Chair Thiessen welcomed Tom Barnes, CEO and Maria Creighton, CFO Municipal Insurance Association of BC.

Mr. Barnes and Ms. Creighton provided a video and PowerPoint Presentation.

Mr. Barnes spoke of some local governments having a Reimbursement Bylaw addressing coverage for elected officials when personally sued. He noted the importance of remembering that a Board speaks with one voice after a debate, resolution and a vote. Ms. Creighton commented that a communication plan can provide guidance and contacting the CAO prior to having conversations or discussions will also assist in determining direction.

- > Under promise + over deliver = reasonable expectations
 - More tips for managing public expectations
 - 1. Understand who the party is and what is important to them
 - 2. Confirming letters/emails
 - 3. Develop an invariable practice
 - 4. Keep good notes
 - 5. Remain professional and take the high road
 - 6. Avoid doing or saying anything that you would be embarrassed to see show up in an affidavit before a judge.

Director Bachrach spoke of the use of Facebook and personal/corporate business pages. He noted that personal pages provide more opportunity to interact and respond to people. Mr. Barnes commented that risk recognition and managing the risk is important.

Discussion took place regarding MIABC Risk Management Grants. Mr. Barnes provided an overview of the grant process.

Chair Thiessen thanked Mr. Barnes and Ms. Creighton for attending the meeting.

Chair Thiessen spoke of the importance of the Lakes Timber Supply Area (TSA) Timber Supply Review (TSR) to the region.

Director Riis-Christianson questioned the following:

- The weight and impact of public comments to the Chief Foresters determination of the Allowable Annual Cut (AAC).
 - Ms. Nichols noted that the sensitivity analysis conducted is based on comments that were received. Community, land base and socio-economic concerns have a strong bearing on her decision.
- An update in regard to the science used for the information package provided to the Chief Forester.
 - Mr. Prasad provided an overview:
 - Inventory was updated in 2016
 - Different stands are updated annually
 - Permanent sample plots are used to monitor growth of old and young stands to ensure modeling is on track
 - Analysis was conducted by a vigorous peer group using the best minds and the best available information
 - The information used is the most up to date information possible.

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DELEGATION (CONT'D)

MINISTRY OF FORESTS, LANDS, NATURAL RESOURCE OPERATIONS AND RURAL DEVELOPMENT –RE: Lakes Timber Supply Area Timber Supply Review (Cont'd)

- Ms. Nichols noted that the following is also included:
 - Aerial and ground forest health surveys
 - Any cumulative effect assessments conducted on the area
 - Wildlife habitat assessments and monitoring
 - Forest and range effectiveness programs results
 - Values of Forest Range Practices Act (FRPA)
 - Most completed on an annual/biannual basis
- In regards to socio-economic it has been suggested that job losses are conservative, How and what methodology is used to determine the socio-economic impacts?
 - Utilized FLNRORD staff to determine the cubic meters and the potential impacts to jobs – which will be determined by the forest companies
 - Ms. Nichols noted that wood does flow in and out of the area depending on the trading of wood to support the various mills
 - Socio-economic assessment also looked at primary and secondary jobs and multiplier affects built in the modeling.

Director Layton requested clarification on:

- The impacts of moving from volume based to area based salvaging to the AAC in cubic meters.
 - Mr. Prasad commented on the proportion of the Timber Harvesting Land Base (THLB) affected has a direct proportional effect to the AAC.
- Science completed in regard to how much better managed stands are closer to harvest date vs. mother nature?
 - Ms. Nichols spoke of two types of plots:
 - Permanent sample plots
 - In mature timber
 - Sets growth and yield rates
 - Young stem monitoring plot program
 - Going into young managed stands
 - Ensure yield projections are for managed stands second growth – plantation stands
 - Ensure growth projection and if needed recalculate yield to go into modeling.
- Need to be proactive and is there recommendations to mitigate the intensively managed stands sooner than 60 years
 - Ms. Nichols discussed:
 - Timber Supply Review is most sensitive to fastest rejuvenation.
 - Forest Genetics
 - "Results" silviculture program
 - Small amount of fertilization being tried
 - Information built into the growth and yield

Director Bachrach questioned the social choice being asked of the public?

- Ms. Nichols commented that the base graphs show the live volume
- The current practice is utilizing live and dead volumes of fiber
- There is potential dead volume that could be utilized depending on milling and other opportunities and could assist with timber supply
- Some pellet plants utilizing deciduous fiber and some facilities are looking at opportunities moving forward
- Ms. Nichols spoke of being realistic about potential opportunities and a balanced decision making process.



