MINISTRY OF FORESTS, LANDS, NATURAL RESOURCE OPERATIONS AND RURAL DEVELOPMENT -Geoff Recknell, Regional Executive Director, Skeena and Heather Wiebe, NxNW Caribou Recovery Team Lead - Omineca Region - Update re: Fiber Utilization, Timber Supply Appurtenancy, Fire bans, Broadcast Burning, Species at Risk, Tenures, Salvage Activity re: Wildfires; and Forest and Range Practices Act (FRPA) Improvement Initiative: Renewal and Resilience Discussion Paper

Chair Thiessen welcomed Geoff Recknell, Regional Executive Director, Skeena and Heather Wiebe, NxNW Caribou Recovery Team Lead, Omineca Region, Ministry of Forests, Lands, Natural Resource Operations and Rural Development (FLNRORD).

Mr. Recknell reported that the Interior Forest Revitalization (IFR) policy papers are currently in the approval stage with the Province and will be released in the near future. Invitations to Engagement Sessions will be organized after July 15, 2019. Mr. Recknell noted that there will be further opportunities to provide feedback beyond the community engagement sessions. Chair Thiessen brought forward concerns in regard to timing for dialogue and engagement. He also spoke of the impacts of mill closures and curtailments to communities and the frustration of local governments not having an opportunity to provide input.

Chair Thiessen outlined follow-up items from FLNRORD's presentation at the June 6, 2019 RDBN Forestry Committee Meeting:

- BC Wildfire Service (BCWS) Fire Bans Ian Meier, Acting Executive Director, BC Wildfire Service, Smithers, FLNRORD to be a delegation to the Regional Board
 - Is BCWS reviewing changes on the land base in regard to fire bans/ratings in regard to closing the bush?
- o Pipeline fiber utilization agreement
- Economics of Industry Peter Jacobsen, Executive Director, Timber Operations, Pricing and First Nations Division, FLNRORD
- Provide links to the FRPA and IFR discussion papers to RDBN staff
- Copy of Premier Horgan's letter to industry referenced at the 2019 COFI Conference.

Ms. Wiebe provided an outline and update in regard to the Caribou Program. **April 2019**

- Engagement Process in the Province of BC
 - Two Agreements
 - Bilateral Agreement between the Province of BC and Federal Government
 - Partnership Agreement Central Group Herd (Peace Region)
 - Provincial and Federal Governments, Saulteau and West Moberly First Nations
- At 9:05 am today the Province announced:
 - o Release of the Lekstrom report on caribou recovery with 14 recommendations
 - Unveiled a broader plan to continue to work with the Saulteau and West Moberly First Nations
 - Intention to sign the Southern Mountain Caribou Bilateral Conservation Agreement (Section 11)
 - Work plan to identify and collectively work together to take steps to plan for caribou recovery
 - o Interim moratorium on new resource development in parts of northeastern BC for two years (2021) for partnership agreement area only
 - Have begun discussions in regard to the Tweedsmuir herd
 - Will be having conversations with the First Nations in regard to the engagement process developed in consultation with Bill Miller to move forward

DELEGATION (CONT'D)

MINISTRY OF FORESTS, LANDS, NATURAL RESOURCE OPERATIONS AND RURAL DEVELOPMENT (CONT'D)

- Letters will be sent in the next two weeks to interest groups in regard to meetings in Fall 2019 to discuss herd planning, recovery actions, and scientifically valid mitigating factors brought forward from interest groups.
- o Meetings in Fall 2019:
 - Small group table conversations for targeted herds
 - Provide analysis in regard to each targeted herd
 - Forwarded to a larger table conversation
 - Recommendation to be made to government in regard to recovery actions and implementation
 - Decision makers implement recovery actions
 - There may be engagement on a one by one basis depending on the FLNRORD Science Team's findings and if implementation of recovery actions need to occur quickly
- o Current targeted herds due to immediate industrial pressures
 - Tweedsmuir
 - Hart Ranges
 - Wolverine
 - Chase
 - Takla
- FLNRORD worked with the New Gold Blackwater Project in 2018 excellent opportunity to partner and work to offset any impact to caribou recovery.

Director Layton questioned if the Telkwa herd was included in the targeted herds. Ms. Wiebe indicated it would be a separate discussion. Director Layton spoke of the importance of ensuring that municipalities and rural directors are included in interest group discussions. Ms. Wiebe indicated that there will be approximately 60 small meetings held in regard to each specific herd prior to larger roundtable discussions. Chair Thiessen reiterated the importance of meeting with individual local governments in regard to herd planning.

Mr. Recknell provided an update regarding the mountain goat

- Skeena region population is viable and intact
- A significant resource
- Protection measures
 - Timber Supply Area's (TSA's) and Timber Farm Licence's (TFL's) have identified ungulate winter range areas and have management measures in place
 - Impacts to goat are:
 - Access
 - Disturbance in security habitats through winter months
 - Feeding areas
 - Escape terrain
 - Winter/Summer access in alpine areas
 - Harvesting activities
 - Bulkley order is ready to move forward
 - Unique due to the LRMP (Land and Resource Management Plan) in place
 - Ability to close areas if there is a need under the Wildlife Act.

Director Layton spoke of past GIS exercises that created mountain goat ungulate winter range areas and that information is no longer accurate. Information utilized to create protection areas needs to be current and up to date. Mr. Recknell noted that in the Bulkley region, the LRMP was reviewed and it was identified that the protection areas had changed. Discussion took place in regard to disturbances to the goats and utilizing education to inform users of the backcountry. A brief discussion took place in regard to predator management and recreational uses.



DELEGATION (CONT'D)

MINISTRY OF FORESTS, LANDS, NATURAL RESOURCE OPERATIONS AND RURAL DEVELOPMENT (CONT'D)

Forest Tenures/Reform

- Tenure system –challenging for value added users to access fiber
 - o Timber Supply Areas (TSA's) within the RDBN includes the following TSA's
 - a. Bulkley
 - b. Morice
 - c. Lakes
 - d. Portion of Prince George
 - First Nations tenures
 - a. Morice approximately 15%
 - b. Lakes approximately 46% higher area based tenures
 - c. Bulkley approximately 25%
 - Spoke of past take backs to enable First Nations to have more ownership in the industry
 - a. ongoing interest of the Province
- BC Timber Sales (BCTS)
 - A marketing system
 - o Varies between business areas (Stuart/Nechako, Babine)
 - Specific role in terms of market pricing
 - Ensuring a certain amount of volume on publicly owned land/Crown Land is auctioned in a free market system to set price to ensure:
 - a. The best value for a publicly owned resource
 - b. Main response/defence in regard to the softwood lumber dispute
 - 20% of volume held by BCTS -Statisticians believe gives statistically viable and reliable data that demonstrates selling enough timber that is market based/market priced
 - a. Province firm interest in maintaining 20%
- Remaining tenure owned by large licencees eg. Canfor Corporation, West Fraser Timber, Hampton Lumber Co., L & M Lumber Ltd.
- Forest reserves minimal amount for such examples as pipeline corridors
- Opportunities for salvage
 - o Spruce /mountain pine beetle
 - Most addressed through large licencees.

Director Layton noted that communities are taking a stance in regard to input and tenure is an area that is important. He spoke of mill closures creating a commodity to sell at the highest price. Bill 22 – 2019: Forest Amendment Act, 2019 is reported to provide opportunities for community input in regard to sawmill closures and tenure allocations. Mr. Recknell commented that Bill 22 is one step to ensure public interest is addressed in terms of sales and transfers. Director Layton also spoke of community safety and Wildland Urban Interface (WUI) needing to take precedent in relation to FRPA and tenures. Mr. Recknell noted that FLNRORD has a role to assist facilitating conversations to assist with community safety and WUI.

Forest and Ranges Practices Act (FRPA) Improvement Initiative: Renewal and Resilience:

- More authority at the District Manager level
- Bring more discretion for the District Manager
- Focused on stewardship.

Director Lambert questioned the impact of the FRPA Renewal in regard to range tenures. Mr. Recknell will follow up with information.

Director Bachrach mentioned challenges understanding the discussion paper questions and providing proper feedback.

MINISTRY OF FORESTS, LANDS, NATURAL RESOURCE OPERATIONS AND RURAL DEVELOPMENT (CONT'D)

Fiber Utilization/Salvage

- Fiber brought into mills is 100% utilized
- Partnerships with secondary users such as pellet plants
- Provisions within FRPA that promotes less waste
- Changes and incentives made to utilize dry Grade 4 log
- FLNRORD investigating options:
 - o for secondary operators to utilize fiber left on the ground from primary operators/licencees
 - o once a primary operator has left a site others can utilize fiber
 - o fiber utilization zones and other options

Fire Salvage

- Morice/Lakes TSA's approximately 400,000 m³ under cutting permit for wildfire salvage wood
- Harvesting fire damaged trees within existing tenure licences.

Discussion took place in regard to a timeline being developed to allow secondary licencees to utilize fiber on the ground. Director Layton outlined that there is a 30 month licence requirement to burn fuel build up on a logging block. There are liabilities to the licencee within that timeframe. Discussion took place in regard to stumbling blocks to utilize wood that stumpage has been paid but the wood is not viable for the primary user. Legislation requires that secondary users must pay stumpage again if they are to use the wood left on the block.

The Regional Board indicated its interest of having the new Beetle Boss as a delegation at a future RDBN meeting.

Chair Thiessen thanked Mr. Recknell and Ms. Wiebe for attending the meeting.

We have a volunteer board of 11 members, who do not receive any financial remuneration.

The extreme mega-fires that impacted our region in 2018 resulted in tremendous social, ecological and economic costs; which highlighted that urgent solutions are needed. Therefore, we arranged and hosted the Northern Conference for Wildfire Resilience in Burns Lake to bring local players together. As a conference outcome, we are planning a post-conference podcast to continue these discussions, support a shifting paradigm, and spread the word on the Norther Wildfire Resilience Initiative.

To do this, we will retain a podcast producer, Future Ecologies, who made our pre-conference podcast, to deliver this project. They will travel to Highway 16 from Vancouver to meet with podcast guests and interview them about the work that they are doing on the land to create resilient forests and communities. This project requires coordination, recording, editting, communications and publishing to be completed. We have applied on other grant sources, have requested donations from local individuals and organizations, and have some in-kind donations. Please refer to the attached budget for details.

Many of the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako residents were directly impacted by the 2018 wildfire season: evacuation orders meant that many community members were working long hours to protect their homes, woodlots, businesses, livestock, and were exhausted from fighting fire. Not all of our community members could attend the conference in April, therefore, this podcast will provide a free and accessible opportunity to learn and stay informed about important, local wildfire initiatives in Northern BC.

The Ootsa Lake Bible Camp Society has requested the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako's assistance in the form of Federal Gas Tax Funds to assist with a drinking water upgrade project at the Ootsa Lake Bible Camp, located in Electoral Area 'E' (Francois/Ootsa Lake Rural).

The water pump needs to be replaced in order to service the entire camp and a UV water filtration system is required to meet Northern Health standards. The cost of this project has been estimated at \$30,000.00.

Total uncommitted Gas Tax Funds remaining in the Electoral Area 'B' allocation is \$186,693.38 and in the Electoral Area 'E' allocation is \$104,114.51. Director Michael Riis-Christianson and Director Clint Lambert are supportive of this project and of accessing Federal Gas Tax Funds in the amount of up to \$15,000 from Area 'B' and \$15,000 from Area 'E' for this Drinking Water Infrastructure project. A Board resolution is required to contribute Federal Gas Tax Funds to this project.

The Dze L K'ant Friendship Centre has requested the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako's assistance in the form of Federal Gas Tax Funds to assist with re-siding the Dze L K'ant Friendship Centre Building, located in Smithers.

This project includes removing the asbestos and worn-out siding on the exterior of the building and replacing it with stucco. The budget for this project has been estimated at \$91,342.35.

The project may fit under the Cultural Infrastructure category, but it is not entirely clear at this time. Staff are waiting for a response from UBCM staff, which is expected by July 19, to determine eligibility of the project. The Society wishes to use the Gas Tax funding as leveraging for their Community Gaming Grant – Capital Projects application, which is due at the end of July.

Total uncommitted Gas Tax Funds remaining in Electoral Area 'A' allocation is \$848,740.50. Director Mark Fisher is supportive of this project and of accessing Federal Gas Tax Funds in the amount of up to \$30,000.00 from Area 'A' for this Cultural Infrastructure project. A Board resolution is required to contribute Federal Gas Tax Funds to this project.

Issue: Internet Connectivity – CRTC Grant Application

Background:

The Regional District commissioned its first study on broadband coverage with Sandbox Systems. This study — "Better Broadband for the RDBN" was presented to the Board from Sandbox Systems on November 29, 2018. The report recommended building a fibre backbone from Prince George to Smithers with branches off this backbone to serve communities on secondary highways. The cost for this study was \$25,000 and was funded by the special projects budget in general administration.

TANEx Engineering Corporation is nearing completion of the second and more detailed Broadband Connectivity Study commissioned by the Regional District. The report is expected to be released in August. One of the draft recommendations is to consider a grant application to CRTC to provide high speed internet to unserved rural populations and utilize the fibre connections currently available or soon to be available in the incorporated communities along Highway 16. The cost estimate of this report is \$27,500 and was funded through the special projects budget in general administration.

Canadian Radio-television and Telecommunications Commission (CRTC) provides grants for increasing broadband connectivity coverage to underserved areas. The deadline for the next grant intake is expected to be December 2019.

Discussion:

To prepare for a successful grant application, preparations must begin as soon as possible. A working group made up of select staff and interested Directors should be established to provide oversight for this project. This working group will likely need to meet weekly for several months. Some meetings may be able to utilize conference calls, but others will require meeting in person. Staff time is currently fully allocated and if this project is decided to move forward, other projects will be deferred until this project is complete.

This working group will then be required to:

Set up a joint venture agreement with a partner that has a minimum of three years' experience with providing broadband. If this partner is not to be another local government or a not-for-profit organization, the Regional District will need to facilitate a public process to search for a commercial partner.





- Complete regional project strategy would be written for Board approval.
- Prioritize several smaller construction projects out of all the possible projects in the electoral areas for inclusion in the first grant intake. Example areas could be Perow, Highway 35, South Houston (Buck Flats) and Colleymount. Areas selected for the grant application must be strategically and methodically selected to provide internet to the majority of the rural areas over a number of years (funded by a number of successful grant applications).
- Prepare a detailed engineering estimate and logistic plan for each area to include in the grant applications.
- Prepare grant applications.

