NORTHWEST BC RESOURCE BENEFITS ALLIANCE (RBA) – Kris Boland, Project Manager, RBA and Ron Poole, CAO, Regional District of Kitimat-Stikine RE: Update

Chair Thiessen welcomed Kris Boland, Project Manager, RBA and Ron Poole, CAO, Regional District of Kitimat-Stikine (RDKS).

Mr. Poole introduced Mr. Boland as the newly appointed RBA Project Manager and Deputy CAO, RDKS. Their visit is to work to increase communications between the RBA and the Regional District. Mr. Boland provided a PowerPoint Presentation providing an RBA activity update and current priorities moving forward.

Chair Thiessen spoke of the importance of having vibrant communities and the RBA will provide an opportunity to be a vibrant north.

DELEGATIONS (CONT'D)

NORTHWEST BC RESOURCE BENEFITS ALLIANCE (RBA) – Kris Boland, Project Manager, RBA and Ron Poole, CAO, Regional District of Kitimat-Stikine RE: Update (Cont'd)

Director Newell referenced Administration Correspondence on the April 18, 2019 RDBN Agenda from Darcy Repen titled "Resource Dependency the Spatial Origins of BCs Economic Base" and the relevance to the RBA. Director Newell spoke of the high percentage of export revenue that is from northern B.C. and the lack of understanding from lower mainland residents in regard to resource revenue funding a high percentage of the provinces social service programs such as healthcare. Mr. Boland mentioned that Mr. Repen has provided information to the RBA and acknowledged the difference in understanding between southern and northern BC residents.

Director Bachrach questioned how the quantifiers for the Sustainability/Livability study will be achieved and determined and will the study define what the acceptable level of services is for the communities in the northwest. Mr. Boland noted that it will be different for every community and the contributing factors for consideration will be: where has the community been?, where does the community want to be?, and what a community has and doesn't have. The approach to determining quantifiers will need to be broader than the infrastructure deficit alone and will be an interactive process. Director Bachrach mentioned the challenge in regard to attraction/retention having so many intangible factors that are difficult or impossible to track to determine vibrancy and sustainability of a community.

Director Fisher brought forward the difference between the rural and municipal infrastructure and livability components. He noted that there are many features and aspects of rural communities such as groomed trails that are not quantified but developed and maintained by rural residents themselves. Director Fisher also spoke of the self-reliance of rural residents in regard to infrastructure such as water and sewer services. He noted the importance of the RBA recognizing that rural residents have costs similar to those of municipalities even though the costs are not captured and rural residents are key to the community as a whole.

Discussion took place in regard to communication. Mr. Boland requested that feedback in regard to communication is welcome.

Chair Thiessen thanked Messrs. Boland and Poole for attending the meeting.

Chair Thiessen welcomed Roberta Squire, CEO, United Way of Northern BC.

UNITED WAY OF NORTHERN BC - Roberta Squire, CEO RE: bc211 Initiative (Cont'd)

Ms. Squire spoke of the communities that aren't "live" currently have access to the website and within five minutes a community can go "live". Chair Thiessen noted that each community has different resources that can be accessed. Ms. Squire mentioned that bc211 is free for agencies to upload their information. Ms. Squire commented that United Way has used/and is using social media and letter writing and postcard campaigns to promote bc211 to organizations, agencies and residents.

Director McGuire questioned if a community does go "live" how would the information be accumulated. Ms. Squire mentioned that they would access the information available closest to that community and her team would also visit each community and do its best to gather all the information available. She also noted that the information is updated on a regular basis and the system shows when the information was updated last. Discussion took place in regard to the challenges of continually updating organizations and agencies information. Ms. Squire mentioned that United Way has two full time staff that continually review the information and conduct call outs to ensure the information is as up to date as possible. Staff are located in the lower mainland.

Director Fisher questioned the long term funding of the initiative and if discussions have been held with the province. Ms. Squire indicated that discussions have taken place with the province in regard to funding the initiative along with large companies and the goal is to be fully funded within three years.

Ms. Squire commented that United Way has a memorandum of understanding with 911 and an understanding with 811 in regard to its bc211 initiative. The assistance to first responders and the eComm Centre was discussed. Discussion also took place in regard to the benefits of the initiative to community members.

Director McGuire questioned the hold time for callers. Ms. Squire will follow up with the information.

Chair Thiessen thanked Ms. Squire for attending the meeting.

 - o Ms. Nichols noted that the sensitivity analysis conducted is based on comments that were received. Community, land base and socio-economic concerns have a strong bearing on her decision.

 - Socio-economic assessment also looked at primary and secondary jobs and multiplier affects built in the modeling.

Director Layton requested clarification on:

- The impacts of moving from volume based to area based salvaging to the AAC in cubic meters.
 - o Mr. Prasad commented on the proportion of the Timber Harvesting Land Base (THLB) affected has a direct proportional effect to the AAC.
- Science completed in regard to how much better managed stands are closer to harvest date vs. mother nature?
 - o Ms. Nichols spoke of two types of plots:
 - Permanent sample plots
 - In mature timber
 - Sets growth and yield rates
 - Young stem monitoring plot program
 - Going into young managed stands
 - Ensure yield projections are for managed stands second growth – plantation stands
 - Ensure growth projection and if needed recalculate yield to go into modeling.
- Need to be proactive and is there recommendations to mitigate the intensively managed stands sooner than 60 years
 - o Ms. Nichols discussed:
 - Timber Supply Review is most sensitive to fastest rejuvenation
 - Forest Genetics
 - "Results" silviculture program
 - Small amount of fertilization being tried
 - Information built into the growth and yield

Director Bachrach questioned the social choice being asked of the public?

- Ms. Nichols commented that the base graphs show the live volume
- The current practice is utilizing live and dead volumes of fiber
- There is potential dead volume that could be utilized depending on milling and other opportunities and could assist with timber supply
- Some pellet plants utilizing deciduous fiber and some facilities are looking at opportunities moving forward
- Ms. Nichols spoke of being realistic about potential opportunities and a balanced decision making process.

DELEGATION (CONT'D)

MINISTRY OF FORESTS, LANDS, NATURAL RESOURCE OPERATIONS AND RURAL DEVELOPMENT –RE: Lakes Timber Supply Area Timber Supply Review (Cont'd)

Director Brienen spoke of the 2014 timber swap that occurred with the sawmill in Quesnel and Houston and the apprehension. He spoke of the interest today in the Discussion Paper. He requested that it would be very beneficial to include an acronym definition appendix in the discussion paper. Ms. Nichols commented that it has been excellent to have the interest in the process that is taking place and it is important for people to have an understanding of the process.

Chair Thiessen thanked Mr. Snetsinger in his past role as Chief Forester and Ms. Nichols in her present role as Chief Forester for being open to discussions in regard to issues and concerns.

Director Funk asked:

- Has there been a consideration to the shelf life of the Mountain Pine Beetle (MPB) wood and to harvesting it all until it is no longer salvageable?
 - Ms. Nichols noted that the shelf life for the MPB is different in different areas of the province
 - Use the dead wood not burn it except for wildfire mitigation and fuel management consideration.
- Take aways from the May 1 Public Meeting in Burns Lake
 - o People looking for information
 - Stewardship in the TSR
 - Job effects
 - Specific questions of the Chief Forester how conduct analysis?
 - Discussion Paper is not the AAC determination Chief Forester's process moving forward to determine the AAC
 - Having information explained.

Director Layton requested access to the summary of the fiber available in the TSA. The District FLNRORD office can provide the information.

Ms. Nichols spoke to clarification of the volume base to area base changes, that while the TSA has been reduced, the wood is still available to harvest under different tenures.

Alternate Director Spooner brought forward diversity in regard to the use of fiber. Ms. Nichols mentioned that it is not included in the AAC determination but she does work with researchers from around the world about various opportunities and emerging initiatives for wood fiber. She spoke of the provincial and federal governments programs in regard to research, delivery and commercialization of biofuels. Ms. Nichols noted she has spoken to supporting communities with new initiatives and opportunities concerning the changing wood fiber basket. Chair Thiessen spoke of the importance of having support for communities to develop variations of community energy systems.

The Regional Board thanked Mr. Snetsinger and Ms. Nichols for their engagement and feedback.

Director Newell questioned the influence that FLNRORD has in regard to pipelines and their utilization of fiber on right of ways and access ways. Ms. Nichols noted that the Oil and Gas Commission has a certificate program and that certificate has certain conditions that have to be met. The certificate includes language in regard to the utilization of fiber. She spoke to moving towards developing stronger methods to ensure utilization of fiber.

Chair Thiessen spoke to the regions communities being resource based and the importance of sharing information.

Ms. Adams noted that some wild seed mixes have species that are invasive in northern B.C. but can be planted in other locations. Wild seed mixes are not regulated and can be easily purchased. Ms. Adams spoke to the importance of researching the species of plants in wild seed mixes and encouraged purchasing individual seeds and mixing them yourself.

Ms. Adams mentioned that she can provide information pamphlets and posters to those needing the information. She also noted that the Invasive Species Council of BC has information on its website.

Director Fisher questioned whether there is public outreach and/or partnerships with retailers and others in regard to selling seeds. Ms. Adams spoke of the PlantWise Program and the Grow Me Instead information and that NWIPC contractors or herself can assist in providing workshops and information to retailers and residents. Director Fisher spoke of opportunities to partner with the RDBN to assist in providing the information to area residents. Ms. Adams stated that the NWIPC needs assistance and has limited capacity to raise awareness of invasive plants. She spoke of the need to build its volunteer base to assist in raising awareness of programs and invasive plants.

Director Bachrach reiterated the concerns and the magnitude of the impacts to Seymour Lake due to the Yellow Floating Heart and that it is nearly impossible to rid the lake of the invasive plant species. The Yellow Floating Heart will eventually deplete the oxygen in the lake and kill the native habitat. Ms. Adams noted that there is not a lot of hope for the lake and it is important to educate people using the lake to ensure that they clean, drain and dry all forms of boats used in the lake.

This memo provides a further update on the Northern Capital and Planning Grant.

Please find attached the question and answer information released by the province for the Northern Capital and Planning Grant.

With respect to the timing of the allocation of the funds please see question 5. It is important to note that except for planning and feasibility studies, the Regional District's general government service have little eligible infrastructure save the office building.

Of special interest may be question 11 that suggests the establishment of a reserve fund within general services [general government] for the purposes planning.

I would be pleased to answer any questions.

Northern Capital and Planning Grant (NCPG) Q's & A's for Regional Districts in Receipt of the NCPG

Allocation of NCPG Funds

- Q1. Can the NCPG funding be allocated to electoral areas based on the Provincial formula used to determine the grant amounts for each Regional District?
- A1. No. The grant calculation for each Regional District took into consideration a base amount and several other key variables. The NCPG was intended to assist the board in addressing regional priorities and not meant to be reallocated back to electoral areas based on the Ministry allocation formula.
- Q2. Will the Province specify to Regional Boards how to allocate the NCPG funding?
- **A2.** No. It is the Regional Boards responsibility to determine the regional priorities and ensure that all the NCPG funding is allocated to eligible regional services prior to the end of the 2019 calendar year. However, if requested, the ministry staff can assist regional staff on possible methods of allocation. That said, the final decision will rest with the Board.

Reserve Funds

- Q3. Do Regional Districts need to segregate NCPG funding from other funding sources?
- A3. No. NCPG funds need only be transferred to existing (or new) capital reserve funds that have been established for each of the services that will be allocated NCPG funding.
- Q4. Does interest earned on NCPG funds need to be tracked and added to the NCPG amounts once the funds are allocated to reserve?
- **A4.** Yes. Interest earned in the NCPG fund must be tracked and allocated back to the fund and may only be used for eligible purposes related to the NCPG program. This is in accordance with S. 189(1) of the *Community Charter*.

Transfer of NCPG Funds to Eligible Services

- **Q5.** The process to create a new service within a Regional District is time consuming and typically requires elector consent, is there any ability to allocate funds to a new service that is in the process of being created at December 31, 2019?
- **A5.** No. All NCPG funding must be allocated prior to the end of 2019 calendar year to comply with Section 377 of the LGA if funding remains unallocated after the end of the calendar year it will be utilized within General Administrative Services.

Eligible Costs Under NCPG

- **Q6.** How broad is the term "infrastructure" under the *Local Government Grants Act*? Is there a duty on the Regional District to consult the Ministry when a purchase is going to be made for infrastructure?
- A6. For the purposes of the NCPG program, the Province is interpreting "infrastructure" broadly and eligible projects under the NCPG can include: engineering, infrastructure planning, pipes, wells, treatment facilities, building, roads, machinery, equipment, vehicles and other associated capital that are owned and controlled by the local government. This can also include the cost of land associated with the developing the above capital investment. The Regional District is not required to consult with the Ministry when using NCPG funds.
- Q7. Will the Province provide a breakdown of eligible vs. ineligible costs under the NCPG?
- **A7.** No. All capital and planning costs are eligible providing the capital will be owned and controlled by the local government (**note**: municipalities can provide funding from the NCPG reserves for RD services within which they participate).

Regarding capital versus operating costs, operating costs (including maintenance costs) are not eligible. If a local government is uncertain whether a cost is operating or capital, the Ministry recommends the local government consult with its auditors to determine whether expenses meet the criteria of physical capital in the Public Sector Accounting Board guidelines.

- Q8. Can a Regional District use NCPG for multi-year project that has already started?
- **A8.** Yes. The NCPG can be used for any capital project that has not yet been completed.
- Q9. Can a Regional District use the NCPG for a contribution to a regional project that they will not own?
- **A9.** No. The Regional District is not permitted to use NCPG funding for any capital projects that they will not own. Though, a municipality may contribute from its NCPG reserves to the regional district for services within which it participates.
- Q10. Can NCPG be used for IT projects that include more than just new hardware and software?
- A10. No. NCPG funding is intended only for physical capital and planning.
- Q11. Can NCPG be used for feasibility planning prior to the establishment of a service area and gaining elector consent.
- **A11.** Yes. The planning projects do not need to result in capital projects. The planning can be stand-alone. For planning projects not directly related to an established service, the Regional District will need to fund the project through a NCPG contribution to a planning reserve fund within general services.

NCPG Reporting

Q12. What are the NCPG reporting requirements for Regional Districts.

A12. The RD must provide a separate report (schedule) outlining how the funds were allocated to various services. This report would be a schedule to the 2019 annual audited financial statements. (as required under S.377(1)(a) of the LGA and S.167 of the CC). RD's are not required to provided annual reports on the NCPG as once the funding is allocated it will be legally restricted within the capital reserves of those services.

Q13. Are Regional Districts required to annually report on NCPG funding?

A13. No. Beyond the reporting on the allocation of funds in the 2019 audited financial statements, annual reporting on the NCPG funding is not required for regional districts. Though, the Province may ask from time-to-time on the different projects regional districts have undertaken (for communications purposes).

Q14. Will the schedule to the annual audited financial statements be left to the discretion of the Regional District? Does the Ministry have authority to request additional information?

A14. Yes, and yes. The form of the schedule to the annual audited financial statements will be left to the discretion of the Regional District. The Ministry retains the right to request additional information from Regional Districts as required.

Q15. Is a separate auditors' report required for this schedule?

A15. No. The Province does not require a separate auditor's report.

Canada Infrastructure Grant Program

Q16. Will receipt of the NCPG affect our eligibility for the Canada Infrastructure Grant Program?

A16. No. The NCPG will not affect decisions on eligibility for grant funding through the Canada Infrastructure Grant Program. However, the Regional District can use NCPG funding to cover their portion of the project costs.

Report by Tom Greenaway on the Council of Forest Industries held in Vancouver on 3-5 April2019

There is going to be many challenges in the Forest Industry in BC in the near future.