DELEGATION (CONT'D)

Director Brienen spoke of the 2014 timber swap that occurred with the sawmill in Quesnel and Houston and the apprehension. He spoke of the interest today in the Discussion Paper. He requested that it would be very beneficial to include an acronym definition appendix in the discussion paper. Ms. Nichols commented that it has been excellent to have the interest in the process that is taking place and it is important for people to have an understanding of the process.

Chair Thiessen thanked Mr. Snetsinger in his past role as Chief Forester and Ms. Nichols in her present role as Chief Forester for being open to discussions in regard to issues and concerns.

Director Funk asked:

- Has there been a consideration to the shelf life of the Mountain Pine Beetle (MPB) wood and to harvesting it all until it is no longer salvageable?
 - Ms. Nichols noted that the shelf life for the MPB is different in different areas of the province
 - Use the dead wood not burn it except for wildfire mitigation and fuel management consideration.
- Take aways from the May 1 Public Meeting in Burns Lake
 - People looking for information
 - Stewardship in the TSR
 - Job effects
 - Specific questions of the Chief Forester how conduct analysis?
 - Discussion Paper is not the AAC determination Chief Forester's process moving forward to determine the AAC
 - Having information explained.

Director Layton requested access to the summary of the fiber available in the TSA. The District FLNRORD office can provide the information.

Ms. Nichols spoke to clarification of the volume base to area base changes, that while the TSA has been reduced, the wood is still available to harvest under different tenures.

Alternate Director Spooner brought forward diversity in regard to the use of fiber. Ms. Nichols mentioned that it is not included in the AAC determination but she does work with researchers from around the world about various opportunities and emerging initiatives for wood fiber. She spoke of the provincial and federal governments programs in regard to research, delivery and commercialization of biofuels. Ms. Nichols noted she has spoken to supporting communities with new initiatives and opportunities concerning the changing wood fiber basket. Chair Thiessen spoke of the importance of having support for communities to develop variations of community energy systems.

The Regional Board thanked Mr. Snetsinger and Ms. Nichols for their engagement and feedback.

Director Newell questioned the influence that FLNRORD has in regard to pipelines and their utilization of fiber on right of ways and access ways. Ms. Nichols noted that the Oil and Gas Commission has a certificate program and that certificate has certain conditions that have to be met. The certificate includes language in regard to the utilization of fiber. She spoke to moving towards developing stronger methods to ensure utilization of fiber.

Chair Thiessen spoke to the regions communities being resource based and the importance of sharing information.

Pricing B.C.'s Water





Drought Levels – Fall 2018


Snow Map - May 1, 2019

Regarding: Provincial Nominee Program – Regional Pilot

The BC Provincial Nominee Program (BC PNP) Entrepreneur Immigration – Regional Pilot (EI – Regional Pilot) is focused on attracting entrepreneurs from around the world to establish businesses in regional communities. This will help meet the communities' economic development needs and encourage investments outside urban areas.

Municipalities in the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako have successfully applied to participate in the BC PNP Regional Pilot Program. The Village of Burns Lake has identified a Nominee for whom a rural property is more appropriate than a property with in the Village boundaries.

The Village of Burns Lake is inquiring if the RDBN is interested in applying to the BC PNP Program to support this candidate. There is the potential that additional candidates may be identified in other RDBN communities as well.

Pilot-specific training is offered to community representatives and must be completed before a community confirms their enrolment in the pilot. Communities will then be able to host exploratory visits and issue referrals for foreign entrepreneurs. For this reason, initial host duties for the identified candidate will be fulfilled by trained staff at the Village of Burns Lake. It is possible that additional training sessions will become available later in the year should it make sense for the RDBN to train their own staff for the Pilot.

Community Resilience Investment Program - FireSmart Community Funding

Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako

WHEREAS the Community Resilience Investment Program's funding model for FireSmart related activities on private property is capped at \$100,000 per local government regardless of population or geographic area;

AND WHEREAS the funding model and funding eligibility requirements put geographically large regional districts at a notable disadvantage compared to local governments with significantly less wildfire interface areas;

THEREFORE BE IT resolved that the Province develop eligibility requirements for Community Resilience Investment Program funding, and a funding model, that are equitable and based on local government need.

