educate the public about the toxic arrival of fentanyl in the drug supply in 2016. A recent campaign altered the focus to change public perception of addicted populations by illustrating the diverse range of users and people at risk, beyond the stereotype of the Vancouver Downtown Eastside illegal substance user.

Sixty-four province-wide, inter-disciplinary action teams conducted research that identified four distinct user groups: recreational, occasional users; street-involved regular users; high functioning, hidden regular users; and First Nations users. This knowledge helped inform the more humanizing second campaign, and an understanding that different groups will require different approaches and supports.

The Overdose Emergency Response Centre that launched in Vancouver in late 2017 was designed to focus overdose emergency response in the ER with dedicated space for acute overdose risk case management, treatment and recovery. The Centre's staff of medical professionals works collaboratively with family and survivors with lived experience of overdoses, and agencies responding to the crisis. The success of this approach led the province to announce a Community Action Team program in 2018.

Twenty Community Action Teams have been funded in high-overdose communities to build teams of municipal representatives, First Nations, affected families, health care and housing professionals, police and others. These teams identify local at-risk populations, reach out to offer information and resources and break the isolation surrounding users, and provide structured supports to enter and complete treatment, and to stay on long term, possibly life-long treatments such as suboxone and methadone.

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Take Action on Climate Change: Weaver

Sept. 12, 2018

BC Green Party Leader, Dr. Andrew Weaver, implored the UBCM membership to hear and respond to the abundance of scientific warnings and to work to renew the foundations of BC's economy in the face of the deepening climate crisis.

Weaver detailed the environmental and economic risks of climate change, saying that "between 20 and 50% of the world's species, almost certainly including the iconic Fraser River Sockeye" will become extinct this century.

The BC Green caucus has been working with the NDP government to develop a clean growth strategy for BC. Weaver emphasized the need for such a strategy to be regionalized and developed in partnership with indigenous peoples. Research papers exploring such a strategy were issued this summer. It is expected the first phase of the clean growth strategy released in the fall.

"Building healthy, safe secure communities needs to be prioritized in a changing world," said Weaver. "I believe we can do it, and I hope you do too."

Taking Action on Housing Affordability

Sept. 12, 2018

UBCM President Wendy Booth updated delegates on UBCM's advocacy, program delivery and collaboration with the Province during an address Wednesday.

Booth praised the response of local governments and the Province working together responding to the 2018 flood and wildfire seasons. Noting that all levels of government need to work together on climate action, she also spoke to the need for continued investment in programs that support climate adaptation. Booth also expressed appreciation for the provincial staff that have been available throughout Convention to meet with delegates and discuss this year's response.

UBCM's efforts to advocate membership positions on the current housing crisis also featured in the address. In February, UBCM released a strategy calling for a complete renewal of housing policy by all levels of government to restore affordability and address the challenge of homelessness. "We have reached a crisis point where substantive changes are needed," said Booth.

UBCM advocated a balanced approach to address both supply of, and demand for, housing. On the supply side, communities across BC are facing a shortage of purpose-built rental housing and supportive housing. Booth noted policies over the past decade have focused almost exclusively on increasing supply have so far failed in delivering affordability. Greater attention, she said, needs to be given to the forces driving demand, including the impact of foreign and domestic speculation.

Booth praised the quality of consultation undertaken by the Province with UBCM over the past year, noting the successes of collaborative efforts on campaign finance reform and cannabis legalization. Local governments remain frustrated, though, by the prospective impacts of the Employer Health Tax and changes to the Fire Safety Act on local government finances.

The past year has also featured significant transfers of federal and provincial funding to local government infrastructure through a number of programs. These investments are playing a significant role in supporting local governments in the renewal and expansion of core facilities in BC communities.

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Infrastructure, Housing Highlight Minister's Address

Sept. 12, 2018

New investments in community infrastructure, a development approval process review to remove barriers to building the affordable housing that people need, new housing funding opportunities for local governments and First Nations, and the success of the Province's Building BC: Rapid Response to Homeless Program were highlighted in Municipal Affairs and Housing Minister Selina Robinson's address to UBCM delegates today.

Minister Robinson announced the launch of funding programs for everything from new recreation centres to improved Internet service. The newly launched programs – the Community, Culture and Recreation fund, and the Rural and Northern Communities fund – are part of the Investing in Canada Infrastructure Program, a partnership with the federal government.

