POWERPOINT PRESENTATION – Rory McKenzie, Director of Environmental Services RE: Knockholt Landfill Phase 3 Expansion Project

Rory McKenzie, Director of Environmental Services provided a PowerPoint Presentation. Started in 2016 and finished in 2017.

Knockholt Landfill Phase 3 Expansion Project Purpose of Project

- Develop a new Phase of the landfill footprint (3a) with an estimated lifespan of 7 years;
- Phases 3b and 3c to be developed in the future giving Phase 3 an overall lifespan of 33 years;
- Annual landfilled tonnage approximately 15,000 metric tonnes;
- Natural clay liner;
- Expansion area 7,500 m².

Phase 3 - 2016 construction works includes the following:

- Go beyond the original plan to only pre-develop the bottom half of Phase 3 and predevelop all of Phase 3. Excavate, haul and stockpile 9,000 m³ (1200 tandem loads) of topsoil from Phase 3 (value \$480, 000);
- This will be enough topsoil for final cover of Phases 1, 2, and 3;
- Excavate, haul and stockpile 12,000 m³ of un-useable clay (due to high moisture content) from Phase 3 and place in Phase 4 borrow pit area;
- Slope and ditch Phase 3 so it will drain and dry up for the construction year of 2017.

2016 Budget and Expenditures:

- Budget \$400,000,
- Expenditures:
 - o Engineering/Geotechnical \$14,435,
 - o Equipment \$ 77,110,
 - Total spent on project in 2016 \$91,545.

Phase 3(a) construction works 2017 include the following:

- Excavate, haul and place 20,000 m³ of good quality clay for final cover on Phase 1 and Phase 2;
- Excavate, haul and place remaining 10,000 m³ of clay in Phase 4 borrow pit;
- Make two 75 m long perforated HDPE (dr11) pipes using thermal fusion technology and tie into the existing manholes for leachate collection;
- Place non-woven geotextile and 1000 m³ drain rock on HDPE pipe and build herringbone drainage lines to the pipe;
- Work done over and above original plan;
 - Build 250 metres of all-weather road 8 metres wide from scales to the new turning pad;
- Build a 1200 m² all-weather turning pad for trucks to turn around on and dump garbage into Phase 3(a) the pad will be recycled for the next pad in Phase 3(b)
- Haul 3000 m³ of topsoil and place it on Phase 1 & 2 in a 30 cm spread
- > The road, turning pad and placement of topsoil were all done within the budget.

POWERPOINT PRESENTATION – Rory McKenzle, Director of Environmental Services RE: Knockholt Landfill Phase 3 Expansion Project (CONT'D)

2017 Project Budget and Expenditures:

- Budget \$350,000;
- Expenditures: HDPE pipe and thermal fusion \$19,208;
- Geotextile and delivery \$6,458;
- Total for out of RDBN expenditures \$25,666;
- Expenditures within the RDBN:
 - o Equipment \$207,610;
 - Drain rock, blast rock and gravel \$77,305;
 - Project management (RDBN) \$4,620.83 (OT) for 6 weeks vs contract manager at \$8,000 per week;
 - o misc. expenses \$4,000;
- Total expenditures in the RDBN \$293,535.83;
- Year to date costs for 2017 \$319,201.83;
- Projected final costs \$330,000.

Director Repen commented that the Knockholt Landfill Phase 3 Expansion Project information should be provided to the public for information.

Discussion took place regarding the amount of top soil that is on location at the Knockholt Landfill and that there is sufficient top soil to cover Phase 1, 2 and 3 during closure works along with future Phase development. Mr. McKenzie spoke of the need to keep the soil onsite for future use.

Director Repen spoke of the thermal fusion technology utilized to fuse the HDPE pipes together and questioned if there would be an option for the Regional District to partner with municipalities to purchase the technology for use on projects throughout the region. Mr. McKenzie noted that the Regional District does not have a high demand for the technology but could potentially research options to contribute at the Regional Board's direction.

Director Thiessen thanked Mr. McKenzie and expressed his appreciation for the report and presentation in regard the Knockholt Phase 3a project. Director Beach also noted that the management of the project and attention to budget details was greatly appreciated. Chair Fisher spoke to the importance of the Waste Management Committee receiving technical information in regard to the project. Mr. McKenzie noted that the presentation was to assist in identifying the economical manner in which the RDBN landfills and addresses the lifespan of a landfill. He spoke of the benefits of the location and space available for the RDBN landfills and also the natural materials at the sites that provides a significant cost savings to the Regional District. This information will also be beneficial in the RDBN Solid Waste Management Plan review process.

Chair Fisher thanked Mr. McKenzie for his presentation.