Between staff time, Directors time, legal fees and consultant fees, the Board may wish to allocate funds to this project from the Northern Capital and Planning Grant. An initial draft budget for this project is \$100,000 made of:

- Detailed engineering studies and consultant fees \$75,000
- Legal fees, Incorporation Fees, Administration costs, and travel \$20,000
- Directors remuneration, travel, and staff overtime \$5,000

Before staff can prepare a detailed budget proposal for this project, the working group will be required to meet several times and the initial stages of the project will need to be substantially defined (incurring consulting and legal costs) so that the full scope of the work can be understood.

As per direction at the June 20th RDBN Board Meeting, staff are proceeding and participating in the BC Provincial Nominee Program – Regional Pilot within the RDBN.

On June 21, Economic Development Staff participated in the Ministry of Jobs, Trade and Technology's Orientation and Training Session for Communities for the Entrepreneur Immigration Regional Pilot Program.

The training covered: an overview of Immigration and the EI Regional Pilot, the Role of the Community, the Community Process and Applicant and Business eligibility.

The Community Process includes:

- > Attracting the right Entrepreneur
- Hosting an Exploratory Visit
- Making a Referral to the BC PNP program in support of an Entrepreneur
 - The Entrepreneur uses the provided referral to register with the Provincial Nominee
 Program and begins the approval process with the Province. The Province will confirm both applicant and business eligibility (listed below)
- > Supporting business establishment
- Celebrating Success

The training also covered strategies to deal with the potentially high volume of inquiries.

Enrollment forms for each Electoral Area were submitted with input from the Area Director regarding preferred NAICS codes. The updated program website listing RDBN Electoral Areas is expected to be launched by the end of July.

Minimum Applicant Eligibility:

- ✓ Exploratory visit to the community in which the proposed business will be located.
- ✓ Referral from the community: the applicant must submit the referral form with their Entrepreneur Immigration Registration.
- ✓ Minimum investment of \$100,000 in the business: The investment proposed must be realistic and reasonable, reflecting the type of business proposed and estimated costs in the community. The BC PNP assesses the eligibility of investments (for example real estate is ineligible and only six months of operating expenses can be claimed).
- ✓ Minimum personal net worth of \$300,000: This will be assessed by the BC PNP. All assets and

- liabilities must be declared and verified by a BC PNP-authorized accounting firm at the time of application.
- ✓ Minimum language requirement level 4 on the Canadian Language Benchmarks (CLB): This is considered basic language ability. The applicant must submit language test results with their Entrepreneur Immigration Regional Pilot Registration.
- ✓ Long-term intentions to integrate in the community and actively manage the business: Assessed by the BC PNP at the interview and nomination stages.

Minimum Business Eligibility:

The applicant must decide on the specific type of business they intend to establish before submitting a registration to the BC PNP, with due diligence performed as part of the exploratory visit to the community.

Businesses proposed under the Regional Pilot must meet the following criteria:

- ✓ Start-up business proposals. Purchase of an existing business or business assets are not permitted.
- ✓ Business must be within one of the three priority economic subsectors identified by the community: identified by North American Industry Classification System (NAICS) three digit code
- ✓ The applicant must be the controlling shareholder of the new business, with a minimum percentage ownership of 51%. The applicant could propose a partnership
- ✓ Creation of one full-time equivalent position for a Canadian citizen or Permanent Resident.
- ✓ The business must be operated for the primary purpose of earning profits by providing products and/or services.
- ✓ The business must have strong potential for sustained commercial success.
- ✓ Active management by the applicant: transferable skillset, personal contribution to the success of the business (not just financial or strategic role) and likelihood of day-to-day supervision of staff on site.

Purchase/partnerships with existing businesses and succession buy-outs are not eligible under the Regional Pilot but could be pursued by the applicant under the BC PNP Entrepreneur Immigration category.

Applicants who are approved through the program enter into a Performance Agreement with the Province, which stipulates terms and conditions that must be fulfilled during the business establishment and settlement period (approx. 2 years). Applicants are provided with a work permit support letter with which they can apply for a Government of Canada work permit.

Once an applicant meets the requirements of the Performance Agreement, they must submit a final report (i.e. application for nomination) to the BC PNP. If the BC PNP determines they have met all the criteria from the Performance Agreement, the applicant and accompanying family members will be nominated for permanent residence.

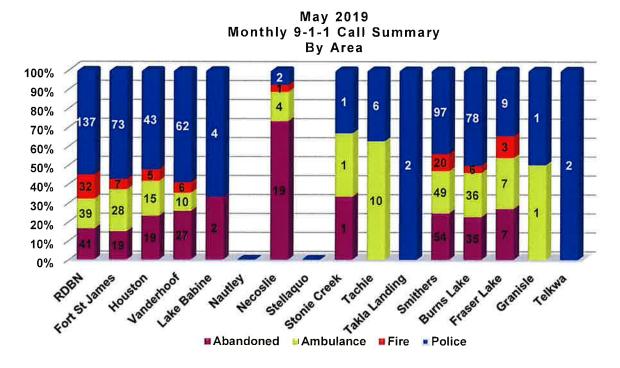

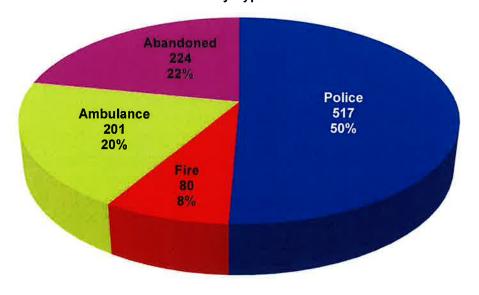

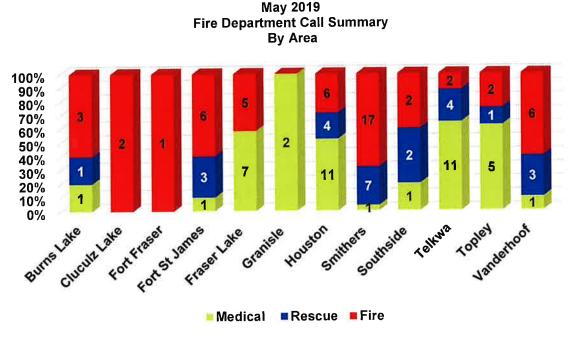

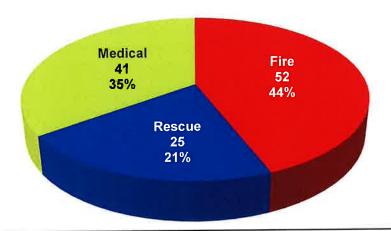
May 2019 Monthly 9-1-1 Call Summary By Type

Coastal GasLink Pipeline Project Update Report

PROJECT STATUS

Coastal GasLink (CGL) was granted an Environmental Assessment Certificate (EAC) on October 24, 2014. LNG Canada made a positive Final Investment Decision on October 1, 2018. This decision triggered the commencement of construction of their LNG facility in Kitimat, B.C. as well as the CGL Pipeline project.

Construction of the CGL project is underway, with clearing and site preparation in anticipation of mainline construction in 2020 with the projected in-service of the pipeline in 2023.

SOCIAL AND ECONOMIC EFFECTS MANAGEMENT PLAN (SEEMP)

A condition of the Provincial Environmental Assessment Certificate (EAC) approval was that a Social and Economic Effects Management Plan (SEEMP) be developed in consultation with infrastructure and service providers. The stated intent of the SEEMP is to clarify the proponent's role in identifying, communicating, quantifying and mitigating socio-economic effects arising from construction of the pipeline.

The SEEMP does the following.

- It outlines a schedule for TransCanada's communication with the RDBN, and other stakeholders, immediately prior to and during the construction process.
- It requires TransCanada to develop various plans prior to construction. The SEEMP does not require that TransCanada involve the RDBN or any other stakeholders in the plan development or review process.
- It provides a monitoring schedule, and requires TransCanada to communicate with the RDBN during pre-construction and construction at specified intervals and allows TransCanada to respond to issues raised as TransCanada considers appropriate.

TransCanada staff arranged a meeting with the Planning Department on June 17, 2019. At this meeting they advised that they intend to issue reports on SEEMP implementation every 6 months. TransCanada said that the first SEEMP implementation report would be provided on July 2, 2019. Staff have not yet received this report.

Staff asked TransCanada staff if the SEEMP is required to be updated or formally amended because of the delayed construction and changes to the project. TransCanada said this was not the case.

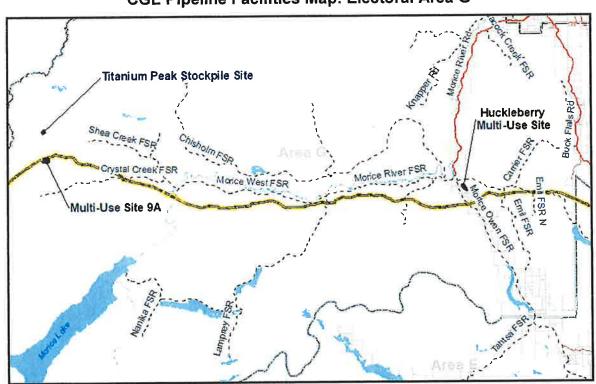
PIPELINE ROUTE AND FACILITIES

The following section outlines the CGL Pipeline route and the potential facility locations from west to east.

Electoral Area G

- Huckleberry Multi-Use Site is located on the Morice Owen FSR. RDBN Staff received an application for a Temporary Use Permit on June 3, 2019. TUP application G-01-19 is currently being reviewed. Owner authorization is still outstanding.
- Multi-Use Site 9A is located near Shae Creek FSR on the Pipeline ROW
 approximately 70 km southwest of the District of Houston. The area is 15.21 ha in
 size. The area is not zoned. RDBN approval is not required. A work camp is being
 developed.
- Titanium Peak Stockpile Site is located in a remote area off of Shea Creek FSR, approximately 70 km southwest from the District of Houston. The referral area is 19.2 ha in size. The area is not zoned. RDBN approval is not required.

CGL Pipeline Facilities Map: Electoral Area G

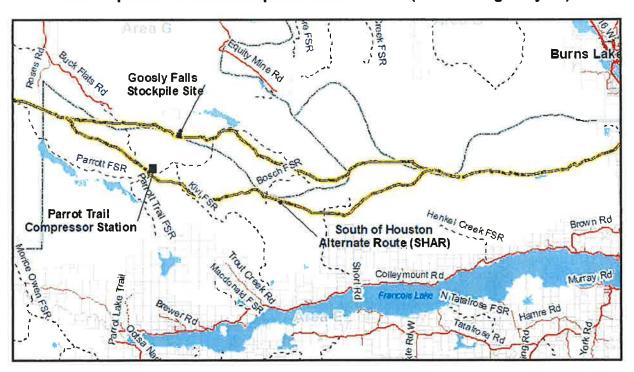


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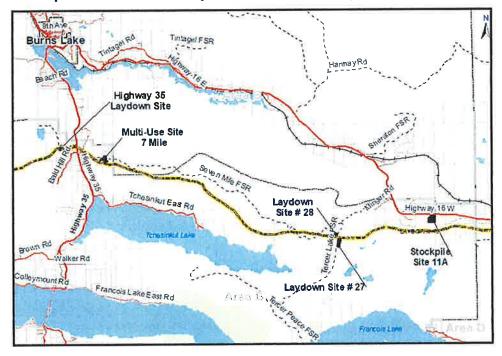
Electoral Area E

- Goosly or Parrot Lakes Stockpile Site is located on Parrot Lake FSR in both Electoral Area G and E.
- Parrot Trail Compressor Station is located on Parrot Trail FSR
- Laydown Site # 27 is located on Tercer Lake FSR, approximately 25 km southeast from the Village of Burns Lake. The referral area is 3.41 ha in size. The area is not zoned. RDBN approval is not required
- Laydown Site # 28 is located on Tercer Lake FSR, approximately 25 km southeast from the Village of Burns Lake. The referral area is 4.67 ha in size. The area is not zoned. RDBN approval is not required
- Highway 35 Stockpile Site is located on Seven Mile FSR, approximately 11 km southeast from the Village of Burns Lake. The referral area is 6.60 ha. in size. The area is not zoned. RDBN approval is not required.
- Stockpile Site 11A is located on Highway 16 East in the community of Sheraton and is zoned and within the Agricultural Land Reserve. A Non-Farm Use application (ALR 1213) and a TUP Application E-01-19 are currently being reviewed by staff. The TUP application is incomplete.
- Multi-Use Site 7 Mile is located on Seven Mile FSR, approximately 11 km southeast from the Village of Burns Lake. The referral area is 21.7 ha. in size. The area is not zoned. RDBN approval is not required.

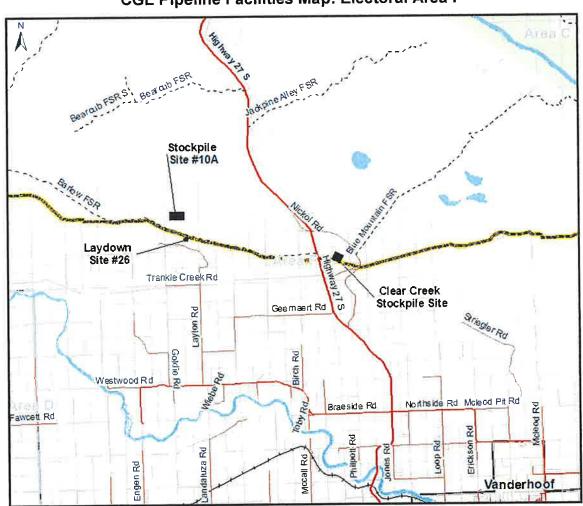
CGL Pipeline Facilities Map: Electoral Area D

- Laydown Site #26 is located on Barlow FSR, approximately 18 km northwest of the District of Vanderhoof. The referral area is 2.71 ha in size. The area is zoned Rural Resource (RR1). TUP application F-03-19 is currently being reviewed by staff. The TUP application is incomplete.
- Stockpile Site # 10A is located near Barlow FSR, approximately 18 km northwest of the District of Vanderhoof. The referral area is 24.48 ha in size. The area is zoned Rural Resource (RR1). TUP application F-02-19 is currently being reviewed by staff. The TUP application is incomplete.
- Clear Creak Stockpile Site is located near Highway 27, approximately 19 km northwest of the District of Vanderhoof. The referral area is 16.70 ha in size. The area is zoned Rural Resource (RR1). TUP application F-01-19 is currently being reviewed by staff. The TUP application is incomplete.

