Chair Thiessen welcomed Beth Eagles, District Manager, Nadina Natural Resource District, Ministry of Forests, Lands, Natural Resource Operations and Rural Development. Ms. Eagles introduced Cam Bentley, A/District Manager, Regional Operations, Skeena Stikine, Lori Borth, Regional Executive Director, Omineca, Justin Calof, Director Strategic Initiatives, Omineca, Neal Marincak, Resource Manager, Aboriginal Affairs, Burns Lake, Ministry of Forests, Lands, Natural Resource Operations and Rural Development.

# MINISTRY OF FORESTS, LANDS, NATURAL RESOURCE OPERATIONS AND RURAL DEVELOPMENT – Beth Eagles, District Manager, Nadina Natural Resource District RE: Old Growth Deferrals (Cont'd)

Ministry of Forests, Lands, Natural Resource Operations and Rural Development (FLNRORD) staff provided an overview of the Province of B.C.'s Old Growth Deferrals

- In 2019 the Province appointed an Independent two person panel
  - One of the largest engagement uptakes
  - o 14 recommendations regarding old growth
  - Technical panel appointed to select old growth deferral areas
    - Province is working on additional mapping to what is available on the Ministry of Forests, Lands, Natural Resource Operations and Rural Development website
    - Panel identified 2.6 million hectares where old growth could be deferred
    - o Meaning of "deferral": further discussion
  - Province presently working with First Nations
    - 30 days for engagement and initial input
    - Will continue more conversations may take more time
    - FLNRORD has received some input
  - FLNRORD staff working through the process with Deputy Minister Rick Manwaring and Associate Deputy Minister Eamon O'Donoghue
  - FLNRORD working with First Nations over the past several years
    - Cumulative impacts
    - o Understand how to improve sustainability for the forests and communities
    - Component of existing and ongoing work
  - Lessons learned from Mountain Pine Beetle (MPB)
  - Significant decision by the provincial government
    - o FLNRORD highly aware of the potential impacts
  - Two components of Old Growth Deferral
    - Provincial intent
      - Government's current vision for forests different than previous governments
      - Vision driven by reconciliation, climate adaptability and sustainability
      - Preserving old growth
      - Pursing reconciliation and partnerships with First Nations proactively
      - Inheriting a history and context of MPB salvage
      - The Province and FLRNRORD's role chart the future
    - Begun process with a technical product and now turning to partners on reconciliation
      - Seeking input
      - Government set a direction manifested from relationships with indigenous communities
      - Diversity of solutions that will chart the course going forward
      - Be prepared, flexible and adaptive to different solutions.
  - Mapping of the old growth deferral within the RDBN

- Request for further information regarding:
  - Percentage of old growth on the Coast and in the Interior
  - Percentage of each category of old growth within the RDBN
  - Percentage in highly productive areas
  - Compensation
    - If companies have proposed/laid out blocks is there compensation?
- Forest Act
  - Part 12 Division 3 Regulations
    - Section 157 Requirements for replaceable contracts and subcontracts
  - Part 13 Designated Areas
    - Section 168 Definition
    - Section 175.1 No compensation during first 4 years of designation
- FLNRORD staff still need to complete a full analysis of the potential impacts of the Old Growth Deferral
  - The number of deferrals to be recommended to the Provincial Cabinet is unknown at this time
  - Deferral of harvest areas where indigenous support is granted
  - Further discussion of areas will take place where indigenous support is not yet granted
  - Protection order through legislation
  - Short term deferral 2 years
- Timeline and participation in technical panel
  - Initiative by previous Minister of Forests, Lands, Natural Resource Operations and Rural Development Doug Donaldson
  - Strategic review and 14 recommendations regarding old growth
  - Province defined the process temporary measure to manage immediate process in order to define long term outcome for old growth
- Discussions with First Nations regarding cumulative effects and old growth
  - Begun in 2013/2014
  - o Old Growth Deferral First Nations received letter October 21, 2021
- Concerns regarding:
  - Lack of local government consultation and opportunity for meaningful input
  - Impacts to the forest sector significantly impacts municipal/local government budgets, planning and investment attraction
  - Communities are heavily dependent on the forest sector
  - Lack of understanding on the inner working of smaller communities and the devastation that is being caused
  - Unrest and unease of residents and communities throughout the RDBN
    - Impact to social fabric of communities
  - Uncertainty and vagueness are extremely challenging severely impacting families and those directly and indirectly employed by the forest sector
  - Ranchers' ability to utilize Old Growth Deferral Areas for grazing
    - FLNRORD staff will follow up

# MINISTRY OF FORESTS, LANDS, NATURAL RESOURCE OPERATIONS AND RURAL DEVELOPMENT – Beth Eagles, District Manager, Nadina Natural Resource District RE: Old Growth Deferrals (Cont'd)

- FLNRORD staff
  - o Provide concerns to the Provincial Executive Committee
  - Commitment for continued communication
  - Balancing overall forestry health for future generations with a viable forest economy
  - Current old growth deferral impacts are unknown if nothing is done there will also be impacts
  - Encouraged by relationships being built between local governments and First Nations
- Provincial announcement of Old Growth Deferral poorly executed
  - Some First Nations communities within the RDBN have indicated that they have not been consulted or provided the opportunity to provide input
  - Awaiting further information and readable mapping
- Old growth a topic since the 1990's
  - Management through Forest Stewardship Plans and Old Growth Management areas
- Require ground truthing data verification
  - FLNRORD consultation with First Nations
  - Areas outlined by Technical panel have not yet been ground truthed
  - Accurate, complete and readable data and mapping required
    - Concerns have been raised by industry, communities and First Nations regarding the lack of fulsome data and mapping
    - Data required whether deferral moves forward or not
- Forest Management requires improvements
  - Modernizing of forest policy
  - Long term forest future
  - o A pause to ensure inclusiveness of indigenous communities
- Impact of wildfires on Old Growth Deferral areas
  - o Information needs to be confirmed with on the ground surveying
  - > FLNRORD reviewing utilization of burnt timber from 2021 wildfires
- Potential impacts of future fires in the two-year deferral time frame
- Impacts to smaller forest companies
  - Community transitions supports available
  - Permit holders will continue to operate until provided direction
  - Description BC Timber Sales (BCTS) deferring areas in planning stages
    - Will move forward with fiber that is sold
    - Investigating areas that may be modified to adjust for deferral areas
  - Currently fibre continues to move
  - o Challenges in quantifying potential impacts
- Fibre
  - Secondary manufacturing not always feasible
- Impacts to Allowable Annual Cut
- Ensuring input from all Ministries and agencies potentially impacted e.g. Ministry of Environment
- Importance of backcountry to residents including wildlife and forests
- RDBN desire for reconciliation with First Nations
  - Local government not being included in the process of consultation with First Nations is a lost opportunity for local government and First Nations reconciliation
  - Concerns regarding First Nations being provided 30 days for initial comment

# MINISTRY OF FORESTS, LANDS, NATURAL RESOURCE OPERATIONS AND RURAL DEVELOPMENT – Beth Eagles, District Manager, Nadina Natural Resource District RE: Old Growth Deferrals (Cont'd)

- Northwest B.C. Resource Benefits Alliance (RBA)
  - RBA has the information regarding resource dollars that leave the northwest
  - Return of resource dollars to the northwest would give communities the ability to diversify and adjust to changes
- Require clarification from the Province and an opportunity to work together to find a path forward
  - Communities have a desire to be part of the solution and a vibrant future for the north and the Province
- Follow up and continued communication from FLNRORD is imperative
- Request Associate Deputy Minister Eamon O'Donoghue attend a future meeting.