DISCUSSION ITEM

Solid Waste Management Plan

Mr. McKenzie provided an overview of his October 11, 2017 memo titled "Solid Waste Management Plan Project Schedule." In the teleconference meeting with Tetra Tech Canada, October 10, 2017, discussions took place regarding the formation of the Advisory Committee and the three options of structuring the committee: Technical Members Committee, Public Members Committee or a combination of both a Technical and Public Members Committee and the consensus was that one committee be comprised of both technical experts and public members would be the most beneficial. Mr. McKenzie mentioned that he has reviewed the Ministry of Environment's Guide to Solid Waste Management Planning that committee members will also need to review. He mentioned that all information in regard to the SWMP review process and Advisory Committee will be brought forward to the Regional Board for consideration.

 - Municipalities CAO/CFO/Engineers/Operations Managers;
 - Members of the Public Expression of Interest Media Release
 - Regional Board to review Expressions of Interest received and determine Advisory Committee public members;
 - A component of the Expression of Interest will include the ability to provide comments.
- > Meeting details will be determined moving forward.

Director Repen brought forward challenges regarding staff capacity for municipal representatives on the Advisory Committee.

Janette Derksen, Deputy Director of Environmental Services noted that in discussions with Tetra Tech Canada to prepare for Stage One of the project and to prepare the site visits occurring October 24-26, 2017 it was decided that the meetings would take place at the Transfer Stations and possibly at Municipal Offices. She will provide an invitation and itinerary to the Regional Board of Directors. Mr. McKenzie commented that the consultants would be coming to the region to review RDBN infrastructure and recycling options for the SWMP.

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RECOMMENDATION (All/Directors/Majority) 1. That the Board of Directors receive the memorandum titled, "Solid Waste Management Plan Summary of Work Completed", dated December 14, 2017.

Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Media Release - Solid Waste Management Planning

The Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako (RDBN) is updating its Solid Waste Management Plan (SWMP), a legally binding document that is mandated by the province for all regional districts. The purpose of the SWMP is to provide regional districts with a guiding document that will direct the Region's solid waste management activities over the next 10 years, while also considering longer-term objectives and opportunities.

Solid Waste Management in B.C. is continuously evolving, necessitating updates of solid waste management plans to reflect changes that are happening in the solid waste industry. Change's that affect the management of solid waste are the growing B.C. population and consumer demand for product. It is also noted that British Columbians are increasingly conscious of the need to "reduce and reuse" in a variety of measures. A growing number of Product Stewardship programs exists in BC to take responsibility for end-of-life product management.

Currently, the RDBN is working with Tetra Tech Canada, a team of solid waste management consultants, to review and update of the existing SWMP to better reflect the current and planned diversion and management method for the region. The existing plan was adopted in 1996 and was successful in its time to develop and manage waste materials from the consumers in the region to its end of life in either the region's landfills or recycling depots.

There have been significant changes in the waste management landscape in the last twenty-one years. Other changes include many Extended Producer Responsibility (EPR) Programs such as the Printed Paper and Packaging, Used Oil Management and Electronic Products stewardship programs. The new SWMP will lay out how we will recycle, compost and dispose of our garbage for the next 10-20 years. The review of the SWMP will focus on: waste reduction, waste diversion, organics, the financial aspect to solid waste management and the possibility of pursuing zero waste in our region.

Updating the SWMP requires regional participation through an advisory committee and public perception surveys. The advisory committee will be made up of public, local government and technical representatives. The committee will be working together from January to June of 2018 in monthly meetings located in Burns Lake. The Committee will be asked to review reports outside of the meetings in preparation for the meeting dates. Two surveys will be released, one in December 2017 and another in spring 2018, to ask questions about the public perception of solid waste management in the RDBN.

Any interested citizens may apply to be part of the Advisory Committee for the Solid Waste Management Plan review and update. If you are interested or invested in recycling and waste management for our Region, the RDBN invites you to be part of this process by filling out an Expression of Interest form. The RDBN acknowledges the distances that will need to be traveled within the Regional District for these meeting and as such there will be remuneration for mileage and meals as required for committee meetings. Meetings will likely be held during the day with a meal provided during the mid-day break. Expressions of Interest forms will be due by Friday, December 15, 2017.

Subject: Recycle BC's Proposed Program Changes

The Environmental Services Department had requested a summary report on the Recycle BC Consultation process that occurred in New Westminster on November 15 and 16, 2017 regarding the proposed changes that are being made and how they may affect the recycling groups in our region. Maura Walker, one of the RDBN's Solid Waste Management Planning consultant's attended the recycling workshops and reported to the RDBN on the key changes that may occur in 2018 and 2019. Please see attached report.

The RDBN is working towards building a regional framework for recycling in our region and hope to work with Recycle BC in regards to approving more depots to come on board with either curbside collection or depot collection contracts. This will hopefully minimize some of the subsidies that the RDBN pays out annually to our regional recycling groups.