CGL Pipeline Facilities Map: Electoral Area F

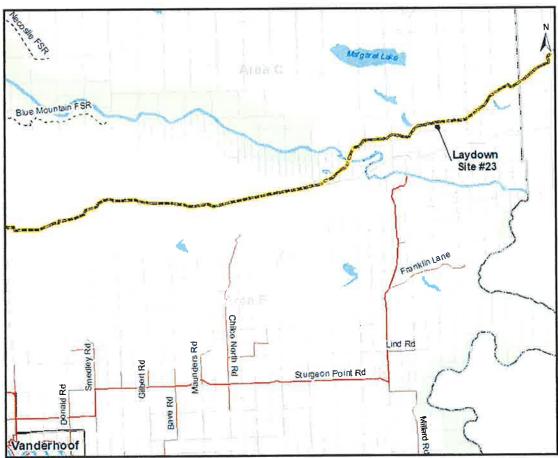

RDBN PIPELINE CONSTRUCTION ISSUES

The following is an update regarding the recent discussions the Planning Department has had with TransCanada regarding pipeline construction issues. The Planning Department emphasizes that it is supportive of LNG pipeline development in our region, and the potential opportunity that it represents. The desire is to work with TransCanada and the Province in a meaningful way to maximize the potential benefits to RDBN residents, and minimize the negative impacts and potential risks, associated with the construction and operation of the pipeline.

The issues discussed below are addressed in additional detail in the attached November 10th, 2017 letter from the RDBN to the Oil and Gas Commission, and the December 15th, 2017 response to the RDBN from TransCanada.

RDBN Board Approval for Pipeline Facilities Locations

Planning Department staff have consistently asked TransCanada to make any required land use applications as soon as possible. This was done based on the expectation that TransCanada will delay making land use applications to the last moment and then indicate that any delay in providing the requested approvals will delay the project and jeopardise the associated benefits for the region. Unfortunately, this is the situation that is developing.

The RDBN Planning Department has received 5 Temporary Use Permit applications, and 1 ALC non-farm use application for CGL Pipeline facilities. These applications are summarised below.

It is noted that the Clear Creek Stockpile Site, Stockpile Site 10A, Laydown Area 26, and Stockpile Site 11A may not require RDBN approval and the issuance of a temporary use permit if these uses are within or directly adjacent to the pipeline corridor and are limited to activities directly associated with and necessary for pipeline construction in that area. However, given the lack of information on the proposed use of the sites RDBN staff cannot evaluate the situation and advise the Board on this issue. It is also noted that these TUP applications cannot legally be approved prior to the RDBN receiving the missing owner authorizations and Contaminated Site Profiles.

The first 3 TUP applications were received by the RDBN on February 7th, 2019, and the outstanding information was requested by the RDBN on February 13th, 2019. To date the required application information has not been received, and the new applications subsequently received were also missing the same critical information.

RDBN staff have recently received requests from TransCanada and their contractors that they be allowed to clear and grade the sites prior to receiving temporary use permit approval from the RDBN.

Liquid Waste Disposal

The Province has not required as a condition of the Environmental Assessment Certificate or Oil and Gas Commission permitting that TransCanada work with municipalities regarding liquid waste disposal. The Socio-Economic Effects Management Plan (SEEMP) approved by the Province states that TransCanada must provide "Waste and Water Management Information" to local governments a minimum of 3 months before construction.

TransCanada has previously committed to undertake this work with local governments; however, the RDBN is not aware of any notable action. During the June 17, 2019 meeting between TransCanada and RDBN staff TransCanada said that their contractors were currently talking to municipalities regarding liquid waste disposal.

Invasive Plant Control

The CGL pipeline will facilitate the long term spread of invasive plants, and these invasive plants will spread from the pipeline onto adjacent lands. The cost of combating these inevitable invasive plant outbreaks from the pipeline will be at the expense of the residents of the RDBN if TransCanada does not contribute to the North West Invasive Plant Council (NWIPC).

The Province has not required as a condition of the Environmental Assessment Certificate or Oil and Gas Commission permitting that TransCanada contribute to the NWIPC. During the June 17, 2019 meeting between TransCanada and RDBN staff TransCanada reconfirmed that they have no plans to financially contribute to the NWIPC.

Fire Protection and Emergency Response

The Province has not required as a condition of the Environmental Assessment Certificate or Oil and Gas Commission permitting that TransCanada work with the RDBN in developing emergency response plans. The Socio-Economic Effects Management Plan (SEEMP) approved by the Province states that TransCanada must provide "Emergency Response Planning Information" a minimum of 3 months before construction, and there is no requirement that the RDBN approve, or otherwise be involved in, the plan development process.

The RDBN continues to request that TransCanada immediately develop emergency response plans in consultation with the RDBN that address fire protection and emergency response based on an understanding of the services available in the region, and in consultation with the RDBN. Specific areas of interest to the RDBN include consistent communications protocols for work camps, and evacuation plans for workers that do not use resources needed by local residents.

During the June 17, 2019 meeting between TransCanada and RDBN staff TransCanada confirmed that they have been developing emergency response plans with their contractors and could not commit to letting the RDBN review the draft plans or see the plans when complete. TransCanada did offer to provide a presentation on emergency response.

Public Communications During Construction

The RDBN has expressed concern that industry and the OGC will not have an adequate plan in place to accept, evaluate, and respond to public complaints associated with pipeline construction. It is expected that the Province and industry may look to the RDBN to play a lead role in accepting public complaints and representing those concerns to the OGC and industry. This will allow the Province and industry to avoid being directly accountable for adequately responding to the public regarding negative impacts associated with the pipeline construction process.

The Socio-Economic Effects Management Plans (SEEMPs) approved by the Province outlines the process that industry must use to engage with stakeholders during construction. However, the SEEMPS are largely silent regarding the specific manner in which industry will accept, evaluate and respond to the general public. There is also no indication of the role the OGC or the EAO will play in ensuring that public concerns are adequately addressed.

The RDBN has asked that TransCanada develop specific procedures and processes by which they and the Province will accept, evaluate, and respond to public complaints associated with pipeline construction. The RDBN also asked that TransCanada establish store front offices in communities where construction activity is occurring so that residents can engage more easily with TransCanada regarding any issues that arise.



During the June 17, 2019 meeting between TransCanada and RDBN staff TransCanada confirmed that they are working, with their contractors, on opening storefront offices in RDBN communities,.

INTER AGENCY GROUP

The Lake Babine Nation invited the RDBN to an Inter-Agency & Community Preparedness Meeting to discuss social issues relating to CGL's proposed 7 Mile Construction Work Camp located near the Village of Burns Lake. Planning Department staff attended this meeting. The meeting was well attended by representatives of the Lake Babine Nation, the RCMP, and the Province. CGL representatives were not present.

It was proposed that the multi-agency group meet monthly leading up to and during the CGL Pipeline Construction process to review and help address the social, health, and policing issues that may arise. It was agreed that the group meet monthly and that CGL be at the next meeting.

Planning Department staff plan to continue attending these meetings and will report to the Board as appropriate.

The Board of the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako (RDBN) would like to thank you and Corey Jonsson for meeting with the Board on September 21st, 2017. We appreciate your commitment to increased dialogue and collaboration between our organizations. We also appreciate your offer to discuss with the Environmental Assessment Office (EAO) the LNG pipeline development issues which the RDBN believes have not yet been adequately addressed.

To assist in your discussions with the EAO we have prepared this letter which summarizes the concerns that continue to exist. Also, attached to this letter is a chronology of the comments provided by letter by the RDBN to the EAO (during the certificate approval process) and the OGC (during the permitting process).

The Board emphasizes that the RDBN is not objecting to LNG Pipeline development in our region. The potential opportunity associated with LNG development is recognized; however, it is our responsibility to work with the Province and industry in an attempt to maximize the potential benefits to our residents, and minimize the negative impacts and potential risks, associated with the construction and operation of the pipeline. We are hopeful that this letter and your discussions with the EAO will ultimately benefit the pipeline development process and our residents.

Please note that the issues discussed below focus on the Coastal Gaslink Pipeline (CGL). The RDBN has been notably involved in the associated approval processes for the CGL Pipeline as it is proposed to be developed through the heart of our region. We wish to note that the issues discussed below are applicable to some degree to all potential pipelines developed in our region.

MUNICIPALITIES:

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Worker Camps and Pipeline Facilities Locations Contrary to RDBN Bylaws.

At present at least one work camp and a number of other facilities associated with the CGL pipeline cannot legally occur as proposed. There is a formal process for TransCanada to ask the RDBN Board to permit these use to occur; however, this approval is discretionary and is not guaranteed. Therefore, it is important that TransCanada initiate the process to determine if these facilities can be located as proposed as soon as possible.

The RDBN has consistently requested that the outstanding land use issues be addressed; however, the only formal requirement is that contained in the Socio-Economic Effects Management Plan (SEEMP) prepared by TransCanada. This plan states that TransCanada will make the necessary Temporary Use Permit applications 3 months prior to the start of construction. CGL representatives have verbally indicated to the RDBN that their plan is to submit applications 6 months prior to construction.

Unfortunately, these timelines do not ensure adequate opportunity for meaningful public consultation, and evaluation and resolution of any outstanding public or Board concerns that may arise. Also, the application timeline would not likely provide CGL adequate opportunity to identify alternative facility locations, and obtain OGC approvals, should the Board not approve the proposed land uses.

The RDBN advises that TransCanada immediately initiate the application process to allow the RDBN Board to determine if the work camps and other pipeline facilities can be located as proposed.

Liquid Waste Disposal

The RDBN continues to believe that TransCanada should explore options for cooperation with the RDBN or member municipalities in the disposal of liquid waste from work camps. The Socio-Economic Effects Management Plan (SEEMP) prepared by TransCanada states that TransCanada must provide "Waste and Water Management Information" a minimum of 3 months before construction. However, exploring options for cooperation with the RDBN or member municipalities cannot occur within this limited timeline and will only be possible if TransCanada takes advantage of an available option well in advance of construction.

It would be a shame if money is spent unnecessarily on hauling waste long distances, or building on-site disposal facilities which will be abandoned, rather than investing in improving local community infrastructure.

Invasive Plant Control

The RDBN again recommends that TransCanada provide annual funding to the Northwest Invasive Plant Council (NWIPC) as do numerous agencies with right of ways that facilitate the spread of invasive plants. The CGL pipeline will facilitate the long term spread of invasive plants, and these invasive plans will spread from the pipeline onto adjacent lands. The cost of combating these inevitable invasive plants outbreaks from the pipeline will be at the expense of the residents of the RDBN if TransCanada does not contribute to the NWIPC.

Fire Protection and Emergency Response

The RDBN has asked that TransCanada address fire protection and emergency response issues in a proactive manner. Unfortunately, the Socio-Economic Effects Management Plan (SEEMP) prepared by TransCanada states that TransCanada must provide "Emergency Response Planning Information" a minimum of 3 months before construction, and there is no requirement that the RDBN approve, or otherwise be involved in, the plan development process.

The RDBN continues to advise that TransCanada immediately develop emergency response plans in consultation with the RDBN that address fire protection and emergency response based on an understanding of the services available in the region, and in consultation with the RDBN. Specific areas of interest to the RDBN include consistent communications protocols for work camps, evacuation plans for workers that do not use resources needed by local residents, and confirmation that TransCanada is not relying on the use of local fire departments where that service is not available.

Log and Wood Fiber Utilization

The long term loss of forested lands associated with pipeline construction represents a negative impact to the long term sustainability of the region's forest products industries. The impact of this loss should be mitigated through the full use of wood fibre harvested along the pipeline route. The RDBN has expressed concern that where the cost of harvesting and transportation are too high the wood fibre will not be utilized in support of the forest products industries. The RDBN requests that TransCanada be required to ensure that all wood fibre harvested for pipeline construction is utilized.

An additional issue related to the use of wood fibre, relates to the potential facilitation of the spread of the Spruce Beetle. Our understanding is that the Spruce Beetle takes advantage of fallen logs and wood debris in their reproduction process; therefore, an increase in the availability of such materials facilitates Spruce Beetle population growth. For this reason the RDBN requests that TransCanada be required to ensure that all wood fibre harvested for pipeline construction is utilized, and that wood debris is not left in place.

Employee Training and Apprenticeships and the Use of Local Business

The Socio-Economic Effects Management Plan (SEEMP) prepared by TransCanada states that TransCanada must prepare a "procurement strategy" that provides opportunities for qualified Aboriginal and local contractors, and a "Coastal GasLink training program," some time prior to construction. There is no requirement that the RDBN be involved in the plan development process.

The RDBN remains concerned that there are no specific commitments regarding the use of local employment in the pipeline construction process, and there are no specific commitments regarding the provision of apprenticeship positions for local employees.



The RDBN also remains concerned that there are no specific commitments regarding the use of local business, and there are limited specific commitments regarding the actions that will be taken to allow local business to take advantage of the opportunity offered by pipeline construction.

Public Communications During Construction

The RDBN is concerned that industry and the OGC will not have an adequate plan in place to accept, evaluate, and respond to public complaints associated with pipeline construction. It is expected that the Province and industry may look to the RDBN to play a role in accepting public complaints and representing those concerns to the OGC and industry. This will allow the Province and industry to avoid being directly accountable for adequately responding to the public regarding negative impacts associated with the pipeline construction process.

The Socio-Economic Effects Management Plans (SEEMPs) approved by the Province outlines the process that industry must use to engage with stakeholders during construction. However, the SEEMPS are largely silent regarding the specific manner in which industry will accept, evaluate and respond to the general public. There is also no indication of the role the OGC or the EAO will play in ensuring that public concerns are adequately addressed.

The RDBN recommends that TransCanada be required to develop specific procedures and processes by which they and the Province will accept, evaluate, and respond to public complaints associated with pipeline construction.

The Board of the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako looks forward to addressing these issues with the OGC and the EAO.

Chronology of RDBN Letters to the Environmental Assessment Office (EAO) and the Oil and Gas Commission (OGC)

Work Camps and Pipeline Facility Locations Contrary to RDBN Bylaws.