The Board granted permission for Ken Nielsen, Chinook Community Forest to share information regarding Chinook Community Forest tenure area as well as the 2018 Nadina and Verdun Wildfire areas in comparison with the Province's mapping of old growth deferral areas. He identified differences in the Provincial mapping in regard to the wildfire areas. He noted that Chinook Community Forest is undergoing an in-depth analysis utilizing high resolution equipment of its tenure area in relation to old growth deferral. Chair Thiessen thanked Mr. Nielsen for providing the information.

Chair Thiessen thanked Ms. Eagles, Borth and Mr. Marincak and Calof for attending the meeting.

He spoke of the young individuals that move into the RDBN for internships and continue to stay in the region.

Recognition of Past Director Rob Newell

Director Brienen recognized the upcoming two-year anniversary of the passing of Director Rob Newell.

Village of Granisle Curling Club Director McGuire spoke of the Village of Granisle having great member turnout at its Annual General Meeting and planning for an upcoming curling season following COVID-19 protocols.

**COVID-19 Provincial Health** Orders

Director McGuire noted that people are awaiting the announcement by Dr. Bonnie Henry, Provincial Health Officer regarding the COVID-19 Provincial Health Orders due to expire November 19th. #### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Rezoning Bylaw No. 1966, 2021 amends the Zoning Bylaw to add Crematorium as a permitted use in the M1A Zone. There are two parcels in Electoral Area A zoned M1A (3844 Henry Road and 8150 Highway 16). The applicant proposes to establish a Crematorium at the 3844 Henry Road property.

As a result of the input received at the Public Hearing staff are recommending that the application be denied and that staff work with the proponent to identify an alternative location for a Crematorium.



#### **Proposed Rezoning**

The applicant is requesting a text amendment to the Zoning Bylaw to add Crematorium as a permitted use in the M1A Zone to allow the use on their 3844 Henry Road property. The proposed text amendment to the M1A Zone would allow a crematorium on two parcels in the RDBN, both of which are in Electoral Area A, as shown on the previous maps.

A crematorium means the use of land, building or other structure for the cremation of human or animal remains. The cremation of animal remains may use a burning or an alkaline hydrolysis process. The cremation of human remains may only use a burning process. The applicant anticipates that a maximum of approximately 100 humans and 100 animals would be cremated per year. The proposed rezoning would not allow the operation of a funeral home in the M1A Zone.

Crematoriums are currently permitted uses in the Light Industrial (M1), Heavy Industrial (M2), Agricultural Industry (M3), and Special Civic / Institutional (P1A) Zones.

#### DISCUSSION

#### The Regulation of Crematoriums

Crematoriums in BC are regulated by the Business Practices and Consumer Protection Authority and are subject to the regulations in the *Cremation, Interment and Funeral Services Regulation*. These regulations ensure local government approval of the land use and require operation of the cremation equipment according to manufacturers specifications, and other technical requirements. There is a general requirement under the *Environmental Management Act* (Section 6(4)), that applies to crematoriums, that a person must not introduce waste into the environment in such a manner or quantity as to cause pollution. However, emissions from crematoriums are not monitored by any Provincial Government agency and there are no specific emissions standards for crematoriums.

The Business Practices and Consumer Protection Authority says that local governments can set their own emissions standards; however, it is unclear under what authority this could be achieved by the RDBN.

#### **Planning Department Comments**

It appears that there is a gap in service within the Smithers/Telkwa area for Crematorium services, and there appears to be general support for the establishment of a crematorium in the region. However, the issue at hand is whether the properties zoned M1A are appropriate locations for a Crematorium given the potential impact on the local residential community.

Staff's research has indicated that a properly operated crematorium may have little impact on the surrounding community in terms of emissions. However, should the incineration equipment not operate properly there could be times where emissions are visible. In this case staff can not ensure the Board that there would be any meaningful action the RDBN could take to ensure the facility is operated properly. Enforcement would be up to the Provincial Government.

The Public Hearing was very well attended with notable opposition from residents regarding the establishment of a Crematorium at the 3844 Henry Road property. In addition to concerns over emissions there was a general concern that the use does not fit within their established residential community. Given the notable level of opposition from the residents in the vicinity of the Henry Road property staff are not able to recommend Board support.

The report of the Public Hearing will be provided to the Board upon completion and will be on the Supplemental Agenda for the December 16<sup>th</sup> Board meeting.

#### Referral

The Advisory Planning Commission for Electoral Area A recommended that the application be supported. The Ministry of Transportation has no objection to the proposed text amendment. The attached Northern Health submission was received on December 7<sup>th</sup> and was made available to the public prior to the Public Hearing. The Town of Smithers did not respond to the referral.

Thank you for the opportunity to review this land use referral package. The World Health Organization's definition of health states that "health is a state of complete physical, mental and social well-being and not merely the absence of disease or infirmity." In line with this definition, Northern Health is fully committed to ensuring the preservation of the dignity (physical, social and mental health and wellness) of our people and the protection of their built and natural environment (determinants of health, services and infrastructure, land, air and water). In concordance with Northern Health's commitment, statutory and ethical obligation to build and strengthen the health of the people we serve in Northern British Columbia, please find the following comments on a variety of topics to inform your decision making regarding this referral.

#### Air quality:

There are a variety of air pollutants associated with the cremation process (combustion gases, particulate matter and fine dust, organic pollutants, and heavy metals) and these pollutants cause harmful health effects. There are also a variety of good combustion practices which can limit emissions to as low as reasonably achievable (especially given the low volume of this proposed operation). We recommend that the RDBN require the business owner to develop a management plan which details the good combustion practices and other site specific mitigations that will be employed.

- While fine particulate matter causes a variety of health impacts, of particular concern are the polychlorinated dibenzo-p-dioxins (PCDDs) and dibenzofurans (PCDFs), polycyclic aromatic hydrocarbons (PAHs), and heavy metals such as mercury (Hg). These pollutants can be limited with good combustion practices (eg. eliminating plastics and metals from the process). The level of exposure to these pollutants caused by crematoria has not been widely studied and causal effects have not been inferred due to potential confounding factors (ie. the presence of other significant sources of local air pollution or exposure sources) (2020 NCCEH Crematoria emissions and air quality impacts). Mercury from crematoriums accounts for more than 7% of total mercury emissions to the atmosphere in BC, but risk assessment found no indication that ground-level exposures to elemental mercury vapour from crematoriums poses a significant risk to human health (Piagno and Afshari, 2020²).
- Other local sources of air pollution will pose significantly higher air quality risks, especially during periods without a lot of air movement; residential wood burning, open burning, traffic related air pollution, and other industrial emissions all contribute harmful air pollutants to the airshed. The burning of garbage is particularly concerning given the significant quantities of organic pollutants and heavy metals emitted with inefficient and unlawful burning practices.
- The Bulkley Valley Lakes District Airshed Management Society has a <u>Clean Air Plan 2012</u> which details significant local air quality risks and mitigation strategies to build on continuous improvement in the airshed.
- Exposure to air pollutants is cumulative and even small increases in particulate matter or other non-threshold pollutants can cause health impacts. We can use this same logic to infer that the emissions associated with the transportation of these remains will also pose an overall toll on the airshed.
- The cremator unit manufacturer's specifications and recommendations regarding good combustion practices, setbacks and stack height should be considered in the site specific management plan. "Pyrox could run an air dispersion modelling based on your exact conditions if needed." (page 19 of Public Information Package Nov 24-Clean.pdf)

#### Climate change:

Climate change is likely to impact most areas of our lives, including our health. In British Columbia, the principal hazards include rising temperatures, sea level rise, and increased frequency and intensity of extreme weather events (<u>BC ENV – Climate Change Health Risks</u>). Communities need to start incorporating both climate change mitigation strategies and adaptation strategies in their community planning processes.

- Providing cremation services locally not only reduces the greenhouse gas emissions associated with the transportation of the remains, but it also makes the service available in the event of road closures (wash outs, floods) or wildfires.

#### Community health and wellbeing:

- Providing this essential service locally will reduce the stress and financial costs associated with seeking these services outside the community.

