# **Christmas DIY**

Here's some ideas to get you started! Look around your home for ideas of what could be made:)

#### **Sock Snowmen**

You'll need a pair of old socks that are crew length or longer. Cut off the top of the sock from the foot. Turn the sock inside out and attach a rubber band tightly to the top of the sock. Then turn the sock right side out again. Fill the sock with rice. Make sure to pack it down as you go so the sock gets a nice round base. Rubber band the top of the sock closed and put another rubber band 3/4 of the way to the top for the head of your snowman. Now decorate! Tie a scarf around your snowman's neck and add eyes, nose and buttons. Use the toe of your cut socks to fashion a stocking cap.






#### **Little Yarn Hats**

First, take a toilet paper roll and fold it a bit for easier measuring. Measure 1.8 cm or 0.7 inch wide strips. You'll get five strips from one paper roll. Now, take your yarn scraps and measure off 35 cm or 14 inch long lengths. You can use whatever color you like, but remember that some yarns are easier to work with than others. Choose one that is not too thick or fluffy. Fold a piece of yarn in half and place inside the strip of paper roll. Keep the ends on one side and the loop on the other. Thread the ends of the yarn into the loop. Then pull them tight to make a knot on the strip. Continue with more strand of yarn until you have the entire strip covered. Next, pull all the loose ends through the loop to the other side.

Take a piece of yarn and tie it around the rest of the threads to form the pom-pom part. Trim the yarn to get a round and fluffy pom. Don't trim the thread you used for tying if you want to hang your hat. And voila! You have a little yarn hat ready to hang!!!

### **Scrap Ribbon Christmas Tree Ornament**

Take some straight sticks or cinnamon sticks, about 6 inches long. Tie the scraps of ribbon down the twig or cinnamon stick. For best results, bunch the ribbons close together. The ribbons will bend and slightly overlap. Gentle tug them into place until you are satisfied with their placement. Use sharp scissors to trim the ribbon scraps into the shape of a Christmas tree. If desired, melt the edges of the ribbon with a match so the ribbon doesn't fray. Hot glue or tie a loop or twin to the top of the tree. If desired, top the tree with a wooden star, yellow button, or primitive metal star. Your scrap ribbon tree ornament is complete!