In a letter to the EAO dated February 18, 2014 the RDBN requested that land use and zoning regulation issues be evaluated as part of the EAO approval process for the Coastal Gaslink (CGL) Pipeline because work camps, temporary storage areas, contractor storage yards, disposal sites, compressor stations, borrow sites (if crushing occurs), and other used may not be permitted in certain areas. This was requested in order to avoid potential for project delay or unnecessary inconvenience.

In a letter to the EAO dated April 17, 2014 the RDBN expressed concern to the EAO that the OGC permitting process will not address the socioeconomic and infrastructure impacts associated with workcamps, and other pipeline facilities.

In a letter to the EAO dated July 18, 2014 the RDBN expressed concern that the OGC permitting process is not expected to address the outstanding socioeconomic and infrastructure impacts associated with the specific location of worker camps and other facilities, and there are no proposed EA Certificate conditions relating to the location of pipeline construction facilities. The RDBN recommended to the EAO that the RDBN Board be required to approve the proposed facility locations.

In a letter to TransCanada, copied to the OGC, dated July 21, 2014 the RDBN responded to an OGC permit referral. The RDBN noted that certain facility locations may not occur where proposed and asked that the issues surrounding work camp and pipeline facility locations be addressed immediately as part of the OGC permitting process.

In a letter to TransCanada, copied to the OGC, dated June 2, 2015 the RDBN requested that TransCanada be required to make application for Temporary Use Permits at least 6 months prior to construction. The EAO approved the TransCanada proposal that applications can be made 3 months in advance of construction.

In a letter to TransCanada, copied to the OGC, dated October 26, 2015 the RDBN responded to an OGC permit referral. The RDBN noted that facility locations were not legal and asked that issues surrounding work camp and pipeline facility locations be addressed immediately as part of the OGC permitting process.



In a letter to the OGC dated March 13, 2017 the RDBN responded to an OGC permit extension referral. The RDBN noted that the RDBN's previous comments on the permits remained valid.

Liquid Waste Disposal

In a letter to the EAO dated July 21, 2014 the RDBN responded to an OGC permit referral by requesting that TransCanada begin working with municipalities to identify their capacity to accept liquid waste, identify any facility upgrades that may be necessary, and discuss the fees that may be associated with utilizing municipal facilities. It was also suggested that the option to develop a regional facility be considered. This was described as an opportunity for the region to obtain upgrades to infrastructure for the benefit of the region's residents. This same opportunity may be available for municipal water systems. The RDBN's Environmental Services Department offered to facilitate the necessary discussions between the municipalities and the pipelines.

In a letter to TransCanada, copied to the OGC, dated June 29, 2015 the RDBN requested that the EAO require that TransCanada consult with the RDBN and member municipalities to determine opportunities for, and actions necessary to accommodate, their taking of liquid waste.

In a letter to TransCanada, copied to the OGC, dated June 29, 2015 the RDBN responded to a referral regarding a draft Chemical and Waste Management Plan. The RDBN noted that the plan did not deal with the location and method of waste disposal. It was recommended that the plan deal with disposal issues following consultation with the RDBN,

In letters to TransCanada, copied to the OGC, dated October 26, and December 10, 2015 the RDBN responded to OGC permit referrals again requesting that TransCanada begin working with municipalities to identify their capacity to accept liquid waste, identify any facility upgrades that may be necessary, and discuss the fees that may be associated with utilizing municipal facilities. It was also suggested that the option to develop a regional facility be considered.

In a letter to the OGC dated March 13, 2017 the RDBN responded to an OGC permit extension referral. The RDBN noted that the RDBN's previous comments on the permits remained valid.

Invasive Plant Control

In a letter to the EAO dated February 18, 2014 the RDBN recommended to the EAO that TransCanada make a commitment to provide funding to the Northwest Invasive Plant Council as the pipeline can be expected to facilitate the spread of invasive plants.

In a letter to the EAO dated April 17, 2014 the RDBN expressed concern to the EAO regarding the spread of invasive plants along the pipeline and again recommended that TransCanada be required to make a commitment for funding to the Northwest Invasive Plant Council, as do other right of way holders.

In a letter to the EAO dated July 18, 2014 the RDBN expressed concern regarding the spread of invasive plants along the pipeline and recommended that TransCanada be required to make a commitment for funding to the Northwest Invasive Plant Council, as do other right of way holders.

In a letter to TransCanada, copied to the OGC, dated June 29, 2015 the RDBN requested that the EAO require TransCanada to provide funding to the Northwest Invasive Plant Council.

In a letter to TransCanada, copied to the OGC, dated June 29, 2015 the RDBN responded to a referral regarding a draft Invasive Plant Management Plan for the CGL pipeline. The RDBN requested that the plan include a commitment for funding to the Northwest Invasive Plant Council.

In letters to TransCanada, copied to the OGC, dated October 26 and December 10, 2015 the RDBN responded to an OGC permit referrals. The RDBN requested that TransCanada commit to provide annual funding the Northwest Invasive Plant Council to help support their weed control efforts in the RDBN.

In a letter to the OGC dated March 13, 2017 the RDBN responded to an OGC permit extension referral. The RDBN noted that the RDBN's previous comments on the permits remained valid.

Fire Protection and Emergency Response

In a letter to the EAO dated February 18, 2014 the RDBN requested to the EAO that TransCanada develop an emergency response plan based on an understanding of the role of the RDBN in an emergency, and fire protection capacity, in the rural area.

In a letter to the EAO dated April 17, 2014 the RDBN recommended to the EAO that fire protection and emergency response should be discussed with the RDBN and an emergency response plan should be developed in conjunction with the RDBN.

In a letter to the EAO dated July 18, 2014 the RDBN expressed concern that the CGL fire protection plans incorrectly rely on local fire departments responding to work camps which are located outside of rural fire protection areas. The RDBN requested that the EAO require TransCanada to develop a fire response plan that is based on an understanding of the fire services that will be available from the RDBN. The RDBN also requested that an emergency response plan be developed which includes an evacuation plan for the work camps showing how workers will be transported and the nature of the accommodations they will be provided.

In a letter to TransCanada, copied to the OGC, July 21, 2014 the RDBN responded to an OGC permit referral and expressed concern with the TransCanada plan to rely on the construction contractors to develop the emergency management plans at the time of construction. The RDBN requested that TransCanada develop emergency management plans that address fire protection and emergency response in consultation with the RDBN.

In a letter to TransCanada, copied to the OGC, dated June 29, 2015 the RDBN requested that the EAO require TransCanada to develop an emergency management plan, fire suppression plan, and work camp evacuation plan following meaningful consultation with the RDBN. The EAO approved the TransCanada proposal that these plans be developed 3 months in advance of construction. There is no requirement for TransCanada to consult with the RDBN on the development of these plans.

In a letter to TransCanada, copied to the OGC, dated June 2, 2015 the RDBN responded to a referral regarding a draft Fire Suppression Contingency Plan for the CGL pipeline. The RDBN pointed out that the CGL plan continued to incorrectly rely on local fire departments responding to work camps which are outside of the Fire Protection boundary where there is no fire department response. The RDBN recommended a Fire Suppression Contingency Plan be developed following meaningful discussion with the RDBN and an understanding of the fire protection services that are available to CGL.

In a letter to TransCanada, copied to the OGC, dated October 26, 2015 the RDBN responded to an OGC permit referral. The RDBN expressed concern that TransCanada had not yet consulted with the RDBN regarding fire protection, emergency response and the development of emergency response plans that include communications protocols and emergency evacuations.

In a letter to TransCanada, copied to the OGC, dated December 2015 the RDBN responded to an OGC permit referral. The RDBN requested that TransCanada consult with the RDBN regarding fire protection, emergency response, and their emergency management plan.

In a letter to the OGC dated March 13, 2017 the RDBN responded to an OGC permit extension referral. The RDBN noted that the RDBN's previous comments on the permits remained valid.

Wood Fiber Utilization

In a letter to the EAO dated February 18, 2014 the RDBN expressed concern to the EAO that the cutting of trees and the long term loss of forested lands associated with the CGL pipeline represents a negative impact to the long term sustainability of the region's forest industries. The RDBN expressed concern that where the cost of harvesting and transportation are too high the logs will not be utilized in support of the forest products industries. The RDBN said it would like TransCanada to ensure that wood fibre is utilized in support of the forest products industries even if it cannot be sold or otherwise economically processed.

In a letter to the EAO dated July 18, 2014 the RDBN expressed concern that the proposed certificate conditions did not adequately address the RDBN's desire to ensure that wood fiber is adequately utilized.

In a letter to TransCanada, copied to the OGC, dated July 21, 2014 the RDBN responded to an OGC permit referral and requested that TransCanada ensure that wood fiber is utilized in support of the forest products industries even if it cannot be sold or otherwise economically processed.

In a letter to TransCanada, copied to the OGC, dated October 26, 2015 the RDBN responded to an OGC permit referral. The RDBN expressed concern that TransCanada would not agree to ensure that wood fibre is utilized in support of the forest products industries even if it cannot be sold or otherwise economically processed.

In a letter to the OGC dated March 13, 2017 the RDBN responded to an OGC permit extension referral. The RDBN noted that the RDBN's previous comments on the permits remained valid.



Employee Training and Apprenticeships

In a letter to the EAO dated April 17, 2014 the RDBN expressed concern that there are limited specific commitments regarding the steps that will be taken by TransCanada to ensure that local employment is maximized and that apprenticeship positions for local employees are provided. The RDBN said that the specific actions that TransCanada is committing to undertake to maximize local training and employment needs to be further discussed and confirmed.

In a letter to the EAO dated July 18, 2014 the RDBN expressed concern to the EAO that the draft certificate conditions regarding training commitments are vague, do not ensure appropriate training of local residents, and do not include the requirement for consultation with the RDBN.

In a letter to TransCanada, copied to the OGC, dated July 21, 2014 the RDBN responded to an OGC permit referral with concerns that there are limited specific commitments regarding the steps that will be taken to ensure local employment and apprenticeship positions for local employees. The RDBN also expressed concern that there were no plans to include the RDBN in their process to plan for local worker training and employment.

In a letter to TransCanada, copied to the OGC, dated June 29, 2015 the RDBN requested that the EAO require TransCanada to allow the RDBN an opportunity to review and comment on TransCanada's education and training plan.

In a letter to TransCanada, copied to the OGC, dated October 26, 2015 the RDBN responded to an OGC permit referral. The RDBN expressed concern that there are limited specific commitments regarding the steps that will be taken to ensure local employment and apprenticeship positions for local employees. The RDBN said that the specific actions that TransCanada will undertake to maximize local training and employment needs to be further discussed.

In a letter to the OGC dated March 13, 2017 the RDBN responded to an OGC permit extension referral. The RDBN noted that the RDBN's previous comments on the permits remained valid.

Use of Local Business

In a letter to the EAO dated April 17, 2014 the RDBN said that TransCanada should do all that is possible to scale the size of contracts and operations in a manner that allows local business to take advantage of the opportunity offered by pipeline construction. This includes early communication with local business. The RDBN stated that the specific actions to be taken by TransCanada need to be discussed and confirmed.

In a letter to the EAO dated July 18, 2014 the RDBN expressed concern to the EAO that the draft certificate conditions regarding the use of local business are vague, do not ensure that meaningful efforts will be made to maximize the use of local business during the construction process.

In a letter to TransCanada, copied to the OGC, dated July 21, 2014 the RDBN responded to an OGC permit referral by reminding TransCanada to do all that is possible to scale the size of contracts and operations in a manner that allows local business to take advantage of the opportunity offered by pipeline construction. The RDBN noted that the specific actions TransCanada commits to undertake need to be further discussed. The RDBN also noted their



concern that TransCanada has not agreed to include the RDBN in their process to plan for the use of local business.

In a letter to TransCanada, copied to the OGC, dated June 29, 2015 the RDBN requested to the EAO that TransCanada's previous commitment to communicate with First Nations regarding subcontracting opportunities be expanded to include the commitment to also communicate with the general population on subcontracting opportunities. The RDBN also asked that TransCanada be required to provide the RDBN with an opportunity to review and comment on the Local and Aboriginal Participation Plan.

In a letter to TransCanada, copied to the OGC, dated October 26, 2015 the RDBN responded to an OGC permit referral. The RDBN said that TransCanada should do all that is possible to scale the size of contracts and operations in a manner that allows local business to take advantage of the opportunity offered by pipeline construction. This includes early communication with local business. The RDBN requested that the specific actions to be taken by TransCanada be discussed and confirmed.

In a letter to the OGC dated March 13, 2017 the RDBN responded to an OGC permit extension referral. The RDBN noted that the RDBN's previous comments on the permits remained valid.

Dear Chair Miller,

On behalf of the Coastal GasLink Pipeline Project, thank you for the opportunity to present to the RDBN Board on September 21, 2017. We appreciate the opportunity to share information, and to gain valuable feedback from Board members.

As part of our follow-up to the meeting, we had committed to sending a preliminary permitting schedule, and a record of some of the important construction planning updates that we currently have available. This letter and response is also in reference to the letter from the RDBN sent to the OGC, dated November 10, 2017.

Temporary Use Permit Applications

We understand that regional districts need to plan for any Temporary Use Permit applications in advance to ensure that the Board and staff are equipped to make decisions. As we have explained, the Coastal GasLink construction schedule is fully dependent on a Final Investment Decision (FID) from our client, LNG Canada. In July of 2016, LNG Canada announced a delay to their project. In the meantime, they are advancing the planning for their project in anticipation of a decision by their joint venture partners. Coastal GasLink has been reviewing our construction schedules, and working with our front-running Prime Contractors to plan our project more effectively. As these contractors are a key part of the detailed planning, much of the final decision-making cannot be completed until contracts have been awarded. The project is broken up into 8 construction sections, and will be carried out by 4 different Prime Contractors. The way we've designed our work packages will allow the contractors to have their crews work in both summer and winter months.

Coastal GasLink will require Temporary Use Permits from local governments across the certified project corridor. This includes TUPs for camps, multi-use sites, stockpile sites, and laydown sites. The following table is a preliminary TUP permit application schedule as of December 2017:

As we stated in the presentation in September, these sites and the schedule are subject to change, as there has not been an investment decision to definitively proceed with the project. Our permit applications need to be sequenced to the timing of use for each site, need to match the requirements of the Prime Contractors (who are not yet awarded), and need to account for the permit term (3 years). It is anticipated the last of these sites will not be vacated until Q1 of 2022 and final reclamation completed in the summer of 2022. As a result, it is not practical to initiate the application process at this time as the permits would expire before the project would be complete. If there are any issues with a particular site that the RDBN has currently, we are willing to discuss them in detail. These locations have been available in a detailed map book on the dedicated Sharepoint website created for RDBN during the regulatory process. The general reference maps of ancillary sites used in the September 21, 2017 presentation have also been attached to this letter for your convenience.