Please let us know if there is any additional information, clarification or review we can provide. As mentioned by the <a href="NCCEH">NCCEH</a>, communication with the public about potential impacts and risk reduction strategies early in the development process can help to address concerns and inform appropriate siting, operational controls and monitoring. We appreciate the work that the RDBN has done in this regard.

#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

The proposed rezoning of the property from the Agricultural (Ag1) and Small Holdings (H1) Zones to the Light Industrial (M1) Zone will allow the property to be used for any of the uses permitted in the M1 Zone. The applicant indicates that their plan is to construct a heavy equipment storage building and bring the existing equipment storage and aggregate processing uses into compliance with zoning. Staff recommend that Rezoning Bylaw No. 1965, 2021 be given 3<sup>rd</sup> Reading and Adoption.



#### **Proposed Rezoning**

The applicant proposes rezoning the subject property from the Agricultural (AG1) and Small Holdings (H1) Zones to the Light Industrial (M1) Zone to allow the property to be used for any of the uses permitted in the M1 Zone. The subject property is used for unenclosed heavy equipment

storage and aggregate extraction and processing. The proposed rezoning to the M1 Zone would permit heavy equipment storage and aggregate processing. The only structure on the property is a 7.4 m<sup>2</sup> (80 ft<sup>2</sup>) power shed to supply power to the property.

## **DISCUSSION**

## Official Community Plan and Zoning

The subject property is designated Industrial (I) in the "Smithers Telkwa Rural Official Community Plan Bylaw No. 1704, 2014" (OCP). To the north, west, and south of the subject property are lands designated for future Industrial land use. Both the Regional District and the Town of Smithers have concentrated industrial designations and zoning along Tatlow Road. Only a limited amount of land in the OCP area is designated for industrial development.

OCP Policy 3.3.2(2) states "[n]ew industrial uses will be encouraged to establish within the Industrial (I) designation in the Tatlow Road area". The proposed zoning amendment aligns with the Industrial land use designation of the subject property.

The applicant wants to build a heavy equipment storage space on the subject property, which also has a history of aggregate processing. These are both permitted uses in the Light Industrial (M1) Zone and a property to the north of the proposal area is zoned M2 in the Zoning Bylaw. 

Green = Agricultural (AG1) Zone; Purple = Small Holdings (H1) Zone




## **Seymour Creek**

OCP Policy 4.6.2(6) states "[w]hen rezoning to allow [...] development in area known to have potential hazards, the proper scientific assessments are to be required at the rezoning or subdivision stage to ensure the area is appropriate for development and to mitigate safety concerns and the potential damage to property".

39

The only known potential hazard on the subject property is Seymour Creek, which runs near the western boundary of the subject property, parallel to Tatlow Road (see map below). Seymour Creek appears to be a minor hazard without a history of flooding. The Zoning Bylaw does not allow the construction of a building or structure within 15 m of Seymour Creek. The Floodplain Bylaw has construction elevation and setback requirements that must be met. In staff's opinion these regulations adequately protect any future development from flood damage.

Staff asked the property owner if they would be interested in offering to register a covenant on title of the subject property restricting vegetation removal adjacent to Seymour Creek. The applicant stated they are familiar with the Ministry of Environment and Climate Change Strategy's regulations and do not want to add a covenant to their title.



## **Land Use Conflict**

Staff note the potential for land use conflict as this area transitions to increased Industrial land uses as directed by the OCP. These impacts could include increased noise levels and traffic, and reduced air quality. These impacts were considered during the OCP review process when the lands received their Industrial Designation in 2012. There are a number of dwellings in the area;

however, a number of these properties contain a variety of home occupations and industrial uses and the proposed industrial activity is not out of character with the area.

#### REFERRAL COMMENTS

**Electoral Area A Advisory Planning Commission:** supported the application.

**Northern Health:** No comments received as of the writing of this report.

**Town of Smithers:** No comments received as of the writing of this report.

**Ministry of Agriculture, Food and Fisheries:** No comments received as of the writing of this report.

**Agricultural Land Commission (ALC):** recommended considering a setback (15 m) and vegetative buffer (8 m) requirements from the ALR boundary. See attachment for details.

Staff note: the M1 Zone specifies a 15 m setback from residential zones and a 7.5 m setback when abutting all other zone types. Further, the shared property line between the subject property and the neighbouring property in the ALR is an existing gravel extraction, making a vegetative buffer impractical.

Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure (MoTI): "As per section 52 of the Transportation Act the Ministry has no comments on the proposal as the development is outside of the 800m radius to a controlled access highway intersection that would require Ministry approval. The Ministry will not need to sign the final zoning amendment." Staff confirmed that, at this time, the Bulkley-Stikine MoTI office does not want to review RDBN referrals unless the application is within an 800 m radius of a controlled access highway.

## **PUBLIC HEARING**

The Public Hearing for Bylaw 1965, 2021 was held on December 8, 2021. The Public Hearing report will be provided to the Board on the supplementary agenda.

Thank you for forwarding a draft copy of RDBN Application No: RZ A-08-21 for review and comment by the Agricultural Land Commission (ALC). The following comments are provided to help ensure that the bylaw is consistent with the purposes of the *ALC Act*, the Agricultural Land Reserve (ALR) General Regulation, the ALR Use Regulation, and any decisions of the ALC.

Application No: RZ A-08-21 proposes to rezone property from the Agricultural (AG1) and Small Holdings (H1) Zones to the Light Industrial (M1) Zone to allow the construction of a heavy equipment storage building.

The ALC recognizes that the Property is not within the ALR; however, the eastern boundary of the Property is directly adjacent to ALR lands.

Part 3 of the Ministry of Agriculture's <u>Guide to Edge Planning</u> (2015) describes urban-side edge planning tools to promote urban/rural compatibility. With the construction of a heavy equipment storage building adjacent to the ALR, there may be potential for complaints about farm noise and smells, as well as potential impacts to agriculture, such as dust, trespass, litter, theft, etc.

For this reason, ALC staff recommend considering the setback and buffer requirements outlined in the <u>Guide to Edge Planning</u>, including up to a 15 m industrial building setback from the ALR boundary, and an associated 8 m vegetated buffer to reduce the potential for urban/agricultural conflicts. At minimum, ALC staff recommend fencing along the Property boundary with the ALR, in order to prevent encroachment of industrial uses on to ALR land.

## **PROJECT OVERVIEW**

The Planning Department received the attached letter from the Burns Lake Community Forest Ltd. (BL Comfor) initiating engagement on a proposed Forest Stewardship Plan amendment

within the Burns Lake Community
Forest K1A license area. BL Comfor
has received provincial approval of
its visual amendment request to
implement landscape fire
mitigation efforts in the area
between Burns Lake and Tchesinkut
Lake. (Please visit the Forest
Management page of the Burns
Lake Community Forest website to
see the associated documents.)



Staff has no comments on the amended Forest Stewardship Plan. However, there is interest in the temporary bridge over the narrowest part of Burns Lake ("the Narrows") proposed as



temporary access from the highway to the area south of the lake to facilitate harvesting. BL Comfor indicates that the lake crossing will be finalized in the coming months and the access over the Narrows is planned to be put in place in mid to late summer 2022.

This area is considered to have high recreation values and potential for trail development. However, access to this area is very limited. Therefore, staff are recommending that they work with BL Comfor to explore options for the establishment of a bridge that can be maintained as a permanent pedestrian access to the south shore to facilitate future trail and recreational development in this area.

It is noted that these discussions must also involve the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure, the Ministry of Forests, Lands Natural Resource Operations and Rural Development, First Nations and CN Rail.

## **INTRODUCTION**

Order in Council 438/2021 was released on July 12, 2021, to increase residential flexibility in the *Agricultural Land Reserve (ALR) Use Regulation* which go into effect on December 31, 2021.