BC is heading into the Mid Term Timber Supply. The Southern Mountain Caribou at Risk issues has raised a lot of discussion and frustration. Our lumber buyers from abroad are concerned about BC's ability to supply the wood products they need.

Overall growth is softening in the United States, Japan and China. China is the #2 importer of lumber in the World. This is due to the growth of their middle class. India is also increasing it appetite for lumber. We have decreased our dependence on US timber sales from 80% down to round 55%.

Minister Doug Donaldson said in his speech that the BC Government has increased funding in 2019 by 58% for Fire Suppression. We are going to have to move our towns more to towards value added and become more diversified.

Mass Timber Construction is starting to take root in the US. By using Mass Timber Construction buildings as high as 12 stories can be built using wood.

Mass timber is a term used to describe a number of large dimensional wood products that typically involve the lamination and compression of multiple layers to create solid panels of wood. Mass timber construction uses solid wood panels to frame a building's walls, floors, and roofs. And is seen as a sustainable and more carbon-friendly alternative to steel and concrete.

Glue-laminated timber (glulam). Glulam is made from stacking dimensional lumber on edge and bonding them together with moisture-resistant adhesives. Glulam is commonly used for floors, beams, columns and arches.



Actions Survey 2018

As a signatory on the Community Climate Action Charter, we continue to track the emissions produced by the RDBN, not only in the traditional services we provide, but also services that are contracted out. Below is a chart that shows the emissions from year to year. Some factors that contribute to the increase in our emissions this year are more wood waste haul loads in 2018 and increased staff travel. Also, with wood waste, it was not all hauled in 2017 due to staff availability, some stockpiles were only transported in the beginning of 2018. In regards to staff travel, 2018 saw the addition of staff such as the Environmental Services Operations Foreman and an additional Building Inspector out in the field.



The Climate Actions Survey will be submitted to the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing on May 24, 2019, from which the attached report was generated. The report outlines measures the RDBN undertook in 2018 to reduce carbon emissions and move towards carbon neutrality. As per our reporting requirements for the 2018 CARIP grant, this report is hereby being made public prior to the deadline of June 1, 2019.

The Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako has completed the 2018 Climate Action Revenue Incentive Program (CARIP) Public Report as required by the Province of BC. The CARIP report summarizes actions taken in 2018 and proposed for 2019 to reduce corporate and community-wide energy consumption and greenhouse gas emissions (GHG) and reports on progress towards achieving carbon neutrality.

2018 BUILDING AND LIGHTING ACTIONS

Building and Lighting Actions

Low-carbon buildings use the minimum amount of energy needed to provide comfort and safety for their inhabitants and tap into renewable energy sources for heating, cooling and power. These buildings can save money, especially when calculated over the long term. This category also includes reductions realized from energy efficient street lights and lights in parks or other public spaces.

Working with community groups to improve their ageing facilities to make them more energy efficient. The Lakes District Food Bank completed energy efficient upgrades to their building (roofing, insulation and windows).

Continue to work with community groups to realize energy efficiencies at their facilities. Some projects that are planned are trail lighting upgrades (LED) for the Burns Lake and Fort St. James cross country ski clubs.

Q 19 + Q 20 Corporate Building and Lighting Actions Taken in 2018 + Additional Actions

The Bulkley Valley Aquatic Centre (BVAC) completed their "Energy Use Review and Study".

BVAC's Distribution Digital Control (DDC) archiver is now complete.

BVAC installed a pool deck air handling unit. This decreased their gas consumption considerably.

They also installed a Variable Frequency Drive (VFD) on the 4 pool pumps. This allows lower speeds to follow a flow set point. This led to a 35% decrease in electricity consumption for the last four months of 2018.

Q 21 Corporate Building and Lighting Actions Proposed for 2019

Switching to LED lighting throughout our Administration Building.

Exploring the possibility of installing solar panels on our Administration Building.

Building and Lighting

The Province has committed to taking incremental steps to increase energy-efficiency requirements in the BC Building Code to make buildings net-zero energy ready by 2032. The BC Energy Step Code--a part of the BC Building Code--supports that effort

The District of Houston is in the process of reviewing and amending Official Community Plan (OCP) Bylaw No. 1001, 2010. The Regional District has received a referral copy of the OCP and associated maps. The OCP document is provided under separate cover and the maps are available from Planning Department staff upon request.

Planning Department staff have reviewed the document and overall have no issues. The OCP appears to be a comprehensive document. However, it is noted that Section 5.2.3 (page 47) states that:

As part of the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Electoral Area G Official Community Plan Review, the District of Houston should pursue the inclusion of a policy that supports future annexation of heavy industrial lands into the District to increase the property tax base.

Staff will take note of this statement and during the next OCP review for Electoral Area G it will be taken into consideration and discussed.

In addition, staff have noted some minor technical issues with the proposed bylaw document and will send a letter directly to municipal staff concerning those issues.

Recommendation

That the Regional District Board direct staff to respond to the District of Houston that the RDBN has no comments or concerns with Bylaw No. 1111, 2018.



PROPOSAL

The purpose of this application is to exclude a portion of the subject property from the Agricultural Land Reserve (referred to in this report as, application area). The application area is approximately 1.56 ac. in size.

This property and the neighbouring property is owned by the Canadian Reformed School Association of Smithers. The School wishes to use the application area for recreation areas associated with the school.

The School Association applied for a subdivision in 2018 under Section 10 of the ALC Regulation to change the boundaries between the subject property and the neighbouring School property. However, the application could not be processed by the Provincial Approving Officer because the proposed size of the subject property is smaller than 1 ha. as such, does not satisfy Section 10(1)(c)(iii) of the ALC Regulation. Therefore, the applicant is now applying for the area to be excluded from the ALR to allow the proposed boundary adjustment. It is noted that the School property was removed from the ALR in 2014.

PLANNING DEPARTMENT COMMENTS

Public Input

As part of the process required by the Agricultural Land Commission the applicant is required to solicit public input on the application in the following three ways:

- advertise in a local newspaper;
- put a sign up on the property; and,
- notify adjacent land owners of the application.

The notification process undertaken by the applicant takes place before the exclusion application is submitted to the Regional District and directs the public to provide any comments or concerns regarding the proposal to the Regional District. The applicant has submitted all required notification documents. At the time of writing this report, the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako has not received a response to the applicant's public notices.

OCP and Agricultural Plan

The current OCP designation for the property is Agriculture (AG). This designation is intended to preserve these lands for the purposes of farming and other related activities.

Section 3.1.2(6) of the OCP states that:

Non-farm use of agricultural land shall be avoided. Applications for exclusions, subdivisions, and non-farm uses within the Agricultural Land Reserve may only be considered under the following circumstances.

- a) There is limited agricultural potential within the proposed area.
- b) Soil conditions are not suitable for agriculture.
- c) Neighbouring uses will not be compromised.
- d) Adequate provisions for fencing are provided, where a proposed development is adjacent to an existing agricultural use.
- e) The application is in the best interest of the local community.

- f) The proposed development considers and addresses potential impacts and potential improvements to recreational features and the environment, including wildlife habitat.
- g) And, traffic management issues will be considered and addressed appropriately.

A guiding policy under RDBN's Agricultural Plan is to maintain appropriately large parcel sizes and to keep smaller parcel residential development away from farming areas. This policy helps preserve the integrity of agricultural lands and minimizes conflict between agriculture and non-agriculture uses. The Agriculture Plan recommends that:

The RDBN should continue with its efforts to protect and preserve farm land and soil having capability for agricultural purposes through the restriction of subdivision, and limited encroachment of non-farm uses.

Zoning

The application area is zoned Country Residential (R5). The minimum parcel size requirement for the Country Residential (R5) zone is 4,000 m² (0.99 acres). Therefore, the application area and the remainder parcel would meet the minimum parcel size requirement if it were excluded and subdivided.

The following uses are permitted in the R5 Zone.

- (a) single family dwelling;
- (b) two family dwelling;
- (c) field crops and horticulture;
- (d) home occupation;
- (e) buildings and structures accessory to the permitted principal uses.

The use of school playground would require a zoning amendment.

Land Use

The property is in a residential area of small lots averaging 5 acres in size, known as Ebenezer Flats in rural Smithers. The larger neighboring property to the east is actively farmed, and hobby farms are present on the neighboring smaller residential lots.

The subject property is not used for agriculture purposes and consists of a small residence and accessory buildings.

The School has operated on the neighbouring property since 1969, before the inception of the ALR. The applicant states that the school has been growing steadily about 39% in the past 7 years. As of March 2019, there are 231 students in grades K-12.

In 2009, the school society made a non-farm use application for approval to build a 5,340 square foot addition and to request permission for any potential future expansions. The ALC approved the expansion but denied the potential future expansions without the required application. The ALC stated that they were not prepared to endorse any future expansions of the school without a specific application while the land was in the ALR. It was suggested that the school apply to remove the land from the ALR.



Agricultural impact

Typically, in order to justify exclusion from the ALR the agricultural capability of the subject property would have to be very low. Based on the available Canada Land Inventory mapping the agricultural capability of the property appears to be farmable. However, given the small size of the properties, the available farming opportunities are minimized. See Appendix A for more details.

The Planning Department feels that the school use of this property is appropriate, and the application area should not remain in the ALR. Having the property excluded from the ALR, will give the school society more flexibility for building additions, changes or renovations to their facility. Therefore, staff recommend the application be forwarded to the ALC for approval.

Recommendation:

That the Agricultural Land Reserve Exclusion Application No. 1213 (Penninga) be recommended to the Agricultural Land Commission for approval.





Proposed Rezoning

The purpose of this application is to legalize the existing trailer sales business located on the northwest portion of the property at the corner of Barsness Road and Highway 16 E. The business does not comply with the RDBN's home occupation regulations, as there are two employees who do not reside on the property, and it is not a permitted use under the Agricultural (Ag1) Zone.

The trailer sales business occupies approximately 0.5 ha. of the 27.48 ha. property. The business includes the following:

- A trailer sales yard;
- a 34' x 24' building consisting of 3 offices, bathroom, foyer and a storage room; and,
- a 8' x 40' shipping container used for storage.



The property also contains a 4 ha. field used for pasture and livestock, and a single-family dwelling, chicken coop and corral.

The applicant is requesting that Section 14.01 of the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Zoning Bylaw No. 700, 1993 be amended to allow the proposed uses on the subject property.

ALC Non-Farm Use Decision

In 2017 the ALC approved the Non-Farm Use Application for the trailer sales business subject to the following 7 conditions:


- a. Siting of the non-farm use as shown on the attached Schedule A;
- Registration of a covenant on the property title, in favor of the Commission, advising that if
 the Property is sold and/or transferred to a new owner, or the existing business is
 discontinued, the non-farm use area of the Property is to be rehabilitated back to an
 agricultural condition similar to its original capability;
- c. To meet the requirement of condition b. the Commission will require the preparation of a soils remediation plan prepared by a Qualified Professional with a background in soil

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science which describes how the non-farm use area of the Property will be reclaimed to a standard capable for agricultural use.

- d. The submission of a closure report prepared by a Qualified Professional is required upon completion of the rehabilitation of the site;
- e. The posting of a financial security for \$10,000 in the form of an Irrevocable Letter of Credit (the "ILOC") with the Commission is required for the purpose of ensuring the non-farm use site is rehabilitated back to an agricultural condition (should condition b occur);
- f. Condition b. and e. must be completed within three (3) months of the date of release of this decision (January 4, 2018);
- g. Approval for non-farm use is granted for the sole benefit of the Applicant and is non-transferable.

The property owners have satisfied conditions b and e. Applicant has not prepared a soils remediation plan specified under Condition 'C'.



ALC Reconsideration Request

In 2018, the applicant requested that the ALC reconsider the condition that prohibited expansion of the existing business. This request was made to allow the construction of a new 6,240 square foot building for trailer repairs. On February 20, 2019, the applicant was notified that the ALC refused the reconsideration request and stated that no further expansion of the business is permitted.

PLANNING DEPARTMENT COMMENTS

OCP and Zoning

The Subject property is designated as Agriculture (AG) under the Vanderhoof Rural OCP. The intent of the Agriculture designation is to preserve these lands for the purposes of farming and other related activities.

The subject property is zoned Agricultural (Ag1) under Regional District Zoning Bylaw, No. 700, 1993. The permitted uses for the Ag1 zone are as follows.

- (a) agriculture;
- (b) intensive agriculture;
- (c) horticulture, nursery, greenhouse;
- (d) single family dwelling;
- (e) two family dwelling on parcels not within the Agricultural Land Reserve;
- (f) logging and silviculture;

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- (g) portable sawmill and lumber kiln (provided that the floor of the lumber kiln does not exceed 45 m^2);
- (h) mineral, placer, coal and aggregate exploration, extraction and processing;
- (i) waste disposal site;
- (j) kennel and veterinary clinic;
- (k) outdoor recreation facilities;
- (I) primitive campsite;
- (m) guest ranch;
- (n) rural retreat;
- (o) peat extraction;
- (p) unpaved airstrips and helipads for use of aircraft flying non-schedule flights;
- (g) home occupation;
- (r) buildings and structures accessory to the permitted principal uses.

Building Permits and Development Variance Permit

The property is located in the Regional District's Building Inspection Area. However, there are no building permits on file for any of the structures located on the property.

The applicant applied for a building permit to legalize the office building on May 2nd, 2018.

The siting of the office structure does not meet the setback requirements of the zoning bylaw. Therefore, the applicant must also apply for a Development Variance Permit to legalize the siting of the office. This application will be reviewed if the rezoning bylaw is adopted.

Discussion

As mentioned in the letter from the ALC, the applicant has not completed a soils remediation plan prepared by a Qualified Professional (Condition C. of the ALC Decision for Non-Farm Use).

Staff can recommend that the Board give the rezoning bylaw 1st and 2nd reading; however, it is recommended that the public hearing not be scheduled and held until the applicant has submitted a soils remediation plan to the ALC's satisfaction.

Recommendations:

- 1) That "Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Rezoning Bylaw No. 1869, 2019" be given first and second reading and subsequently be taken to Public Hearing.
- 2) That the Public Hearing for "Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Rezoning Bylaw No. 1869, 2019" be delegated to the Director or Alternate Director for Electoral Area F.
- 3) That the Public Hearing for Bylaw No. 1869, 2019 not be held until the applicant has submitted a soils remediation plan to the satisfaction of the Agricultural Land Commission.

Thank you for referring the proposed amendment to the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Zoning Bylaw No. 700, 1993 Section 14.01 for review and comment by the Agricultural Land Commission (ALC). The following comments are provided to help ensure that the bylaw amendment is consistent with the purposes of the *Agricultural Land Commission Act* (ALCA), the Agricultural Land Reserve regulations (the "Regulations"), and any decisions of the ALC.

According to ALC and Regional District documents, the bylaw amendment affects 0.5 ha of Agricultural Land Reserve (ALR). The ALC has determined that the amendment to Zoning Bylaw No. 700, 1993 Section 14.01 is related to ALC Application 54810, Resolution #307/2017.

Resolution #307/2017 outlines the approval to use a 0.5 ha portion of PID: 014-967-812 for an existing trailer sales business, subject to conditions. Upon review of the file, the ALC notes that condition c. of Resolution #307/2017 remains outstanding. Condition c. of Resolution #307/2017 requires the preparation of a soil remediation plan by a qualified professional with a background in soil science which describes how the non-farm use area of the property will be reclaimed to a standard capable for agricultural use. The approval for the continuation of the trailer sales business is contingent upon completion of condition c.

In consideration that all conditions of Resolution #307/2017 have not been satisfied, the ALC believes it is premature to rezone the 0.5 ha portion of PID: 014-967-812. The ALC recommends that rezoning be considered once condition c. of Resolution #307/2017 has been satisfied.