Construction Camps

The EAC Application contemplated camps and ancillary facilities in its assessment of environmental, economic, social, heritage and health effects of the Project. Coastal GasLink's camp requirements are formed from the mitigations committed to in that process and from detailed discussions we are currently having with our leading Prime Contractors and camp contractors. The current construction camps planned within the RDBN, approximate peak workforce, and duration include the following locations:

Vanderhoof Airport - 850 persons at peak, over 120,000 man days Lejac - 550 persons at peak, over 140,000 man days Tchesinkut Lake - 600 persons at peak, over 100,000 man days. Huckleberry - 850 persons at peak, over 120,000 man days. Multi-use Site 9A - 150 persons at peak, over 35,000 man days.





These camps will reflect current construction workforce standards, including separate quarters for men and women, catering, laundry, games rooms and exercise facilities. The camp population will include the construction workforce, field management and supervisory staff, technical and administrative support, camp catering and maintenance services, security, medical personnel and logistics services. Medical services on site will include paramedics, first aid attendants, and access to the services of a nurse practitioner. Security personnel will also be on site at all times, and camps will be equipped with their own fire suppression capability. Members of the workforce may travel into communities and use facilities and services during non-work hours, and we are reviewing transportation options for this to attempt to minimize traffic.

Coastal GasLink has adopted TransCanada policies and processes to ensure safe and harassment-free camp and work environments. These rules prohibit the use or possession of illegal drugs, and will have no tolerance for harassment. Firearms will be prohibited on site. The Project will set out clear guidelines for behaviour to all workers that will be enforced by camp management and by Prime Contractors. This is for the benefit of everyone in camp and in northern B.C. communities.

Coastal GasLink's camps will have their own power sources, water supply and waste management systems. However, we are investigating the use of grid power, hauling in water and utilizing centralized sewage treatment systems for multiple camps. Although we've discussed liquid waste capacity with a number of municipalities, recent guidance from the Ministry of Environment has indicated that liquid waste must be treated on site in camps that are over 100 persons. Therefore, with regard to liquid waste disposal, it is Coastal GasLink's intention to treat sewage on site at construction camps where practical, generating a dewatered biosolid. RDBN staff have previously indicated to us that some biosolids may be accepted at RDBN landfills depending on volumes. However, we understand that the regional district prefers the use of composting methods for biosolids so this has been taken into consideration. The solid waste from the camps will be hauled to local landfills that have capacity, and we would expect regular tipping fees to apply. The Project has committed to avoid any solid waste incineration as part of the mitigation included in Section 6 of the Environmental Assessment. The approximate solid and liquid waste volumes by camp location for Coastal GasLink were provided to RDBN staff in 2015, and are attached again in the appendices to this letter for reference.

Fire Protection and Emergency Response

TransCanada has an Emergency Management Program that includes Corporate, Operations and Project related areas. The program is routinely reviewed and revised as necessary and is tested through drills on an ongoing basis. The Emergency Response Program is based on an Incident Command System structure. This system can be activated to respond to a variety of potential emergencies such as fire, natural disaster, security events, etc. When activated, this program assembles subject matter experts in various disciplines such as Emergency Response, Safety, Environment, Operations, Engineering, Supply Chain Management, Communications, etc. to ensure the appropriate resources are engaged to mitigate the emergency as effectively and expeditiously as possible.

During the pipeline construction phase, Coastal GasLink will be utilizing experienced and qualified pipeline contractors, who are designated as Prime Contractors. In addition, construction workers are provided extensive training during onboarding and throughout construction to reduce environmental, safety, and security risk. Prime Contractors are responsible to develop, as part of their Project/Site Specific Safety Plans, comprehensive Emergency Response Plans. These Plans must include various emergency situations and scenarios and identify procedures and resources required to isolate, control and manage emergencies. The Prime Contractors, as part of their planning and preparation to commence the construction process will consult local resources to identify and engage the available resources and to share information. The plans will ensure that emergency response management is executed in compliance with applicable laws, regulations



and in accordance with contract obligations respecting TransCanada policies and procedures. Where there are gaps noted (for example, camps where there is no Fire Protection service in proximity), then the appropriate resources would be brought in by the contractors. The Prime Contractors will typically be self-sufficient for all but major emergencies. The Prime Contractor Emergency Response Plans will also contain Communication Plans which will include local governments and emergency service providers where applicable. These Emergency Response Plans would be shared with regional organizations of concern when they have been developed and prior to construction commencing, and must be submitted for approval to regulatory authorities.

TransCanada strives to maintain good communications throughout construction and operations. We operate more than 91,000 kilometres of pipeline throughout North America and we are eager to maintain good relationships with local organizations and vendors who are our neighbours. Our people working for TransCanada during the operations phase will likely be drawn from and live in the local communities. Prior to a pipeline going into service, TransCanada's Regional Emergency Operations Plans are updated to integrate the new asset into its operations. As standard practice, the development of these plans includes consultation and communication with local governments and emergency service providers. Following the development of the plans, emergency scenarios and the company responses will be communicated and shared with these organizations. As well, local governments will be informed of any practice drills that occur as a regular course of our operations.

Coastal GasLink and our Prime Contractors will work with local organizations as soon as possible and when it has the appropriate information to do so. We cannot provide specific Emergency Response Plans until contracts are in place with our Prime Contractors. Because Prime Contractors are a key component of this discussion, we believe it is important for communication protocols to be established with their involvement.

Invasive Plants

The Environmental Assessment Certificate (EAC) for the Coastal GasLink Project conditions the development of an Invasive Plants Management Plan (Condition 16). This Plan was developed with extensive consultation from government agencies, Aboriginal groups, and stakeholders and was approved as part of the Project's Environmental Management Plan by the Environmental Assessment Office (EAO) on April 29, 2016. The Plan will be implemented applying industry standards and best management practices during construction, reclamation and throughout the operations phase.

The primary objective is to prevent the introduction of noxious and invasive plants (weeds) to Project sites but also to manage weeds discovered during monitoring activities throughout construction, reclamation and operations. The plan also provides details on alternative methods of weed control, avoiding the use of herbicides and pesticides, in accordance with British Columbia's Integrated Pest Management Act and commitments documented during Coastal GasLink's ongoing Aboriginal and stakeholder consultation. Furthermore, it is our expectation that equipment will arrive to site clean and free of debris. Our interest is to work in co-operation with you and other stakeholders to use effective weed management strategies at every phase.

With regards to the Northwest Invasive Plant Council (NWIPC), Coastal GasLink last met with them in November 2015. Coastal GasLink and NWIPC discussed project scope and potential opportunities for partnership. Coastal GasLink plans further discussions with NWIPC on sharing database information and potential opportunities to contract with the organization during the construction phase. At that time, Coastal GasLink representatives also invited NWIPC to submit an application to the project's Community Investment program, but no application has been received to date. Coastal GasLink provided \$15,000 to the Invasive





Species Council of BC in 2013 to deliver training programs in northern B.C. communities, with the involvement of NWIPC.

Timber Salvage

The EAC also conditions Coastal GasLink to develop a Timber Salvage Strategy (Condition 21) and underwent the same consultation and approval process. The strategy is about minimizing the volume of waste timber to gain the most value from a shared resource. The strategy includes the following details:

- timber volume estimates for the Certified Pipeline Corridor;
- marketing commitments and plans for the timber cleared;
- salvage activities for the timber volume that will not be marketed; and,
- the approach for a reconciliation report including a scaled volume comparison to the timber volume estimate to FLNR and EAO on at least an annual basis until harvest activities are complete.

Section 13.0 (Forest Pest Management) of the Timber Salvage Plan addresses how we will approach forest pests, such as the Spruce Beetle. The Timber Salvage Plan also describes mitigation to avoid and minimize the spread of forest pests during construction-associated timber management and hauling. Pest infestation monitoring and stand evaluation of risk will be ongoing to ensure Coastal GasLink activities have not created conditions for forest pest spread. Infested timber will not be transported during critical times to avoid distributing forest pests into new geographic areas.

Local Contracting and Employment

Coastal GasLink goes beyond the industry standard when it comes to emphasizing local contracting and employment on the Project. Local businesses, including those in the RDBN, have already participated in opportunities for the Project. The Socio-economic Effects Management Plan was approved by the EAO on May 13, 2016, and includes mitigation for concerns on the economy and on the labour force, among other social impacts. The Project continues to develop plans and work with our contractors to ensure that qualified Aboriginal and local individuals are considered for opportunities.

Most business opportunities on Coastal GasLink will be provided through Prime Contractors or their sub-contractors. To ensure meaningful opportunities for B.C. communities, TransCanada requires that each Prime develop a Local and Aboriginal Participation plan. These plans describe how contractors will identify and utilize local business capacity. A large portion of the prime contractors' hiring will be through construction labour unions. We are currently working closely with our leading contractors on their labour strategies. These strategies include advanced work and planning with the unions to ensure that Aboriginal and local people in Northern BC have preferential hiring.

The Project continues to connect with businesses and individuals at Chamber events, business forums, and job fairs across Northern BC. Throughout these efforts, we have been collecting local vendor information through our vendor databases, and will be sharing this information with our contractors. Coastal GasLink plans to notify communities when our prime contractors are selected, and we will tour the region with our contractors to promote both local contracting and local employment through networking opportunities. During construction, Coastal GasLink will continue to oversee the prime contractor to ensure a quality product, a safe worksite and the implementation of Local and Aboriginal Participation plans.

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Many communities, including those in the RDBN, communicated how important it is for Coastal GasLink to invest in education and training opportunities to ensure individuals are ready when the project moves to the construction phase. As a result, the Project developed the *Pathway to Pipeline Readiness Program* as a set of principles to enable spending on skills training. The program aims to support Northern B.C.'s skilled labour force, and to grow workers' transferable skills. We recognize that building the capacity of individuals along our pipeline route is essential to maximizing local benefits and building a better project.

Since 2014, Coastal GasLink has committed over \$1.8 million to education and training initiatives in Northern BC (increased to over \$3 million when combined with other TransCanada projects). These investments include major funding partnerships with College of New Caledonia, and Northwest Community College for bursaries and equipment purchases. They also include major funding partnerships with Indigenous training organizations to upgrade essential skills, and job readiness. These investments have been made in advance of a Final Investment Decision because we recognize that training and labour force preparation takes time. In the coming months, Coastal GasLink will be announcing new partnerships that will support individuals in the RDBN region to gain construction-related work experience, and to help entrepreneurs with the support they need to capitalize on new business opportunities. Further direct training will be included as part of the construction phase, and is related to the labour strategies of the Prime Contractors and their respective labour unions. This includes safety training and on-boarding, union-sponsored training opportunities, and the hiring of apprentices in select trades.

Public Relations During Construction

Coastal GasLink takes all public concerns seriously, and takes responsibility for answering questions related to our project. The project email address and public phone number are available to contact us at any time, along with Public Affairs, Indigenous Relations, and Land staff who regularly engage with landowners, stakeholders and Aboriginal groups. The SEEMP contains a section dedicated specifically to engagement during construction. SEEMP section 3.4 includes an Issues Management Process (see figure below) that describes how Coastal GasLink responds to public inquiries.



Coastal GasLink takes accountability for responding, documenting and tracking issues, as part of the regulatory reporting process. If RDBN Directors or staff receive public complaints regarding Coastal GasLink, we'd ask that they be directed to:

South of Houston Alternate Route Amendment

On November 8, 2017, the Project filed an amendment application to add an alternate route option called the South of Houston Alternate Route (SHAR) to the Certified Pipeline Corridor with the B.C. Environmental Assessment Office (EAO), and filed with the B.C. Oil and Gas Commission (OGC) shortly thereafter. The requested amendments would add the proposed SHAR to the existing Certified Pipeline Corridor and one of the two potential route options would be chosen for construction.

After extensive consultation with local communities and Aboriginal groups, the South of Houston Alternate Route was identified to help minimize potential adverse effects on traditional and cultural land use on a portion of the current route. As part of our ongoing engagement, Coastal GasLink notified these Aboriginal groups in May 2016 and August 2017 of our intent to study an alternate route about 4 km south of our certified pipeline corridor (southwest of Burns Lake and south of Houston), and about 42 km in length. Since that time, we have completed important environmental and engineering fieldwork that has helped us identify an alternate route option which best reduces those impacts identified by Aboriginal groups. Coastal GasLink appreciates RDBN's participation in the EAO Working Group for the SHAR amendment application.

In closing, thank you to the RDBN Board and staff for the interest in Coastal GasLink. It is our hope that RDBN views Coastal GasLink as a welcome industry partner and a project of choice among major LNG-related projects in BC. We believe the Project continues to represent a transformational economic opportunity for Northern BC communities. We will continue to keep RDBN informed of our plans moving forward, and please don't hesitate to contact us if we can be of further assistance.