In September 2021, RDBN planning staff attended an Agriculture Land Commission (ALC) webinar on the upcoming residential flexibility changes (see Attachments for webinar slides). During the webinar, ALC staff stated some fine-tuning of the policies and procedures were being developed. On December 2, 2021 the ALC released an updated Information Bulletin 05 (see Attachments) to include the residential flexibility changes.

## **DISCUSSION**

## Additional Dwellings – form, density, and RDBN zoning

The change in legislation allows a small additional residence in addition to the principal residence on a property in the ALR. The occupancy of the additional dwelling is no longer restricted to immediate family. The additional dwelling may take a variety of forms, including but not limited to: a garden suite, a carriage house, a manufactured home, and dwelling unit above an existing building. The second dwelling may have a secondary suite. The additional dwelling does not require an ALC application but local governments may further regulate the additional dwelling

(size, location, form, whether they can contain secondary suites) or restrict second dwellings altogether in their bylaws.

## Implications for RDBN:

No changes are required to Zoning Bylaw 1800, 2020. The vast majority of ALR lands located in the RDBN are zoned Agriculture (AG1) in the Zoning Bylaw or are not zoned.


Section 16.0.2.1 of the AG1 zone states "[n]ot more than one Single Family Dwelling shall be located on a Parcel unless additional dwellings are permitted pursuant to the Agricultural Land Commission Act"; therefore, an additional single family dwelling is allowed in the AG1 Zone for properties located in the ALR. While most AG1 zoned properties are within the ALR, this creates a situation where the AG1 properties outside of the ALR have a lower allowable maximum density per parcel. The AG1 Zone limits housing forms to single family dwellings which may include a secondary suite that does not exceed the 90 m² (968 ft²) or 40% of total floor area, whichever is less.

## Additional dwellings – size limits

On parcels 40 ha or less, additional dwellings are limited to 90 m<sup>2</sup> (968 ft<sup>2</sup>) when the principal dwelling is 500 m<sup>2</sup> or less.

On parcels over 40 ha, additional dwellings are limited to 186 m<sup>2</sup> (2,002 ft<sup>2</sup>) when the principal dwelling is lawfully constructed<sup>1</sup>.

If a parcel does not comply with either of the above situations, e.g., a parcel under 40 ha with a dwelling over 500 m², an additional dwelling would not be permitted without an approved ALC Non-Adhering Residential Use application.



The ALC does not regulate the order of placement of the two dwellings, meaning a property owner may build the smaller "additional" dwelling first.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>1</sup> A lawfully constructed principal residence refers to a residence that pre-dates the legislative changes made on February 22, 2019 under Bill 52 or a residence larger than 500 m<sup>2</sup> as approved by the ALC and constructed with appropriate authorizations.

## Additional dwellings – calculating floor area

The ALC has an existing definition of Total Floor Area (TFA) that applies only to principal residences. The ALC has a new definition of TFA specific to the additional dwelling, which goes into effect on December 31, 2021:

"total floor area" (TFA) of the additional 90 or 186 m² residence permitted in the ALR Use Regulation (if permitted by local government bylaw or First Nation Government law), pursuant to Commission Resolution No. 086N/2021, is measured to the outer surface of exterior walls including corridors, hallways, landings, foyers, staircases, stairwells, enclosed balconies, enclosed porches or verandas, basements, and attached garages as part of the TFA unless the additional residence occupies the second storey above a one storey garage or is contained within a permitted building, and excludes attics with attic meaning the unfinished space between the roof and ceiling of the top storey of a building or between a partial wall and a sloping roof."

## Implications for RDBN:

Calculating the floor area of dwellings is critical during the building permit review process. The Zoning Bylaw definition is more restrictive than the ALC's definitions, which include certain exemptions for attached garages and unenclosed carports up to 42 m², basements below grade (principal dwelling only) as well as attics (principal and additional dwelling). The RDBN Zoning Bylaw definition of TFA states,

"FLOOR AREA, TOTAL (TFA) means the total area of all the floors in a Structure measured to the exterior faces of the exterior walls of the Structure, excluding crawl spaces with a vertical clearance of less than 1.8 metres."

While ALC staff have advised on multiple occasions that local governments may use their own definitions from zoning bylaws to calculate total floor area, no formal documents to date have been published on the ALC website confirming this. As such, a conservative approach is to use the ALC definitions when reviewing dwellings located in the ALR. Currently the RDBN uses the definition provided by the ALC to calculate TFA for principal residences on ALR properties to ensure that they do not exceed the 500 m<sup>2</sup> size ALC restriction. Staff will need to incorporate the TFA definition for the 90m<sup>2</sup>/186m<sup>2</sup> additional dwelling into building permit and zoning reviews.

While the ALC states a second dwelling may occupy the second storey of an existing garage or other farm building, many farm buildings are exempt from requiring a building permit. Property owners may face challenges ensuring an existing building has the structural capabilities to support an additional dwelling on the second storey when no permits were issued for the original building.

## Additional and oversized dwellings

Property owners that want more than two dwellings or want dwellings larger than permitted in the ALC regulations will require an ALC Non-Adhering Residential Use application. The additional dwellings will only be considered by the ALC if necessary for farm use. Property owners with extra dwellings and oversized dwellings built prior to the new ALC regulations do not have a right to replace if 75% or more of the dwelling has been substantially damaged or destroyed.

## Removing soil and placing fill

The removal of soil or the placement of fill up to 1,000 m $^2$  (1,195 yd $^2$ ) remains a permitted use in the ALR for the construction or maintenance of a principal dwelling. The requirement to apply for Notice of Intent (NOI) application for placing fill or removing soil exceeding an amount of 1,000 m $^2$  (1,195 yd $^2$ ) for the construction or maintenance of a principal dwelling remains. Further, NOI applications will remain a requirement for other residential uses, including the construction of the newly permitted additional dwelling.

## **Implications for RDBN:**

Staff will not be able to issue building permits associated with the additional dwellings that require the removal of soil or placement of fill until the applicant has their NOI application approved by the ALC. This would include the construction or expansion of a driveway to the additional dwelling.

Many applicants for building permits lack familiarly with the NOI process and do not apply for the NOI in advance of a building permit. Based on ALC advice, waiting on NOI decisions may add 60 to 90 days to the building permit processing timeline.

Property owners may want a second driveway for the additional dwellings. Many applicants for building permits do not realize second residential driveways, even when accessed on no-controlled access highways, require a Highway Use Permit from the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure.

Subject: 2022 Capital Budget Pre-Approval – Air Curtain Burner Purchase

## RECOMMENDATION

 That the Board pre-approve \$100,000 in the 2022 Capital Budget purchase of an air curtain burner.

#### **BACKGROUND**

Air Curtain Burners are devices that supply high pressure air to a contained burn pit or box, primarily for emission reduction. They are also capable of burning larger quantities of wood waste in a given timeframe when compared to that of open burning.

Currently, the RDBN open burns clean wood waste at the Clearview and Knockholt Landfills, and the Granisle and Southside Transfer Stations.

Operation Certificate (OC) MR-8866 for the Knockholt landfill specifies the use of an air curtain burner for burning operations, however, the landfill has been operating under an OC amendment allowing open burning since 2003. Open burns are still permitted at other RDBN facilities.

Staff was informed by the Ministry of Environment and Climate Change Strategy (MECS) that future OC's for all sites will likely require air curtain burning and amendments for open burning cannot be guaranteed.

## **2022 CAPITAL PLAN**

Staff would like to be proactive with our burning operation and has budgeted \$100,000 for the purchase of an air curtain burner in 2022. There are only 2 manufacturers in North America, both of which are experiencing high demand and limited components for the models that the RDBN is interested in. Staff has received quotes and delivery timeframes from both companies (AirBurners and McPherson Systems) for comparable models and have an opportunity to secure an order with January 2022 delivery. Waiting until the budget approval in March 2022, will cause delays in establishing our operations as there are expected to be significant production delays in 2022.