Municipal Solid Waste

Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako

WHEREAS local governments in the Northwest of British Columbia spend over \$20 million annually on municipal solid waste;

AND WHEREAS there are opportunities for collaboration and to share best practices but rarely a chance to discuss these opportunities;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the North Central Local Government Association sponsor a forum for elected officials to discuss solid waste management issues until needed;

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the North Central Local Government Association also ensures that there be a minimum of one municipal solid waste session at all future conventions.

Permitting Entry into an Evacuation Order Area

Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako

WHEREAS wildfire events are increasing in frequency, intensity, and duration, and local governments and the BC Wildfire Service are required to implement an efficient, effective, and coordinated approach to address the demand for persons, equipment, and supplies requiring entry into an evacuation order area;

AND WHEREAS the BC Wildfire Service does not have a comprehensive permitting process to facilitate the entry of support personnel, equipment, and supplies into an evacuation order area, and the *Emergency Program Act* and British Columbia Emergency Management System do not address, recognize, or provide any direction regarding the permitting of residents, farmers, or persons working in coordination with the BC Wildfire Service to enter into an evacuation order area;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Province work with local governments to develop a permitting system and associated policy, procedures, and best practices that facilitate the necessary entry of persons, equipment, and supplies into an evacuation order area;

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Province consider the need for legislation that addresses the risk management issues associated with allowing entry into an evacuation order area.

Provincial Download

Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako

WHEREAS Section 2 of the *Community Charter* states that the Provincial government must not assign responsibilities to municipalities unless there is provision for resources required to fulfill the responsibilities;

AND WHEREAS legislated changes have shifted responsibility for managing a wide range of complex issues, including but not limited to the significant impact of emergency response services onto local governments placing notable strain on local government resources;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the North Central Local Government Association lobby the Provincial government to ensure that adequate resources and funding are provided to local governments to fulfil the responsibilities that have been assigned to local governments.

Stay and Defend Policy

Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako

WHEREAS wildfire events are increasing in frequency, intensity, and duration, and local governments and the BC Wildfire Service are increasingly required to deal with the issues created by residents who stay within an evacuation order area to defend their property and farmers who stay to look after livestock sheltering in place;

AND WHEREAS the *Emergency Program Act* and the British Columbia Emergency Management System do not address, recognize, or provide direction regarding the management of issues created by persons choosing to stay and defend their property from wildfire;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Province work with local governments to develop policy and best practices regarding stay and defend issues with consideration given to formally recognizing a person's right to stay and defend their property from wildfire.

- Recognize the Northern Infrastructure and Planning Grant. Currently the
 unallocated funds will be allocated to a newly created planning reserve account

 further budget amendment will be completed.
- Adjust the capital expenditures for government services to reflect the planned installation of the LED lighting project; and for Environmental Services to reflect the construction of the Burns Lake, Ft. - Eliminate the borrowing from own reserves (\$700,000) and the capital expenditures associated with the delay of the Houston Transfer station construction to future years.



ALC No Longer Reviewing Cannabis Production

May 23, 2019

The Ministry of Agriculture has undertaken legislative and regulatory amendments that change provincial policy on cannabis production in the Agricultural Land Reserve (ALR). A key change is the classification of all cannabis production in the ALR as farm use. As a result, applications to the Agricultural Land Commission (ALC) are no longer required for any form of cannabis production in the ALR.

The ALC made this information public in its Revised Information Bulletin 04 - Cannabis Production in the ALR, released in May. The bulletin indicated that, effective February 22, 2019, the Agricultural Land Commission Act and the ALR Use, Subdivision and Procedure Regulation (now the ALR General Regulation) were amended, and the ALR Use Regulation was created.

UBCM was not contacted by the Ministry of Agriculture in advance of these amendments and has followed up with Ministry staff for background information on the changes. The UBCM Executive discussed this issue at their May 2019 meeting and conveyed a letter to the Province outlining concerns and a number of questions. These include: lack of consultation, delay in informing local governments and implications for local monitoring and enforcement.

Under the updated regulation, local governments retain the ability to prohibit and/or regulate provided that cannabis production is not: outside, in a structure with a soil base; or in a structure constructed (but not altered to increase its size); or authorized for construction before July 2018.

However, as applications to the ALC are no longer required for cannabis production in the ALR, the removal of this safeguard means that it is incumbent upon local governments to regulate ALR land within their boundaries if they wish to prohibit certain forms of production.

UBCM will provide an update to the membership once we have received a response from the province.