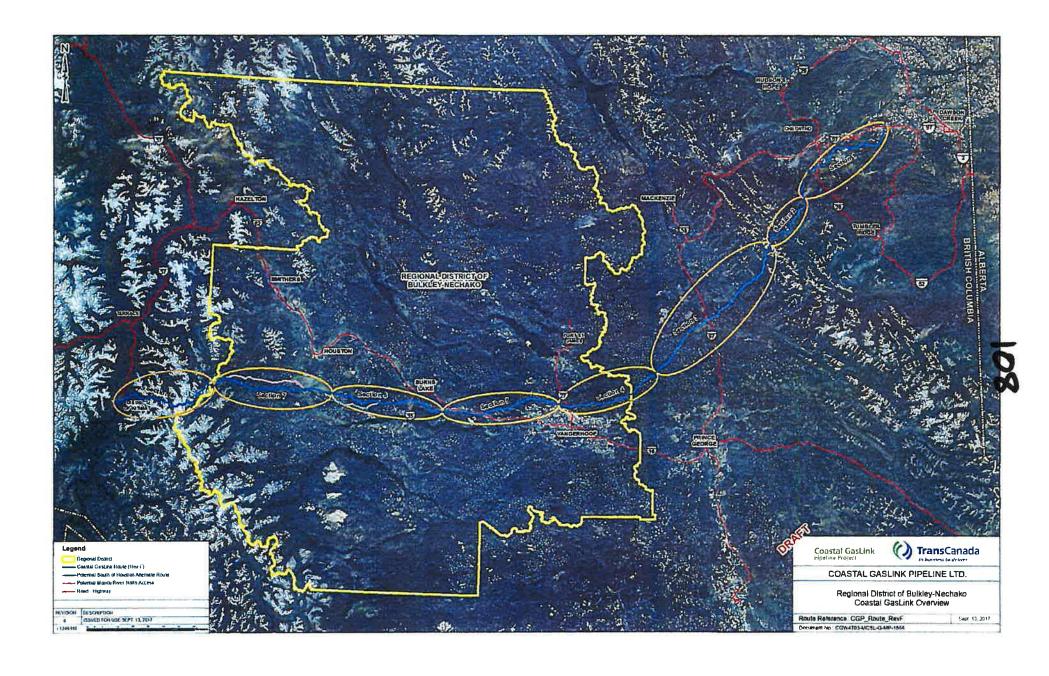

At times it has been SO loud it wakes one from sleep in the morning and overrides the announcers on the radio/ or television. The noise creates health risks from heightened stress level causing irritability that has negative effects on families. Also it has devastated our property values, making the thoughts of selling impossible, as no one wants to live in an area with this degree of noise.

The first Table meeting for the Rio Tinto Water Engagement Initiative (WEI) was held on June 13, 2019 at Scott's Grille in Vanderhoof, British Columbia. The session was open to the public and ran from 10:00 AM to 3:40 PM.

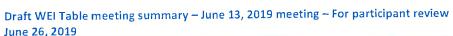

The following provides a summary of the topics discussed at the meeting. The presentation given at the meeting accompanies this summary.

- The WEI project team introduced themselves and provided details on their respective roles in the WEI
- Meeting participants then introduced themselves and identified the organization they represent (if they are associated with an organization). They then spoke about their interest in the Nechako Region and the WEI Process.
- A question was asked if the District of Vanderhoof (DOV) are full participants in the WEI process. Mayor Thiessen responded that the DOV and the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako's (RDBN's) participation is dependent on the implementation of the four points identified in the letter provided by the Province. The letter can be found at: https://www.getinvolvednechako.ca/wei
- AC clarified that Rio Tinto is a participant at the table and are not leading the WEI process. He will represent Rio Tinto's interest in the same fashion as other participants. His interests include being accountable to Rio Tinto's business interests in BC, which also represents approximately 1,500 employees. AC commented the Rio Tinto's operations in BC produce low CO₂ emission aluminum and generate approximately \$400 million per year to the economy, though employment, tax revenue, pensions, and other avenues. Rio Tinto is also the largest independent power producer in BC and generates enough energy to power 140,000 homes. Rio Tinto in undertaking the WEI in order to improve their operations.
- RR commented that EDI is part of the WEI process as Independent Facilitators. RR's role is to facilitate a fair process and to ensure that people's interests are heard. EDI does not have a stake in the outcomes generated through the WEI process. EDI works for the participants.
- A comment was made that is good that an independent facilitator will be leading the process, but that there is concern about who makes the decision at the end of the process to implement the outcomes? Who will pay the bill or compensation? It was noted that the Province is also culpable to what has happened. The question is how do we start the process when the Province says they are there to ensure the process doesn't evolve into something bigger with scope creep, and not having a long process? This situation is not a quick fix.
- The Province clarified that what was meant as watching for scope creep was that the Province would not like to see the WEI turn into a major land use planning process. The Province wants to help address issues, but not focus on items being addressed through other efforts or initiatives, and that the focus remains on the Nechako, its water use and flows, and timing.
- Discussion centered around the expected timeframe for the WEI Process. RR stated that based on experience in similar processes, the timeframe could be 18 months, but that is not a hard deadline. The





duration depends on the issues to address and participant preferences, but efforts will be made to keep the process efficient.

- AC commented that the timeframe is important, and the table can shape the specifics of the process. He
 mentioned that immediately implementable short-term opportunities can be implemented during the WEI
 Process. For more complex scenarios, the 18-month timeframe seems realistic.
- A comment was made that there is a plenty of good data and scientific information available that can help
 the process. It is true that things can be done now, but a flow regime needs to be in place in order to
 implement long-term changes.
- A comment was made that there is still concern with the initiative. It was thought that the 1987 and 1997
 Agreements would bring new life to the Nechako, but that did not happen. What is needed is a new plan to move forward. Having independence is important.
- RR stated that the intent is to improve operations, to bring interests and knowledge together. The WEI process is based on the principles and approaches outlined in the BC Water Use Plans (WUP) guidelines. The WEI process will build on Strategic Decision-Making approaches. RR clarified that the WEI process will be driven by the participants, not Rio Tinto.
- Comment was made that we don't have a lot of time for the process. Fish are suffering. Fish stocks are way down and spawning is getting less and less every year. Runs are at historic lows and crisis appears everywhere. For the Sturgeon effort underway, it is doomed unless the habitat improves. Reaching consensus is great, but we need to do something now.
- Comment was made that for true consultation to occur, we need many voices whose input needs to be valued and heard. If there is a set result in mind, then it is not true consultation. It is simply a discussion. AC commented that Rio Tinto does not have a pre-determined flow regime in mind. The WEI process is being conducted to hear about the interests and issues held by interested parties. The WEI is not a duty to consult. It is not checking a box. Rio Tinto would like to understand how best to balance the multiple interests in the region. Participant replied that there is still a lot of skepticism based on past actions. AC commented that he has tried to understand what occurred. He confirmed that Rio Tinto is invested in the region and BC, and believes there is a better way of doing business.
- A comment was made that there has been ample talk today about the Nechako River. But not much is being said about the reservoir itself. There are plenty of issues there, as well, to consider. RR agreed and said that all interests need to be brought forward, so that participants can understand all the issues and concerns. People want to work through a process that is impactful, and meaningful.
- Comment was made that the 1987 and 1997 Agreements were made without input, behind closed doors.
 It took a long time for the Nechako Watershed Council (NWC) to go through its process. Industry can get things done if it wants to.





- Comment was made that small things are not going to make a big difference. The NWC came to determination that a spillway was needed at Kenney Dam and the sturgeon recovery effort should be contingent on the spillway being built. A different flow regime and flushes are needed to address and fix habitat. BC could re-visit the recommendations brought forward by the NWC, but it is time to get on with achieving our goals. RR stated that the WEI process will look at these issues. There are many issues to examine and we should use the knowledge compiled and experience of the participants to develop a plan of action.
- A comment was made about the need to help all participants understand the work that has been to date. It would take a long time to bring folks up to speed, so that decisions can be made in the proper context. RR replied that participants will have the support of the Technical Working Group to help inform and share information with participants. The intent is for participants that have the information made available to them in an approachable manner.
- Some discussion occurred on the topic of quick wins. An example was provided with respect to ranching being conducted on the banks of the Nechako. It would be useful for ranchers to have forward-looking information on flows, so that they can plan activities accordingly to protect their cattle, horseman, and hay crops.
- A comment was made that gathering information will be very useful, but that participants will need to understand where flows will come from. RR replied that infrastructure needs can be discussed during the process.
- Comment made on how Rio Tinto has many assets in the Nechako Region and participants will need to know what isn't on the table? What Rio Tinto is not willing to do? Participants will need to know the sensitivities of the Water License, and if a different flow regime can be on the table. AC replied that the water release facility at Kenney dam is being looked at by the First Nations Major Projects Coalition and Rio Tinto is working with them. It is not off the table and a feasibility study is currently in the works. A change in flows is also not off the table, but surrendering 30% of the Water License could be difficult to do, and AC will represent Rio Tinto's interests at the table. However, the WEI process may find ways to free up flows, and there may be a better balance to be found.
- There was discussion on the risks involved in going through the process and making change to the current situation. The risks will need to be evaluated and addressed quickly, so that changes can be made. However, it should be noted that as soon as lawyers become involved, the process can slow down considerably. RR stated that one of the reasons the provincial and federal governments are at the table is so regulatory risks can be identified early during the process and solutions identified.
- A comment was made that the NWC identified risks related to the spillway at Kenney dam, the Cheslatta fan, and the dewatered portion of the Nechako. There were high risks of mobilizing sediment downstream should the spillway be constructed at Kenney dam. Participants will need to be aware that they may be



reluctant to implement changes if it risks damaging spawning habitat downstream, even though the change needs to be done. Many studies have been in favour of building a spillway at Kenney dam, and if it is not built, other work may not be useful in the long-term.

- Discussion centered around the availability of data, and how it is being amalgamated. It will be important to have access to the information and have it stored appropriately. The more information we can gather, the better off we will be. Ecofish, in the role of technical coordinator, is currently amalgamating the documents, and will be a valuable source of information. The TWG will be formed with specialists with extensive backgrounds working on the Nechako. The TWG is open, and Table members can recommend TWG members. A question was asked about who pays for Ecofish's work. RR answered that Jayson's work is funded by Rio Tinto, but he is an independent professional, guided by the Table and the facilitator. JK has plenty of experience working on similar processes and his input will be valuable.
- A comment was made on importance of trying to make things better. Even when people thought they lost during the 1987 and 1997 Agreements, they always won something. For example, the 1987 Agreement removed other watersheds that were planned for the reservoir and established long-term flows. The 1997 Agreement established flows of 36.8 m/s and continued cooling flows established prior to the 1987 agreement. There were improvements made. When an invite comes from Rio Tinto, the participants need to try once more to improve the situation. The Table may not get everything they want, but will win something in the end.
- Discussion centered around the Guiding Principles and focused in on the scope of the WEI and its boundaries. AC said Rio Tinto isn't sure about where to draw the line in terms of boundaries, and should be left up to the participants. It is true that in terms of dam safety, the reach is all the way to Vancouver. Boundaries were discussed in terms of cooling effects, flows, watersheds, operations, fish, economics. RR wanted to know how far Rio Tinto's modeling goes.
- Action Item: AC to report how far their downstream modeling extends next meeting.
- A participant expressed concern about getting bogged down in the details with how far the discharge of Nechako effects downstream. Comment that we need to focus on the process now, and not get caught-up in determining the end results. A comment was made that if we start at the end, we will lose focus on the wider context.
- The Draft Guiding Principles document was reviewed as a group, section by section. Discussion on wording in Section 2.1 Mandate and Purpose and 2.3 Planning Area occurred. A revised draft for table review will be provided ahead of the next meeting.
- Action Item: Draft Guiding Principle wording to be updated by RR, and a revised draft provided electronically to participants ahead of the next meeting.

Draft WEI Table meeting summary – June 13, 2019 meeting – For participant review June 26, 2019



- A question was asked if the Province has given the authority to the FLNRORD representatives to act with authority. The speaker suggested the Province has an important role to play and should invest resources and tax dollars in the river. The FLNRORD representative responded that they did have authority to make decisions, but cannot guarantee the outcomes as they are not known yet. Their role in the WEI will be as participants, and will provide technical support, such as supplying data and weighing in on technical information. The representatives are participating in order to listen, identify red flags on issues, report back to the Minister on progress, and to ask questions that the participants may have of the Province. Another important aspect of the Province's participation is the UN Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples and their commitment to engage with First Nations. AC stated that Rio Tinto has been discussing the WEI with the Water Comptroller, who is fully supportive of the process.
- As promised, RR read a statement from June Wood who was unable to attend the meeting today. She stated, "recognition that in order to enable restoration of the Nechako River to a healthier, more natural condition, changes to existing rights and agreements will be required."
- Action Item: Post support letter from the DFO on the Get Involved Nechako website: getinvolvednechako.ca. (RR comment: Complete. The letter is posted at: https://www.getinvolvednechako.ca/7037/documents/15124)
- Discussion centered on the First Nation court cases involving Rio Tinto. AC acknowledged that the court
 cases are proceeding and that they will take their course, but that the WEI Process can help understand and
 address some issues in the short term, before the legal proceedings conclude.
- Discussion centered around having media present during the WEI meetings. It was agreed that the process needs to be transparent, but it is important that the media not distract from the process or take things out of context. Suggestion was made that one person be designated as the media spokesperson.
- Key outcome: Rahul was confirmed as the media spokesperson for the Table. Participants will review draft media releases before they are issued.
- Key outcome: Participants agreed that, if needed, they can communicate with the media on a personal level, not as a representative for the WEI Table.
- Key outcome: Participants confirmed that field trips around the Nechako region would be valuable in providing a common understanding to all participants. Suggestions for field trips should be sent to RR who will present options to the Table.
- Participant funding was discussed. Funding from Rio Tinto will cover travel costs, a day of preparation time ahead of meetings, and meeting attendance. Details will be presented at the next meeting.
- Question about where the Table meetings will be held. RR replied that the meetings will rotate through different communities in the watershed, suggested, and confirmed with participants.

Draft Rio Tinto WEI Process Guiding Principles



Purpose of this document: Numerous meetings and presentations with interested parties have been hosted by the Rio Tinto Water Engagement Initiative (WEI) team over the past number of months. During that time, the intent of the process and guiding principles have been discussed. This document is a compilation of those principles, for discussion, revision, and confirmation by you beginning at our meeting on Thursday, June 13.

1.0 Introduction

Rio Tinto initiated the WEI to collaborate with organizations and individuals with interests in its operations as it relates to management of the Nechako Reservoir. Discussions with Indigenous communities; municipal, regional, provincial, and federal levels of government; and stakeholders have occurred to determine their willingness to help identify ways of improving Rio Tinto operations in the Nechako region.

2.0 WEI Process

2.1 Mandate and purpose

The WEI Process is intended to provide a vehicle to share interests, review information, develop alternative operating options, and select a preferred option for Rio Tinto to implement in the Nechako region. This option will remain responsive, rather than a plan that "sits on a shelf".

The WEI Process builds on principles and approaches outlined in the Province of British Columbia's Water Use Plan Guidelines (1998).

2.2 Future Positions

Participation in this initiative does not affect positions participants may currently have or take in the future related to Rio Tinto operations.

2.3 Planning area

The planning area for the WEI is the Nechako Reservoir and the area downstream of the reservoir.

2.4 Regulatory Context

Rio Tinto currently operates within an established regulatory framework. The key components of this framework include legal agreements, a water management flow schedule, and the Final Water License.