Staff have had conversations with the regional recycling groups and it is known that the incentive rates that are given to Recycle BC contracted depots are not sufficient to cover 100% of the program. Staff will be working with Recycle BC to identify more opportunities for depot and curb-side status in our region for 2018 and 2019 in hopes that there will be more recycling opportunities in our regional district.

SUBJECT: Recycle BC's proposed program changes

1. Background

Based on 3 years of program performance data and the upcoming expiration of the majority of their collector contracts, Recycle BC (formerly MMBC) is proposing changes to the contractual requirements and the financial incentives offered to local governments that provide collection services on behalf of Recycle BC.

This memo summarizes, in point form, the key changes being proposed.

2. Curbside Collection

- Financial Incentives
 - No change to education top up (\$0.75 per curbside household/yr, plus \$0.25 per household if depots are also provided)
 - Admin top up reduced from \$2.50 to \$1.75/household/yr if collection is provided by inhouse service providers and \$1.10 if provided by contracted service providers
 - o Collector financial incentives to be increased across the board
 - Incentive varies based on collection type (SS vs. MS, cart vs. other) and density
 - Most significant contamination issues are associated with cart-based, singlestream collection (double other single stream models)
 - Range is from \$33.40 /household/yr for SS cart-based, high density to \$\$42.80/household/yr for MS, low density
- Game changer: New curbside programs must meet the following criteria:
 - A curbside garbage collection program was in place by May 2014.
 - The community represents an incorporated municipality.
 - The community has a minimum population of 5,000 residents
- Phasing out use of single-use blue bags (by Jan 2019)
- Need to include Recycle BC logo on new containers
- Recycle BC would have the right to require advance approval of major promotion and education material, including depot signs, regardless of whether it includes the Recycle BC logo.
- Voluntary consolidation is permitted

Note: In a phone conversation with Brendan McShane a few weeks in advance of the Recycle BC workshop, he suggested that Recycle BC would be willing to consider curbside communities on the

Hwy 16 corridor since they are already servicing the area. This, however, is not a commitment and would need to be explored further.

3. Depot Collection

- Depots must be staffed when open and secure when closed (no change from original requirements)
- Depots must be sufficiently staffed to ensure:
 - o Interaction with residents --contamination reduction and ICI segregation
 - o Regularly check program material
 - Remove improperly sorted and unacceptable material
- Recycle BC would have the right to require advance approval of major promotion and education material, including depot signs, regardless of whether it includes the Recycle BC logo.
- Reduced the liability insurance requirement from \$5million to \$2million
- Collected material be stored in such a way that material quality is not impacted by inclement weather, such as rain and snow.
- Financial Incentives
 - No change to education top up (\$0.75 per depot household /yr if no curbside)
 - Resident Education Top Ups must be used for associated promotion and education activities
 - o Plastic bags/overwrap increasing from \$175/t to \$500/t
 - o Foam increasing from \$175/t to \$600/t
 - o Glass containers increasing from \$80/t to \$90/t
 - Currently 2 depot incentives: one for communities with curbside, another for communities without
 - **Game changer**: for government-run depots where there is curbside collection of PPP, the per tonne payment for paper, cardboard and containers is being eliminated
 - If there is no curbside, the following incentives are offered:
 - Paper and cardboard: \$80/tonne (baled = \$110/t)
 - Containers: \$130/tonne (baled = \$110/t)
- Based on the above game changer, MMBC is proposing that there is 3 options for local governments that have both depot and curbside:

1. Direct to curbside/multi-family

- o Recycle BC's preferred option
- o Paper, cardboard and containers no longer accepted at depot
- Direct residents to make use of curbside/multi-family service --unlimited volumes at residence collection site

2. Manage independently

- Accept paper, cardboard and containers but manage and market independently of program (Note: this option is not recommended by MWA due to the increasing difficulty in marketing recyclable materials)
- Voluntary decision to duplicate service –cannot alternate option based on market conditions

3. Collect under Recycle BC program without incentives

- o Accept paper, cardboard and containers
- Recycle BC would pick up at depots, manage post-collection including processing --no payment for collection
- o Requirements on contamination, ICI etc. will apply
- Beginning in April 2018, MMBC will be piloting the collection of multi-laminate packaging at depots and will pay \$175/tonne (voluntary participation). If successful, they will require all depots to begin collecting multi-laminates separately and will pay \$500/t

4. In Summary

The above noted changes to the Recycle BC program are proposed and feedback is currently being collected. Based on unofficial discussions at the Recycle BC workshop, it's likely that the proposed financial changes (i.e., the incentives) will not change because Recycle BC's budget has already been approved by their Board. However, other terms may change based on feedback from collectors and the MoE.