## 2022 BUDGET PRE-APPROVAL

Staff would like to request budget pre-approval of up to \$100,000 for the purchase of the AirBurners T-300 trench burner as it has an easy set-up, better trailer design, equal performance and a lower price than the McPherson M30G.



## **BACKGROUND**

The RDBN and the Town of Smithers have entered into an agreement for Smithers Rural Fire Protection and Recreation and Culture that identifies that the RDBN shall endeavour to take the steps necessary to make the boundaries of the Smithers Recreation and Culture Service Area the same as the boundaries of the Smithers Rural Fire Protection Service Area. It has been identified that the boundaries of the bylaws are not identical, and therefore two properties have been added to the Smithers Recreation and Culture Service Area at the request of the property owners. Attached is Smithers Rural Recreation and Culture Service Area Boundary Amendment Bylaw No. 1968, 2021.

**NOW THEREFORE** the Regional Board of the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako, in open meeting assembled enacts as follows:



Re: Budget 2022 Update and Timelines

## **Recommendation** (All/Directors/Majority):

That a Committee of the Whole Meeting be scheduled for January 20, 2022 to discuss the Draft 2022 Budget.

## Background:

The budget process for 2022 has began with this Board Meeting and will continue into March of 2022.

## Committee and Board Meeting December 16, 2021

Various minor service budgets will be presented to the Rural/Agricultural committee for review including Rural Grant in Aid and Rural Economic Development.

The Board will review the Bulkley Valley Swimming Pool Budget

## **Committee Meeting January 13, 2022**

Minor service budgets that were not previously brought forward will be brought forward to the Rural/Agricultural Committee or the Board including the rural fire department budgets.

## Committee of the Whole Meeting January 20, 2022

The first draft of all the major service budgets will be brought forward including draft requisition totals for each municipality.

## Committee and Board Meeting of February 10 and 24

The budget will receive one reading at each of these meetings.

## **Committee Meeting of March 17**

Revisions to the budget will be presented based on updated assessment from the municipalities for items such as recreation, culture, and fire service provision. Updates to the major service budgets will be presented based on direction of the Board in February.



## **Board Meeting of March 31**

As the Revised assessment will be available from B. C. Assessment, the third reading and adoption of the Budget Bylaw will happen.

While the budget for 2022 is expected to be very similar to 2021, two factors will need to be considered by the Board in January.

The first is the Consumer Price Index for B. C. which is currently sitting at 3.8%. Regional District salaries and wages and remuneration are tied to this amount creating a pressure of approximately 3% on the overall budget. In addition, some fees and charges, including Fort Fraser Water and Sewer are tied to this rate.

The second factor is the increase in assessments. Overall residential properties have increased approximately 20% in value and new construction (including pipeline construction) has increased non-market assessments by over 2%. This non-market increase may help reduce the impacts from inflation, be used for new programs, or be used to face future challenges.

A full report on these two factors will be brought forward in January after additional details become available.

## **Recommendation** (All/Directors/Majority):

That the Board include the Bulkley Valley Regional Pool and Recreation Centre budget in the 2022 Regional District Budget

That the Regional District renew the contract with the Bulkley Valley Aquatic Management Society for a five-year term from January 1, 2022 to December 31, 2026.

## **Background:**

The Bulkley Valley Regional Pool Advisory Commission is appointed by the Board to review the performance of the contract with the Bulkley Valley Aquatic Management Society and to make recommendations on the annual pool budget. The Society members are the Electoral Area A Director, two councillors from the Town of Smithers, one councillor from the Village of Telkwa and one director from the Pool Society.

At a meeting on December 6, 2021, the advisory commission met and made the following recommendations:

- The Board approve the proposed budget for 2022 (including an annual grant of \$655,980 to the Society).
- That the Board renew the contract with the Society for a period of five years.

In addition, The Village of Telkwa has provided a Council motion indicating that they support the annual grant of \$655,980 to the Society.

This recommendation matches the grant level originally set in 2020 and maintained in 2021.

With the recommendation from the commission, Regional District and Society staff members are working on a new five-year contract. This updated contract will be available under separate cover for the December 16, 2021 Board Meeting. The current



agreement expires on December 31, 2021 and without renewal the Society will no longer be insured under the Regional District's liability insurance.

The new contract will be substantially the same as the previous contract but with minor changes recommended by the Regional District's legal advisors.

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## **OPERATING AGREEMENT**

THIS AGREEMENT is made the 24 day of February 2020.

BETWEEN:

REGIONAL DISTRICT OF BULKLEY-NECHAKO

P.O. Box 820 37 Third Avenue Bums Lake, B.C. V0J 1E0

(the "Regional District')

AND:

BULKLEY VALLEY AQUATIC CENTRE MANAGEMENT SOCIETY, (Inc. No. 0026459)

P.O. Box 2298 1316 Toronto Street Smithers, B.C. V0J 2N0

(the "Operator")

## **WHEREAS**

- A. The Regional District is the owner of the lands and premises known as the Bulkley Valley Aquatic Centre (collectively known as the "Facility");
- B. The Operator is duly incorporated under the laws of the Province of British Columbia and has the necessary skills and ability to operate a regional recreational facility such as the Facility;
- C. The Regional District wishes to enter into an agreement with the Operator for the management and operation of the Facility, as more fully set out and described in this Agreement; and
- D. The purpose of this Agreement is to:
  - (1) to set out the respective obligations of the Regional District as the owner of the Facility and the Operator as both the operator of the Facility and the recipient from the Regional District of the major source of the Operator's public funding;
  - (2) ensure the alignment of the objectives of the Regional District and the Operator with respect to the Facility;

NOW THEREFORE the Regional District and Operator in consideration of the premises, and the mutual promises exchanged in this Agreement, agree as follows:

## 1.0 Definitions

## 1.1 In this Agreement

- (a) "Capital Works" means the construction of an addition or improvement to the Facility;
- (b) "Chief Administrative Officer" means the CAO for the Regional District;
- (c) "Hazard" means anything that presents a risk of personal injury or property damage to users and persons at or within the Facility;
- (d) "Facility" means the Bulkley Valley Aquatic Centre and Racquet Courts and Climbing Wall;
- (e) "Term" means the term of this Agreement as established under section 2.1.

## 2.0 Term

2.1 The Term of this Agreement shall be for a period of two years commencing on January 1, 2020 and terminating on December 31, 2021 (the "Term").

## 3.0 Operator's Services

- 3.1 During the Term, the Operator will manage, operate and maintain the Facility in accordance with the terms and conditions set out in this Agreement.
- 3.2 The Operator will render its services to the Regional District with that degree of care, skill and diligence normally provided by the operators of similar regional recreational facilities elsewhere in British Columbia.
- 3.3 The Operator shall manage, operate and maintain the Facility in a manner that is consistent with and to the standards required under the policies of the Regional District. The parties agree that those policies, if any, are incorporated into and form part of this Agreement, and the Operator shall carry out and perform all of the duties and responsibilities of the Operator as described in the Regional District policies. In the event of a conflict between the terms of this Agreement and the Regional District policies, this Agreement shall govern.
- 3.4 The Operator will ensure that all its employees, licensees, contractors and volunteers are appropriately trained, are familiar with all rules, regulations and bylaws applicable to the Facility, and are thoroughly familiar with and able to implement all emergency procedures as required under this Agreement. The Operator will also ensure that its employees, licensees, contractors and volunteers abide by the terms of this Agreement. The Operator will ensure that all of its employees are qualified and have the certifications necessary for the positions they hold. Further the Operator will ensure that all its licensees and contractors are