The ALC strives to provide a detailed response to all bylaw referrals affecting the ALR; however, you are advised that the lack of a specific response by the ALC to any draft bylaw provisions cannot in any way be construed as confirmation regarding the consistency of the submission with the ALCA, the Regulations, or any Orders of the Commission.







PLANNING DEPARTMENT COMMENTS

Land Use

The surrounding area consists of residential parcels that range in size from 0.4 ha. to 2.3 ha. The subject property consists of one single family dwelling, a barn used for storage, and a storage shed. The proposed second residence and shop will be visible from the road.







OCP

The subject property is designated Rural Residential (RR) in the Smithers Telkwa Rural Official Community Plan Bylaw No. 1704, 2014 which is intended to provide opportunities for people to live in a rural setting while protecting and preserving the rural character of the area.

With regards to an additional dwelling in the RR designation, Section 3.4.2 (7) of the OCP states that rezoning applications to allow a second single family dwelling on a parcel may be considered under the following circumstances:

- (a) The subject property is a minimum of 2 hectares (5 acres) in size or larger, or a 2^{nd} single family dwelling exists and is legal but non-conforming to zoning.
- (b) It has been demonstrated that the parcel can accommodate an on-site sewage disposal system for two dwellings.
- (c) The development is compatible with adjacent land uses and maintains the rural character of the area.
- (d) The parcel is not located within a floodplain or on other hazard lands.
- (e) The development addresses wildlife and ecological values.
- (f) And, the future subdivision of the land into a parcel smaller than 2 hectares (5 acres) is prohibited.

The proposal complies with conditions (a) (c) and (d) of Section 3.4.2 (7) in the OCP.

The applicant will be required to demonstrate that the application area can support an additional on-site sewage disposal system in order to comply with condition (b). No documentation has been submitted at this time.

Further subdivision of the property cannot occur under the current or the proposed zoning due to the existing parcel size of 2.0 ha.

Zoning

The Small Holdings (Additional Dwelling) (H1-A) Zone only permits one single family dwelling per parcel with a gross floor area exceeding 100 m² (1,076 ft²). The H1-A zone has a relatively small parcel size requirement of 2 ha.

Within the boundaries of Electoral Area 'A' there are only 8 properties zoned H1-A.

Regional District Zoning allows Secondary Suites – essentially a second dwelling located within an existing home in all residential zones.





However, Secondary Dwellings are only permitted in zones with larger parcel sizes; such as, Rural Resource, Large Holdings and Small Holdings zoned properties larger than 4 ha. in size.

The property is located in the RDBN Building Inspection Area. The RDBN issued a building permit for the primary residence in 1975. The agent has been in contact with RDBN building inspectors regarding the building permit for the proposed shop and second dwelling.

Discussion

The applicant has two driveways currently off Proctor Road. One driveway leads to a barn used for storage, and the other is used for the dwelling. No new access will be made to Highway 16. Therefore, Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure interests are not affected.

A key consideration in rural land use planning is the desire to keep rural densities at a reasonable level to maintain a rural character, avoid the environmental issues that can be associated with on-site sewage disposal, water supply, and control the need for land use regulations associated with higher density.

The Zoning Bylaw has a provision that limits the size of the second dwelling to reduce the potential visual impact associated with two large homes on a property. In addition, the size restriction also serves to limit the number of bedrooms and therefore control the on-site sewage disposal impacts. The proposed second dwelling consists of two bedrooms, a bathroom, kitchen and a living area. The size is larger than the permitted size for a second dwelling under the H1-A zone, however, the size and number of bedrooms proposed is not a concern.

Allowing a suite above an accessory building will change the height of the accessory building from one to two stories to accommodate the suite and will impact the look of the property as both dwellings will be visible from the road.

There is some concern that permitting too many secondary dwellings in rural areas could undermine the desire to limit rural densities. This proposal will increase density; however, it is not seen to be significant, or will compromise the area's rural character. Therefore, staff is recommending the application be given First and Second Reading.

Recommendations:

- 1. That "Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Rezoning Bylaw No. 1870, 2019" be given first and second reading and subsequently be taken to Public Hearing.
- 2. That the Public Hearing for "Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Rezoning Bylaw No. 1870, 2019" be delegated to the Director or Alternate Director for Electoral Area 'A'.

PLANNING DEPARTMENT COMMENTS

OCP

The property lying west of Tintangel Road is designated Resource (RE) in the Burns Lake Rural and Francois Lake (North Shore) Official Community Plan Bylaw No. 1785, 2017 (the OCP). The intent of this designation is to preserve lands within the Plan area for agriculture and grazing, mineral extraction, fish and wildlife management, trapping, wilderness-oriented recreation, and necessary institutional, public utility or transportation services.

The Resource designation supports the creation of parcels as small as 8 ha. Therefore, the applicant must amend the OCP to a designation to support the minimum parcel size set out in the H1, and R6 zones, such as the Rural Residential (RR) designation.

The intent of the RR designation is to:

- provide opportunities for residential lots that fit the existing rural character of the Plan area;
- to support opportunities for affordable housing rental housing and special needs housing;
- to ensure future development is sustainable and does not have a notably negative impact on the natural environment, and;
- to protect and enhance the quality of life associated with existing and new rural residential development.

As stated under the RR designation, applications to permit parcels as small as 2 ha. may be considered where:

a) it has been demonstrated that the proposed lots can accommodate an on-site water supply and sewage disposal system;



- b) the development is compatible with adjacent land uses and maintains the rural character of the area;
- c) parcels are not located within a floodplain or on other hazard lands; and,
- d) the development adequately addresses wildlife and ecological values.

Applications to permit parcels smaller than 2 ha. (4.94 ac.) to a minimum parcel size of 0.4 ha. (1 ac.) may be considered where an existing parcel is truncated by an existing developed public road or natural water feature.

ZONING

The property was subdivided from the existing mobile home park on Freeport Road in 1984 and the zoning remained Manufactured Home Park (R7) on both properties.

The applicants wish to develop and subdivide the property for residential use and not as a mobile home park.

H1 Zone:

The applicants wish to zone a portion of the property to Small Holdings which permits the following uses:

- (a) Single family dwelling;
- (b) Two family dwelling;
- (c) Agriculture;
- (d) Horticulture;
- (e) Silviculture
- (f) Kennel and veterinary clinic;
- (g) Home occupation;
- (h) Buildings and structures accessory to the permitted principal uses.

The H1 zone allows the creation of 2 ha. parcels or larger and allows one single family dwelling per 2 ha, up to two dwellings per parcel if the property is 4 ha or larger. The portion of the parcel proposed to be rezoned to H1 is approximately 10.35 ha. in size and would facilitate subdivision up to 5 lots.

R6 Zone:

The applicants wish to zone a portion of the property lying north of Kelway Road and a portion of the property lying east of Tintagel Road to Rural Residential (R6) to facilitate the subdivision of these portions to create stand-alone parcels.

The R6 zone permits the following uses:

- (a) Single family dwelling;
- (b) Two family dwelling;
- (c) Field crops and horticulture;
- (d) Non-commercial farm livestock;
- (e) Home occupation;
- (f) Buildings and structures accessory to the permitted principal uses.

The R6 zone allows the creation of 1 ha. parcels or larger. The portions of the subject property proposed to be rezoned to R6 are approximately 1.85 ha. and 1.01 ha. in size and could not be further subdivided.

In total, the rezoning application could facilitate the creation of a 7-lot subdivision.

DISCUSSION

The uses found in the surrounding area are primarily residential. The permitted uses and minimum size requirement listed under the H1, and R6 zones fit the character of the area.

The Planning Department does not expect the proposed rezoning to have a negative impact on the character of this area. The change in zoning reduces the density significantly since the minimum parcel size requirement stated under the R7 zone is 2 ha. and allows the density of 20 manufactured home spaces per acre (0.40 ha). In addition, the proposal is consistent with the Official Community Plan which states that the development of manufactured home parks are discouraged throughout the Plan area (Policy 3.4.2(12)).

The parcel is not located in a floodplain or known hazard area. However, the property may have some challenges during the subdivision process in regard to finding a suitable building and/or sewage disposal sites due to the topography of the property. These issues will be considered by the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure at the subdivision stage.

CONSULTATION FOR OCP AMENDMENTS

The Local Government Act requires that local governments consider consultation with persons, organizations and authorities it considers will be affected by an OCP amendment. Specifically, the local government must:

- (a) Consider whether the opportunities for consultation with one or more of the persons, organizations and authorities should be early and ongoing; and,
- (b) Specifically, the RDBN Board should consider if consultation is required with:
 - The board of any regional district that is adjacent to the area covered by the plan,
 - The council of any municipality that is adjacent to the area covered by the plan,
 - First Nations,
 - School district boards, greater boards and improvement district boards, and
 - The Provincial and federal governments and their agencies.

Also, the *Local Government Act* requires that local governments consult with the local School District regarding any amendment to an OCP. A further *Local Government Act* requirement is that all OCP amendments be considered in conjunction with the financial plan, and any waste management plan that is applicable or Regional District. Staff are currently undertaking the above noted consultation as considered appropriate.

Recommendations:

- 1. That "Burns Lake Rural and Francois Lake (North Shore) Official Community Plan Amendment Bylaw No. 1871, 2019" and "Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Rezoning Bylaw No. 1872, 2019" be given first and second reading and subsequently be taken to Public Hearing.
- 2. That the Public Hearing for "Burns Lake Rural and Francois Lake Official Community Plan Amendment Bylaw No. 1871, 2019" and "Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Rezoning Bylaw No. 1872, 2019" be delegated to the Director or Alternate Director for Electoral Area B.
- 3. That the Board consider and approve the consultation identified in the consultation checklist attached as Appendix A.

To Whom it May Concern,

My husband and I purchased our parcel of land two years ago in 2017 with the desire to move out of the city and build a house and a little homestead. At the time of purchase, we were not informed that the existing zoning would, in essence, prohibit that dream. We would like to rezone our parcel of land to H2 so we can build our house. We intend to build an off grid single family house and homestead our land.

Time is of the essence for us as our log home builder has already started building our home (in his yard) with the timeline to reassemble it in July. Additionally, we have retained a contractor to oversee the build etc. It was not until applying for the building permit that we became aware of the zoning trouble as it was not disclosed to us by agents or the previous owner.

It was relayed to us that the Regional District has pursued rezoning our parcel for many years and they contacted the previous owner who was unresponsive.


We and the Regional District have the same goal. It is my hope that we can expedite this process and rezone our parcel to H2 efficiently and quickly.

PURPOSE

This report is to present "Endako, Fraser Lake and Fort Fraser Rural Official Community Plan Bylaw No. 1865, 2019" to the Regional District Board for third reading and adoption.

The text of the Endako, Fraser Lake and Fort Fraser Rural Official Community Plan (Schedule "A") is provided under separate cover. The maps (Schedules "B" and "C") will be available at the Board meeting or can be obtained from staff. Also note that the text of the OCP (Schedule "A") and the maps (Schedules "B", and "C") are available on the Regional District's website.

OVERVIEW OF THE OCP DEVELOPMENT PROCESS

In May 2017, the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Board of Directors directed staff to proceed with the review process for the Endako, Fraser Lake and Fort Fraser Rural Official Community Plan, and approved a consultation strategy. This process was undertaken in conjunction with the review of the Village of Fraser Lake Official Community Plan.

The review process began with preliminary consultation with the Advisory Planning Commission (APC) for Electoral Area D in June 2017. Letters with information about the start of the review process and requests for any preliminary comments were also sent to local First Nations, community groups, the Village of Fraser Lake, School District 91, and various Provincial Ministries.

Community meetings and an open house were held on July 25, 2017 in Fraser Lake and an open house was held in Fort Fraser on July 26, 2017. The purpose of these events was to introduce the municipal and rural OCP review processes and to provide an opportunity for the public to ask questions and provide input regarding land-use and community development related issues, and their visions for the area. The events were also an opportunity to solicit participation on a working group to assist in the review process and the drafting of a new Plan.

The Village of Fraser Lake, Community Futures Stuart-Nechako, the Fraser Lake Chamber of Commerce, the Nadleh Whut'en, the Stellat'en, the Cheslatta Carrier Nation, Northern Health, the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure, the Ministry of Forests, Lands and Natural Resource Operations were asked to provide a representative to participate on the working group.

Staff created a preliminary draft of the OCP to provide the working group with a format for discussion of issues. Working group meetings were held on February 27, March 12, April 9 and May 14, 2018. The focus was on reviewing the process and the mandate of the Plan, identifying and discussing key issues, helping define the community visions and goals for the plan area, and developing the policies contained in the Plan. A meeting to discuss the draft was also held in Fort Fraser on July 20, 2018 with the Fort Fraser Local Commission and the members of the working group living in Fort Fraser.

Staff attended two Grade 4/5 classes at Fraser Lake Elementary Secondary School in April to obtain input from school age children. The students were asked to draw their community, to find out how the students interact with and view their community.

The APC reviewed and provided comments on the draft plan at a meeting on September 17, 2018. Letters with an invitation to review the draft plan and to attend December's open houses were sent to local First Nations, community groups, the Village of Fraser Lake, School District 91 and Provincial Ministries in November 2018. Two open houses were held, on December 10, 2018 in Fort Fraser and December 11, 2018 in Fraser Lake, to introduce the draft plan to the public and to obtain feedback on the draft.

In late December and early January, consultation letters and a copy of the plan were sent to the referral agencies that were identified in the consultation checklist approved by the Board in May 2017 and re-approved at first and second reading April 18, 2019.

The public hearing for the Bylaw will be held on May 13, 2019 and the report of the public hearing will be on the supplementary agenda.

DISCUSSION

The draft Endako, Fraser Lake and Fort Fraser Rural OCP has undergone a notable public consultation process, and in staff's opinion the Plan reflects an appropriately balanced expression of the community's interest and vision for the future of the area. The focus of the process was to update the existing plan and not undertake an extensive review process.

Staff note that the "Endako, Fraser Lake and Fort Fraser Rural Official Community Plan Bylaw No. 1865, 2019" has been considered in conjunction with the Regional District's financial plan and solid waste management plan, and there are no apparent conflicts or issues between the plans. As required by the *Local Government Act* the Bylaw has been referred to the Agricultural Land Commission for comments after first and second reading.



The Board may approve "Endako, Fraser Lake and Fort Fraser Rural Official Community Plan Bylaw No. 1865, 2019" at 3rd reading, amend the Bylaw and then approve the amended Bylaw, or refer the Bylaw back to staff with direction to make further amendments. Should the Bylaw be amended another Public Hearing may be required depending upon the nature of the changes.

RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. That the Board receive the Report of the Public Hearing held on May 13th, 2019 for "Endako, Fraser Lake and Fort Fraser Rural Official Community Plan Bylaw No 1865, 2019".







PLANNING DEPARTMENT COMMENTS

It is noted that the BC Land Surveyor's Building Location Certificate shows the measurement from the building's exterior wall to the property line. However, the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Zoning Bylaw measures setbacks from the nearest projection (typically roof overhang). The setback of the structure is further reduced than shown on the submitted site plan. To compensate for the roof overhang, the variance is therefore set at 1.2 meters instead of 1.4 meters as shown on the location certificate.

The applicants did receive a building permit from the Regional District for the residence and a storage shed in 1974. There was no site plan found from this building permit application in the property file. It cannot be confirmed that the existing attached garage was permitted at that time as the measurements for the permitted building do not match the existing building.

The RDBN Building Inspector has no Building Code related objections to the reduced setback. The building does not have any notable impact on the neighboring property to the west.

All property owners within 50 meters of the subject property have been provided notice of the application and will have an opportunity to comment on this application at the Board meeting on May 16, 2019 when the Board considers this application.