Robinson also encouraged delegates to take advantage of new Building BC housing funds that will support the efforts of municipalities, regional districts and First Nations to bring more affordable housing across B.C.

Minister Robinson also recognized the 22 local governments who are partnering with the Province to build modular housing for people in need.

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Social Media and Democracy

Sept. 13, 2018

The growing influence of social media, what it is doing to democracy and how it can be used to better serve local government constituents was explored by Port Coquitlam Mayor Greg Moore in a clinic Thursday.

Social media platforms have long been touted as paths to the democratization of information and freedom of expression, dramatically increasing levels of civic access and political engagement.

The quality of that engagement has also been profoundly changed, and not always for the good, according to Moore. Misinformation and hate fester in social media and threaten to drown out the genuine discussion of ideas, he said.

Moore referenced the many examples of elected officials being harassed and even leaving Facebook in response to persistently ugly online comments. He suggested that the increase in social media attacks on elected officials is likely a factor in the high number of Mayors and Councillors in Metro who have declined to run for election this year. "We need to step up as community leaders, lead by example, and call out this abuse."

The fast-paced and often unverified information feeds of Twitter and Facebook are influencing conventional print and broadcast media. Television networks now treat political news as they do sports coverage, using the same formats of debate panels, splashy graphics, and countdown clocks, pushing a paradigm of winners and losers in matters of civil society.

But as Moore stated, politics is not like sports, which implies that there is a winner and a loser. "One of the traits of local government elected officials is that they try to find solutions that benefit everyone."

"Facebook's number one priority and legal obligation is to make money for their shareholders, monetizing everything they can," Moore reminded delegates.

Moore wondered at the what self-regulation or independent regulatory approach may be required to move social media towards fulfilling its promise of a paradise for free speech and anti-censorship.

He concluded by offering some tips for using social media platforms as an elected official or as a community. Most importantly, he said "have a game plan for social media," a strategy that outlines your intentions for utilizing the platform.

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Professional Reliance Review

Sept. 13, 2018

Thursday morning, UBCM delegates were given an update on a recent independent assessment of public confidence in qualified professionals (QP's) working in the natural resource sector. The Professional Reliance Review resulted in 121 recommendations to improve the professional, technical and ethical standards that are applied to private sector QP's and their self-governing professional organizations.

Government relies on these QP's and their oversight bodies to manage natural resources throughout the province. The recommendations from the review will have a substantial impact on the legislation and statutes that govern natural resource management in the province. In fact, 87 of the 121 recommendations propose changes to 9 regulatory regimes that pertain to natural resource management; these include the *Forest Range and Practices Act* and the *Water Sustainability Act*.

It was noted by many delegates that public trust in the forestry and hydrology sectors has declined over the past decade. Session participants noted that it is difficult to ensure proper deployment of qualified professionals and to ensure that opinions and reports provided by QP's are made with local interests in mind.

Delegates also cited concerns lacking confidence in the disciplinary process of workers. Representatives from the Province noted that the goal of the review was to provide recommendations that aim to increase public trust in natural resource decisions and operations by increasing transparency of regulators and establishing greater certainty for industry.

The Province has committed to action two report recommendations in the short-term. The first will be to introduce legislation this fall that will regulate qualified professionals. The second will establish an independent office of professional regulation and oversight to enforce the act. The meta-regulators role would be ensuring that oversight bodies for qualified professionals including forest professionals, engineers and geoscientists, agrologists, biologists and technicians are held to a higher standard; in essence it is a regulator of current regulators.

The review included a public engagement, which received over 2,200 feedback forms from the public, 102 stakeholder submissions and over 1,800 surveys from qualified professionals.

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Wilkinson Pledges Flipping Tax Bill

Sept. 13, 2018

In his first address to the UBCM Convention as Opposition Leader, BC Liberal Leader Andrew Wilkinson pledged that his party would work in partnership with local government.

Wilkinson invoked the legacy of the government led by then-Premier Gordon Campbell, which brought in the *Community Charter* and UBCM administration of the Federal Gas Tax Fund. The Liberal Leader also contrasted the Liberal track record in government with recent NDP-led initiatives like the Employers Health Care Tax.

On housing policy, Wilkinson was critical of the proposed Speculation Tax introduced in the 2018 provincial budget, saying the tax penalizes British Columbians. The Leader committed to introducing a bill before the Legislature on the flipping of presale condos. Wilkinson also pledged that a Liberal government would generate "a massive increase in [housing] supply." A key step in the achievement of this increase is expediting permitting processes by local government. "If places like Langley and Langford can do it, so can every municipality," said Wilkinson.