The Process will focus on gaining an understanding of the interests of participants, followed by developing objectives, generating operating alternatives, assessing the trade-offs between the operating alternatives, selecting a preferred option, and defining mechanisms to ensure operations remains responsive.





Formal government-to-government consultation with Indigenous communities could be required if the outcome of this process requires regulatory revisions or considerations related to Aboriginal Rights and Title.

2.5 Inclusiveness

The process is meant to be inclusive to incorporate the broad range of interests in the Nechako region.

Active participation in the Process is open to Indigenous communities; municipal, regional, provincial, and federal levels of government, stakeholders, and the public.

3.0 Process guidelines

The Process is expected to identify options to improve Rio Tinto operations in the Nechako region and will:

- Support collaboration, cooperation, and inclusiveness
- Recognize that trade-offs and choices may need to occur
- Embody science and continuous learning
- Focus on issue resolution and long-term benefits
- Adapt to changing conditions

3.1 Forward-Looking Process

The Process is forward-looking, focused on creating improvements in Rio Tinto reservoir operations. This process is not meant to address accommodation or compensation related to historical activities or related claims. The focus is specifically on refining Rio Tinto operations in the Nechako region.

3.2 Process Scope

Examples of topics that could be considered as part of the Process were provided as context during the WEI communication phase. These topics included:

- Spillway discharge schedules
- Flood management measures
- Reservoir levels
- Downstream flow and water temperature targets
- Fisheries and monitoring plans
- Infrastructure



- Research
- Communication

It should be noted that as part of the Process, other interests brought forward by participants will be considered.

4.0 Structure and Process Involvement

Participants have a broad range of interests in the Nechako region that interact with Rio Tinto operations. The following sections provide an overview of the process structure and outline the details regarding participant's involvement in the process.

4.1 Structure

The Process is expected to involve regular face-to-face meetings over an estimated 18-month period. The frequency and location of the meetings will be determined by the participants.

4.2 Participants

Throughout the WEI process, participants in the process will:

- Share their knowledge and experience of the Nechako region
- participate in an open, inclusive and engaged manner with the goal of working collaboratively.

4.3 Alternate Members

Participants are encouraged to identify Alternate Members to act on their behalf in their absence, for process continuity. It is the responsibility of the Alternate Member to:

- Be aware and act according to these Guiding Principles,
- Inform themselves of past discussions and the progress of the Process,
- Respect previous decisions made in the Process.

4.4 BC and Canada participation

Provincial and federal government representatives will take part in the Process and may be available to provide resources and technical support, such as supplying data and technical information. Government representatives are expected to help identify regulatory issues throughout the process.





4.5 Rio Tinto's Involvement

Rio Tinto will be an active participant in the Process. They will represent their interests in the same manner as other participants.

4.6 Transparency and Accountability

The WEI Process will be transparent. During the Process, efforts will be made to share information with the public, based on input from participants. It is envisioned that these could include:

- Website posting of approved meeting summaries, which document discussions held, and decisions made.
- Media can be used to share information about the process. The form of media used could include radio, television, print, or social media. The information content and form of media will be approved by participants prior to release.

4.7 Team Building

Various team building activities will be conducted as part of the Process to help build understanding among the participants. Participants should be willing to participate in various field trips.

4.8 Technical Working Group

A Technical Working Group will be formed to analyze and evaluate different options as determined by participants. Subject matter experts will be recruited to consider technical issues raised by participants. Ecofish Research will be the Technical Working Group (TWG) coordinator and will evaluate analyses, and present results to participants in the process.

Participation in the Technical Working Groups will be open to interested participants in order to enhance transparency.

4.9 Participant Funding

Project No: 18P0173

Funding will be provided by Rio Tinto to support participation in the process. Administration of the funding will be handled by EDI Environmental Dynamics, and will include reimbursement for costs for meeting attendance, preparation time, travel, lodging, and food.

To access funding, participants are asked to complete a Travel Claim Form on a per meeting basis, which will detail the specifics of the costs incurred by the participant to attend meetings. Details on how to complete the form and additional information will be available from the Facilitator.

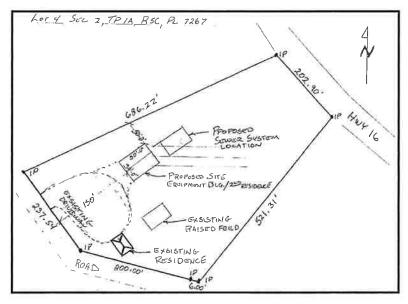

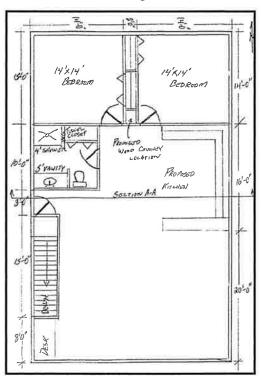

This application is regarding a Crown Grant for Residential purposes. The applicant wishes to purchase the vacant 0.9 ha. parcel, which is located in the community of Endako. Ownersdhip of the property reverted to Crown on Sept. 4th 2014.

The applicant wishes to redevelop the site as a campground with approximately 9 sites for recreational vehicles. The property is zoned Manufactured Home Park (R7); therefore, the use of the site for a campground is not permitted.



The property contains a well that services the subject property and a 12 dwellings in the area. Over the last year the Endako Hall Society have been working with Northern Health and the Ministry of FLNRORD to assume control and responsibility for the system. The RDBN has provided the Endako Hall Society with Grant & Aid Funding to cover the cost of application fees and permitting.

The applicant indicates that he plans to manage the water system and the provision of water service to area residents. The Planning Department has concerns regarding the establishment and expansion of private water systems. They are commonly not operated appropriately, and it can be expected that the RDBN will eventually be called upon the take ownership of the system at some time in the future. However, this system has existed for many years and a number of residents have come to rely on its operation.

My hope is to restore the natural beauty of the property while also trying to re-establish existing Trailer hook ups to accommodate over night stay for seasonal vacation travellers. The overall project plan for the property is to landscape, remove garbage, fence property line, refurbish existing 9 trailer and RV electrical and sewage hook ups, build structure over well opening and electrical box, tear down existing rundown shed and add picnic tables and sitting areas. The building over the well will be 16ft x 16ft and will have a lock to maintain security and safety. Fencing will be along the south edge of the property and will go along both sides where it is accessible and property markers will be placed in area that are not accessible for fencing. Fencing will have gates at both entrances to restrict unwanted entry to property. Landscaping will include leveling ground, remove trees and garbage, move entrance driveway closer to the south side of the property, removing rundown shed as well as adding picnic tables and sitting areas. Existing 9 electrical and sewage hookup are to be refurbished and updated to current regulations. Each hook up will be approximately 55ft long and 22ft-24ft wide and will be able to accommodate seasonal vacation travelers.

Subject: Early engagement on the approach to developing the federal Grizzly Bear Management Plan

Good Day,

As you may know, the Grizzly Bear was listed as a species of special concern under the federal *Species at Risk Act* (SARA) in June 2018. Grizzly Bear was assessed by the Committee on the Status of Endangered Wildlife in Canada (COSEWIC) as special concern in 2012 due to international and regional population declines and pre-listing consultations were undertaken in 2013. This means that, as the next step, Environment and Climate Change Canada (ECCC) must prepare a Management Plan for Grizzly Bear and its habitat in Canada. We are reaching out to let you know that we are beginning the early engagement process to develop the approach that we will use to prepare this Management Plan. We would like your feedback on if and how you would like to be engaged.

The purpose of a Management Plan is to prevent species of special concern from becoming threatened or endangered. The Management Plan for Grizzly Bear in Canada will be an overarching federal document that describes voluntary management practices, broad strategies and conservation measures for this species across its range in Canada. The federal Management Plan will also include a description of the needs of, and threats to, Grizzly Bears as well as the species' background and steps to measure overall progress in addressing the threats to the species. The Grizzly Bear Management Plan will be developed in close collaboration with the appropriate provinces, territories, and Indigenous organizations.

ECCC recognizes the cultural, ecological, and economic significance of Grizzly Bears for Indigenous people and other Canadians and understands the importance of working together in an effort to safeguard this iconic species' well-being. The intent is for the Grizzly Bear Management Plan to reflect well-established Indigenous, provincial, and territorial conservation and management approaches and plans.

We would appreciate your response, letting us know if you would like to provide input and be involved as the work progresses. We also invite you to share with us any related information or concerns you may have with respect to the conservation of Grizzly Bears across the country. We encourage you to connect with us as soon as possible as we develop the approaches that will be used for the advancement of this Management Plan. Grizzly Bears have a heavy, dish-shaped skull with dentition indicative of both a predator and herbivore (large canines and crushing molars), a robust body with long fore-claws, and powerful digging muscles that give the species its characteristic shoulder hump. COSEWIC (Committee on the Status of Endangered Wildlife in Canada) held two Wildlife Species Assessment Meetings in this reporting year (September 1, 2011 to September 30, 2012) from November 21 to 25, 2011 and from April 29 to May 4, 2012. The wildlife species assessment results for the 2011-2012 reporting period include the following: Extinct: 1 Extirpated: 4 Endangered: 29 Threatened: 10 Special Concern: 15 Data Deficient: 2 Not at Risk: 6 Total: 67 Of the 67 wildlife species examined, COSEWIC (Committee on the Status of Endangered Wildlife in Canada) reviewed the classification of 49 species that had been previously assessed. The review of classification for 26 of those species resulted in a confirmation of the same status as the previous assessment (see Table 1a).

The status of wildlife species is assessed by an independent panel of expert Canadian scientists, the Committee on the Status of Endangered Wildlife in Canada (COSEWIC (Committee on the Status of Endangered Wildlife in Canada)). 149 terrestrial species were assessed as at-risk by COSEWIC (Committee on the Status of Endangered Wildlife in Canada) between 2009 and 2016 and are eligible for listing under the Species at Risk Act (SARA (Species at Risk Act)) to be considered by the Governor-in-Council (GIC) on the recommendation of the Minister of the Environment: 86 species would be new additions, 54 currently listed species would be reclassified and 9 species would be updated to reflect changes in their recognized designatable units. Both orders are accompanied by a Regulatory Impact Analysis Statement (RIAS) which presents the implications of listing the species or changing their status. Publishing this plan on the Species at Risk Public Registry is intended to provide transparency about the Government of Canada's plan to make listing decisions under the Species at Risk Act. 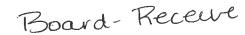

RE: Single Use Plastics Ban

The Regional District of Fraser-Fort George wishes to express its support for the call from the Comox Valley Regional District to consider provincial regulations that would reduce single-use plastic bags and disposable plastic packaging.

According to statistics, 3 billion single-use plastic bags are used in Canada each year. Less than 11 per cent of Canada's plastics is estimated to get recycled. The rest end up in landfills, lakes, parks and oceans, posing significant risks for animals and the environment.

There are some municipalities in BC that have begun to implement bylaws that restrict or reduce the use of single-use plastics by businesses. However, Regional Districts do not have the same authority to impose those restrictions on businesses and the resulting impact is inconsistent rules about single-use plastics, depending on the area you live.

We support the Comox Valley Regional District's call for the Provincial Government to introduce regulations that would diminish the use of single-use plastics throughout the province, regardless where you live or operate a business.

Providing a province-wide regulation will provide a level playing field for business operators and go a long way in protecting our environment from the many harmful effects of single-use plastics.

If supported, the amendment would permit municipalities the authority to impose, by bylaw, an annual vacancy tax on taxable residential and commercial properties. The City of Vancouver has set a precedent for this authority through the *Vancouver Charter*. Our resolution reads as follows:

WHEREAS The City of Vancouver has authority through the *Vancouver Charter* to implement an Annual Vacancy Tax

WHEREAS The City of White Rock is governed through the *Community Charter* where there is no current authority to implement a Vacancy Tax and it is believed that there are a number of vacant residential and commercial properties in the City of White Rock

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT the City of White Rock request that UBCM work with the Province of British Columbia to amend the authority given to Local Governments through the *Community Charter* permitting municipalities the authority to impose, by bylaw, an annual vacancy tax on taxable residential and commercial properties, and that the criteria and administrative requirements be similar to those of the *Vancouver Charter*.

We believe that providing local governments this authority is one step closer towards addressing BC's affordable housing crisis.

RECOMMENDATION

THAT the Governance and Legislation Committee receive for information the corporate report dated June 24, 2019 from the Director of Financial Services, titled "Proposed Vacancy Tax".

INTRODUCTION

This corporate report is in follow-up to Council's resolution of January 28, 2019, that directed staff to prepare a corporate report on a proposal that the City of White Rock implement a vacancy tax, similar to the City of Vancouver, with certain considerations. The motion states that the proposed vacancy tax be 5% of the tax assessed level of the property municipal levy on commercial and residential properties and include a 2.5% municipal levy on the sale of assignments ("flipping"). As well the motion states that all such receipts be earmarked for the acquisition and construction of affordable (or below market rate) housing in White Rock.

ANALYSIS

The first step in considering a plan for a vacancy tax is to determine if the City has the legal authority to impose it. The City has confirmed that, with the exception of the City of Vancouver who have their own Charter, local governments in British Columbia do not have the authority to impose a vacancy tax.

Section 193 (1) of the *Community Charter* states that a municipality may not impose a tax unless it is expressly authorized to do so by statute. The *Community Charter* provides the City with the authority to impose certain types of taxes, such as property value taxes, parcel taxes and local services taxes. However, there is no express authority in the *Community Charter* to impose a vacancy tax.

Unlike other municipalities in the province, the City of Vancouver is governed by the *Vancouver Charter*, rather than the *Community Charter*. Prior to imposing a vacancy tax, it was first necessary for them to work with the Province, to amend the *Vancouver Charter* granting them the authority to impose a vacancy tax. This was done as of July 2016.

If White Rock Council wanted to pursue a similar amendment to the *Community Charter*, an appropriate process would be through a UBCM resolution. The deadline for submitting

resolutions to the UBCM for debate at their fall conference is June 30, 2019. There are specific requirements for the drafting of such resolutions, and they must be adopted by the respective municipal councils before being submitted.

UBCM staff have advised that if resolutions are received past the June 30 deadline, they will be reported to the "Resolutions Committee" but not necessarily recommended to go forward for debate at the conference. All late resolutions are published and distributed to conference attendees, for information.

Another option is to submit a Council endorsed resolution to the LMLGA 2020 spring conference, which if supported, will be forwarded to the 2020 UBCM conference for consideration, if the City wishes.