This application is regarding two amendments to an existing recreation site designation under Section 56 of the *Forest and Range Practices Act* (FRPA) for the Smithers Mountain Bike Association (SMBA). Approval of this application will allow the Recreation Sites and Trails BC (RSTBC) to include the site in a formal maintenance contract and establish rules regarding site use through the Forest Recreation Regulations.

SMBA wish to include the 2 areas in their existing recreation area known as "The Bluff". Amendment Area #1 is located off Dahlie Road adjacent to the Town of Smithers. Amendment Area #2 is located approximately 2 km west of the Town of Smithers off Hudson Bay Mountain Road.

Amendment #1

SMBA has made an application to provide additional parking in the area shown as Amendment #1.

The property adjacent to area #1 was subdivided in 2014. This area was returned to the Crown as the Province identified the need to expand the Bluff Recreation Site during the subdivision process to capture the existing trails and to develop additional parking.

The current parking for The Bluff Recreation Site is located at the end of Hudson Bay Mountain Road, on private lands owned by CN Rail. RSTBC has approvals to maintain and keep this parking area; however, it is not ideal from a liability perspective as insurance does not cover volunteers on private lands. The Bluff Recreation Site is becoming increasingly popular and the area's Recreation Officer states that the two parking locations are needed.

RSTBC will construct the new parking lot in 2020. Improvements to the parking lot will include a sign board, and an outhouse. The Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure will provide snow removal, and the Ministry of Forests Lands and Natural Resource Operations and Rural Development would provide grading. Works also include tree removal, stripping the site, and adding fill.

Amendment #2

Amendment #2 proposes to expand The Bluff Recreation Site to include the proposed trails. The proposed 6.8 km bike trails will connect the existing 'Meanstreak' and 'Nervous Shakedown' mountain bike trails to the Seymour Ridge trail network. The proposal is aimed at providing more intermediate trails which will expand ridership. More information is provided in the attached Management Plan.

Discussion

Zoning

The application areas are zoned Large Holdings (H2), and outdoor recreation facilities are permitted within this zone.


Wildlife and Ecological Values

Both application areas are located on Crown Lands currently used for recreation that are designated for Resource (RE) under the Area's Official Community Plan (OCP).

Significant ecosystems and wildlife values identified by the Ministry of Environment and mentioned in Schedule 'C' of the "Smithers Telkwa Official Community Plan, 1704, 2014" (OCP) are found within the application areas including:

- Wildlife Habitat Values: High valued wildlife habitat for moose, and mule deer.
- Sensitive Ecosystems Values: Dry southwest facing slopes with Saskatoon slender wheatgrass scrub/ steppe in the area of Amendment 2. Mesic to moist south-west facing meadows and grasslands in the area of Amendment 1.

Bulkley-Valley Backpackers have indicated support regarding the use of the Seymour Ridge trail for mountain biking. Given that the trail tenure is not exclusive and located on undeveloped Crown Lands, the proposed use is not expected to impact future use of the area.

Staff support the development and enhancement of active recreation and tourism in this area of Hudson Bay Mountain.





Project: Trail Expansion at the Bluff Recreation Site in Smithers

Recreation Sites and Trails BC (RSTBC) wishes to inform you of the Smithers Mountain Bike Association's (SMBA) proposal to RSTBC to construct five (5) kilometres of new trail at the Bluff Recreation Site in Smithers. The new trails would connect existing sections of trail to allow for longer loops while providing more intermediate riding opportunities. The trails would be designated non-motorized and multi-use, be built using a combination of hand- and machine-built, and built to RSTBC-approved standards in providing sustainably built trails that are safe and enjoyable. Trail construction is planned for summer 2019.

RSTBC – a branch of the Ministry of Forests, Lands, Natural Resource Operations and Rural Development - provides high quality recreational opportunities on Crown Land outside of BC Parks. The Bluff Recreation Site sees daily use throughout the year with mountain bikers, runners, hikers, dogwalkers, snowshoers and fat bikers taking advantage of the variety of trails it has to offer and proximity to Smithers.

FRPA, Section 56 Legal Designation - Proposed Boundary Amendment

The Bluff Recreation Site is a legally designated site under Section 56 of FRPA, having gone through the appropriate stakeholder referral process and consultation with the Office of the Wet'suwet'en at the time. It was legally designated in 2009 and a formal partnership agreement secured with SMBA shortly after. Section 56 establishments ensure sites, trails and interpretive forests are managed within an integrated land base framework and receive consideration in forest planning and practices.

The proposed trail locations fall outside of the designated area as does the site of a new parking / main staging area. Conditional on the outcome of this referral, my intent is to amend the recreation polygon to include these two areas. They are attached in google earth (kml) as follows:

- Amendment #1 recreation polygon expanded to include the site of the new parking / main staging area for the Bluff trails.
- Amendment #2 recreation polygon expanded to include the proposed trails

FRPA, Section 57 Authorization - Trail Building on Crown Land

The minister has delegated authority to the Recreation Officer under Section 57 of FRPA to authorize trail construction on Crown Land. This type of activity requires a formal referral process be completed and all overlapping First Nations and stakeholders given the opportunity to outline their interests in the land and any values that the land may uphold for them. This information, along with how the proposal meets the RSTBC mandate, is used to inform my decision.

As such, the proponent is asked to develop a management plan that outlines their ideas for engaging with First Nations and stakeholders, promoting user safety and environmental sustainability, and any short-and long-term goals listed as they relate to the purpose of the recreation site. SMBA's 2019 management and operating plans are attached.



INTRODUCTION

Purpose

The Smithers Mountain Bike Association (SMBA) and Recreation Sites and Trails BC (RSTBC) have signed a Trail Management Agreement (PA14DSS-11 hereafter the "Agreement") under Section 118 of the Forest and Range Practices Act (FRPA). The Agreement represents a trail management arrangement over a 10 year term (October 1, 2013 – September 30, 2023) and outlines expectations and requirements that ensure the trails and related infrastructure are managed and maintained to RSTBC standards. Under the Agreement, the SMBA has committed to develop and regularly update a 5 Year Management Plan. The purpose of this plan is to guide the management of mountain biking trails and activities in three trail networks on Hudson Bay Mountain: The Bluff Recreation Site, the Ptarmigan Road Recreation Trails, and the Piper Recreation Site.

The Management Plan forms an appendix to the aforementioned Trail Management Agreement between the SMBA and Recreation Sites and Trails BC (RSTBC) of the B.C. Ministry of Forests, Lands, Natural Resource Operations and Rural Development (FLNRORD) and is intended to inform a more detailed Annual Operational Plan (see Appendix 1).

Context

A study commissioned by RSTBC in 2011 estimated the GDP contribution of recreation sites and trails use to the Provincial economy at \$14.08 million annually. By 2016, studies revealed that the North Shore areas alone generated over \$12 million in direct spending from mountain bikers (see: www.mtba.ca). Studies from the interior of BC, including Williams Lake, Revelstoke, and Rossland, confirm the growth of the sport since 2010, the contribution of trails to economic diversification in small communities, and the role that trails play in attracting and retaining professional workers. The case for ongoing investment in mountain bike infrastructure remains strong.

The SMBA is a registered non-profit society established in 2009 to support the Bulkley Valley's mountain bike community through trail development, trail maintenance, and events. Specifically, the objectives of the SMBA are to:

- encourage participation in mountain biking to people of all ages and abilities,
- · promote responsible mountain biking practices,
- participate in the planning process for the management of recreational lands as it relates to mountain bike access and use,
- organize volunteers to aid in restoration, development, and maintenance of legitimate mountain bike trail systems, and
- educate riders on mountain bike safety, best practices, and trail maintenance and development.

The SMBA is run by a board of directors elected annually by SMBA members (average of 170 members per year) at the Annual General Meeting. Through government and community business support, the SMBA has a proven ability to reach the above objectives. For example, since 2011 the SMBA has:

secured and invested >\$500,000 into trail networks,

- · vastly expanded trail networks, which includes 54 kilometres of trail,
- constructed and maintained a skills development Bike Park,
- initiated a successful Sprockids program, which includes an average of 60 youth per year,
- held women's specific skills training camps and rides with over 60 participants,
- significantly increased the number of mountain bike riders in the community,
- built community through annual events and races,
- garnered media attention and tourism through hosting the BC Bike Ride and being featured by Mountain Biking BC (www.mountainbikingbc.ca), and
- witnessed a marked increase in visits from out of town riders.

The scope for this management plan is guided by the requirements under the SMBA's agreement with RSTBC and will focus on SMBA's approach to management of trails and trail development.

5 YEAR MANAGEMENT GOALS AND STRATEGIES

This management plan outlines three goals for the SMBA and lists the strategies that SMBA will use to achieve them. The strategies will be adaptively managed in partnership with RSTBC on an on-going basis.

Goal 1 - Maintain and enhance trails under agreement with RSTBC

Strategy 1: Maintain the Annual Operating Plan based on the SMBA Trail Policy. The Operating Plan (Appendix 1) outlines the trail maintenance and enhancement, and new trail development proposals on an annual and five-year period. The trail works outlined in the Operating Plan are informed by the SMBA Trail Policy (Appendix 2), which specifies how consultation with the SMBA membership will inform trail maintenance and enhancement. The Operating Plan is designed to maintain the current distribution of trail ratings of 35% black, 55% blue, and 20% green across all trail networks under Agreement. The SMBA will maintain trails using a variety of approaches including engagement with membership, paid contractors, and volunteer efforts.

Strategy 2: Seek authorization from RSTBC to develop new trails for integration into the Partnership Agreement. The Operating Plan identifies new trail development proposals that will be submitted to RSTBC for Section 57 and 56 authorizations.

Strategy 3: Work in a coordinated manner with RSTBC to administer funding for trail construction and maintenance. Detailed project budgets will be developed in collaboration with RSTBC to ensure transparency in the use of all funding for trail construction and maintenance. Standard priorities include: danger tree assessment & falling, signage (including kiosks), contracts for trail construction, tool purchase and aerial lifts of materials.

Strategy 4: Seek Section 56 authorization in 2018/19 to incorporate the existing Backdoor trail into the Agreement.

Goal 2 – Ensure all trails under Agreement are managed for safety and environmental stewardship

Strategy 1: The SMBA will undertake annual inspection of trails and technical trail features (TTF) in a manner consistent with the requirements of the Agreement, including International Mountain Bike Association (IMBA) guidelines for building and enhancing mtn bike trails, Whistler Trail Standards for trail and feature classification and TTF standards, and Chapter 10 of the Recreation Manual for additional specifications for trail and feature construction and management. Records of inspections will be maintained by the SMBA and issues will be incorporated into the Operating Plan for action.

Strategy 2: Hazard trees and blow-down are persistent safety issues throughout the trail networks under the Agreement. SMBA will work with RSTBC on an on-going and annual basis to develop operational approaches to address blow-down and hazard trees. The SMBA will ensure volunteers are adequately trained to address these issues.

Strategy 3: Consistent and coordinated with strategies under Goal 1, the SMBA will work with RSTBC, the SMBA membership, volunteers, and paid contractors to ensure all trails are maintained to a safety standard consistent with the requirements under the Agreement. Under this Management Plan the SMBA is utilizing two volunteer mechanisms for maintenance of trails under Agreement:

- Adopt a Trail (ATT): A group of volunteers, who maintain a designated trail, including monitoring for safety issues. AAT will clear fallen trees and perform basic maintenance to ensure safety;
- Trail Brigade: A smaller group of volunteers with trail building experience that perform enhanced maintenance, based on approvals form RSTBC through the Annual Operating Plan.

Strategy 4: SMBA will maintain signage on all trails and TTFs in a manner consistent with the Agreement to ensure safe route finding. SMBA will augment trail signage with on-line tools, including the SMBA website and Trailforks. SMBA will work with RSTBC over the term of this Management Plan to incorporate emergency routes into the trail signage and mapping system.

Strategy 5: The SMBA will work with RSTBC to manage natural disturbance events and other safety hazards that require trail closures and other emergency measures. SMBA will use its website and social media to communicate safety issues to the SMBA membership and public.

Strategy 6: The SMBA will work with RSTBC and FLNRORD to ensure the requirements of the *Water Sustainability Act* are reflected in all activities under the Operating Plan.

Goal 3 – Undertake community, First Nations, and stakeholder engagement in support of this Management Plan and the Agreement

Strategy 1: Engage with the Office of the Wet'suwet'en in any new trail development or infrastructure plans. Seek opportunities to incorporate traditional and cultural values into trail development and signage where possible. Work with First Nations to engage youth in all aspects of the mountain bike community.

Strategy 2: Engage with the SMBA membership through social media, events, and email to promote appropriate use of the trails.

Strategy 3: Work with other stakeholders that have overlapping interests with the trails under this Agreement or identified in the Operating Plan. Represent SMBA in the broader recreational community within the Bulkley Valley in an effort to promote mountain biking and seek synergies with other groups that can enhance trails.

Strategy 4: Work with RSTBC and BC Parks to maintain access to the existing Cronin Pass Trail.

APPENDIX 2 - SMBA TRAIL POLICY

SMBA POLICY FOR TRAIL MAINTENANCE, ADJUSTMENTS, AND DEVELOPMENT

This policy details the process by which proposed trail maintenance, adjustments, and development are approved annually by the SMBA and outlines maintenance standards to be upheld on existing trails. This policy directly informs the SMBA's *Annual Operating Plan* and is crucial to meeting Goal 1 in the *SMBA Management Plan*.

PROCESS FOR PROPOSED TRAIL ADJUSTMENTS AND DEVELOPMENT

Step 1: Submit Proposals

Proposals for trail adjustments or new trail development can be put forward to the SMBA Executive by October 1st of each year. Proposals may be submitted by any SMBA member or the SMBA *Trail Management Subcommittee*. In order for the Executive and SMBA membership to make an informed decision, each proposal for a new trail must include the following information:

- difficulty level,
- style,
- length,
- TTFs to be included,
- linework/route (e.g. walked, flagged, GPSed),
- value or special components of proposed trail (e.g. connections to trail networks, viewpoints, terrain),
- maintenance considerations (e.g. overhead hazards, foliage, soil, drainage),
- estimated costs,
- funding options, and
- environmental considerations. Recognizing that meeting the trail objectives would be terrain dependent.

For proposed trail adjustments, the following information must be presented to the SMBA Executive and Membership:

- Location
- Value/Purpose
- Description of how the adjustment will enhance or alter difficulty of trail
- Description of how the adjustment will enhance or alter style of trail

Step 2: SMBA Executive Review

Executive to review proposals and come to an agreement on which proposed trail adjustments and/or new trail development will be presented to SMBA membership. This review will occur prior to the SMBA Annual General Meeting (AGM).

Step 3: SMBA Membership Feedback

The Executive will review any proposed trail adjustments and new trail developments with the SMBA membership at the AGM. Detailed feedback will be recorded and communicated to the Executive.

Step 4: SMBA Executive Approval and Incorporation into Operating Plan

The Executive will review membership feedback and finalize decision on proposed trail adjustments and new trail development with the Trail Management Subcommittee. Approved proposals will be incorporated into the *Annual Operating Plan* for the following season.

Step 5: Funding Strategy

The Executive will prepare a funding strategy to implement the *Annual Operating Plan* including trail maintenance, approved adjustments, and approved new trail development. The Executive will work with the Trail Management Subcommittee to develop a plan to secure funding.

Step 6: Implementation

The Trail Management Subcommittee will lead the implementation of the Annual Operating Plan. Maintenance will be implemented through work bees, the Adopt-A-Trail Program, the Trail Brigade and where necessary, preferred and experienced contractors. While the majority of trail adjustments and development will be executed by preferred and experienced contractors, the Trail Brigade will also actively partake in key projects. all trail maintenance will be guided by the standards outlined in the Agreement with RSTBC" and attach Schedule F. Any work conducted, including adjustments, development, and maintenance, must be led by someone who is well-versed in the aforementioned trail standards and the practical application of them.