Other measures proposed by the Liberal Leader included a complete overhaul of ICBC and a new wildfire recovery and prevention program.

BYLAW NO. 1842

A bylaw to amend and consolidate the "Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Fort Fraser Local Community Establishment Bylaw"

WHEREAS the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako has enacted the "Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Fort Fraser Local Community Establishment Bylaw 642, 1990" that since has been subsequently amended;

AND WHEREAS the Regional District wishes to amend and consolidate the existing establishment bylaw;

AND WHEREAS the Regional District may amend a Local Service Establishment Bylaw under Section 349 of the *Local Government Act*;

AND WHEREAS the Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing has consented under Section 244 (2) of the *Local Government Act* to waive the requirement for assent of the electors;

NOW THEREFORE, the Board of Directors of the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako, in open meeting assembled enacts as follows:

- A. All sections of Bylaw 642, 1990 "Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Fort Fraser Local Community Establishment Bylaw" are hereby repealed and replaced with the following:
 - 1. The Fort Fraser Local Community (the "Local Community") consisting of the geographical area shown outlined on the map attached to this by-law as Schedule "A:, established by bylaw 223 is hereby continued.
 - 2. The Fort Fraser Local Community Commission (the "Commission") established by bylaw 223 is hereby continued in the manner prescribed by this bylaw.
 - 3. The Commission shall consist of:
 - a. Four elected Commissioners, and
 - b. The Regional Board Director for Electoral Area "D".
 - 4. Commissioners must be qualified to hold the office of Regional Board Director and shall reside in the Local Community.
 - 5. The elections for Commissioners shall be held every four (4) years at the same time as the general local elections, referred to in Section 52 (a) of the Local Government Act.
 - 6. The Term of office of the Commissioners shall be four (4) years or until their successors are elected under Section 5 of this by-law.
 - 7. A quorum of the Commission shall be three (3) Commissioners.
 - 8. The Commission shall hold an annual general meeting no later than the second Monday of January.



- The Commissioners, at their annual general meeting, shall elect a Chairperson and a Vice-Chairperson.
- 10. The time and place of the Commissioners' meetings shall be decided by resolution of the Commission.
- 11. Elected Commissioners seats may become vacant through death, incapacity or resignation. The Regional District Chief Election Officer must hold a by-election for commissioners to fill the vacant seats if there are fewer than three remaining commissioners.
- 12. A Commissioner shall be paid the half day approved meeting rate as described on bylaw 1837 "A Bylaw for Directors' Remuneration" on or after January 1st, 2019 and before that time \$118.00 for attendance at each Commission meeting. Commissioners shall be reimbursed for any reasonable travel expenses as described in bylaw 1837 "A Bylaw for Directors' Remuneration" as if the Commissioner were an Electoral Area Director.
- 13. The Board hereby delegates to the Commission the administrative powers of the Board with respect to the duties listed below in this section for the local community of Fort Fraser. The powers and duties delegated are:
 - For the street lighting service, the Commission shall request new lights and report to the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako when repair or maintenance is required for existing lights;
 - For the water and sewer services, the Commission shall recommend levels of user charges to be established by bylaw of the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako and extent of requisition to be collected by way of frontage taxes or parcel taxes;
 - c) The Commission shall recommend to the Regional District the undertaking of capital projects;
 - d) The Commission shall provide to the Regional District a recommendation on all capital and operating budget matters no later than January 31st each year; and
 - e) The Commission shall provide such other recommendations and advice to the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako as the Commission deems desirable regarding the provision of services or matters affecting the local community generally.
 - f) The operational, maintenance, and regulatory functions of the water and sewer service shall be performed by staff of the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako in conformance with Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako policy/government regulation.
 - g) Despite the provisions of sections above, the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako retains the right of approval of operational rules, procedures and policies, and the levels of fees and other charges to be established by bylaw of the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako or taxes collected by requisition.
- 14. The Corporate Officer and Chief Financial Officer of the Regional District or his/her designate shall be the Corporate Officer and Chief Financial Officer of the Local Community.

- 15. The Commission shall, to the extent applicable, be governed by the Procedure Bylaw of the Regional District as amended from time to time.
- B. This bylaw may be cited for all purposes as "Fort Fraser Local Community Establishment Consolidation and Amendment Bylaw No. 1842, 2018."
