He advised that the Recruitment Officer started couple of weeks ago. Director Wiebe stated that with the addition two doctors, they are still 5 short.	
	Chair Greenaway added that there have been occasions recently where 2 of the 3 hospitals in our region are on diversion at the same time.	
	Director Lambert commented on the impacts to other hospitals when diversion occurs. He added that citizens are expressing concerns in regard to the number of closures.	
	It was suggested that a delegation go to Victoria to meet with the Minister of Health.	
<u>Electoral Area F (Vanderhoof</u> <u>Rural) Update</u>	Director Moon commented on her recent experiences at the St. John Hospital. She added that there does not seem to be any staffing issues at the Cancer Unit. She noted that children must go to Vancouver for cancer treatment.	
<u>Village of Fraser Lake</u>	Director Storey reported that she would be attending a meeting with Minister Osborne to discuss hospital closures. She added that she and Director Greenaway will be in Victoria next week and will advocate for the region.

16 What is the Healthy Communities program?

The Healthy Communities team has **three** Leads who each work in a health service delivery area (Northwest, Northern Interior, Northeast) and a **Community Granting Coordinator**. We work with Northern BC communities, including local governments, community organizations, and others to influence the conditions that **promote equity**, **community health**, **and well-being** (e.g., transportation, food systems, neighbourhood design, social connection, and housing).

We are a part of Northern Health's Population and Public Health program. We work collaboratively across the health system and the Northern Health region to protect and promote community health and well-being.



How can local governments collaborate with the Healthy Communities team?

To grant funds to Northern Health for capital projects, a bylaw must be adopted specifying both the specific project and the maximum amount of funds that may be made available to that project.

This bylaw authorizes payments for the building integrity and minor capital grant that is paid annually to Northern Health, as well as two major projects;

St. John Hospital Fire Panel Replacement Burns Lake Hospital Chemistry Analyzer Replacement.

WHEREAS, the Board of the Stuart-Nechako Regional Hospital District proposes to expend money for capital expenditures included in the 2025 annual budget;

AND WHEREAS, those capital expenditures have received the approval required under Section 23 of the *Hospital District Act*;

NOW THEREFORE, the Board of the Stuart-Nechako Regional Hospital District enacts the following capital expenditure bylaw as required by Section 32 of the *Hospital District Act*;

1. The Board hereby authorizes and approves expenditures of money necessary to complete the following capital contribution expenditures totaling up to \$1,036,120 representing a portion of the capital expenditures included in the 2025 budget more particularly detailed as follows:

Description	<u>Amount</u>
St. John Hospital Fire Panel Replacement	\$617,320
BLH Chemistry Analyzer Replacement	\$208,000
Building Integrity and Minor Capital Grant	\$210,800

- 2. The board hereby delegates the necessary authority to the Treasurer to settle payment.
- 3. This bylaw may be cited for all intents and purposes as the "Stuart-Nechako Regional Hospital District Capital Expenditure Bylaw No. 94, 2025."