The Trail Management Subcommittee will be accountable to manage new trail development including; working with RSTBC to secure approvals; working with the Executive to engage stakeholders; and, implementing the funding strategy approved by the SMBA.

The Trail Management Subcommittee will regularly update the SMBA Executive on the progress of the *Annual Operating Plan*. These regular updates will allow for the Executive and Trail Management

Subcommittee to be adaptable and address unforeseen circumstances that may require in-season changes to be made to the *Annual Operating Plan*. Examples of circumstances that may result in within season changes to the plan include, but are not limited to:

- 1) unanticipated funds becoming available for trail adjustments and/or development,
- 2) weather events that cause damage to existing technical trail features (TTFs), the fixing of which may need to be prioritized over other proposed work, and
- 3) limitations in the resources and/or capacity necessary to finish all of proposed work. The need to communicate in-eason changes to the Annual Operating Plan to the SMBA membership will depend on the scale of the change and will be at the discretion of the Executive and the Trail

TRAIL MAINTENANCE

Management Subcommittee.

As with trail adjustments and development, trail maintenance will be outlined and prioritized in the SMBA's *Annual Operating Plan*. Routine trail maintenance, as outlined in the RSTBC partnership agreement, should be considered in the development of the *Annual Operating Plan*. Annual inspections of existing trails and TTFs must be completed by May 15th each season, including a description of trail/TTF condition and maintenance requirements. These inspections are submitted to RSTBC each year as a requirement of the partnership agreement and inform the maintenance requirements outlined in the SMBA's *Annual Operating Plan*. The Trail Management Subcommittee is responsible for ensuring the annual inspection occurs each year.

Any trail maintenance that is conducted in the SMBA trail networks must follow at minimum, the standards outlined in the Agreement with RSTBC, including that conducted by the Adopt-A-Trail Program and the Trail Brigade. Trail maintenance standards for the SMBA are adapted from IMBA and Whistler trail standards and conform to standards outlined in the RSTBC partnership agreement. At the beginning of each season, these standards shall be reviewed by anybody participating in maintenance of the trails throughout the year. This review may include a field day with an experienced trail builder.

SMBA Trail Maintenance Standards – In addition to Schedule F of the Partnership Agreement, the following standards apply for SMBA:

- 1. Signs—all signs will be checked prior to the season of operation to ensure they are in place and visible and any additional signs required to meet the objectives of this Agreement should be installed. Conduct minor repairs and stain/paint trail signs as required.
- 2. **Deadfall**—on a priority basis cut out windfall/deadfall over the trail, cut deadfall to a minimum of 1 metre from trail edged. Where possible, place felled trees downhill, out of sight of trail, and with butt ends pointing away from the trail.
- 3. **Brushing**—on a priority basis remove all juvenile trees and woody brush to a minimum of 1 metre from trail edge, within 3 centimetres of ground level. Scatter the cut material out of sight of the trail.
- 4. **Erosion control**—Maintain culverts and knicks to avoid water damage. This may include clean-outing and repairing any existing water bars and ditches as necessary to drain water away from the trail and prevent erosion.
- 5. Route marking—mark obscure routes with flagging or delineating tags as required.

- 6. Litter cleanup—remove litter and garbage at the trailhead and along the trail.
- 7. Limbing—remove tree limbs to allow 2.5 metres of overhead clearance above the trail, with 1.0-1.5 metres total clearance width. Scatter cut limbs a minimum of 1.0 metre from the trail edge, out of sight where possible. Ensure limbing cuts are clean, without scarring the main trunk of the tree.
- 8. **Technical Trail Features (TTFs)** TTFs are to be evaluated regularly and kept in safe and working order (see Whistler Trail Standards)
- 9. Fall Zones Keep fall zones around TTFs and berms free of debris and hazards
- 10. Sightlines Where possible, maintain corridor sight lines.
- 11. **Hazards** Repair or eliminate known trail hazards when possible. If the trail is unsafe, close trails until hazard has been repaired or eliminated.
- 12. Trail tread maintenance
- Drain/harden mud holes and boggy areas.
- Complete washout and/or slump repair.
- Grub rocks, roots, stumps as necessary to allow grooming during operating season.
- Undertake surface repair as required.

UNSANCTIONED TRAIL WORK

Recreational mountain bike trail construction, rehabilitation, or maintenance on Crown Land is not permitted unless authorized by the MFENRORD District Recreation Officer. Any unsanctioned trail work is therefore illegal and puts the partnership agreement between the SMBA and RSTBC at-risk. As a result, any unsanctioned trail work shall be addressed immediately by the Executive. The Executive will report details of the unsanctioned work to Recreation, Sites, and Trails BC, which may result in the Province ordering the offenders to restore the trail to its original form and/or fines of up to \$10,000. The SMBA Executive is responsible for regularly reminding members of the public and the membership that unsanctioned work is unacceptable.

Dear Local Governments:

As you are aware, housing availability and affordability are some of the biggest issues facing British Columbians today. That is why I am writing to let you know about exciting partnership opportunities that can be used to increase the supply of affordable housing in your community.

With the 30-point housing plan, the Government of British Columbia is making the largest investment in housing affordability in B.C.'s history—approximately \$7 billion over 10 years—through the **Building BC** funds. In the first year of this plan, we have already made significant investments in communities across British Columbia:

- Building BC: Community Housing Fund (CHF) will provide close to \$1.9 billion over 10 years to develop 14,350 units of mixed income, affordable rental housing for independent families and seniors. The new homes are designed to address the need for affordable housing across a range of income levels, in response to a housing crisis that has made housing unaffordable for even middle-class families. Currently, more than 4,900 of these new homes have been approved in 42 communities. (See map: https://www.bchousing.org/partner-services/Building-BC/community-housing-fund)
- Building BC: Indigenous Housing Fund (IHF) is a \$550 million investment over the next 10 years to build and operate 1,750 new social housing units for Indigenous families and seniors. In Fall 2018, we announced 1,100 new affordable homes for indigenous peoples in 26 communities across B.C. (See news release for project list: https://www.bchousing.org/news?news/d=1479152910395)
- Building BC: Women's Transition Housing Fund (WTF) is investing \$734 million over 10 years for 1,500 units of transition and second-stage housing to help women and children get out of violent and abusive situations and rebuild their lives. More than 280 of these new spaces have been approved for 12 communities.

- Building BC: Supportive Housing Fund (SHF), an investment of \$1.2 billion over 10 years, will
 deliver 2,500 new homes with 24/7 support services for people who are experiencing
 homelessness or who are at risk of homelessness. This fund builds on the Rapid Response to
 Homelessness initiative (now fully subscribed) in which 2,000 homes with supports are currently
 being built in 22 communities across the province, with 1,285 units already opened.
- Building BC: Capital Renewal Fund (CRF) is a \$1.1 billion investment over the next 10 years to
 make existing B.C. social housing stock more livable, energy-efficient, and safer. This investment
 will make dramatic improvements to the existing social housing stock in the province and
 benefit thousands of British Columbians.

Many of these housing projects are underway, but I wanted to make sure you knew about upcoming opportunities to apply for future funding. BC Housing is interested in partnering with municipalities, non-profit housing providers, and community groups to create more innovative and sustainable housing solutions through the following:

- Future RFP BC Housing will be issuing a second formal Request for Proposals for the
 Community Housing Fund and the Indigenous Housing Fund in 2020. We encourage groups
 interested in submitting proposals to start their planning early, to ensure their projects are

- Ongoing Opportunities BC Housing welcomes discussions with partners interested in developing new housing through the Supportive Housing Fund and/or the Women's Transition Housing Fund. - Major Repairs for Existing Social Housing Funding is available for non-profit housing providers
 or housing co-operatives to support capital projects that maintain or benefit an existing social

- The HousingHub is a new division within BC Housing, and was established to seek innovative partnerships with local housing organizations, community land trusts, Indigenous groups, faith-based groups, charities, the development community, financial institutions and other industries to create affordable rental housing and homeownership options for middle-income British Columbians. As a centre for housing expertise and collaboration, affordable housing will be developed through the HousingHub either through new construction or through the redevelopment of existing sites. Partners bring suitable land, equity and/or the catalyst for development. The HousingHub can provide:
 - Expertise to provide advice on assisting the group in the planning and development process
 - o Access to pre-development funding
 - o Low-cost financing
 - o Project coordination advice
 - o A place for organizations to collaborate



Thank you for your letter of March 18, 2019 regarding your concerns about some of your agriculture producers and their potential tax issues having received financial assistance from the 2018 Canada-British Columbia Wildfire Recovery Initiative.

I am glad to hear that these producers have benefited from the financial support programs that the Ministry of Agriculture established to assist the recovery of farms and ranches impacted by wildfire. The recovery initiative was purposefully designed to provide financial support in a timely manner. This allows producers to return to production as quickly as possible following a disaster.

With regard to your request that program payments not be counted as taxable income, the Ministry of Agriculture does not have the legislative or authoritative responsibility to amend or change taxation. However, the Canada Revenue Agency (CRA) does have 2018 tax relief options for British Columbia producers affected by wildfire:

Coastal GasLink Progresses Final Field Planning and Engineering

Good Afternoon,

In keeping with our commitment to share information about the progress of the project, we want to let you know that Coastal GasLink is moving forward to complete the necessary field work and technical engineering required to proceed with local permitting and construction on a 42-kilometre segment of pipeline known as the South of Houston Alternate Route (SHAR). This follows the Oil and Gas Commission's approval of an amended permit, which was submitted in October 2017.

As you will recall, this route was approved by the Environmental Assessment Office (EAO) in May 2018 following two years of study and the OGC permit clears the path for route finalization.

This segment of pipeline starts about 21 kilometers southwest of Burns Lake and ends 25 kilometers south of Houston, B.C. and relocates this segment of pipeline by about four kilometers to the south of the original location.

This routing reflects input received from Indigenous communities, stakeholders and regulatory agencies. The approved re-route reduces the number of water crossings and minimizes effects on areas of traditional and cultural significance.

Routing decisions take into account cultural, environmental, commercial, and constructability considerations and are ultimately determined by the regulatory process.

Over the coming months, Coastal GasLink will continue to visit local communities along the project corridor to provide an update on project schedule, final project design and other important items such as contracting and employment opportunities.



Where we're going

It's important to ensure Coastal GasLink's proposed route is the best option for not only the project, but also the surrounding communities and environment. Below is a timeline of how our route was developed:

2012 — Our team established a "conceptual corridor" based on aerial inspection, mapping and online information sources. Numerous meetings were held with First Nations, local governments, landowners and community residents to gather feedback.

2013 — Over 100,000 hours of environmental and engineering field studies provided detailed knowledge of the terrain about the proposed route.

2014 — In January, we filed an application with the BC Environmental Assessment Office (EAO) with detailed information about the proposed route. In October, after a period of public review, the BC EAO accepted our application with conditions, issuing an Environmental Assessment Certificate.

2015 — After extensive consultation with Aboriginal groups in the area of the Morice River near Houston, Coastal GasLink applied for an alternate route in November. Both the approved route and the alternate route being proposed are constructible and respect the environment through which we would pass.

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2016 — We received 10 permits from the BC Oil and Gas Commission, finalizing all of the major provincial regulatory approvals required for the construction and operation of the proposed pipeline and related facilities.

After feedback from Wet'suwet'en leaders, we decided to conduct field work on the potential South of Houston Alternate Route, a route that moves us even further away from cultural areas that are important to them.

Our team would like to acknowledge the positive advice and expertise that northern B.C. First Nations, local governments, landowners and community residents contributed to the project. To date, more than one-third of all field work completed on the project has been conducted by Indigenous people.

2017 — Coastal GasLink filed its amendment applications for the South of Houston Alternate Route with the B.C. Environmental Assessment Office and the Oil and Gas Commission in November 2017. Coastal GasLink's consideration of a proposed alternate route was entirely initiated as a potential solution to the feedback received from Aboriginal groups in the area.

In late 2014, Coastal GasLink initiated a program to provide local Aboriginal groups with the opportunity to participate in field study activities, information sharing and intergenerational transfer of traditional and cultural knowledge along sections of the Coastal GasLink pipeline comidor.

After extensive consultation with Aboriginal people from various groups through that program, Coastal GasLink initiated additional studies and engineering work to create the South of Houston alternate option to help further reduce effects on traditional and cultural land.

2018 — Coastal GasLink was given approval for the South of Houston Alternate Route by the Environmental Assessment Office in May 2018.

Coastal GasLink announced it will proceed with construction on the project following a positive Final Investment Decision from its partner, LNG Canada on October 2, 2018.

2019 — Coastal GasLink received approval from the Oil and Gas Commission (OGC) on May 1 of an application to amend the pipeline permit for construction of the re-routed section known as the South of Houston Alternate Route (SHAR).



This letter is to alert you to Bill C-68, another piece of interventionist federal legislation that will have a negative impact on your municipality, and on the property rights of your ratepayers.

Bill C-68, which is currently before the Senate, reverses changes to the Fisheries Act – changes which municipalities similar to yours requested our previous Conservative government to make.

Specifically, we amended the "HADD" provisions of the Act, (Harmful Alteration Disruption or Destruction of fish habitat).

One of the most significant problems identified by municipalities about the HADD provision was its broad application and restrictive nature, which ended up costing property taxpayers thousands of dollars, with no real or apparent benefit to the environment.

Municipalities which needed to install culverts or other flood mitigation work were in too many cases faced with negative enforcement after work was completed, with inconsistent guidance when they sought direction for compliance.

In addition to repealing our amendments, the current Federal Government has expanded the definition of "habitat," and added a new concept to the Act, "water flow."

By explicitly adding in the concept of water flow, which was not in the old legislation, the scope of offences municipalities can be charged with, have been greatly expanded.

Worst of all, rather than specifically listing what is and is not an offence under this legislation. including fines or jail, this power has been handed over to the unelected technocrats, to determine by regulation, what the penalties for non-compliance will be, after they have determined what is non-compliance.

As the longest consecutive serving Conservative MP in Ontario, representing a predominantly rural riding, I am very aware of the challenges rural and small-town municipalities have faced dealing with the Federal government.

REPORT

1.0 INTRODUCTION

Financial investments form a critical part of the activities of a municipality, providing a source of revenues for capital expenditures and to offset cash flow fluctuations. The allowable investment parameters as laid out in the Community Charter is considered a "prescribed" or a "closed" set of legislated guidelines designed to protect municipalities from taking unnecessary or undue risks. The concept being that the current regulations provide for a list of instruments that can be placed in the portfolio, instruments that are considered the most creditworthy and least risky, such as provincial debt obligations and investments in financial institutions in Canada. What occurs in a market such as Canada, which represents less than 3% of the global economy, is an over concentration of holdings and limited investment diversification due to the regulation limitations.

The parameters set and limitations for investment powers and opportunities has not changed for decades in British Columbia. The purpose of the proposed changes to Section 183 of the Community Charter is to provide municipalities with the ability to obtain improved returns

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through asset class diversification, which in return can reduce tax implications and funding costs associated with capital funding; while also reducing investment risks. Analysis and discussion for structured governance will be critical to determine the scope of change and authority granted through legislated changes. However, the purpose of this report is to start the conversation with the Province.

2.0 POLICY SECTION

Goal

MUNICIPAL INVESTMENTS 3.0

3.1 Investment Funds

Part 6, Division 3, Section 183 of the Community Charter provides investment guidelines to British Columbia municipalities. These legislated guidelines state that municipalities may invest or reinvest money that is not immediately required for expenditures as follows:

183 Money held by a municipality that is not immediately required may only be invested or reinvested in one or more of the following:

- (a) securities of the Municipal Finance Authority;
- (b) pooled investment funds under section 16 of the *Municipal Finance Authority Act*;
- (c) securities of Canada or of a province;

(d) securities guaranteed for principal and interest by Canada or by a province;

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- (e) securities of a municipality, regional district or greater board;
- (f) investments guaranteed by a chartered bank;
- (g) deposits in a savings institution, or non-equity or membership shares of a credit union:
- (h) other investments specifically authorized under this or another Act.