- registered with Worksafe BC, and hold the required trade certifications for the project for which they are contracted.
- 3.5 From time to time, the Operator may undertake off site activities that are complementary to the operation of the Facility. For example, such activities may include, but are not limited to:
  - the operation of atriathlon; or,
  - · field trips for school age children in the Facility's day camp.
- 3.6 Except as specifically provided elsewhere in this Agreement, during the Term, the Operator will be solely responsible:
  - (a) to supply at its sole cost and expense all administration, management, supervision, labour, equipment (including vehicles, material, supplies) and other services necessary for the management, operation and maintenance of the Facility In accordance with this Agreement,
  - (b) for all other operating expenses during the Term, including, without limitation, all utility and similar charges for the use of electric current, water, sewer, solid waste removal, telephone services and any other fees or charges for services and utilities which may be assessed or charged in relation to the operation of the Facility,
  - (c) carry out equipment maintenance in accordance with the schedules and cycles recommended by the manufacturer and, if none, in accordance with Regional District policies, and where none are applicable, in the manner that a prudent owner of such equipment would maintain them,
  - (d) to comply with the requirements of all Federal, Provincial, Regional District and Municipal laws applicable to the Facility, and
  - (e) to manage all funds received and disbursed in connection with the Facility.
  - 3.7 Except where expressly provided elsewhere under this Agreement:
    - (a) the Regional District shall not be obliged to furnish any services or materials for the management, operation and maintenance of the Facility, or to make repairs or alterations in or to the Facility, and
    - (b) the Regional District shall not be responsible for the payment of any operating expenses inrelation to the Facility.
  - 3.8 As an exception to section 3.5 and 3.6 above, the Regional District will be responsible for the payment of natural gas bills for the Facility.

## 4.0 Accessibility

4.1 The Operator shall ensure that the Facility is open and accessible to the general public during scheduled hours of operation. Notice of any changes in the schedule of operating hours shall be sent to the Regional District at least one week prior to implementation.

4.2 The Operator shall ensure that the Facility is secured at all times when the Facility is closed to the general public.

## 5.0 Safety and Security

- 5.1 The Operator shall implement and follow procedures for security, public safety, public control and emergencies at the Facility to the satisfaction of the Regional District and subject to the approval of the Regional District's insurer.
- 5.2 The Operator shall review and obtain the approval of the Regional District for the procedures in Section 5.1 on an annual basis throughout the Term of this Agreement.
- 5.3 In the event of an emergency, and where the Operator deems it necessary, the Facility may be closed to the general public until the Operator determines that it is safe to reopen the Facility.
- 5.4 The Operator shall ensure that appropriate and sufficient warning signage is posted and maintained, and that information is made available to Facility users, concerning Hazards at the Facility.
- 5.5 The Operator shall promptly notify the Regional District of any major incidents or accidents at the Facility.

## 6.0 Policies and Procedures

- 6.1 The Operator will establish policies and procedures for the operation and management of the Facility but those policies and procedures must be consistent with the following goals and objectives of the Regional District,
  - (a) to enrich the lives of the residents of the community by providing affordable leisure, recreation and fitness opportunities;
  - (b) to manage the Facility in a professional, responsible manner;
  - (c) to promote the Facility and to encourage members of the community to use and support it:
  - (d) to exercise the principles of sound financial management in the operation and management of the Facility;
  - (e) to obtain the approval of the Regional District's Board for any borrowing in respect of the Facility.

## 7.0 Reporting Requirements

- 7.1 The Operator shall, throughout the Term of this Agreement, provide to the Regional District:
  - (a) a quarterly report including
    - (i) an unaudited statement of revenues and expenditures for the quarter in two parts:

- (1) separately for the pool, the racquet courts and the climbing wall, and
- (2) consolidated for the Facility as a whole,
- (ii) minutes of all meetings of the Operator's Board
- (iii) a copy of the Facility Manager's Report;
- (b) notice of the Operator's Annual General Meeting, including an invitation to the three Regional District Directors representing the taxpayers funding the Operator under this Agreement, names of the Directors to be notified to the Operator from time to time as they change by the Regional District;
- (c) an annual budget and a five-year capital plan for the Facility, updated each year, by December 10<sup>th</sup> for the next year
  - (d) an annual update of the proposed schedule of user fees for the ensuing year, by December 10 in each year of the Term;
  - (e) audited annual financial statements for the Facility by June 30th of the ensuing year; and
  - (f) any other information that may be requested by the Regional District from time to time.

#### 8.0 Constitution and Bylaws

8.1 The Operator shall not amend its Constitution or Bylaws without at least 30 days' prior written notice to the Regional District.

#### 9.0 Standards

- 9.1 The Operator shall maintain the Facility in good repair in the same manner as a prudent owner of the Facility would maintain it.
- 9.2 The Operator shall be responsible for all necessary repairs and upgrades to equipment within the Facility.
- 9.3 The Operator shall not undertake any Capital Works in respect of the Facility without the prior written consent of the Regional District.
- 9.4 All Capital Works and any other improvements placed by the Operator within the Facility shall become and remain the property of the Regional District, and shall be maintained by the Operator to the same standards applicable under section 9.1.

#### 10.0 Management

10.1 The Operator shall hire, train, manage, supervise, discipline and terminate all personnel necessary for the management and supervision of the day to day operation of the Facility.

- 10.2 The Operator shall, under the direction of the Regional District, conduct an annual review of Facility operations and of the Operator's services. That annual review shall include a risk assessment of the Facility and the Operator's operations and programs in or at the Facility. The Operator shall implement any changes in management, operational or maintenance practices or standards reasonably requested by the Regional District following such review.
- 10.3 The Operator shall monitor and maintain all public information displayed on notice boards in or outside the Facility, and at any other locations designated by the Regional District.

#### 11.0 Cooperation

- 11.1 The Operator shall, from time to time, communicate with the Regional District and the owners of land adjacent to the Facility with respect to matters of mutual interest or benefit, including:
  - (a) public access issues,
  - (b) nuisance and vandalism,
  - (c) security, and
  - (d) emergency preparedness.

#### 12.0 Sources and Disposition of Revenues

- 12.1 In consideration of the services provided by the Operator under this Agreement, and in lieu of receiving a fee for its services from the Regional District, the Operator shall be entitled to retain all user fees charged and collected by the Operator for the use of the Facility and all other user fees authorized by the Regional District for programs or facilities provided by the Operator.
- 12.2 The user fees charged under section 12.1 shall be the fees established by the Regional District by bylaw from time to time, based on input from the Operator.
- 12.3 The amount, if any, of Regional District operating funds provided to the Operator for the cost of operation of the Facility is in the sole discretion of the Regional District Board and will be determined annually at the same time the Regional District establishes its budget for the ensuing year, and will be subject to Regional District bylaws.
- 12.4 The Operator may conduct its own fundraising to assist it to fund special projects for the Facility or if the Operator determines that it requires funding to supplement the revenues from the user fees under section 12.1 and operational funding provided by the Regional District under section 12.3.

#### 13.0 Financial Accountability and Recordkeeping

- 13.1 The Operator shall, throughout the term of the Agreement, maintain accurate records. to a standard or in such form as would normally be kept by a prudent operator, of all maintenance and repair activities undertaken by the Operator.
- 13.2 During the Term, the Operator shall keep and maintain accurate financial and accounting records in a form that is in accordance with generally accepted

- accounting principles, of all revenue and expenditures in relation to the management, maintenance and operator of the Facility.
- 13.3 The books, accounts, financial records and other records of the Operator with respect to the matters referred to in sections 13.1 and 13.2 shall be open for audit and inspection by the Regional District and its auditors upon 24 hours notice to the Operator during regular business hours, and the Regional District and its auditors may take copies and extracts therefrom.

