### Lana Pestaluky, Healthy Communities Lead (Northwest), Population and Public Health Observatory and Jeff Kormos, Lead, Healthy Communities (Northern Interior), Population and Public Health Observatory – re: Northern Health's Healthy Communities Program: Overview and Opportunities to Collaborate

Ms. Pestaluky provided an overview of the leadership structure and advised that she and Mr. Kormos are part of the Observatory Team.

- Keep people well in their homes and communities, reducing the need for healthcare services.

- Embrace diversity and foster a sense of belonging
- Work together to improve life for everyone
- About 75% of factors that impact health fall outside of health care.

- Visit communities to discuss community health priorities, community health data needs, granting opportunities, etc