The British Columbia provincial government is responsible for the laws and framework that provide governance across the province. The *Municipal Act* has provided this guidance since the 1880's. In 1991, UBCM proposed the idea for the creation of a Bill of Rights for municipalities for the purpose of providing broader powers and greater freedoms for BC municipalities. The *Local Government Act* was then created and received Parliamentary approval in 1996. Finally, with Royal Assent in August 2001 of the *Community Charter Council Act*, a Community Charter Council was created for the purpose of developing the *Community Charter*.

BC municipalities have managed investment portfolios under these guidelines as a matter of fiduciary responsibility and with due diligence. Internal investment guidelines support each municipality's investment activities within the constraints of the *Community Charter*. While protectionist in nature, the regulations actually place inadvertent restrictions on the ability to generate higher rates of return and increased revenues, as well as limiting asset class diversification which is paramount to financial sustainability and risk diversification. Currently, BC municipalities can invest in two of the four main asset classes - money market (including cash equivalents) and fixed income (bonds). The other two asset classes include equities and real estate (or other tangible assets). This limitation in turn affects the portfolio real rate of return once inflation is considered and it affects annual taxation rates and other capital costs for a municipality.

3.2 Prudent Investor Rules

The prudent investor rule (aka prudent investor standard) requires the investment manager of an organization to conduct investment activities with care, skill and due-diligence for that which a prudent person would do when managing their own investments, such as property, cash or securities. Such a person would therefore deploy investments through a diversification strategy that can potentially reduce risks while enhancing returns.

A prudent investor would therefore have flexibility and seek opportunities based on market and economic cycles, as well as utilize diversification opportunities both in and outside of Canada. For a municipality, benefits from increased returns can reduce taxation requirements and fees. Without a change to provincial legislation, BC municipalities will continue to invest in

prescribed investment products which under varying market conditions, like the historical low interest rates experienced over the last 10 years that has in turn translated into the lowest yields and lower income.

3.3 Prudent Investor Rules – Other Jurisdictions

Various municipalities and pensions maintain prudent investor rules such as the cities of Ottawa, Edmonton, Calgary, Medicine Hat and more recently the City of Toronto. In 2000, the Canada Pension Plan began investing in equities and other investment products (real estate, commodities and futures) with the main goal of seeking higher returns and to stabilize the Canada Pension Plan (CPP) program for future generations. This change meant a more diversified and global deployment of funds for capital appreciation, taking advantage of a much larger global market than just Canadian content.

When the Province of Ontario decided to make changes to the municipal legislation, it was for the purpose of providing municipalities more flexibility. Thus, allowing local governments more freedom to invest available funds in a larger pool of diversified investment products. Providing the added flexibility and freedom could potentially deliver higher returns while lowering or removing systemic risks, reinvestment risks and interest rate risks. The Ontario government put in place specific requirements that a local government must meet to permanently opt into the prudent investor program. The logic was to ensure appropriate governance and structure was in place with separate guidance from an independent board for the expanded portfolio.

The City of Toronto is currently preparing to place their initial investments into equities now that the legislated requirements for prudent standards have been met. The City of Ottawa however has been investing endowment funds of over \$200 million since 2007. Ottawa conducted an RFP and hired two fund managers to manage the investments of the endowment. Applying prudent investment standards to the endowment funds has allowed the City of Ottawa to generate much higher yields over the last decade when compared to the funds invested based on the prescribed legislation. Also, the City of Ottawa is watching Toronto's activities closely and will contemplate the opt-in decision for the remaining portfolio funds as they have first-hand knowledge of the large differential in returns between their funds.

The City of Edmonton began investing in equities in 1995 with the creation of an endowment fund. A May 2014 staff white paper identified that through the use of asset class diversification, the endowment fund has contributed well over \$700 million to the City of Edmonton's operating budget and the fund has grown from \$445 million to \$710 million. Staff reports indicate that the change to investment structure has allowed the city to achieve cost efficiencies and to better align the portfolios with specific risk profile needs and objectivity. This in turn allows for the creation of new asset class investing, such as global infrastructure and emerging market equities, while achieving the goals of increasing overall returns and long term financial sustainability.

Another report highlighted that Edmonton home owners have saved over 7% for the period 2005 – 2014 on property taxes paid. Not only have the funds increased returns resulted in a reduction of the tax burden on citizens, but has and will continue to the support the city's financial position

and sustainability. The investment diversification through prudent investor rules has meant an expanded revenue base for operating and capital budgets.

3.4 Prudent Investor Rules - Capacity and Knowledge

While providing expanded investment options to municipalities through legislation can achieve many benefits, consideration must be made regarding municipal capacity and expertise. Any change in legislation will require municipal input in determining the governance structure that will work best for the province and each municipality. With examples from Ontario and Alberta now in place, this presents a tremendous opportunity to learn from the legislative process and experiences and to understand the need for improvements and the request to change.

Because of the vast range of assignments and work conducted in municipal treasury, the current staff compliments most likely will not have the expertise to branch out into a larger array of investment asset class products. Indeed, smaller municipalities have very few staff that manage varying professional disciplines such as budgets, banking, trades payable, accounting and investments. There are however significant differences amongst the municipalities in the lower mainland and across the province when it comes to portfolio management expertise and knowledge. So governance must consider inclusion for all without creating additional costs and risks.

Such risks can be mitigated through pooling investments or contracts with qualified funds managers through the set-up of simplified but effective reporting standards and clear guidelines. Under prudent investment standards the need for monitoring the decisions made, portfolio performance, policy and governance principles becomes even greater. Setting the criteria by thoughtful consideration will ensure a more comprehensive and general acceptance and adaptation by municipalities. The goal is not to make prudent investing an impossible challenge, but to ensure there is significant and meaningful impact when prudent investment standards are followed.

4.0 REQUIRED CHANGE IN LEGISLATION

The City of Burnaby has maintained a concentrated and focused effort on the investment portfolio for over three decades. This attention has provided for consistently improved yields and income generation. While the City of Burnaby has outperformed market benchmarks and municipal peers, there are still missed opportunities due to investment restrictions based on the current legislation.

While protectionist in nature, a "prescribed" or "closed" set of guidelines can introduce unintended risks by being extremely limited, thus introducing systemic and interest rate risks to a municipal portfolio. This can increase in magnitude for a large portfolio that seeks additional product and yield within the limited reach and size of the Canadian fixed income market. The *Community Charter* provides clarity but does not empower a municipality to obtain greater investment variation and seek to reduce risk further through asset diversification and allocation.

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It is therefore proposed that by providing prudent investor standards within the *Community Charter* or other provincial legislation, risk versus reward through asset class diversification can culminate into various funding and cash flow opportunities as returns increase. If the City of Burnaby moved 30% of current holdings to other asset classes for example (Edmonton has 60% of the endowment fund in equities), with only a 2.5% increase in yield on that portion of the portfolio, the annual additional revenue would be \$12.75 million per year.

The evidence is very clear from municipal examples to pension plans and historical analysis that asset mix is a critical determinant of long term investment fund stability, yield and income. Maintaining a set of guidelines that limits municipal investing to a restricted list of products within limited asset classes will result in what is occurring in many municipal portfolios today – yields that range from 1.50% - 3.00% with significantly reduced income. The current standards limit municipal investments to the Canadian market only and to the fixed income asset class which is based on Canadian interest rates only.

The size and utilization of the City's investment reserves, without debt payment obligations other than internally through annual depreciation, means we are well positioned for the longer term investment time horizon that is needed under other asset classes such as equities and real estate. Providing proficient and transparent oversight to the investment portfolio ensures the City of Burnaby is acting in the best interest of citizens. This also means identifying that as investment markets and economies have changed over the years, opportunities have been missed. The best starting point is to begin the conversation about making changes to the current investment legislation in British Columbia.

And while those opposed to change may suggest that introducing the prudent investor rules will bring with it needless risks, one must consider that risk is defined in many ways, including the long term financial sustainability of municipalities and the tax burden placed on residents. Risk diversification also means fund managers and fund management, not just guarantors and asset class diversification. Risk management means a governance structure that takes into consideration the varying investment strategies that can be deployed and empowering municipalities to diversify and grow for future generations of citizens. For these reasons, updating legislation to include prudent investment rules is practical and warranted.

4.1 Resolution: Expanded Asset Class Investments Under Prudent Investor Rules

Given the discussion above, and recognizing that the ability to properly manage and grow assets is an important role of local government, the following resolution has been prepared for the Committee and Council's consideration.

WHEREAS financial investments form a critical part of the activities of a municipality, providing a source of revenues for capital expenditures and to offset cash flow fluctuations;

AND WHEREAS allowable investment parameters as laid out in the *Community Charter* is considered a "prescribed" set of legislated guidelines.

AND WHEREAS the Provinces of Alberta and Ontario have implemented a wider scope for local government investment, which responds to the needs of local governments of all sizes:

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Union of BC Municipalities request the Ministry of Finance to amend the *Community Charter* to provide municipalities with the ability to obtain improved returns through asset class diversification, which in return can reduce tax implications and funding costs associated with capital funding, while also reducing investment risk.

5.0 RECOMMENDATIONS

It is recommended that the Committee recommend Council provide support for changes to the Community Charter to allow for expanded asset class investments under prudent investor rules. It is also recommended that the Committee recommend Council request support from other municipalities for the requested changes to the Community Charter and that a resolution, as outlined in Section 4.1 of this report, be submitted to the Union of British Columbia Municipalities on this matter.



Single-Use Plastics Ban

I am writing to request your support for bringing forward province-wide regulations to reduce single-use plastic bags.

The impact of single-use plastics on the environment and water systems is well understood and documented. Single-use bags and other items are now widely regarded as an ecological danger, leaching into soils, groundwater, and the ocean and harming marine wildlife as well as entering our food systems. As a coastal community, the Comox Valley is deeply connected to the natural environment economically, ecologically, socially and culturally. In short, a healthy environment vital for the well-being of all local residents.

While some municipalities are moving forward with checkout bag regulations to restrict their use, regional districts do not generally have legislated authority to regulate businesses and are therefore unable to meaningfully address this issue. Given the current trend, this will create a patchwork of regulations across the province that will impact our ability to collectively reduce this harmful plastic waste.

The Comox Valley Regional District Board, in response to a delegation from the Comox Valley Nurses for Health and the Environment, is advocating for such changes and seeking your support to work with your ministerial colleagues to bring forward uniform regulations that would apply across the Province of British Columbia.

Reducing single-use plastic bags and disposable plastic packaging is vital for protecting our oceans, lakes, waterways and natural environment and we ask that your ministry take a leadership role in this matter.

I am writing on behalf of Maple Ridge City Council to inform you of recent action taken by the Province of British Columbia that undermines the authority granted to municipal governments, and request that you pass a resolution to be forwarded to Premier Horgan and the Union of BC Municipalities (UBCM) expressing concern for the impact this action has on the roles defined for local government within the Community Charter (CC) and the Local Government Act (LGA).

By way of background, I share with you the recent experience of the City of Maple Ridge, where on two separate occasions, we have been subjected to the Province's unilateral action to bypass local government autonomy and public process, inconsistent with our local zoning.

In May 2018, the Province of BC made application to the City of Maple Ridge to rezone provincially-owned properties on 11749 & 11761 Burnett Street (as referenced in Item 1108 of the May 22, 2019 Council Meeting Report) to build purpose built supportive housing. Citizens attended a public meeting hosted by local MLAs and presented a 10,000 name petition against this application citing several considerations that made the site unsuitable including its proximity to a daycare, two schools, a seniors centre, and that the proposed model itself was inadequate to meet the complex mental health and addiction support services required, particularly persons coming from a camp environment. Following the public process, the City rejected the application. The Provincial Government responded to this decision by taking unilateral action to install housing through the Rapid Response to Homelessness (RRH) program on a nearby provincially-owned site on Royal Crescent, next to senior and low income housing, without any local consultation citing emergency measures were needed to ensure camp closure, which did not happen.

Since this Council took office in November 2018, we have taken swift and deliberate steps to address mental health and housing problems in our community, especially with regard to the ongoing presence of the St. Anne Camp that was first established in May 2017. We have endeavored to open positive channels of communication with the Province of BC to deliver a workable plan that addresses immediate and long term housing needs in our community, while respecting the views that have been clearly stated by local citizens. This began with post-election meetings in October 2018 with our local MP, MLAs, Fraser Health Authority, BC Housing and related non-profit service providers followed by Council's development of a Strategic Plan which includes direction to establish a Community Safety Plan as a major tenet of this work. These steps have been followed up most recently with a meeting in Victoria on February 25, 2019 with Ministers we felt needed to be present to assist us in our plan, that being Ministers of Health, Mental Health and Addictions, Poverty and Housing to discuss a broad range of problems including housing affordability, delivery of addiction and mental health services, community safety, and how we can move forward on these matters in Maple Ridge.

On Monday, March 4, just one week after that meeting, I received a phone call from the Housing Minister demanding that the City deliver a "Social Housing Plan" within five days to address short and long term needs, including providing immediate housing to facilitate the closure of the St. Anne Camp. Council immediately passed a resolution and then delivered on this request in seven days, with all related resolutions from Council to demonstrate our willingness and commitment to collaborate for a mutually beneficial outcome. The Plan was immediately rejected by the Province. The Province cited the unsuitability of the City's chosen property, despite City staff's assessment that the site could accommodate immediate housing needs to achieve camp closure. One week later, Minister Robinson announced publicly that RRH housing would be installed on Burnett Street, at the same location local residents and the previous Council had already rejected through the usual local application process.

Maple Ridge Council is gravely concerned by this second instance of the Provincial Government overriding local autonomy. The initial 53 housing units installed on Royal Crescent did not end the St. Anne Camp as promised by the Province, with units populated by both camp residents and other homeless individuals identified by BC Housing as a regional housing provider. In five months' time, the facility has experienced two deaths, and seen few moving forward as evidenced by statistics provided by the operator. Increasing crime at this location, the St. Anne Camp, and all other low barrier facilities in Maple Ridge indicates that the chosen model is not suitable to help people in a very serious state of poor mental health often coupled with significant substance misuse problems. Moreover, we have seen that other communities working to address closure of camps experienced similar results (e.g. Nanaimo, Victoria, Surrey and now Maple Ridge).

The emphasis that has been placed on low barrier housing in Maple Ridge, which includes approximately 950 rental supplements for untreated persons mostly suffering from substance misuse and mental health problems, has eliminated most of our affordable housing stock that is critical for people on low income, veterans, seniors, single parents and persons with disabilities. Furthermore, ongoing criminal activity has overtaxed all front line resources. These are real and significant local concerns that have been swept aside by the Province's action.

What our community needs is a comprehensive health care facility focusing on mental and physical health, addictions recovery, and services to move people forward to a better place in their lives. We asked for this as part of our Social Housing Plan to the Province, a Plan which recognizes that local governments' role is to make decisions in the best interest of local residents. By acting unilaterally, the Province has imposed regional priorities at the expense of Maple Ridge citizens, and taken away our Council's ability to represent the best interests of our community.

We therefore ask you, our fellow local governments, to consider the ramifications of this unilateral action by the Province of BC to overrule municipal land use regulations and dispense with public consultation and collaboration with local government. In our view, it sets a dangerous precedent that jeopardizes the autonomy of all local governments in British Columbia, and could have repercussions for a wide range of sensitive matters that municipalities might consider, such as a waste incineration plant, a prison, a communication tower, etc. For projects such as these, it is particularly important that senior government initiatives go through proper process including site assessment and suitability evaluation, and for the Province of BC to respect the authority that has been granted to local governments to carry out due public process and represent the best interests of their communities in order to ensure approval.