#### 14.0 Insurance

- 14.1 The Regional District agrees to obtain commercial general liability insurance coverage from the Municipal Insurance Association of British Columbia (MIABC) naming the Operator as an Additional Named Insured entitled to full coverage in the amount of \$10,000,000 (ten million dollars) with respect to third party liability claims arising from the provision of the agreed service. The Operator agrees to carry its own statutory worker's compensation insurance and automobile liability insurance (owned and non-owned), if appropriate.
- 14.2 The Regional District shall insure against all risks of loss or damage to the Facility, Equipment and any and all other chattels and equipment owned by the Regional District and maintained and utilized by the Operator to provide the Services under this Agreement to the full replacement value thereof.
- 14.3 The Regional District will give the Operator timely notice of any changes in Regional District policies of insurance which may affect the operation of the Facility.

#### 15.0 Responsibilities of the Regional District

- 15.1 The Regional District shall provide the Operator on a monthly basis, the funds established by the Regional District in its annual budget for the operation of the Facility.
- 15.2 The Regional District shall notify the Operator in a timely manner of any change in the Directors representing participating areas for the Facility as a Regional District service.

#### 16.0 Termination

- 16.1 If:
- (a) the Operator becomes bankrupt or insolvent, or makes an assignment or petitions for or enters into an arrangement for the benefit of creditors; or
- (b) being an incorporated company or society, proceedings are begun to wind up or dissolve the Operator,

the Regional District may immediately terminate this Agreement.

16.2 If the Operator is in default of the performance of any of its obligations under this Agreement, then the Regional District may, by written notice to the Operator, require that such default be corrected within a period of 30 days. If within 30 days after receipt of such notice the default has not been corrected, the Regional District, without limiting any other right it may have, may immediately terminate this Agreement, in which case the Operator may retain the user fees it has collected to the date of Termination under the terms of this Agreement, less any costs incurred by the Regional District in remedying or correcting the Operator's default.

#### 17.0 Assignment

17.1 The Operator may not assign this Agreement without the advance written consent of the Regional District, which consent may be withheld in the absolute and unfettered discretion of the Regional District.

#### 18.0 Freedom of information and Protection of Privacy Act

18.1 The Operator acknowledges that, as a contractor of the Regional District, it is subject to the provisions and limitations under the *Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act* with respect to the collection, use and disclosure of personal information (as that term is defined under the *Freedom* of *Information and Protection* of *Privacy Act*). The Operator agrees that it shall not collect, use or disclose personal information respecting Facility users, except in strict accordance with the requirements of the *Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act*.

#### 19.0 General Provisions

#### 19.1 Notice

It is hereby mutually agreed that any notice required to be given under this agreement will be deemed to be sufficiently given if:

- (a) delivered at the time of delivery; and
- (b) mailed from any government post office in the province of British Columbia by prepaid registered mail addressed as follows:

#### if to the Operator:

V0J 2N0 Unless otherwise specified herein, any notice required to be given under this Agreement by any party will be deemed to have been given if mailed by prepaid registered mail, or sent by facsimile transmission, or delivered to the address of the other party set forth on the first page of this Agreement or at such other address as the other party may from time to time direct in writing, and any such notice will be deemed to have been received if mailed or faxed, 72 hours after the time of mailing or faxing and, if delivered, upon the date of delivery. If normal mail service or facsimile service is interrupted by strike, slow down, force majeure or other cause, then a notice sent by the impaired means of communication will not be deemed to be received until actually received, and the party sending the notice must utilize any other such services which have not been so interrupted or must deliver such notice in order to ensure prompt receipt thereof.

#### 19.2 Time

Time is to be the essence of this Agreement.

#### 19.3 Binding Effect

This Agreement will endure to the benefit of and be binding upon the parties hereto and their respective heirs, administrators, executors, successors, and permitted assignees.

#### 19.4 Waiver

The waiver by a party of any failure on the part of the other party to perform in accordance with any of the terms or conditions of this Agreement is not to be construed as a waiver of any future or continuing failure, whether similar or dissimilar.

#### 19.5 Cumulative Remedies

No remedy under this Agreement is to be deemed exclusive but will, where possible, be cumulative With all other remedies at law or in equity.

#### 19.6 Entire Agreement

This Agreement when executed will set forth the entire agreement and understanding of the parties as at the date hereof.

#### 19.7 Further Assurances

Each of the parties will do, execute or deliver or cause to be done, executed and delivered all such further acts, documents and things as may be reasonably required from time to time to give effect to this Agreement

#### 19.8 Amendment

No amendment, waiver, termination or variation of the terms, conditions, warranties, covenants, agreements and undertakings set out herein will be of any force or effect unless they are reduced to writing and duly executed by all parties to this Agreement.

#### 19.9 Law Applicable

This Agreement is to be construed in accordance with and governed by the laws applicable in the Province of British Columbia.

At the November Rural/Agriculture Committee meeting, Rural Directors approved allocation of the remaining \$165,019.33 in COVID-19 Restart funds, divided by population, to Electoral Area Services for grants to community groups. Those amounts were added to the \$175,000 that was allocated under the same parameters in October. The Table below shows the starting balance, funding requested and remaining funds in individual Electoral Area Services. 



THAT the Board supports the application to Northern Development Initiative Trust for a grant of up to \$50,000 to host an intern under the Local Government Internship Program from the Northwest and Prince George Regional Development Accounts.

AND THAT the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako is committed to providing sufficient financial and staffing resources, along with training and professional development opportunities while hosting the intern.

#### **Background:**

Staff has prepared an application to Northern Development's Local Government Internship Program for the 2022/23 Internship session. The internship program assists with the hiring of a university graduate in a related field to complete projects at the RDBN from May 2022 – April 2023.

The application requests an intern to support the work of the Administration and Protective Services Departments. Proposed projects may include:

- Community Resilience Investments Grant application preparation;
- maintaining analytical data for the FireSmart Program;
- researching and drafting the Emergency Recovery Plan;
- acting as an Election Official during the 2022 Election process;
- compiling the RDBN Elected Officials Orientation Package; and
- developing the RDBN Corporate Facebook Page and Social Media Plans

A total of \$50,000 in grant funding is available from Northern Development:

- Up to \$35,000 towards salary
- A \$5,000 allowance to support registration and travel costs related to training and professional development
- Up to \$10,000 as a housing allowance may be provided

The cost to the RDBN to have an intern in-house for 12 months will be approximately \$16,200. These costs may in fact reduce project budgets as the intern can complete tasks that would otherwise be outsourced to a consultant.

#### **BACKGROUND**

As part of the RDBN's efforts for creating space to discuss the Truth and Reconciliation Commissions' 94 Calls to Action and how to support local First Nations in their advocacy for reconciliation efforts in the region, staff has prepared this memo to discuss the Calls to Action that focus on the legacy of Residential Schools, language and culture, and health.

In the five Calls to Action brought forward in this report, Call 17 includes all levels of government to allow survivors and their families to reclaim their traditional names on official identification documents with no administrative fee. Through the forced assimilation policies and practices under the *Indian Act*, Indigenous Peoples were forced to adopt English, and often Biblical names assigned to them at random by the local "Indian" agent.

The included health-related Calls to Action are important to reflect on, as while health falls outside of the mandate of local governments, it is relevant to Regional Hospital Districts. As RDBN Directors sit upon the Hospital District Board, reflecting upon the Indigenous healthcare experience is essential. Indigenous Peoples' experiences with, and relationship to, the Canadian healthcare system differ greatly from that of other Canadians. The "In Plain Sight: Addressing Indigenous-specific Racism and Discrimination in B.C. Health Care" and "Implementing the Vision: BC First Nations Health Governance" reports flag the legacy of cultural suppression, displacement from traditional territories and food sources, being subjected to medical experimentation, epidemics, as well as the separation of services from communities, have all played a role in the forced dismantlement of the livelihoods and cultures of First Nations<sup>i</sup>. As such, when reflecting on these Calls to Action, cultural safety", humility", and the use of a trauma-informed approach/lens<sup>iv</sup> are needed, as Indigenous Peoples today continue to have traumatic experiences when accessing healthcare services.