CONCLUSION

It is recommended that the information contained in this corporate report be received.

During the unprecedented 2017 and 2018 wildfire seasons, Prince George hosted over 13,000 evacuees as our guests for a combined three months. Many NCLGA member communities and First Nations experienced wildfire evacuations and hosted evacuees. As a region, we shared in hardship and lessons learned in supporting evacuees. The secret to our successful responses in both 2017 and 2018 was working together. The City of Prince George (CPG) proposes a new model to carry this success forward (see attached briefing note).

In 2018, CPG learned commercial lodging was a better choice for evacuees than remaining in group lodging for long periods of time. The city has capacity for some 3,000 evacuees in commercial lodging. Should another major evacuation occur, we propose hosting the first 3,000 or so evacuees and once at capacity, additional evacuees could travel to neighbouring host communities that have room available. This concept would better support evacuees, ensure business continuity of our local governments and also assist the local tourism industry and economy during smoky skies.

Preparing for the 'new reality' of wildfire evacuations we now collectively face provides us with the opportunity to collaborate on finding a solution that is better managed together. We may not know where the next major wildfire evacuation will occur, but with this new proposed model, we may better collectively respond and recover.

I look forward to exploring this opportunity further with you.

"SHOULDER TO SHOULDER:" A REGIONAL-BASED APPROACH TO PROVIDING WILDFIRE EVACUEES EMERGENCY SUPPORT SERVICES

Prepared for: NCLGA membership

OVERVIEW

As a response to the 2017 and 2018 wildfire seasons that resulted in Prince George hosting over 13,000 evacuees for a combined three months, the City of Prince George (CPG) proposes a new "hub & spoke" regional based approach to housing evacuees: Prince George, as the northern hub, when called upon, may house some 3,000 or so evacuees in commercial lodging. As the city's vacancy reaches capacity, neighbouring communities could then activate ESS to house additional evacuees. This system provides three main benefits (to both the host communities and evacuees):

- 1. Supporting evacuees: increased customer service by reduced registration wait times and dignified approach housed in commercial lodging rather than group lodging;
- 2. Supporting local government a regional team: emergency management and ESS teams receive invaluable real-time training and experience, network support;
- 3. Supporting local economy: smoky skies and wildfire impacts tourism. Hotels, restaurants and other businesses remain prosperous with evacuees.

BACKGROUND

ESS accommodations are generally provided via three methods: group lodging facilities, billeting, and commercial lodging. In 2017, as a result of a large convention occurring in Prince George, the City opted to use Group Lodging facilities. For traditional ESS events lasting up to 72 hours, temporary communal living, cots and shared bathing facilities may be appropriate. However, for prolonged events supporting thousands of evacuees, commercial lodging offers a more dignified and private experience to evacuees during a stressful time. Commercial lodging also offers flexibility for food choices and living spaces. It also provides sustainability for staff and volunteers as Reception Centres and Group Lodging sites do not require 24/7 operations. As an indirect benefit, the local economy can offset traditional tourism dollars that may be lost as a result of smoky skies by filling local hotel rooms, restaurants, grocery stores, and other local businesses and attractions.

In 2018, Prince George collaborated with neighbouring communities to host evacuees once Prince George's commercial lodging capacity was reached. The communities of Quesnel, Williams Lake, 100 Mile House, Dawson Creek and Fort St. John opened their own respective Reception Centres and received evacuees (re-routed through Prince George). In 2018, this model received preliminary testing and the results were a marked improvement over the 2017 experience.



DISCUSSION

The strength of this model rests with the collaborative, 'ground-up' network effect: when one community nears capacity, others are able to step in and assist. Each local government remains autonomous with separate ESS organizations, yet is able to call upon the larger network once capacity is reached.

Consider a scenario:

Multiple wildfires cause numerous local governments and First Nations to evacuate, to the nearest large centre, Prince George. The City responds and places a call (through EMBC) for potential support from non-affected communities who wish to activate ESS and act as a host community. As Prince George's commercial capacity is being reached, evacuating communities are re-directed to nearby alternate host communities with lodging capacity. This process could continue through multiple host communities as needed.

Limitations:

An evacuation of one or more major population centres may strain this proposal and quickly expend commercial lodging capacity everywhere within the region. Should this occur, large-scale group lodging camps may be used in Prince George to support evacuees as necessary.

Additionally, evacuees with special medical needs may need to be centralized to ensure Northern Health and other agencies are able to best provide necessary services.

Further, some communities without the lodging capacity may choose to assist larger centres.

CONCLUSION AND RECOMMENDATION

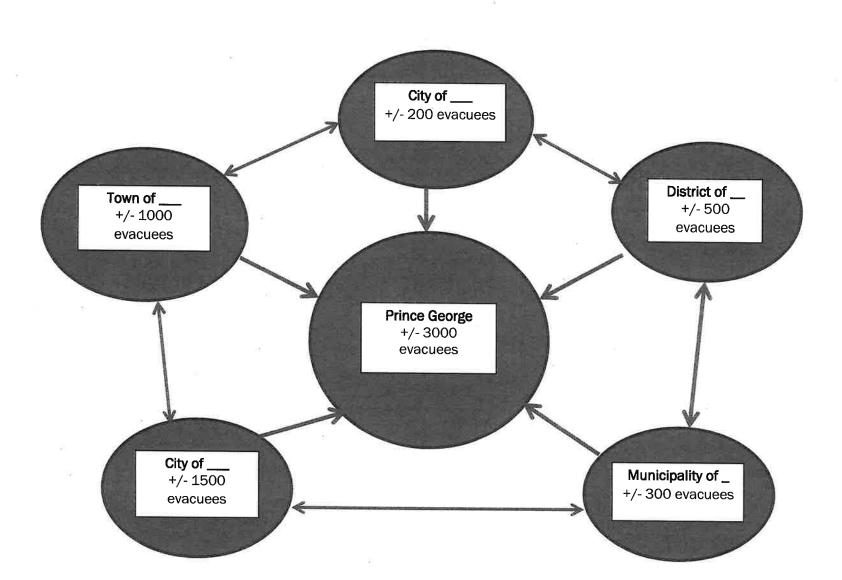
Wildfire-caused evacuations appear to be a new reality we have to collectively learn to live with. Local government is the front-line response to supporting evacuees from neighbouring communities. Through responding together by supporting the larger local government community, we can mitigate many of the overwhelming challenges presented with hosting thousands of our evacuating neighbours. Although we do not know where the next major wildfire evacuation will occur, a unified response will ensure we're collectively prepared and supported. Wetzin'kwa Community Forest Corporation (WCFC) has recently undertaken fire preparedness initiatives that may benefit the community as a whole. These initiatives include the purchase of wild land firefighting equipment, the training of community members in wild land firefighting, maintaining a data base of individuals qualified in firefighting activities, and the establishment of patrols within the Wetzin'kwa Community Forest tenure during hazardous conditions.

Our firefighting equipment and data base will be available for use from Hungry Hill to Witset, where wildfires threaten communities. Only groups or individuals with the appropriate training will have access to the equipment. FireSmart Community Funding & Supports

June 19, 2019

Funding for the 2020 Community Resiliency Investment (CRI) program's FireSmart Community Funding & Supports stream has been confirmed and program materials released. The program is structured to fund FireSmart activities in all eligible First Nation and local government communities throughout BC.

Funding is scaled to offer applicants with lower risk of wildfire to apply for up to \$25,000 and applicants with a demonstrated higher risk of wildfire to apply for up to \$150,000 per year.

The 2020 CRI Program & Application Guide and application materials are now available for the October 18 intake deadline.

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Elements of UBCM's Resolutions Process

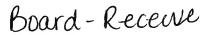
It is our understanding that the Ministry intends to engage with UBCM and embark on additional ALR work including Ministry and ALC guidance to support local governments in their important role in the ALR.

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Feedback Sought: Pool Design and Operations

June 26, 2019

The Ministry of Health is conducting a review is to develop updated standards and/or improvements, which reflect recent innovations and approaches around pool design and operation, while continuing to align with the provisions of the Pool Regulation. The Ministry is requesting comments on their updated, Version 3, draft guidelines for Pool Design and Pool Operations by August 31, 2019.

The previous draft of these guidelines is available on the Ministry of Health website. Comments may be provided to Rupert Benzon in the Health Protection Branch.

Regulatory amendments (changes to the provisions of the Pool Regulation) are out of scope for this initiative.

Key changes that have been incorporated in the updated drafts include:

Guidelines for Pool Design: 1.

- References to specific building code sections/provisions through out the document have been removed, and replaced with general references to the building code (as the building code has periodic updates - for example, change room requirements)
- A section on 'Above Grade Raised Pool Walls' has been added to part 2, section 3.2.
- Extra provisions have been added to part 2, section 3.3 (Flooring).
- Water Dispensing units may now be used as the drinking water supply for pool facilities (part 2, section 5.2).
- A new section on 'Rainwater for Makeup Water' has been added (part 3, section 7.6).
- The Maximum Bathing Load (part 3, section 8.7) has been changed to include depths greater than OR EQUAL to 5 feet in the deep end calculation.
- A section on the use of registered or scheduled products (part 3, section 9.2) has been added.
- BC Fire code provisions have been removed from part 3, section 9.9 (same rationale as Building Code).
- Provisions for Climbing Walls have been added (part 4, section 10.2).

2. Guidelines for Pool Operations:

- Changes to the language under operating permit (section 1) requirements.
- Table 1 (part 2, section 2) amended to reflect 'recommended' testing frequency vs 'minimum' testing frequency.
- The language around the use of cyanuric acid (part 2, section 5.7) has been changed/updated.
- Table 4 (summary of water chemistry parameters) has been moved from section 5.11 to section 5.10.2 (total dissolved solids).
- Part 3, Section 1: Emphasis on course provider's role in setting course length, materials, and prerequisites required (and removal of Health Authority's role in review of courses).
- Additional provisions for the management of movable equipment [and additional movable equipment types (inflatable floating structures, tot docks, etc)] added to part 4, section 1
- Additional details for wading pools has been added to part 4, section 4.1 (Unsupervised Pools).
- · Lifeguard training to include certification by a recognized body and cover Standard First Aid and CPR as additional components (part 4, section 4.4).
- A section on Pool Biomonitoring has been added (part 4, section 4.5).
- Reference to the Health Authority 'Best Practice Guide for Mitigating Suction Hazards in Pools' (part 4, section 8).

Please note that the Chlorine Safe Work Practices Guide [hyperlinks to this document provided in section 10 and 11 (pp 24 and 25) of the Guidelines for Pool Operations] is currently undergoing major revisions by WorkSafeBC staff. Upon completion, the revised document will

be available at the same link.

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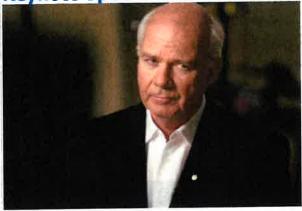

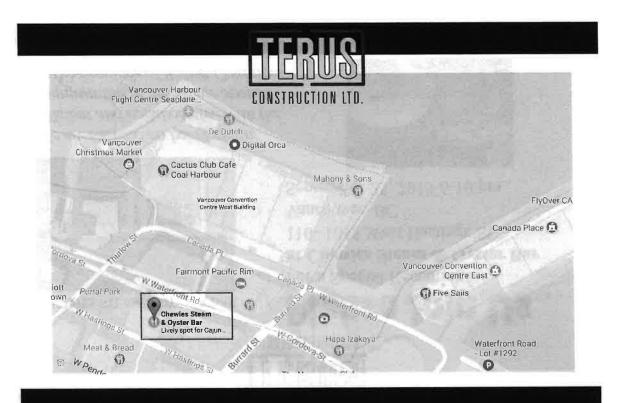

BYLAW NO. 1855

A bylaw to convert and establish the function of funding the Village of Fraser Lake and Electoral Area "D" Television Rebroadcasting

WHEREAS by Supplementary Letters Patent dated March 25, 1976, as amended by Supplementary Letters Patent dated February 4, 1981 and September 15, 1983 the Regional District was empowered to undertake the function to participate in and grant financial aid toward the cost of acquisition, operation and maintenance of a television rebroadcasting system with the Village of Fraser Lake and Electoral Area D as participating member municipalities;

AND WHEREAS the *Local Government Act* authorizes the Regional District Board to convert the function established by supplementary letters patent to a service exercised under the authority of a bylaw establishing the service;

AND WHEREAS the Board wishes to convert the function of providing financial aid toward the cost of acquisition, operation and maintenance of a television rebroadcasting system with the Village of Fraser Lake and Electoral Area D as participating members and increase the tax requisition;

AND WHEREAS under sections 346 and 347 of the *Local Government Act*, the participants have consented to the adoption of this bylaw;

NOW THEREFORE the Regional Board of the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako, in open meeting assembled, enacts as follows:

Citation

This bylaw may be cited for all purposes as the Fraser Lake and Electoral Area "D" Television Rebroadcasting Service Establishment Bylaw No. 1855, 2019.

Conversion and Establishment

The function of Division VIII – Fraser Lake and Area Television Rebroadcasting, granted by Supplementary Letters Patent dated March 25, 1976, as amended by Supplementary Letters Patent dated February 4, 1981 and September 15, 1983 is hereby established as the Fraser Lake and Electoral Area "D" Television Rebroadcasting Service

Scope of Service

The service established by this bylaw includes:



 a) The contribution of funds towards the acquisition, operation and maintenance of a television rebroadcasting system with the Village of Fraser Lake and Electoral Area D.

Service Area

The boundaries of the service area established by this bylaw include the municipality of Fraser Lake and all of Electoral Area "D".

Participants

The participants in the service established are the Village of Fraser Lake and Electoral Area "D".

COST RECOVERY

The annual cost of the service shall be recovered by the requisition of monies in accordance with Section 378 of the *Local Government Act* by one or more of the following:

- (a) property value taxes imposed in accordance with Division 3;
- (b) subject to subsection (2) parcel taxes imposed in accordance with Division 3:
- (c) fees and charges imposed under section 397;
- (d) revenues raised by other means authorized under this or another Act;
- (e) revenues received by way of agreement, enterprise, gift, grant or otherwise.

MAXIMUM REQUISITION

The maximum amount of money that may be requisitioned for the service shall be EIGHTY THREE THOUSAND SEVEN HUNDRED FIFTY DOLLARS (\$83,750).