We appreciate that initiatives such as the RRH program may or may not be suitable in your community. Local government holds the authority and responsibility of making the right decisions based on a balance of all interests and weighing local and regional needs, while working with our senior government partners.

Enclosed you will find a proposed resolution that is strictly about the importance of local government autonomy. We ask that you consider passing this resolution and forward a copy to Premier Horgan and the UBCM to let them know that local governments require the Province of BC to respect local democracy and work collaboratively with us to move forward on projects and programs of mutual concern that balance the interests of all BC residents.

Thank you for your consideration of this important matter.

Rural B.C. to benefit from expanded high-speed internet

Improved connectivity due to updates to the Local Government Act will provide more options for people living in rural and remote areas to connect with friends and family, purchase goods or services, access health services, expand their business or even telecommute.

These changes give regional districts an additional tool to help expand high-speed internet to under-served areas.

"Regional districts have been asking for this. It's one more way we are delivering results that empower communities, bringing more people online to be involved in, and benefit from, today's digital economy," said Selina Robinson, Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing. "The changes build on the significant investments our government has already made to connect people and communities by increasing their access to high-speed internet service."

Changes enable regional districts to provide financing for capital costs to internet service providers where it may not otherwise make sense from a business perspective. This will help advance construction of new connectivity infrastructure for rural and remote communities.

Although the act generally prohibits a regional district from aiding a business, it also contains specific exceptions to this rule for services that are often considered essential, such as telephone, natural gas or electricity. Changes to the Local Government Act reflect that high-speed internet has become a basic service.

"High-speed internet is not a luxury — it's an absolute necessity in today's digital world. This legislative change will empower regional districts to help bring this vital service to residents in a way that meets the specific needs of their communities," said Jinny Sims, Minister of Citizens' Services. "The greatest successes in expanding broadband in rural areas have come when all levels of government, the private sector and community groups work together to make the most of this essential infrastructure for local businesses and people."

The Province has defined high-speed internet service to align with standards established by the Canadian Radio-Television and Telecommunications Commission. To qualify as a high-speed internet service, the new standards require minimum speeds of 50 megabits per second when downloading information and 10 megabits per second when uploading information.

"We are pleased and supportive of the changes made to the Local Government Act to continue to improve services and connectivity for all rural areas across the province," said Ian Thorpe, chair of the Regional District of Nanaimo. "We were very appreciative of the federal Gas Tax Funds received in 2017 that helped bring high-speed internet to a rural area within our region."

Updates to the Local Government Act respond to needs identified by local governments through resolutions endorsed by the Union of B.C. Municipalities.

Funding & Resources Update

Apr. 10, 2019

Each month we provide an update on UBCM funding programs and information on other programs, events and resources that may be of interest to local governments and First Nations.

Local Government Program Services

Asset Management Planning: This program seeks to support local governments to take next steps on the path to better asset management practices. A further objective of the program is to support local governments in meeting their asset management commitments under the Gas Tax Fund. Matching grants of up to \$15,000.00 are available. Application deadlines are May 3 and October 4, 2019.

Urban Communities Partnering for Reconciliation: This program intended to support events and activities that provide a time and place for dialogue to build on opportunities, support reconciliation efforts, resolve issues of common responsibility, interest or concern, and/or to advance tangible outcomes. Funding is available to eligible Indigenous organizations and local governments who want to create opportunities for in-person dialogue and relationship building. The application deadline is May 24, 2019.

Regional Community to Community Forums: With the goal of increased understanding and improved overall relations between First Nations and local governments, C2C Forum events are intended to provide a time and place for dialogue to build on opportunities, support reconciliation efforts, resolve issues of common responsibility, interest or concern, and/or to advance tangible outcomes. The C2C program can contribute a maximum of 50% of the cost of eligible activities -- to a maximum of \$5,000.00. Application deadlines for this fiscal year are September 13 and December 6, 2019.

Structural Flood Mitigation: The intent of this Community Emergency Preparedness Fund stream is to support eligible applicants to prevent, eliminate or reduce the impacts of hazards through construction of structural flood mitigation projects. Ongoing operational costs are not eligible. The maximum eligible funding is \$750,000. The application deadline is October 25, 2019.

Other Funding

Columbia Basin Trust Grants: Environment Small Grants and Social Small Grants, of up to \$5,000, are available to municipalities, regional districts and Indigenous organizations in the CBT region. The deadline is April 30, 2019.

Community Outdoor Revitalization Grants are available to municipalities with populations of 5,000 or less, unincorporated areas and First Nations communities. The deadline to apply for capital grants is June 14, 2019. Project Planning and Design Grant applications are accepted on an ongoing basis.

Northern Development Initiative Trust Housing Grants: Three new funding programs to assist local governments in creating strategic solutions to housing needs in their communities.

The Housing Needs Assessment program provides one-time grant funding to local governments for the development of a comprehensive housing needs assessment that covers the entire community. Up to \$10,000, or 50% of the eligible project budget, is available to local governments. The intake is continuous and applications will be approved on a first come, first served basis until the \$200,000 annual funding allocation has been fully committed.

The Community Planning for Housing program provides local governments with up to \$40,000 to hire one employee for one year to identify housing issues and develop appropriate responses that will encourage the development of housing that meets the needs of their community. Host communities must commit a minimum of \$10,000 toward the salary to support a base minimum salary of \$50,000. The deadline to apply is May 10, 2019.

The Northern Housing Incentive program provides funding to local governments to create a 'Dollars to the Door' program that will enhance and support economic development by incentivizing private sector housing developments across Northern B.C., which will, in turn, retain seniors and attract work force and thereby increase business and employment opportunities. Local governments are eligible to receive a grant of up to \$10,000 per dwelling created in a multi-unit market housing project up to \$200,000. There are four intakes for this program per year.

NDIT Strategic Initiatives Fund: Approximately \$600,000 is available for large-scale projects that will enhance a community's ability to overcome economic challenges and increase strategic economic infrastructure within a First Nation or local government. This funding is only available to local governments and First Nations within Northern Development's service region. Deadline is July 31, 2019.

Local Government Restructure Grants: This program supports the arms length, credible examination of the potential impacts of significant changes to the geography or services of a local government. These grants also cover the transition and implementation costs to reduce barriers to restructuring local governments.

FCM Funding Opportunities: Visit this site to learn about FCM's funding offerings, from plans and studies, to pilots, capital projects and more.

Indigenous Agriculture and Food Systems Initiative: The objective of this initiative is to increase economic development opportunities of Indigenous Peoples and communities in Canada by supporting Indigenous communities and entrepreneurs who are ready to launch agriculture and food systems projects and others who want to build their capacity to participate in the Canadian agriculture and agri-food sector.

First Nations Adapt Program: This federal program supports First Nation communities to assess and respond to climate change impacts on community infrastructure and emergency management. It prioritizes communities most impacted by sea level rise, flooding, forest fires, and winter road failures. Applications are reviewed on an ongoing basis.

Events & Resources

Adaptation Canada 2020: The Call for Abstracts for Adaptation Canada 2020 is now open - with a submission deadline of May 21, 2019. Adaptation Canada will bring to Vancouver experts and leaders from diverse sectors, regions and jurisdictions to work on how to build climate change resilience in our communities, ecosystems and economies.

Webinar - FireSmart in BC: FireSmart Canada leads the national efforts to engage citizens and communities in reducing wildfire risk. This webinar will describe the national programs and opportunities for communities as well as new initiatives in BC to expand FireSmart activities across the province. This webinar is part of the Wildfire and Climate Change Winter/Spring 2019 series. April 18 from 2:00pm to 3:00pm PST.

BC FireSmart Website: The BC FireSmart Committee has launched a new website in time for the 2019 wildfire season. The website introduces the FireSmart program and its seven disciplines and is intended as a one stop shop for all things FireSmart. The site includes links to training, education, an events calendar, resource library and downloadable content. It also features a short video inviting everyone to become involved in prevention and to learn about the benefits of FireSmart.

Weathering the Storm - Developing a Canadian Standard for Flood-Resilient Existing Communities: This report from the Intact Centre on Climate Adaptation presents a flood hazard and vulnerability screening framework that can help identify areas in existing residential communities that require the most immediate attention for flood risk. Application of the framework will enable communities to make better-informed decisions when prioritizing areas for flood-resiliency programming.

Resources for Rural & Small Communities: BC Healthy Communities has launched a collection of resources related to PlanH action areas, with a rural and small community lens.

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
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In Memoriam: Former Oak Bay Mayor Nils Jensen

Apr. 10, 2019



Former Oak Bay Mayor Nils Jensen has died as a result of cancer. Mr. Jensen was elected to Oak Bay Council over 15 years, including two terms as Mayor. He also served as Chair of the Capital Regional District, chaired its regional water supply commission and was a member of UBCM's Executive. He was 69.

Jensen had a bachelor's degree in chemical engineering, and law degrees from Osgoode Hall and the London School of Economics. He worked as a crown prosecutor for the province of B.C. and taught law at the University of Victoria.

"I'm sad to hear about the passing of my friend Nils Jensen," said UBCM president Arjun Singh. "He was a warm, intelligent, decent person. As

Mayor, he advocated tirelessly for Oak Bay. He was also one of the most articulate people I have served with on the UBCM Executive."

A memorial service will be held in the Oak Bay High School Community Theater Thursday April 11 at 2 p.m. At the request of the family, donations may be made to the Mayors' Art Legacy Fund.

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Survey on Legalized Cannabis Costs

Apr. 17, 2019

UBCM, in collaboration with GFOABC, is preparing a survey on the costs to local government as a result of cannabis legalization. The data from this survey will inform ongoing discussions with the province and UBCM on the appropriate sharing of the cannabis excise tax so that the one time and ongoing local government costs are not funded through the property tax.

The federal government has agreed to provide provinces and territories with 75% of revenue derived from the cannabis excise tax, a 10% tax on the final retail price of cannabis. Originally, the distribution was to be 50-50; however, this was met with criticism from a number of provinces, including British Columbia who argued that provinces and local governments would assume the majority of responsibilities. The federal government eventually provided the additional 25% to provinces and territories specifically in recognition of local costs.

UBCM has been engaged with the Province over the past two years in the lead up and adoption of legislation legalizing non-medical cannabis. At the 2018 UBCM Convention, local governments endorsed a resolution seeking to advance a short- and long-term strategy for cannabis excise tax revenue sharing in recognition of the one time and ongoing costs anticipated by local government. This strategy has been discussed with MLAs and Ministry of Finance representatives, however the Province has yet to commit any of its excise tax revenue to address local costs.


Among the many issues arising from legislative changes, the tracking of incremental costs has been of interest to provincial governments, particularly in supporting the idea of excise tax revenue sharing. UBCM, with input from GFOABC, has been working to develop a model that will provide consistency with regard to types of costs, and facilitate analysis of information based on various criteria (e.g. size of local government, expenditure type, etc.).

The survey will be distributed to local government Chief Financial Officers on May 1.

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Caribou Consultation Extended, Liaison Appointed

Apr. 17, 2019

Due to concerns raised by communities and other stakeholders on the draft caribou recovery agreements, the provincial government has extended the engagement period to May 31, 2019. The Province has also appointed Blair Lekstrom as community liaison to engage residents in the Peace River region.

Councillor Lekstrom was elected to the City of Dawson Creek council in 2018. His prior elected experience includes service as a threeterm MLA, cabinet minister, and Mayor.

The provincial press release advises that Lekstrom will consult with community leaders and local stakeholders on the draft agreements; provide input into the economic impact analysis; and advise the Province on how they can meet their obligations to protect caribou, while also protecting local jobs and communities.

UBCM members have previously endorsed resolutions asking the Province to enter into real consultation with all affected communities on recovery plans for the Southern Mountain Caribou. Members have also asked the Province to consider the socio-economic impacts of potential caribou recovery plans.

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Housing Needs Funding

Apr. 17, 2019

A new funding program is receiving applications from local governments to support the development of housing needs reports. Local governments can apply for grants ranging from \$15,000-\$70,000 depending on the population of the planning area(s) included in their application.

Housing needs reports are required by newly-amended legislation and will strengthen the ability of local governments to understand what kinds of housing are most needed in their communities, and help inform local plans, policies, and development decisions.

The Ministry of Municipal Affairs & Housing has confirmed \$5 million over three years for this program. The Program supports local governments in undertaking housing needs reports in order to meet the provincial requirements.

The program is structured to reflect the planning areas for which local governments are required to complete housing needs reports: municipalities, electoral areas and local trust areas (within the Islands Trust).

Funding permitting, the application deadlines are May 31, 2019, and November 29, 2019. For more information, please contact Local Government Program Services or call 250-952-9177.

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Advisor Appointed for Marine Debris

Apr. 17, 2019

MLA Sheila Malcolmson has been appointed as special advisor to Minister Heyman on marine debris protection. Her responsibilities include making recommendations for a provincial action plan to eliminate environmental threats caused by derelict vessels.

MLA Malcolmson will work under the direction of Minister Heyman to:

- Make recommendations for a provincial action plan, in co-ordination with the federal government, to eliminate the environmental threats caused by derelict vessels including but not limited to:
 - building on existing work and partnerships, collaborate with the federal government on potential development of a boatlicensing program to aid enforcement of regulations for the management of derelict boats;
 - the feasibility of an environmental stewardship program to manage the end-of-life recycling of boats and marine infrastructure, as well as fibreglass and other elements of derelict boats;
 - the feasibility of a "cash for clunkers" program for derelict vessels or those at the end of their useful life; and
 - what lessons can be learned from the Washington state program for this problem.
- · Make recommendations for provincial action to curb the disposal of plastics in the marine environment.

The UBCM membership has consistently endorsed resolutions calling on the provincial and federal governments to develop a solution to the issue of abandoned and derelict vessels.


The federal government has also taken action to address derelict vessels by introducing Bill C64, Wrecked, Abandoned or Hazardous Vessels Act. This Act received Royal Assent in February 2019 and will seek to ensure that wrecked, abandoned or hazardous commercial and pleasure vessels are removed and remediated at the owner's expense.

The Act is one of the six measures introduced under the federal government's \$1.5 billion Oceans Protection Plan to address abandoned vessels. The other five measures are:

- Inventory and Assessments
- · Improving vessel owner identification
- Long-term funding for the removal of wrecked and abandoned vessels
- · Abandoned Boats Program
- · Small Craft Harbours Abandoned and Wrecked Vessels Removal Program

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Input Sought on Fisheries Act Regulations

Apr. 17, 2019

The Department of Fisheries and Oceans is seeking input on proposed modifications to the Fisheries Act Regulations, which will affect fish and fish habitat protections. Comments are requested by May 3, 2019.

In 2015, The Minister of Fisheries, Oceans and the Canadian Coast Guard was mandated to review the changes made in 2012 to the Fisheries Act, to restore lost protections and incorporate modern safeguards. On February 6, 2018 the government introduced Bill C-68, An Act to Amend the Fisheries Act and other Acts in Consequence. This Bill passed third reading by the House of Commons and was referred to the Standing Senate Committee on Fisheries and Oceans on December 11, 2018.

While Bill C-68 is undergoing review by Parliament, DFO is engaging in discussions with Canadians on proposed modifications to the Fisheries Act Regulations in anticipation of the coming into force of the fish and fish habitat protection provisions of an amended Fisheries Act, should the Bill receive Royal Assent.

A discussion paper has been posted for comment for a period of 30 days. The purpose of this discussion paper is to inform partners and stakeholders of proposed changes to the Fisheries Act Regulations and to provide an opportunity to comment on the proposal.

The deadline for providing feedback is May 3, 2019.