#### CALLS TO ACTION FOR DISCUSSION

Legacy of Residential Schools and Language and Culture.

- 16. We call upon post-secondary institutions to create university and college degree and diploma programs in Aboriginal languages.
- 17. We call upon <u>all levels of government</u> to enable residential school Survivors and their families to reclaim names changed by the residential school system by waiving administrative costs for a period of five years for the name-change process and the revision of official identity documents, such as birth certificates, passports, driver's licenses, health cards, status cards, and social insurance numbers.

Legacy of Residential Schools and Health.

- 18. We call upon the federal, provincial, territorial, and Aboriginal governments to acknowledge that the current state of Aboriginal health in Canada is a direct result of previous Canadian government policies, including residential schools, and to recognize and implement the health-care rights of Aboriginal people as identified in international law, constitutional law, and under the Treaties.
- 19. We call upon the federal government, in consultation with Aboriginal peoples, to establish measurable goals to identify and close the gaps in health outcomes between Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal communities, and to publish annual progress reports and assess long-term trends. Such efforts would focus on indicators such as: infant mortality, maternal health, suicide, mental health, addictions, life expectancy, birth rates, infant and child health issues, chronic diseases, illness and injury incidence, and the availability of appropriate health services.
- 20. In order to address the jurisdictional disputes concerning Aboriginal people who do not reside on reserves, we call upon the federal government to recognize, respect, and address the distinct health needs of the Métis, Inuit, and off-reserve Aboriginal peoples.

ii Cultural Safety: "A culturally safe environment is physically, socially, emotionally and spiritually safe. There is a recognition of, and respect for, the cultural identities of others, without challenge or denial of an individual's identity, who they are, or what they need. Culturally unsafe environments diminish, demean or disempower the cultural identity and well-being of an individual." (In Plain Sight, 2020, page 8).

Cultural Humility: "...a life-long process of self-reflection and self-critique. It is foundational to achieving a culturally safe environment. While western models of medicine typically begin with an examination of the patient, cultural humility begins with an in-depth examination of the provider's assumptions, beliefs and privilege embedded in their own understanding and practice, as well as the goals of the patient-provider relationship. Undertaking cultural humility allows for Indigenous voices to be front and centre and promotes patient/provider relationships based on respect, open and effective dialogue and mutual decision-making. This practice ensures Indigenous peoples are partners in the choices that impact them, and ensures they are party and present in their course of care." (In Plain Sight, 2020, page 8).

# QUICK UPDATE: Vet Shortage

A quick update regarding the veterinary shortage in the north and across BC. This topic remains a priority for the RDBN Rural/Agriculture Committee and the Ag Team. Rural/Agriculture Committee Chair Mark Parker has met several times on this subject with provincial officials and continues to push for practical solutions including opening additional spots for students from BC at the vet school in Saskatchewan, and in particular for students that are interested in living in the north and specialize in treating in large animals.

### **Nechako Valley Food Network**

This month we want to highlight the work done by the volunteers from Vanderhoof that are part of the Nechako Valley Food Network (NVFN).



The NVFN began in the summer of 2008 - 13 years ago, by a bunch of folks that wanted to be able to access local food more easily, to get better at growing, using and preserving local foods themselves, and to improve local food security. This group built the foundation of this organization that created the local producer directory (similar to the RDBN CPP directory), held numerous community celebrations highlighting local food, offered food preserving workshops and other mentorship opportunities related to growing and storing foods, and through partnerships built the Vanderhoof Community Garden.

Although most of the current focus of the group is on maintaining and expanding the community garden, the group continues to explore ways to strengthen the food security of the community through public education, resource sharing, and networking. The NVFN still maintains a local food directory to help link producers and consumers in the Vanderhoof area.

The NVFN welcomes anyone that has a love for local food to join the team and lend a hand, or to contribute ideas to work they do. The NVFN is a member group of the Nechako Healthy Community Alliance society. # Water License and Premise ID Deadlines Approaching

Reminder that there are two important deadlines approaching for farmers and ranchers in the new year:

#### **Groundwater License**

If you use groundwater for non-domestic use (i.e., for farm-use) then you need to obtain a license by March 31, 2022. If you apply on or before March 1, 2022, the application fee is waived and you will maintain your first-in-time, first-in-right status. Go to the information page on the Provincial Govt. website for more information.

**Groundwater License Requirements** 

#### Premise ID

In 2022, it will be mandatory for all properties that house animals to have a Premise ID. "Premises ID is an important tool for protecting the health and safety of your livestock. In the event of an emergency, premises ID information improves our ability to rapidly notify animal owners, contain pest and animal disease outbreaks and more effectively respond to natural disasters like floods or fires."

Dear Gerry Thiessen and Mark Parker:

Thank you for your letter regarding the availability of veterinary medicine services in British Columbia. I apologize for the delayed response.

I appreciate you taking the time to voice your concerns. Veterinarians are valued professionals and government recognizes the critical role they play in supporting British Columbia's agricultural and aquacultural industries and in protecting the health and welfare of companion animals.

Over the past 50 years, British Columbia has been a key partner in maintaining the Western College of Veterinary Medicine (WCVM) as a world-class veterinary college, and the WCVM has in turn helped provide the domestic veterinarian graduates British Columbia needs. This year, the Province will provide the WCVM with more than \$8.45 million in funding to support 80 British Columbia undergraduate students across the four years of the Doctor of Veterinary Medicine program.

Expanding post-secondary education programs, such as veterinary medicine, is a complex undertaking that needs to fit within the larger provincial system. In recognition of the importance of veterinary medicine education, government has increased funding provided to the WCVM by more than \$528,000 over the past five years and we are committed to continuing our current significant annual investment in veterinary medicine training at the WCVM. I am also pleased to share that our Ministry has supported the WCVM to enable an increase in the number of British Columbia students at the WCVM this year; a total of 32 British Columbia students were admitted to the WCVM this September, as compared to 20 in 2019.

Registered Veterinary Technologists are also critical members of the veterinary care team, who help alleviate some of the demand placed on veterinarians; training programs for this position are offered through Thompson Rivers University and Douglas College, allowing over 50 students to become Registered Veterinary Technologists each year.

In addition to recruitment efforts for new graduates from the WCVM, British Columbia's veterinary labour force is also filled through sources such as domestic migrants and international recruitment; the province is fortunate to attract many foreign-trained veterinarians to live and work here, including Canadians returning from study abroad.

In your letter, you encourage British Columbia to establish its own veterinary school. The WCVM was founded on the recognition of both the need for western-trained veterinarians as well as the benefits and advantages of Western Canadian collaboration, including the cost savings to be gained from working together. Launching and operating a new veterinary school in British Columbia would be very expensive and not a cost-effective means of addressing the current pressures of British Columbia's veterinary industry. We remain committed partners with Saskatchewan and Manitoba in the WCVM.

As you note in your letter, it is important to not just recruit more veterinarians but to also encourage more veterinary graduates to take up practice in a diverse range of settings, such as large animal and mixed animal rural practice. The provincial government, including my Ministry and the Ministry of Agriculture, Food and Fisheries (MAFF) and other partners, is working collaboratively to explore ways through which we can encourage more British Columbia veterinarians to practice in high-demand regions and specialties.

I appreciate the frustration British Columbians may be experiencing when they have difficulties accessing a qualified veterinarian in their area. My Ministry will continue to work with the MAFF and key partners, such as the WCVM, to support the practice of veterinary medicine in British Columbia, the economic sectors that rely on veterinarians, and access to an affordable education in veterinary medicine for British Columbia students.

As animal health programs are within the responsibility of MAFF, I have shared your letter with my colleague, the Honourable Lana Popham, Minister of Agriculture, Food and Fisheries.