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Input Sought on Code of Conduct for Local Governments

Apr. 24, 2019

The Working Group on Responsible Conduct (Working Group) is seeking feedback on local government experiences with codes of conduct. The Working Group also invites input to guide the development of a code of conduct framework for B.C.'s local government system, including processes for establishing, adopting, maintaining and enforcing a code of conduct.

British Columbia has a strong tradition of accountable, responsible and effective leadership by local elected leaders. We also know that when there are breaches of conduct by elected officials, significant impacts result.

In response to a resolution at the 2016 Convention, the Working Group - comprised of staff from UBCM, the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing and Local Government Management Association (LGMA) - has been exploring ways in which the practice of responsible conduct by local elected officials can be strengthened.

Following the release of a set of foundational principles and a model code of conduct, the Working Group is now turning its attention to the framework that supports a code of conduct.

The key components of a code of conduct framework include processes for establishing, adopting, maintaining and enforcing the code of conduct. The Working Group is looking for your views on the balance between standardized rules and local flexibility if local codes of conduct were to be mandatory in legislation in B.C.

The Working Group has found that provinces with enforcement provisions also have legislation that requires local governments to adopt a code of conduct. As a result, local governments lose the choice about whether or not to adopt a code of conduct, but gain an enhanced ability to enforce the code of conduct. The survey will seek views on making a code of conduct mandatory for all local governments.

The survey will also explore a range of other questions in relation to enforcement, including how complaints should be managed; how breaches might be investigated; and what an acceptable range of penalties might look like.

The survey takes approximately 15 minutes to complete and is open to individual local government elected officials and Chief Administrative Officers and Corporate Officers. CAOs and CCOs are asked to convey the link to the survey to all Council and Board members. The LGMA will do a separate distribution of the survey to its members.

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RCMP Contract Committee Seeks Input

May 1, 2019

The RCMP Local Government Contract Management Committee (LGCMC) will be meeting on May 23, 2019 to discuss policing issues of relevance. Local governments wishing to suggest discussion items related to the agreement under which the RCMP provides local police services to BC are asked to submit input to Bhar Sihota, UBCM Policy Analyst, prior to May 8.


The LGCMC is a forum for consultation, analysis and communication between local government and the Province regarding the management of the RCMP police services contract. Biannual in-person meetings present an opportunity for members to analyze and respond to changes that may be proposed from time to time by the federal government and/or RCMP, and recommend changes to the federal government and/or RCMP that may be considered necessary or appropriate.

The LGCMC is comprised of nine local government representatives from throughout the province, appointed for two or three year terms by UBCM's Executive, as well as a representative of UBCM's Executive, and the provincial Assistant Deputy Minister and Director of Police Services, Policing and Security Branch. RCMP representatives are invited to attend Committee meetings as required.

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Session Proposal Process

The session proposal process for the 2019 UBCM Convention will open on April 29th, 2019 and proposals will be accepted until June 7th, 2019.

There are two opportunities for session participation at the 2019 Convention: workshops and clinics. Please refer to the session details and tips offered below prior to submitting a proposal.

Workshops

These are limited to four sessions of approximately two hours. While some proposals are accepted as submitted, preference is given to those that have multi-party participation. UBCM will review such proposals and may suggest combining them with other proposals that have similar themes.

Clinics

These are early morning sessions of 45 minutes in length that generally involve a presentation by a group to a small audience of delegates. Typically, five clinics are offered on Tuesday and four to five each on Wednesday and Thursday. Approximately 15 clinics are held, making this the best opportunity for inclusion in the Convention program.

Proposal Guidelines

The proposal submission process is comprised of the following steps:

- Call for proposals: April 29
- Proposals received until June 7
- · Convention Committee deliberates: July 11
- Proponents are informed of results by July 24. Please do not contact UBCM about results before this date.
- Successful applicants must confirm their session description and list of presenters with UBCM by August 8, for inclusion in the Convention program booklet
- Presenters must agree to submit all PowerPoint and multimedia files for their presentation to the Convention Presentation Management upload site no later than September 13

Writing your Session Description

Please write a session description and session title that UBCM delegates would read in the Convention program booklet when determining which clinics and workshops to attend at the 2019 UBCM Convention. The session description must not exceed 125 words in length. The session description and title is required when submitting your session proposal to the Convention Committee. Successful applicants must submit their final session description and title to UBCM by August 8 for inclusion in the Convention program booklet.

Criteria

1. Proposals must be submitted following the application process provided by UBCM. Submissions sent in any other format will not be accepted.

- 2. UBCM will accept applications until June 7. 3. The application must be completed online.
- 4. All questions/fields of the online application form must be completed.
- 5. All successful applicants must provide a properly labeled electronic copy of their presentation to the Presentation Management System no later than September 13. Once uploaded, the presenter must inform their UBCM contact person. Information on accessing this website will be provided by the UBCM staff contact person assigned to each successful applicant.
- 6. These requirements apply to all proposals, including those from UBCM staff, UBCM Committees and external groups.

Committee Decision

The Convention Committee will carefully weigh all final proposals to determine which contribute the most to delegate knowledge and contain subject matter currently relevant to local governments. Proponents will be informed of the Committee's decisions by July 24.

Once accepted, proponents must commit to having a clinic/workshop description and title complete by August 8, should the initial application description not be sufficient. This final description will be published in the convention program. The description must be 125 words or less in length.

Should proponents fail to meet the program description deadline, the Committee may substitute with another proposal.

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For CFOs: Cannabis Costs Survey

May 1, 2019

UBCM, in collaboration with GFOABC, has released a survey seeking to examine local government costs related to cannabis legalization. The data collected will support UBCM's discussions with the Province regarding cannabis excise tax revenue sharing, so that local government implementation costs are not funded through the property tax.

Quantifying incremental expenditures associated with cannabis legalization has been of interest to several provincial governments, including British Columbia. To best accomplish this goal, UBCM, with input from GFOABC, has developed a model to provide consistency with regard to types of costs and facilitate analysis of information based on various criteria (e.g. size of local government, expenditure type, etc.).

The survey has been designed to report on expenditures for the 3-year period, 2018-2020. The 3-year period was selected recognizing that there are incremental costs (e.g. application review, licensing, bylaw development, etc.) that may not be incurred until at least 2020. Reporting for 2018 is to be based on actual expenditures, while 2019-2020 reporting is to reflect budgeted expenditures.



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Amendments Enable Broadband Service

May 1, 2019

An update to the *Local Government Act* (LGA) will provide regional districts with an additional tool to expand high-speed Internet to under-served areas. The changes enable regional districts to provide financing for capital costs to Internet service providers where it may not otherwise make sense from a business perspective.

Regional Districts have been historically challenged to deliver broadband services within their jurisdictions, where legislation limited the options available to them. Specifically, the prohibition on assistance to business within the LGA excluded regional districts from providing financial assistance to Internet service providers. The LGA does contain specific exceptions for services that are considered essential, such as telephone, natural gas or electricity. The changes to the LGA reflect that high-speed Internet is now considered an essential service.

These legislative amendments respond to UBCM resolutions on this issue, including a 2017 resolution (B37) from the Regional District of East Kootenay.

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Toward Parity Survey – Response Requested

Did you miss the UBCM-FCM Toward Parity webinar? You can still contribute your feedback by completing a survey. Through previous consultations, identified barriers have been prioritized, recognizing that not all women experience all barriers while others may experience compounding impacts from these obstacles.



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Funding & Resources Update

May 1, 2019

Each month the Compass provides an update on UBCM funding programs as well as information on other programs, events and resources that may be of interest to local governments and First Nations.

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Asset Management Planning: This program seeks to support local governments to take next steps on the path to better asset management practices. A further objective of the program is to support local governments in meeting their asset management commitments under the Gas Tax Fund. Matching grants of up to \$15,000 are available. The next application deadline is May 3, 2019.

Urban Communities Partnering for Reconciliation: This program is intended to support events and activities that provide a time and place for dialogue to build on opportunities, support reconciliation efforts, resolve issues of common responsibility, interest or concern, and/or to advance tangible outcomes. Funding is available to eligible Indigenous organizations and local governments who want to create opportunities for in-person dialogue and relationship building. The application deadline is May 24, 2019.

Regional Community to Community Forums: With the goal of increased understanding and improved overall relations between First Nations and local governments, C2C Forum events are intended to provide a time and place for dialogue to build on opportunities, support reconciliation efforts, resolve issues of common responsibility, interest or concern, and/or to advance tangible outcomes. The C2C program can contribute a maximum of 50% of the cost of eligible activities - to a maximum of \$5,000. The application deadlines for forum events to be held by March 31, 2020 are September 13, 2019 and December 6, 2019.

Structural Flood Mitigation: The intent of this Community Emergency Preparedness Fund stream is to support eliqible applicants to prevent, eliminate or reduce the impacts of hazards through construction of structural flood mitigation projects. Ongoing operational costs are not eligible. The maximum eligible funding is \$750,000. The application deadline is October 25, 2019.

Other Funding

Northern Development Initiative Trust Grants: Three new funding programs to assist local governments in creating strategic solutions to housing needs in their communities.

The Housing Needs Assessment program provides one-time grant funding to local governments for the development of a comprehensive housing needs assessment that covers the entire community. Up to \$10,000, or 50% of the eligible project budget, is available to local governments. The intake is continuous and applications will be approved on a first come, first served basis until the \$200,000 annual funding allocation has been fully committed.

The Community Planning for Housing program provides local governments with up to \$40,000 to hire one employee for one year to identify housing issues and develop appropriate responses that will encourage the development of housing that meets the needs of their community. Host communities must commit a minimum of \$10,000 toward the salary to support a base minimum salary of \$50,000. The deadline to apply is May 10, 2019.

The Northern Housing Incentive program provides funding to local governments to create a 'Dollars to the Door' program that will enhance and support economic development by incentivizing private sector housing developments across Northern BC that will, in turn, retain seniors and attract a work force to increase business and employment opportunities. Local governments are eligible to receive a grant of up to \$10,000 per dwelling created in a multi-unit market housing project up to \$200,000. There are four intakes for this program per year.

Community Outdoor Revitalization: These Columbia Basin Trust Grants are available to municipalities with populations of 5,000 or less, unincorporated areas, and First Nations communities. The deadline to apply for capital grants is June 14, 2019. Project Planning and Design Grant applications are accepted on an ongoing basis.

Strategic Initiatives Fund: Northern Development Initiative Trust is currently accepting grant applications for the Strategic Initiatives Fund, deadline July 31, 2019. Approximately \$600,000 is available for large-scale projects that will enhance a community's ability to overcome economic challenges and increase strategic economic infrastructure within a First Nation or local government. This funding is only available to local governments and First Nations within Northern Development's service region.

Ship-source Oil Pollution Fund: The SOPF is available to pay claims to victims of oil pollution damages from ships. In case of oil pollution, the Fund provides local governments with compensation for: clean-up costs and preventive measures, environmental damage repair costs, property damage, losses related to tourism and fishing, and other economic losses. The SOPF's priority this year is to increase awareness of the Fund, so that local governments bordering the sea, lakes or rivers can benefit from the Fund in case of oil pollution from a ship or boat.

Local Government Restructure Grants: This program supports the arms length, credible examination of the potential impacts of significant changes to the geography or services of a local government. These grants also cover the transition and implementation costs to reduce barriers to restructuring local governments.

FCM Funding Opportunities: Visit this site to learn about FCM's funding offerings, from plans and studies, to pilots, capital projects and more.

Indigenous Agriculture and Food Systems Initiative: The objective of this initiative is to increase economic development opportunities of Indigenous Peoples and communities in Canada by supporting Indigenous communities and entrepreneurs who are ready to launch agriculture and food systems projects and others who want to build their capacity to participate in the Canadian agriculture and agri-food sector.

First Nations Adapt Program: This federal program supports First Nation communities to assess and respond to climate change impacts on community infrastructure and emergency management. It prioritizes communities most impacted by sea level rise, flooding, forest fires, and winter road failures. Applications are reviewed on an ongoing basis.

Events & Resources

Community Excellence Awards: These awards recognize and celebrate UBCM members that have implemented projects or programs that demonstrate excellence in meeting the purposes of local government in BC. The awards are designed to profile promising practices and to encourage local governments to learn from the success of other members in order to implement changes in their own communities. The application deadline is Friday, May 10, 2019.

BC FireSmart Website: The BC FireSmart Committee has launched a new website in time for the 2019 wildfire season. The website introduces the FireSmart program and its seven disciplines and is intended as a one stop shop for all things FireSmart. The site includes links to training, education, an events calendar, resource library and downloadable content. It also features a short video inviting everyone to become involved in prevention and to learn about the benefits of FireSmart.

Wildfire & Climate Change Webinar Series: The Fraser Basin Council's series continues this week with "Identifying Barriers to Community Action - Learning from Wildland-Urban Interface Disasters in the Past" on May 2, 2019, from 9 to 10 am.

And if you missed the live event, the recent webinar "Planning for Resilience and Reconciliation in the Face of a Changing Climate" is now available for your interest and edification.

Adaptation Canada 2020: The Call for Abstracts for Adaptation Canada 2020 is now open - with a submission deadline of May 21, 2019. Adaptation Canada will bring to Vancouver experts and leaders from diverse sectors, regions and jurisdictions to work on how to build climate change resilience in our communities, ecosystems and economies.

Weathering the Storm - Developing a Canadian Standard for Flood-Resilient Existing Communities: This report from the Intact Centre on Climate Adaptation presents a flood hazard and vulnerability screening framework that can help identify areas in existing residential

communities that require the most immediate attention for flood risk. Application of the framework will enable communities to make better-informed decisions when prioritizing areas for flood-resiliency programming.

Resources for Rural & Small Communities: BC Healthy Communities has launched a collection of resources related to PlanH action areas, with a rural and small community lens.

State of the North: The second annual State of the North economic report has been released and offers insight into the current fiscal state of Northern BC and what is trending for the future.



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Remuneration of Local Elected Officials

May 8, 2019

UBCM is developing a resource to support local government decision-making with regard to remuneration policies for elected officials. This undertaking follows upon a resolution to the 2018 Convention that tasked UBCM with examining the issue of remuneration and developing a process that would assist local governments in establishing fair and equitable remuneration for elected officials.

The resource resulting from this inititiative will reflect general local government principles of autonomy and local decision-making and provide options that are scalable relative to the varying resources, capacity, and contexts of local governments in British Columbia.


To support the development of this resource, we request that local governments, through the CAO or CFO, provide information on local practices and policies through an online survey. The survey will collect information from small, mid- and large-sized communities, and consider the needs unique to both Municipalities and Regional Districts. The survey will also canvass the economic and social factors that factor into local policies, along with evaluations of the strengths and weaknesses of those policies.

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Deadline Approaching for Code of Conduct Survey

May 8, 2019

The Working Group on Responsible Conduct (Working Group) is seeking feedback to guide the development of a code of conduct framework for local elected officials, including processes for establishing, adopting, maintaining and enforcing a code of conduct. The survey is open to individual local government elected officials along with CAOs and CCOs. CAOs are asked to convey the survey link to Council and Board members. The deadline for submissions is May 15.

The Working Group has found that provinces with enforcement provisions also have legislation that requires local governments to adopt a code of conduct. As a result, local governments lose the choice about adoption of a code of conduct, but gain an enhanced enforcement ability. The survey will seek views on making a code of conduct mandatory for all local governments.

The key components of a code of conduct framework include processes for establishing, adopting, maintaining and enforcing the code of conduct. The Working Group is also looking for feedback on the balance between standardized rules and local flexibility if local codes of conduct were to be mandatory in legislation in B.C.

The survey also explores a range of other questions in relation to enforcement, including how complaints should be managed; how breaches might be investigated; and what an acceptable range of penalties might look like.

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
